PROCLAMATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR.

In the Name of Her Majesty VICTORIA, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir ARTHUR ELIBANK HAVELOCK, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

A. E. HAVELOCK.

HEREAS by section 22 of the Ordinance No. 16 of 1865 it is enacted that, for the purposes of discontinuing the Police Force when introduced into any district under this Ordinance, the same course shall be taken as is prescribed in the said Ordinance for its introduction, and if the demand for its withdrawal be adopted by the proprietors of two-thirds of the acreage, the Government Agent shall forthwith notify to the Government that the required majority is in favour of the withdrawal of the Police Force, and thereupon it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, by Proclamation in the Government Gazette, to direct that the employment of the said Police Force in the said district shall cease and determine from the date fixed in the Proclamation:

And whereas a Police Force has hitherto been established at Kobonella, in the District of Kandy, in the Central Province:

And whereas it has been notified to Government by the Government Agent of the Central Province that the required majority of proprietors of estates is in favour of the withdrawal of the said Police Force at Kobonella:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do by this Our Proclamation direct that the employment of the said Police Force at Kobonella, in the Districtof Kandy, in the Central Province, shall cease and determine from the date hereof.

Given at Kandy, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twenty-ninth day of January, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-five.
