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## "TIGERS" ACCUSE RAW AND CIA

The Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam(LTTE) has charged India with splitting Sri Lanka's militant movement to intervene militarily for securing its diplomalic ends.

It has also alleged a nexus between some high otflcers of India's Research and Analysis Wing (RAW) and the American Central Intelligence Agency(CIA).
"India and Eelam Tamil crisis" a document of the political commitee of the LTE is primarily an appeal to the tami people. It makes starting disclosures about India's role in orming and training the Taril groups and its objectives in Sri Lanka.

## Among the revelations are:

- Indira Gandhl entrusted the task of imparting milltary training of India - based Tamil militant groups (atter the unruly 1983 racial holocaust in the island) to the RAW.
- Some of the RAW officers acled independent of the Indian Government and widened the gap between various militant groups and prevented the formation of a disciplined national liberation movement of the Tamils. The militont groups were rendered tolally dependent on India and reduced to a slave army of the Indian Government.
* An inconsequential group of six exiles the Tamil Eelarn Libercalion Organisation(TELO) and kater the Eelam People's Revolutionery Liberation Front(EPRLF) and the Eelam Revolutionery Organisation of Students(EROS) were deliberately bult up through the training programme as a counterweight to the LTTE wich was the only disciplined group aclive in the tomil areas in Sri Lanka.

The LIE was worried about the growing millitary slrength of these misguided groups' and the possibilily of being destroyed by them. Hence when approached by Inclia, the LTIE agreed to the ofter of "limited mifitary fraining" (by RAW).

U Unlike the other group, the LITE got only limited help, but selup military camps on lis own iniftative (obviously on Incian soil) and enhanced its military strength. Withour depending on India, the LTE got substantial arms from its own sources, thus rising to become a fomidable force to face the challenge of the RAW.

When the TELO launched atlacks on its cadre the LTE retallated and decimated the group. The RAW was disapointed about this and the contlict between the RAW and LITE became acule.

The document says the RAW constifuted an important part of the Indian Govemment and reflected its foreign policy. It functioned directly under the Prime Minister and was an etlective arm of the Indian Government.'Therefore, we have to interpret the actions of the RAW as that of the Indlan political leadership'.

It scrys some high RAW officials acted independentIy of the Indian Govemment and a few even played into the hand of the CIA.

Unnikrishnan, a RAW offickal now in prison and charged wilh acting as an agent of the CIA was responsible for co-ordinating activities of various Tamil groups. But this official was passing on vital information to Sri Lanka (such as the type of training and arms given to various groups, their relrive strength and thelr strotegic plans). Based on this information, Sil Lanka planned its attacks against the LITE.

The conclusions drawn by the LTE are as significant as the revelations.
t Though it wanted to strengthen its assoclation with India and be its royally India regarded the LTTE antinational and had decided to eliminate it.

- India opposed even the minimurn demands of the Tamils and did not want Sri Lanka's ethnic conflici transformed into a national liberation struggle and therefor promoted other militant groups against the LITE.

After Sil Lanka clamped an economic blockad on the Tamil areas and stepped up military operations, India dragged its feet on IITE's request for arms and ammunition. saying It was being considered.

Unnikrishnan informed Sri Lanka that about the LTTE was facing an ammunition shortage and this helped Sri Lankan strategy for an onslaught on Jaffina. India supplied arms and ammunition to 'misguided' groups which were idlling in Tamil Nadu.

* Meanwhile, Indica also threatened Sri Lanka it would supply modern weapons, including anti-aircraft guns, to the LTE to defeat the Govenment forces. This persuaded president J.R. Jayawardene to enter the July 1987 agreement with India.

The accord did not meet Tamil aspirations but only advanced India's commercial political and other inlerests.

The document ends with a promise to the Tamil people that the LTTE will continue to fight for truth and justice in which no great power can ever conquer the peaple who are honest, firm and deeply committed to their cause.
