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## MUNICIPAL COUNCIL NOTICES.

#### MUNICIPALITY OF KANDY.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy held in the Town Hall on Saturday, April 27, 1895, at 8 o'clock a.m.

Present :---R. D. Ormsby, Esq. ; J. B. Siebel, Esq. ; E. Beven, Esq. ; Barnes de Alwis, Esq. ; Dr. J. T. Morgan.

1. Resolved that Mr. Ormsby take the chair.

2. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on March 23 were read and confirmed.

3. The following documents were laid on the table :--Statement of Receipts and Disbursements on account of the Municipal Fund from close of 1894 to March 31 last; also separate statements in respect of the General Revenue, Police Assessment, and Water Rate accounts; Progress Report of Works done brought up to the same date; Return of Work done by the Municipal Magistrate, and of Cases instituted by the several Inspectors during the month of March; also Health Officer's Report.

Resolved,—That the several statements, as required by section 90 of the Municipal Councils' Ordinance, be forwarded, with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, to the Colonial Secretary, together with the Health Officer's Report.

4. Read letter No. 5 dated March 11 from the Colonial Secretary, intimating the approval by His Excellency the Governor of the regulations framed under section 9 of the Rabies Ordinance, No. 7 of 1893.

5. Read letter dated April 9 from the Colonial Surgeon on the increase, within Municipal limits, of zymotic diseases. Read report by Surgeon-Captain A. Perry, Health Officer, to whom a copy of the above letter had been forwarded. Read also letter from Mr. M. Cochran, forwarding an analysis of the water from the reservoir, of which a sample had been sent to him.

Resolved,—That if Surgeon-Captain Perry is unable to complete an analysis of the water as supplied, owing to his intended removal shortly from Kandy, fresh samples of water be forwarded to Mr. Cochran for report and analysis.

### Health Officer's Report for March, 1895.

General Health.—The general health of the town has not been good. There have been a greater number of cases of dysentery and bowel complaints, due in all probability to the long-continued drought.

Drainage.—This is getting into much better order, as the works are being pushed on. With the completion of the work and some heavy rains a better sanitary condition of the town may be expected.

Market, Slaughter-house, and Public Latrines.-These establishments have been kept in good order.

Water Supply.—This has been getting rather low, and the expenditure of water is greater than the intake. With care no serious want of water need be feared.

### Progress Report of Work done brought up to March 31, 1895.

(a) Fifteen manhole covers repaired and renewed; 370 lineal yards of barrel drains cleared of silt out gratings; 80 lineal feet of pavement curbing repaired. (b) 131 lines of sides of roads and drains cleared; 4 cubes of landslips and drain silt removed;

126 cubes of gravel transported ; 10.50 lines of road metalled ; 23 squares of road repaired ; cutting bank and widening portion of Gregory road.

(c) 18 lines of sides of roads and drains cleared. (d) 4 cubes of landslips and drain silt removed ; wages of watcher ; sweeping leaves from roads ; proportion of cost of store and latrine cooly.

(e) 100 lines of sides of roads and drains cleared ; 44 lines of side drains deepened and soil removed ; 20 lineal

feet of barrel drain constructed; 1 manhole cover supplied. (f) Repairing front wall of Municipal premises and colour-washing; re-building portion of wall; shifting tiles; repairs to slaughter house; tarring pillars; shifting tiles of cattle exposing shed, and whitewashing and tarring pillars. (g) Watering town streets, portion of Peradeniya road, and railway road. (h) Cleaning ironwork preparatory to painting.

(i) Cleaning charges on barbed wire, &c.
(j) Cleaning charges on barbed wire, &c.
(k) Weeding round trees and plants; repairing tree guards and fences; trimming hedges.
(l) Clearing charges on sundry tools imported.
(m) Pointing in cement portion of retaining wall of the Gonawatta approach.

(n) Cost of new lifting rod and connections of sluice door.

(o) Cleaning and painting ironwork of two fountains.

(p) Wages of watcher; excavating silt; repairs to hand carts; transport of boiler of steam launch to Colombo.

(q) Labour employed working dredger; 112 cubes of silt removed by barge; 230 cubes of silt removed by hard labour ; excavating and heaping silt.

(r) Cutting and mowing grass on esplanade and recreation ground; weeding; repairs to footbridge at recreation ground.

(s) 70 cubes of earth excavated and removed; filling in over new barrel drain; 280 lineal feet of barrel drain re-built, Colombo street; cement concrete invert and brick arch (2 rings); 25 lineal feet of barrel drain repaired in Brownrigg street; 57 lineal feet of pavement curbing relaid; 20 lineal feet of invert of barrel drain rendered in cement plaster ; 14 manholes repaired.

(t) Mining and blasting away ridge of rock at landing stage; cost of sawing timber for repair of boat.

#### GALLE. MUNICIPALITY OF

## Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle held at the Municipal Office on April 10, 1895, at 4 p.m.

Present :-- The Chairman ; Dr. P. D. Anthonisz, C.M.G. ; Dr. J. Attygalle ; W. Abeyesundera, Esq. ; and C. L. M. Abdul Carim, Esq.

1. The Minutes of Meeting held on February 16, 1895, having been printed and a copy sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read. Resolved, That the Minutes be confirmed.

Pursuant to notice Dr. Anthonisz moved "That as the M nutes of Council of February 16, 1895, printed and circulated among the Members, do not disclose the grounds and reasons urged by the mover of the amendment to the resolution contained in paragraph 11, and in view of the reasons of dissent contained in the memorandam of the Chairman, I move I may be allowed to place on the Minutes a memorandam stating the reasons urged by me in support of the amendment, and also in answer to those urged by the Chairman.'

Seconded by Dr Attygalle.-Carried.

Dr. Anthonisz handed in and read the following memorandum :--.

The Chairman has recorded his dissent from the resolution passed on February 16 last, not to utilize the water in the Bikke reservoir. I shall touch on the main grounds of his dissent.

(1) That the water, as reported by the Analyst, is "satisfactory in all respects but one." It is my belief that so (1) That the water, as reported by the Analyst, is "satisfactory in all respects but one. It is my benefit that so long as this one objection continues the water is not fit to be served out to the public. As there is every prospect of the albumenoid ammonia and free albumen being reduced and the water brought to the required purity, it is well to issue the water when this is effected, and not before. I entertain the same hope as the Chairman, that not before long the quality of the water would be so improved as to be fit to be served out to the Fort residents. The steps taken from time to time to improve the quality of the water have been attended with success. The Analyst on December 17, 1894, reports: "A water which contains so much albumenoid matter, and which absorbs so much oxygen, cannot be considered a safe drinking water." Subsequently he reports: "Most authorities would recommend where, as in the present case, the albumenoid ammonia yielded is so much above the general limit, steps should be taken to reduce it by filtration." Has this been done?

I append a few extracts from Parkes' "Hygiene" bearing on the subject :-

"Many waters, particularly rain water, must be filtered through sand before they pass into small cisterns, and

the filter should be cleamed every three or four months. "As far as possible, all reservoirs, tanks, &c., should be covered in; in form they should be deep rather than extended, so as to lessen evaporation and secure coolness. While they should be periodically and carefully cleaned, it would appear that it is not always wise to disturb water plants which may be growing in them.

"The amount of permanent hardness is very important, as it chiefly represents the most objectionable earthy salts. The greater the permanent hardness, the worse is the water. "On no occasion should a water be affirmed to be good, merely because it is colourless, tasteless, and free from

smell.

"Organic matter when dissolved is often quite tasteless. "Whenever a reservoir is so large that it cannot be covered in, it may be suggested whether a second smaller covered tank, capable of holding a few days' supply, might not be provided with a filter through which the water of the large recovering wight he led as required?" the large reservoir might be led as required.

(2) In the second paragraph the Chairman states that "No satisfactory reason has been advanced for rejecting the water solidly because it has an excess of albumenoid ammonia." I admit that there could be no great objection to harmless regetable matter in water, unless the vegetable matter was derived from poisonous plants. One great objection to the use of water containing a large quantity of albumen is that the water will be the means of supplying food for low organisms when they enter into the water, and consequently the organisms will multiply and render the matter a source of disease, which would not be the case if the water was pure.

(3) As regards the authorities quoted by the Chairman in support of his dissent, it is enough to state that Dr. Parkes has 0070 as the limit for albumen in drinking water, and he is the greatest authority on the subject, dead or alive.

(4) In the 4th paragraph the Chairman states that the water is fit for domestic use, and that those who 'drank the water and used it have not suffered from it. A water, unless it contains poisonous matter, will not produce any immediate effect, and impure water has to be used for some time to find out its deleterious properties, as is often seen when water is used in which lead is found dissolved, causing bad colic.

(5) The Chairman states that the water of Bikke reservoir is far superior to what the inhabitants of the Fort use, and he quotes in support from a report of a Sub-Committee of the Council dated 31st December, 1888. But I am informed that several cases of dysentery occurred in the last few months in the Moorish quarters of the Fort, the residents of which freely used the water from the standposts when they were kept running, and some attribute the disease to the water then drunk.

It is difficult to understand that if the water generally used by the inhabitants is bad, why they should be made

It is difficult to understand that if the water generally used by the inhabitants is bad, why they should be made to use and pay for a water which is a little better, and not up to the mark as if it was pure and wholesome water he has a right to get it. It is not equitable to make him pay for water which is bad. It is stated that a Municipal Councillor died of typhoid fever, and that the disease "might possibly be attributed to the drinking water." Here is no positive proof that this person and some members of his family died from drink-ing polluted water ; death may have been caused by the insanitary state of the house and neighbourhood, the air in them from cess-pits being polluted. The water from Labuduwa vended in the Fort for drinking is stated to be contaminated, as it is not kept free from being polluted. Here the water is almost up to the mark of purity with regard to albumen. Dr. Parkes' limit is '0070, and this water contains '0074, only '0004 more, like a drop in the ocean. The inhabitants use the water on account of its softness.

(6) The opinion expressed by the Chairman with reference to the medical authorities who have opposed the superior to what people use, and therefore should be served out, and European ideas of comparative excellence should -be set aside. I must confess I could not agree to this. Our standard of knowledge not only in this matter and in most matters come from Europe. There is Mr. Ernest Hart travelling all over India, Egypt, and Turkey to secure a wholesome water to pilgrims on their pilgrimage to Mecca, where many now die from cholera owing to the absence of pure water. pure water.

(7) With reference to the remark of the Director of Public Works, I must say if he smelt the water of the reservoir before it was cleaned out he would have had a different tale to tell.

(8) The wide view taken by the Chairman in this matter is a proper one for a person without a medical training, and therefore I need not enter into any explanation. In all professions and walks of life people err, and so do To err is human. doctors.

My opinion is that the water in the reservoir should be left out from the bottom to 12 or 15 ft. from it, and the reservoir then allowed to fill, as this is the water which is considered unfit to be issued at any time.

Pursuant to notice Dr. Anthonisz moved for a return showing the sums of money voted and expended on 3 the drains and canal running behind the bazaar, Pitigalawatta, and Magalle on the Matara road since the works were undertaken.

Seconded by Dr. Attygalle .-- Carried.

The Chairman laid on the table the return asked for.

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Pursuant to notice Dr. Anthonisz moved for a return showing the amount voted and spent on flood-outlets from 1870 to 1894.

Seconded by Mr. W. Abeyesundara.-Carried.

The Chairman laid on the table the return required.

5. Submitted the following recommendations of the Standing Committee made at a Meeting held on February 16 last :---

- Recommended to transfer Rs. 1,000 from vote "Improvement of Drainage and Sanitation, Fort," to "Waterworks Account," head "Repairs."
   Recommended that, Rs. 1,500 be transferred from vote "Minor Works" to "Improvement of Drainage and Sanitation, Suburbs."
   Recommended that is a "interview".

- (3) Recommended that the building of the timber groin at the mouth of the new outlet to the Pitigalleela be suspended.

Resolved,-That the above recommendations be adopted.

6. Submitted Auditor's report for 1894. The Chairman informed the Council that the tools in the hands of Municipal officers have been verified. Resolved,—That Mr. Abdul Carim, in conjunction with the Secretary, verify the tools and other materials instore.

7. Submitted reports on permanent repair of roads for February and March last. Resolved,—That these reports be circulated among the Members of Council.

8. Submitted accounts for the months of February and March, 1895.

(a) Metalled 108 lines and gravelled 181 lines of road; used 279 cubes of metal.
(b) Repaired superficially 524 squares of road; repaired 3 lines of Parawa street, 4 lines Hirimbure road, 5 lines Ferry road, 6 lines Cripps road, 4 lines Kong Tree road; trimmed sides 80 lines; and cleared side drains 199 lines; used 15 cubes metal and 140 cubes gravel.
(c) Renewed decayed planks of Wakwella road bridge, Circular road bridge, Bope bridge, Hume road bridge, Kendwatte bridge; used 20 planks; re-fixed 12 planks of Bope bridge; and renewed abutments of Kepu-ela bridge.

(d) Repaired Balcony latrine, sea-bathing places at Victoria park and near the wind mill, sun shades of meat market, fish market roof, and refuse meat market.
