WHEREAS it has been decided to redistribute the revenue divisions of the Revenue District of Kalutara:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, do hereby proclaim and appoint that the said divisions of the said District shall, from and after the 16th day of August, 1895, consist of the following:—

HEREAS by the 4th section of "The Village Communities' Ordinance, 1889," it is enacted that VV it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation to be by him for that purpose issued, to declare from time to time, as he may think desirable, that any Chief Headman's division or part thereof shall be brought, from a time to be named therein. within the operation of the said Ordinance:

And whereas by the 5th section of the said Ordinance it is further enacted that every Chief Headman's division or part thereof so brought within the operation of the said Ordinance shall be subdivided into villages or convenient groups of villages in such manner as the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, shall appoint; and that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with

the like advice, from time to time to alter and amend such subdivisions:

And whereas by Proclamations dated the 19th day of February, 1879, and 18th day of December, 1885, the Rayigam koralé and Pasdun koralé and the Panaduré Totamune, with so much of the Kalutara Totamune as lies outside the Police limits of the Kalutara town, were brought under the operation of the said Ordinance, and were subdivided into certain villages and convenient groups of villages for the purposes of the said Ordinance:

And whereas it is expedient, in consequence of the subdivision of Pasdun kóralé subsequently thereto into Pasilun kóral. East and Pasilun kóralé West, to alter and amend the subdivisions of the said Rayigam kóralé and Pasdun kóralé and Pánaduré and Kalutara Totamunu, and to subdivide the said Rayigam kóralé and Pasdun kóralé and Pánaduré and Kalutara Totamunu into other villages

or convenient groups of villages for the purposes of the said Ordinance:

SEASON REPORTS FOR THE MONTH ENDED JULY, 1895.

WESTERN PROVINCE

COLOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy: yala plants are thriving, and the prospects of a fairly good harvest continue to be favourable. Dry grain: scarcely any cultivation worth mentioning.

Other products: there is a fair supply of fruits and vegetables, and prices are moderate.

Prices of staple products: rice from Rs. 3.25 to Rs. 4 a bushel; cocoanuts from Rs. 30 to Rs. 35 per 1,000.

Rainfall: the weather has been miserably dry during the month.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally: there is every prospect of a fairly good yala harvest.

NEGOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy, yala: the prospects of the crops of this harvest seem to be good in both korales; the crops in Hapitigam korale are in ear. Maha: fields are being ploughed and sown for this harvest.

Dry grain: kurakkan is in ear in both korales.

Other products: the fruit season is drawing to a close; vegetables are scarce.

Prices of staple products: rice, from Rs. 3 to Rs. 4 per bushel; paddy, Rs. 3 to Rs. 2 per bushel; coccanuts,
Rs. 30 to Rs. 32:50 per 1,000.

Rainfall: hardly any.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally: good.

KALUTARA DISTRICT.

Paddy: the yala crop is three to four months old. The condition of the crop is good.

Dry grain: no dry grain is cultivated in the Totamunas; kurakkan and amu are cultivated in the Pasdun
There is very little dry grain cultivation in the Rayigam korale. The condition of the crop is fair.

Other products: fruits and vegetables are abundant in the Rayigam korale, but scarce in the Pasdun korale

and the Totamunas.

Prices of staple products: country-grown rice, Rs. 4 to Rs. 4 50 a bushel; imported rice, Rs. 3 to Rs. 4 50 a bushel; cocoanuts, Rs. 3 to Rs. 4 per 100.

Rainfall: moderate in the Totamunas and the Pasdun korale, scarce in the Rayigam korale.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally: fair.

CENTRAL PROVINCE.

KANDY DISTRICT.

Paddy: fields for maha being ploughed and sown; yala crops in ear and blossoming; a few fields in Pata Hewaheta are ripening, prospects fair. Dry grain: maha hill paddy chenas in Tumpane and Harispattu being sown; kurakkan chenas in Udunuwara are ripe; and in Yatinuwara blossoming. In Uda Bulatstma chenas are being cleared. Prospects fair in Udunuwara; too early to form an opinion as regards rest. Yala kurakkan blossoming in Tumpane, Harispattu, and Lower Dumbara. In Uda Dumbara and Lower Hewaheta chenas in plants. and in Udapalata being sown; prospects, too early to form an opinion.

Rainfall: sufficient in Uda Dumbara, Udapalata, and Uda Bulatgama; insufficient in the other divisions.

Prices: paddy per bushel, Re. 1.50; kurakkan, Re. 1.25; cocoanuts per 100, Rs. 5.

MATALE DISTRICT.

Matale South: the rainfall during the month is 2.05. The springs and elas are fast drying up owing to the lack of rain, and the fields in crops are therefore dying in several places where there are no streams to irrigate them.

Matale North: rainfall was practically nil. The fine grain chenas have nearly all been reaped, and the crops gathered in Kandapalla korale are estimated as below, which seems satisfactory considering the unfavourable weather: tala, 300 bushels; mun, 170 bushels; member, 200 bushels.

The only paddy produced in the korale during the month was 30 bushels from 3 acres of land under Olu-

Matale East: yala fields under rivers and elas are doing well, but godakumburu have not been yet touched owing to the drought, which has considerably diminished the chena and garden produce.

NUWARA ELIYA DISTRICT.

Paddy: Kotma'e, ploughing and sowing for maha; Uda Hewaheta and Walapane, yala cultivation commenced.
Dry grain: Kotmale, kurakkan chenas sown; Uda Hewaheta and Walapane, no work on chenas.
There was sufficient rain during the month.
Prices of staple articles: paddy, Re. 1.25 to Re. 1.50 a bushel; kurakkan and Indian corn Re. 1.37 to Re. 1.50 a bushel; cocoanuts, Rs. 6 to Rs. 7 a hundred.

Health: generally fair, but fever and dysentery prevail in Walapane.

There was a fair supply of fruits and vegetables.

NORTHERN PROVINCE.

JAFFNA DISTRICT.

Weather: there was rain more or less throughout the district on the 5th: heavy in some parts and light in others. The rainfall registered at the Public Work Department Office, Jaffina, was "nil." Paddy, kalapokam, of 1806: ploughing and manuring were general throughout the district since the rain of 5th July.

Dry grain crops: kurakkan, tinaichami, and panichami were in ear, and the prospects were reported good.

Tobacco: the cutting and curing of tobacco completed during the month, and crop was reported fair.

Price of staple articles: paddy, Re 1.75 per bushel; rice, Rs. 3.50 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1.50 per bushel; thinaichami, Re. 1.25 per bushel; panichami, Re. 1.20 per bushel; varaku, Re. 1.25 per bushel; pinaddu, Rs. 3.75 per kudai.

VAVUNIYA DISTRICT.

 No rain during the month, save a drizzling on the 6th in some villages of Melpattu.
 Kalapokam and idaipokam paddy stacks were threshed. The maha and meda c The maha and meda crops of Mamadu were

harvested during the month; no dry grain; tobacco crops over.

3. Price of paddy varies from Re. 1.25 to Re. 1.60 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1.30 to Re. 1.50; gingelly, Rs. 3.75 to Rs. 4.80. Tobacco fetched, first kind, Rs. 5 per 1,000 leaves; second kind, Rs. 4 per 1,000 leaves; third kind, Rs. 3 per 1,000 leaves.

4. Cattle disease has decreased in the Tamil villages, but has broken out in the Sinhalese villages of Ulubrand and Below.

MANNÁR DISTRICT.

The maha crop in Mantai pattu is still being threshed, and fields manured and fenced for next maha crop. The yala crop in Muchali and Nanuddan pattus, referred to in last month's report, has totally failed for want of water, except under one tank, Murunkan.

Preparations are being made for dry grain cultivation in Mannár island.

Praddy sells at Re. 1-62 per bushel; kurakkan at Re. 1-50 per bushel.

Health of people: fair, with the exception of a few cases of fever and sore-eyes in the island. There have also been 39 cases of cholera along the cooly route. mostly among Indian coolies, of which 28 proved fatal.

Health of cattle: murrain still present in some villages, and cattle generally suffer greatly from want of water

and pasture.

Sea-fishing poor; wind too strong. Rainfall: 0.67.

MULLAITTIVU DISTRICT.

Threshing of paddy is going on in maritime pattus; fields are being prepared for cultivation throughout the district

Prices of food articles: paddy, Be. 1:50 per bushel; rice, Rs. 3:25 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1:25 per bushel, varaku, Re. 1 per bushel; manioc, 4 cents per lb.

Good rain in Karikkaddumulai south; slight rain in Tunukkai and Mulliavalai; want of water is much felt by the people of Puthukkudiyiruppu; weather cloudy, with strong wind.

SOUTHERN PROVINCE.

GALLE DISTRICT.

Paddy, yala: the crop in Four Gravets, Akmimana, Gangaboda, Talpe, Hinidum, and Wellaboda pattus is being harvested, and the return is favourable, except in Hinidum pattu, where it is middling. The crop in Bentota-Walallawiti korale is not ripe yet; it is excellent in the Dedduwa lands, but inferior in the interior divisions.

Dry grain, yala: crop fair, but not plentiful owing to small sowings.

Miscellaneous: jak, plantains, potatoes, and other vegetables are scarce, but cocoanut and breadfruit plentiful.

Price per 1,000 cocoanuts, Rs. 30; breadfruit, Rs. 15.

Price of staple products: rice, from Rs. 3 to Rs. 3:30 per bushel; paddy, Re. 1:50 per bushel; mederi and kurakkan, Re. 1:50 per bushel; and amu, Re. 1:25 per bushel.

Rainfall at Galle: 2:59 inches.

Health: there has been a severe outbreak of fever in the suburbs of Galle along the new railway, and also in the western villages in the Talpe pattu adjoining the line. There is some dysentery in the Gangaboda pattu and Hinidum. Chickenpox has also appeared in Akmimana. Cattle free from disease.

MATARA DISTRICT.

Paddy: prospects for yala harvest poor, owing to long drought; preparations being made for maha. Good rain fell towards end of the month.

Dry grain: practically nil.

Prices: price of paddy same as last month, viz., Re. 1.62 per bushel.

• HAMBANTOTA DISTRICT.

Magam pattu.—Paddy: no cultivation for yala at Tissa. Western Walakada crops half grown in some places and blossoming in others, and will be fit for reaping in a month. Magama: the crop of second maha is being threshed East Giruwa pattu.—Paddy: the crop in all divisions, except of Hatagala and Hewatgala, have been reaped.

Weather: there was no rain except a shower on the 15th instant. All the village tanks are dry, and the whole

country is dried up.

Miscellaneous:, there is a good collection of paddy from the tracts that were harvested, and the price of an.

smunam of paddy is reported to be Rs. 8. Fine grain also Rs. 8 per amunam of 6 bushels; cocoanuts per 100, Rs. 5. Health: health of the people not good; dysentery and fever are prevailing.

Murrain: hoof-and-mouth disease are on the decrease.

West Giruwa pattu.—Paddy: crops of lands dependent solely on rainfall have almost withered away owing to the long-continued drought; under Mandaduwa channel also the crop is said to have withered mostly; under the irrigation works crops fair; under Kirama-ela, too, crops very poor.

Dry grain: applications for maha cultivation of Crown chenas are being made agreeably to the orders of

Government.

Miscellaneous: jak, breadfruit, potatoes, and dry grain are scanty; and the yield of cocoanut trees is also

rather poor.

Prices: paddy, Re. 1.50 to Re. 1.75 per bushel; rice, Rs. 4 per bushel; mederi, Re. 1.50 per bushel; amu
Re. 1.25 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1.50 per bushel; breadfruit, Rs. 5 per hundred; sweet potatoes, Rs. 2 per cwt.;
plaintain bunches, Rs. 40 per hundred; Indian corn, 50 cents per 100 pods; cocoanuts, Rs. 30 to Rs. 40 per 1,000;
pumpkins, Rs. 25 per 100; jakfruits, Rs. 20 to Rs. 25 per 100.

Rainfall: there have been some rainfall on the 1st, 4th, 8th, 9th, and 11th; light rainfall on the 10th, 23rd,

Rainfall: there have been some rainfall on the 1st, 4th, 8th, 9th, and 11th; light rainfall on the 10th, 23rd, and 24th; drizzling on the 13th, 14th, and 26th; the remaining days of the month clear and windy.

The oldest residents say they do not recollect having had such a long-continued drought as the one they are

now experiencing during the last fifty years.

Health: fever, chest colds, and diarrhosa prevailed to some extent in the interior villages; there have been some cases of chickenpox in a house at Getamanna; and three isolated cases in Tangalla and three cases at Kanumuldeniya, and also a few cases of measles in Kahandamodara.

Cattle: from reports received it appears hoof-and-mouth disease is on the decrease. Want of pasture and

water for cattle have been felt greatly.

EASTERN PROVINCE.

BATTICALOA DISTRICT.

Paddy: pinmarai paddy crop on 7,000 acres much damaged by flies in various places; crops ripe, and being reaped whe grain having been much damaged, the harvest cannot be a good one.

Dry grain: nil.

Price of paddy: Re. 1 a bushel. Rainfall: 0 14 inch.

Health: good, with the exception of an occasional fatal case of pneumonia.

TRINCOMALEE DISTRICT.

Rainfall: 2.70 inches.

Paddy crop in Tamblegam pattu good; in Koddiyar pattu likely to fail for want of water; Kaddukkulamputtu nil. No dry grain cultivated.

Tobacco in Kaddukkulam pattu yielded three-fourth crop. Kodiyar pattu and Tamblegam pattu yielded half crop.

Manioc gave fair return in Tamblegam pattu and Koddiyar pattu.

Fisheries in Koddiyar pattu have been good; less so in Tamblegam pattu and Kaddukkulam pattu.

NORTH-WESTERN PROVINCE.

KURUNEGALA DISTRICT.

Dambadeni Hatpattu: yala paddy crops ripening. Operations for maha begun. Reaping of kurakkan and meneri crops begun.

Weudawili hatpattu: 100 acres of paddy land were sown during the month, also about 50 acres with hill.

Orops on paddy and chena land cultivated during the previous months injuriously affected by the drought.

Hiriyala hatpattu: the yala paddy crops in different stages of growth are thriving; dry grain crops are also Ploughing for maha commenced. The rainfall during the month has been however insufficient.

Wanni hatpattu: yala paddy crops ripening and chenas are being cleared for maha. No rain during the month,

and tanks are low, and are drying up.
Only 29 inch of rainfall registered at Kurunegala during the month.

PUTTALAM DISTRICT.

Paddy: young plants in Akkaraipattu south and Pomparippu pattu, prospects poor. No cultivation in Puttalam, and Kalpitiya divisions owing to want of rain. No paddy sown in July in Demala hatpattu; plants of earlier sowing

in places dying for want of rain, and elsewhere earing and ripening with fair propects.

Fine grain: plants in Puttalam pattu partly withered; no sowing in Kalpitiya division. In Demala hatpattu most part died from drought, and small portion being reaped; more chenas being cleared.

CHILAW DISTRICT.

Northern division: preparations being made to sow paddy in kekulan. Fine grain that survived drought now being reaped.

Central division: 1,178 bushels dewareddiri and balawi and 38 bushels of fine grain sown for yala, of which 88½ bushels of the former and 3½ bushels of the latter were damaged by floods in June; remaining crops thriving well. Preparations for maha cultivation are being made.

Southern division: 55 bushels of paddy sown; yala crops promising. Tobacco being planted. Hemp in flower

NORTH-CENTRAL PROVINCE:

ANURADHAPURA DISTRICT.

With the exception of a rainfall of 04 at Anurádhapura on the6th, there has been no rain in the Province

during July.

2. Paddy crops in most of the palatas are being reaped; in some they are still maturing; and in a few they have been threshed.

Crops are somewhat poor owing to the want of water, except under the Yoda-ela.

Tavalu crops for the most part are budding; some crops have been reaped.

There has been but little chena cultivation; the crops were poor. 3.

Some tanks are still quarter full. Most are either completely dry, or contain only sufficient water for

7. Cattle murrain is still prevalent, and the people are suffering from scarcity in the Wilachchiya korale in Nuwargamapalata and in parts of Hurulupalata. There have been some cases of cholera among immigrants.

PROVINCE OF UVA.

BADULLA DISTRICT.

Maha paddy crops in Udukinda below the average; fair in Yatikinda, Wiyaluwa, and Wellassa, but poor in Wellawaya. Preparations for yala cultivation are in progress. Chenas are being cleared. Vegetables are scarce and dear.

Breadfruit, mango, and orange crops good.

Rrainfall in Badulla, 09. Prices: paddy per bushel, Re. 1.25; rice per bushel, Rs. 5.25; kurakkan per bushel, Re. 1.50; Indiancorn per bushel, Re. 1.25; salt per cwt., Rs. 4; cocoanuts per 100, Rs. 7.50.

PROVINCE OF SABARAGAMUWA.

RATNAPURA DISTRICT.

Paddy: the yala crop throughout the district is ripening, except in Atakalan korale, where it is one to two months old. On account of severe drought prospects are not favourable in Kurnwiti korale, nor in the Depattu of Atakalan korale, and crops on large extents of land in the villages Kella, Kolonna, Udawella, and Maduwanwala in Kolonna korale are reported partly withered. In other parts of the district prospects are good. Maha fields have been prepared and sown in Kuruwiti, Nawadun, and Atakalan korales. In Kolonna korale maha crops have been threshed, result satisfactory.

Dry grain: el-wi chenas and owitas have been sown owing to drought; prospects are not very very favourable, except in the Nawadnn and Kukulu korales, where, owing to opportune rain, prospects are better. Kurakkaa chenas in the Depattu of Atakalan korale and in the Bintenna of Meda and Kolonna korales are being cleared. Tana chenas in Kolonna korale are withered, and in some parts they are threshed; outturn unsatisfactory. No cattle murrain; foot-and-mouth disease in some parts of Kuruwiti, Nawadun, Kolonna, and Atakalan korales have been reported.

KÉGALLA DISTRICT.

Paddy: yala prospects are fair; ploughing and sowing for maha are in progress. Rain is very much needed.

Dry grain: hill paddy, kurakkan, and iringu prospects are fair; some of the kurakkan and chenas in Galboda and Kinigoda korales have been damaged owing to the drought; mun sown in Four Korales is doing well; tana sown in Beligal korale and Paranakuru korale is thriving well; chenas are being cleared for amu sowing in Three Korales and Lower Bulatgama.

Prices: paddy, Re. 1.25 to Re. 1.50 per bushel; hill paddy, Re. 1.12 per bushel; kurakkan, 75 cents to Re. 1

per bushel.

Rainfall registered at Ambanpitiya 2:36 (up to 30th), Ruwanwella 2:81 (up to 29th).

Foot-and-mouth disease is reported from parts of Mawata pattu in Paranakuru korale, Kandupita pattu in Beligal korale, and Dehigampal korale. It is on the decrease in Dehigampal korale.

Fever is still prevalent throughout the district, but is less virulent than in the same menth of 1893 or 1894.
