# MINUTES BY THE GOVERNOR.

WITH the view of preventing any misunderstanding on the subject, HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR in Executive Council has been pleased to direct that the following clause be substituted for the last clause in section 6 of the Minute of November 24, 1891, relating to the Subordinate Civil Service:—

"After appointment every Cadet will be required, before he can receive a substantive appointment, to pass the first examination prescribed for the Civil Service in Law, Accounts, and the Native Languages. If he passes at or before the examination occurring not later than twenty-one months from the date of his being attached to one of the Public Offices, his rank in the Service will count from the date of his appointment as Cadet, otherwise his claim to count his service will be deferred; and should he fail to pass within three years from his being attached, his pay will be withdrawn and the Secretary of State will be recommended to cancel his appointment."

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this Our Proclamation amend the Proclamation of the said 20th day of December aforesaid by re-defining the limits of the said town of Náwalapitiya as defined in the said Proclamation, and We do hereby define that the limits of the said town of Náwalapitiya shall, for the purposes of the said Ordinance, be those set out in the schedule hereto, as from and after the First day of June, 1896.

# ABSTRACT OF SEASON REPORTS FOR THE MONTH OF APRIL, 1896.

#### WESTERN PROVINCE.

#### COLOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy: the usual preparation for yala has in some villages been delayed owing to the recent drought.

Dry grain: there is little or no kurakkan cultivation, but what there is is thriving. Other products: the supply of vegetables and fruit is good, and prices are reasonable. Prices of staple products: rice, from Rs. 3 to Rs. 4 a bushel; cocoanuts, from Rs. 35 to Rs. 40 a thousand.

Rainfall: during the month the rainfall was below the average.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally: a good yala harvest may be expected.

# NEGOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy: the fields in Hapitigam korale are being ploughed for yala; those in Alutkuru korale north have

been sown, and the plants are thriving.

Dry grain: chenas are being prepared for cultivation in Hapitigam korale.

Other products: fruit and vegetables are scarce.

Prices of staple products: rice, from Rs. 3.50 to Rs. 4 per bushel; cocoanuts, from Rs. 35 to Rs. 37.50 a

Rainfall: deficient; there were, however, a few good showers.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally: the yala harvest at present promises to be good.

# KALUTARA DISTRICT.

Paddy: the sowing of the fields for the yala harvest is nearly over, and the plants are thriving well, the present weather being favourable to cultivation.

Dry grain: nil. Other products: fruits and vegetables are abundant in Rayigam korale and in the Totamunes, but scarce in the

Pasdun korale east and west; jak is plentiful, and is largely used as food by the people of Pasdun korale west.

Prices of staple products: imported rice, Rs. 3 to Rs. 4 per bushel; country-grown rice, Rs. 3 to Rs. 4 per bushel; cocoanuts, Rs. 35 to Rs. 40 a thousand.

Rainfall: moderate.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally : good.

#### CENTRAL PROVINCE.

# KANDY DISTRICT.

Paddy, maha: the fields in Pata Dumbara, Uda Dumbara, and Pata Hewaheta are being harvested, and in other divisions harvesting is over. Some fields cultivated later in Pata Hewaheta are still ripening.

Crop or prospects of crop: fair in Uda Dumbara and Pata Hewaheta, and good in Pata Dumbara.

Yala: the fields in Udunuwara, Yatinuwara, Pata Hewaheta, and Udapalata are being sown; in Harispattu

Pata Dumbara, and Uda Dumbara are being ploughed.

Crop or prospects of crop: too early to form an opinion.

Dry grain, maha: hill paddy chenas in Tumpane are being cleared for cultivation. Kurakkan chenas in Udunuwara, Yatinuwara, Tumpane, and Harispattu are being cleared and sown; in Pata Dumbara, Pata Hewaheta, and Uda Bulatgama are being cleared; and in Udapalata in small plants.

Crop or prospects of crop: too early to form an opinion.

Crop or prospects of crop: too early to form an opinion.

Rainfall: sufficient in Yatinuwara, Uda Dumbara, Pata Hewaheta, and Uda Bulatgama, and in other divisions insufficient.

Prices: paddy, per bushel Re. 1.50; kurakkan, per bushel Re. 1.25; cocoanuts, per 1,000 Rs. 60.

#### MATALE DISTRICT.

. Matale south.—The rainfall for the month recorded is 3.74 in. The yala cultivation has begun in most places in Medasiya, Udasiya, Gampahasiya, and Kohonsiya pattus. The fields irrigated by rivers and hill streams are progressing rapidly. Prospects are promising.

Matale north.—The rainfall recorded at Dambulla is 2.80 in. The tanks in most places are partly filled, and the cultivation of paddy fields under them are being ploughed for yala harvest. The cultivation in Inamaluwa korale

is reported to be very satisfactory.

Matale east.—The maha fields in Laggala Udasiya pattu are being reaped, with satisfactory results. In Gangala korales the preliminary operations for yala harvest have begun. Prospects are promising.

## NUWARA ELIYA DISTRICT.

Paddy: Kotmale—maha harvest reaped; crops good; Walapane and Uda Hewaheta—young plants; large extent sown; every prospect of an excellent paddy crop.

Dry grain: Kotmale—chenas being cleared; Walapane and Uda Hewaheta—no work on chenas.

Rainfall : light.

Fruits and vegetables: there was a good supply of vegetables, but very little fruit.

Prices of staple articles: paddy, Re. 1 to Re. 1.50 a bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1 to Re. 1.25 a bushel; Indian corn, Re. 1 to Re. 1.25 a bushel; coccanuts, Rs. 7 to Rs. 8 a hundred.

Health: chickenpox in several villages of Uda Hewaheta, but not of serious form.

Health of cattle: hoof disease still prevailing in Walapane, but not seriously.

# NORTHERN PROVINCE.

#### JAFFNA DISTRICT.

Weather: there was no rain during the month in any part of the District, excepting a slight drizzle in Valikamam east on the 5th, 8th, and 17th, the quantity registered at Jaffna by the Public Works Department being 03 in. The weather was exceptionally sultry.

Paddy: harvesting is over in all parts; the paddy lands other than those under fine grain are being manured.

Prices of grain: paddy per bushel sells at Re. 1 to Re. 1.25; rice at Rs. 3 to Rs. 3.75; kurakkan at 75 cents to Re. 1; kampampullu at Re. 1; kadaikanny at Re. 1.

#### MULLAITTIVU DISTRICT.

Paddy: is being threshed in a few villages; reaping is still going on; crop good.

Tobacco: is being cut and cured; crop satisfactory.

Prices of articles: paddy, Re. 1.25 per bushel; rice, Rs. 3 per bushel; kurakkan, 75 cents per bushel; varaku, 62; cents per bushel; payaru, Rs. 4 per bushel; ellu, Rs. 4 per bushel; kollu, Re. 1.25 per bushel; uluntu, Rs. 4 per bushel.

Weather: there were a few showers of rain during the month. The days were very hot. South-west wind blew at intervals. Fever is said to be prevaling in some parts of the District.

#### VAVUNIYA DISTRICT.

There were a few good showers of rain towards the latter part of the month. Rainfall registered, 2.69 in. Tanks still more or less full.

The kalapokam crop is being reaped and threshed. The idaipokam cultivation is in ear, and prospects very Preparations are being made for sirupokam in some villages. good.

Prices: paddy, Re. 1 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1 per bushel; gingelly, Rs. 4 per bushel; rice, Rs. 3 per bushel

The health of the people is not satisfactory; fever still prevailing to a great extent in the District.

A few cases of murrain are reported in some villages in Cheddikulam west and Kilakkumalai south. Hoof-and-, mouth disease still exists in Panankamam.

MATARA DISTRICT.

Paddy: good.

Dry grain : good.

The crop prospects are reported very good owing to seasonable rains. Prices: paddy and fine grain, Re. 150 per bushel.

#### HAMBANTOTA DISTRICT.

Giruwa Pattu West.

Paddy: late second maha crop being reaped. Land is being sown for yala. Chenas sown with dry grain and Indian corn; prospects fair. Vegetables plentiful.

Rain: occasional showers.

Health: fever, dysentery, and diarrhoea in some villages, but on the decrease.

A few cases of hoof disease amongst cattle.

Giruwa Pattu East.

Paddy: second maha crop reaped and threshed; crop indifferent.

Rain: a few showers.

Health: fair.

Magam Pattu.

Paddy: -Tissa: maha crop stacked; crop suffered from attacks of fly. Ploughing for yala commenced. Chenas nave been a failure.

Rain: very slight. Health: satisfactory.

Food supply: generally sufficient.

Prices: paddy, from Re. 1.25 to Re. 1.50 per bushel; rice, from Rs. 3 to Rs. 4 per bushel; kurakkan, from Re. 1 to Re. 1.25 per bushel; Indian corn, from 50 cents to 62½ cents per 100 pods; sweet potatoes, from 87½ cents to Re. 1.75 per cwt.

#### EASTÈRN PROVINCE.

#### BATTICALOA DISTRICT.

Paddy: early munmari harvested, and later munmari being harvested. The yield of neither is likely to be so good as last year. The former was partly damaged by excessive rain in December and January, and the latter by blight.

Other grain: nil.

#### NORTH-WESTERN PROVINCE.

#### KURUNÉGALA DISTRICT.

Weudawili Hatpattu.—About 200 acres of paddy and 100 acres of chena lands were sown, the weather proving favourable for cultivation. Except a few cases of measles and chickenpox, the health of the people in general was good. The health of cattle was fair.

Wanni Hatpattu.—Though continued rain fell for three and five days, paddy cultivation for the present yala

wanni natpattu.—Though continued rain fell for three and five days, paddy cultivation for the present yala harvest has not yet commenced for want of sufficient rain. Hiriyala Hatpattu.-Greater portion of the crop of fields cultivated for the past harvest was reaped and harvested, the remaining portion being equally good is ready for reaping. Chenas which have been cleared and prepared for cultivation in a scattered area are being sown with fine grain. Health of people and cattle is good.

#### CHILAW DISTRICT.

Northern Division.—Paddy crop reaped and gathered completely, and some chenas for the cultivation of fine grain are being cleared.

Central Division.—Yield of paddy for maha cultivation is reported to be about 24,796 bushels, and that of fine grain to be 1,326 bushels. Dewareddiri and bala-wi cultivation for yala of this year is going on. An extent of about 496 bushels is said to have been cultivated, which is in good condition.

Southern Division.—143 bushels of paddy and 1 of fine grain have been sown during the month. Paddy crops

reported to be thriving well, while yala cultivation is still going on.

# PUTTALAM DISTRICT.

Paddy: in Demala hatpattu the harvesting of the maha crops was being completed. In Puttalam division

fields are being prepared for the yala sowing. In Kalpitiya division some fields are being prepared for cultivation.

Wellawaya: paddy crop ripening, and prospects good. Fruit and vegetables scarce. Weather, wet. Health of people and cattle good.

#### PROVINCE OF SABARAGAMUWA.

#### RATNAPURA DISTRICT.

Paddy: the crops of the second maha fields in Kuruwiti korale are being harvested, they are ripening in Nawadun korale, and they are being reaped and threshed in Atakalan korale. Weather is not favourable for gathering operations. Operations for yala cultivation throughout the District have begun in favourable weather, and sowing has nearly been completed. The maha crop in Kolonna korale has now been harvested; outturn satisfactory.
