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# MINUTE BY THE GOVERNOR.

THE following amended Minute by the Governor, dated July 20,1900, is substituted for the Minute dated July 7, 1900, published in the Gazette of the 13th instant.

#### BATTA TO WITNESSES OR JURORS.

It is hereby notified that the following rules for the regulation of the payment by the Government of the reasonable expenses of complainants and witnesses attending for the purposes of any inquiry, trial, or other proceeding before the Supreme Court have been made by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under the provisions of sections 277 and 431 of "The Criminal Procedure Code, 1898":—

1. Complainants and witnesses who attend the Supreme Court from a distance of more than ten miles shall be entitled to payment of batta and travelling allowances; those residing in the Western, North-Western, Southern, Central, Uva, and Sabaragamuwa Provinces, according to the rates set out

in Schedule A; and those residing in the Northern, Eastern, and North-Central Provinces according to the scale prescribed in Schedule B.

- In calculating batta payable to complainants and witnesses who are not entitled to mileage, one day's batta shall be allowed for every ten miles fully completed and travelled; provided the journey is not performed by public conveyance or otherwise paid for.
- The travelling allowances of Jurors residing at a distance of more than five miles from the Sessions town shall be regulated by this Notification, and the lowest rates of batta and travelling allowance payable to them shall be those prescribed in Class IV. of the Schedule.
- Planters and superintendents of estates (Europeans and respectable descendants of Europeans) and native planters, proprietors, and superintendents of estates of not less than 150 acres in extent in cultivation, residing more than ten miles from the Sessions town, shall be entitled to a special rate of batta of Rs. 7.50 per day.
  - 5. No batta is payable either to Witnesses or Jurors for days on which mileage is drawn.
  - 6. The rules published by Minute of August 26, 1898, are hereby cancelled.

A deposit of Rs. 400, which must be made at the Treasury or Kachcheri, will be required before any form of tender is issued; and should any person fail (within a fortnight after he has been written to or notified to the address given by him of the acceptance of his tender), or decline to enter into the contract and bond after he has tendered or fail to furnish approved security, such deposit will be forfeited to the Crown. All other deposits will be returned upon signature of a contract.

5. When required samples must be deposited. Sufficient securities will be required to join in a bond for the due fulfilment of the contract.

100 quarter cents

The amount of the bond, and all other necessary information, can be ascertained upon application at the offices specified.

7. The Government reserves to itself the right, without question, of rejecting any or all tenders, and the right of accepting any portion of a tender.

8. Persons whose tenders are accepted by Government will be required to bear the expenses of having the security bonds prepared for the due performance of their contract, which bonds will be subject to the approval of the Attorney-General, but may be drawn by the tenderers' own lawyers.

9. When bonds have been drawn by the tenderers' own

lawyers, the name or stamp of the proctor who drafted

the bond should be affixed to the document.

10. Every alteration should bear the initials of the tenderers, and all tenders containing alterations not bearing the tenderers' initials will be treated as informal and rejected.

11. Every tenderer should write his address on his tender, giving the name of the street and the number of

the house he lives in.
