Ceylon Medical College.

THE Twenty-sixth Session (1896–97), Winter Term, of the Ceylon Medical College will commence on Thursday, October 1 next.

(2) No person is allowed to be registered as a Medical Student unless he shall have previously passed a preliminary examination in the subjects of general education recognized by the General Medical Council of Great Britain, or possess a Degree in Arts from any University of the United Kingdom, India, or the Colonies, or one of the following certificates:—

Cambridge.—Junior or Senior Local Examination: the certificate must include English, Latin, Mathematics, and one of the optional subjects (Greek, French, German, Logic).

University of London.—Matriculation Examination.

(3) Every person desirous of being registered as a Medical Student shall apply to the Principal of the Ceylon Medical College, and shall produce a certificate of general education recognized by the General Medical Council of Great Britain, and shall pay a matriculation fee of Rs. 10-50.

The Anatomical Rooms are open daily, and Students are aided in their studies by the Lecturer or Anatomy and the Demonstrator.

The following fees have been sanctioned :—

1. The fee for each of the above courses of lectures is Rs. 31-50.
2. The fees for the Hospital Practice of the General Hospital, Colombo, containing 212 beds, Clinical Lectures, and Dispensary shall be as follows :—Rs. 50 a year, or Rs. 44 for six months and Rs. 20 for three months, or Perpetual Ticket for Rs. 150.
3. Practice of the Lying-in Hospital, Rs. 60.
4. Practical Pharmacy under the Apothecary of the Hospital, Rs. 31-50.
5. Vaccination under the Colonial Surgeon and the Inspector of Vaccination, who also gives instruction and officially recognized certificates, Rs. 31-50.
6. The fee for the several examinations of the College are as follows :—For First Professional, Rs. 20 ; Second Professional, Rs. 20 ; Final, Rs. 20.
7. The fee for the License is Rs. 50.
8. The Practice of the Lunatic Asylum, Rs. 10-50.
9. Every Student on registration pays a Matriculation fee of Rs. 10-50.
10. A composition fee of Rs. 700 will be accepted for all the Lectures, Hospital Practice, &c., required for the License of the College, Rs. 800 payable in two yearly instalments, or Rs. 90 half-yearly, from Students who intend to attend all the courses of study provided in the curriculum.

Anatomy.—Dr. L. Leslie will lecture from 2 to 3 P.M. daily (Saturdays excepted).

Dissections (Senior).—From 1 to 2 P.M. daily (Saturdays excepted).

Materia Medica and Therapeutics.—Dr. O. Johnson will lecture from 3 to 4 P.M. on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays.

2. Tenders should be submitted in duplicate, the original being forwarded to the Principal Civil Medical Officer and the duplicate direct to the Hon. the Auditor-General, both being required to be forwarded at the same time.

3. The tenders are to be made upon forms which will be supplied upon application to the Principal Civil Medical Officer and Inspector-General of Hospitals, or to the Medical Officer in charge of the respective hospitals, and no tender will be considered unless it is furnished on the recognized form. Each tender should be for provisioning one hospital only.

4. Every tenderer will be required to make a deposit (on applying for forms) of half the amount of security for hospitals where Rs. 400 or under are required, and Rs. 200 for hospital, where security over Rs. 400 is required; and should any person decline to enter into the contract and bond after he has tendered, or fail to furnish approved security, such deposit will be forfeited to the Crown. All other deposits will be returned after the contract has been signed. The deposit must be made at the Treasury or Kachcheri, and the deposit receipt must be produced to the officer issuing the form as his authority for making the issue. In stations where there are no kachcheries the deposit must be made to the Medical Officer in charge of the Hospital.

5. Provisions should be of the best quality, approvable by the Medical Officer of the hospital.

6. When required, samples must be deposited.

7. The successful tenderers will be required to give cash security as given opposite the name of each station, and to sign the bond given in the tender for the due fulfilment of each contract within a fortnight from date of notification of acceptance of the tenders. The amount deposited for tender forms will form part of the cash security. It is left to the option of the successful tenderer to substitute at any time thereafter for cash deposited by him approved title deeds and to enter into a fresh security bond at his expense.

8. In case any person makes any alterations in his tender before forwarding it, such alteration should invariably bear his initials; otherwise the tender will be treated as informal and rejected.

9. Any further information can be obtained on application to the Principal Civil Medical Officer and Inspector-General of Hospitals.

10. The Government reserves to itself the right, without question, of rejecting any or all tenders, and the right of accepting any portion of a tender.
