LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, CEYLON.

ADDRESS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL TO THE GOVERNOR IN REPLY TO HIS EXCELLENCY'S SPEECH OF OCTOBER 18, 1900.

To His Excellency the President of the Legislative Council, the Right Honourable Sir J. WEST RIDGEWAY, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Com-mander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

THE Council learn with much gratification of the continued expansion of the revenue of the Island, which has formed so marked and recurrent a feature of Your Excellency's wise rule.

When the day, which they trust may still be distant, arrives for Your Excellency to review your administration of the Colony, they have little doubt that its eminently satisfactory financial position, as now placed before the Council, will continue to exist, and will be the best proof of the manner in which the resources of the Island have been utilized during Your Excellency's tenure of office.

They agree with Your Excellency's views as to the policy to be pursued until the great Railway works now in progress have been completed, and have every belief that the expectations entertained as to the ultimate result of that policy will be realized.

The Council note with pleasure the great increase in the general trade of the Island and especially the progress of the tea industry which is the backbone of its prosperity. 859

They are glad to hear of the successful administration of the Department of Public Works and will carefully consider the scheme which has been mentioned by Your Excellency for the improvement of the condition of its members.

They note with satisfaction the progress made in Railway and Harbour Extensions.

The Council agree with Your Excellency that the Island has every reason to be satisfied with the manner in which justice is administered in Ceylon, and that the marked diminution in crime, to which Your Excellency has alluded, is a proof of the success of that administration and of the attention which Your Excellency has personally devoted to this important subject.

They have given careful attention to Your Excellency's remarks as to the continuous increase of expenditure on Education and on Hospitals and are prepared to consider the policy of introducing a system of local taxation to meet the growing demands under these heads.

Your Excellency's views as to the work of the Survey Department and the employment of its officers commend themselves to the Council.

The appointment of a scientific staff at Peradeniya must conduce to the safeguarding and

development of many of the most important industries of the Island. The Council agree with Your Excellency as to the debt of gratitude due by the Colony to the Plague Committee for its vigilance and efficiency. The establishment and able administration of the Cooly Camp at Ragama has also been of the most eminent service to the Public and to the Planting Industry in particular.

They are of opinion that the separation of the Irrigation Department from the Department of Public Works, and its establishment under a separate Officer, is a step likely to prove of great value to the Colony, in view of the large sums now being devoted to Irrigation and of the fact that the supervision of the various works requires the undivided attention of one controlling head.

They note with interest and concurrence Your Excellency's remarks on the internment of Boer prisoners and on the manner in which the Colony has responded to the appeal for help from India. They agree with Your Excellency as to the expediency of appointing a Special Commissioner to

deal with the question of Buddhist Temporalities.

They are prepared to give their careful consideration to all Legislative measures brought before them, of which some have been foreshadowed by Your Excellency, and assure Your Excellency of their thorough and earnest desire to do all in their power to advance the prosperity of the Island and its people. WEST RIDGEWAY.

HEREAS by section 17 of "The Police Ordinance, 1865," it is amongst other things enacted that whenever the Government Agent shall forward an application of the nature described in sections 15 and 16 of the said Ordinance to Government, together with his report as to the necessity for locating a police force in any district and as to the number of men to compose such force, and the amount in money required for its upkeep, it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, to establish a police force in such district from such time as shall be therein named, and to introduce therein such of the clauses of the said Ordinance as the Governor and Council shall consider expedient :

And whereas the Government Agent of the Central Province did forward to Government an application of the nature described in sections 15 and 16 of the said Ordinance, together with his

report as to the necessity for locating a police force in the district of Ukuwela, in the Central Province, and as to the number of men to compose such force, and the amount in money required for its upkeep, as required by the said section 17 of the said Ordinance :

Now know Ye that We, the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby establish a police force in the said district of Ukuwela, in the Central Province, as from and after the 18th day of October, 1900, and We do hereby introduce the following clauses of "The Police Ordinance, 1865," in the said district, namely, all the clauses of Ordinance No. 16 of 1865, except 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39, 49, 80, and the following up to 97, inclusive :

And the said district shall, for the purposes of the said Police Ordinance, 1865, consist of and comprise all lands and high roads included within the external boundaries of the estates specified in the schedule hereto.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by sections 4 and 5 of "The Cattle Ordinance, 1898," it is enacted that the Governor may, with the advice of the Executive Council, from time to time make, and when made revoke or vary, such regulations as may seem necessary or expedient for the sale, removal, registration and branding of cattle, for the prevention of cattle stealing, and for the issue of cattle vouchers, and that the regulations so made may provide amongst other things for the matters specified in section 5:

And whereas by section 6 of the said Ordinance it is enacted that all regulations made under the provisions of the said sections 4 and 5 shall be published by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, and that the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, may by such Proclamation limit the area within which such regulations or any of them shall be in force in any revenue province, revenue district, revenue division, or smaller area, the limits of which shall respectively be set out in the Proclamation, and that such regulations when proclaimed shall have the same force as if they had been enacted in the said Ordinance :

And whereas by Proclamation bearing date the Fourteenth day of September, One thousand Nine hundred, and published in the *Government Gazette* of the Twenty-first September, One thousand Nine hundred, We the said Governor did proclaim certain regulations made by us, with the advice of the Executive Council, and limit the area within which such regulations shall be in force:

And whereas it is expedient to vary one of the said regulations in manner hereinafter declared :

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim that the Regulation No. 8 of the said regulations shall be and the same is hereby varied by inserting therein the word "lawfully" between the word "been" and the word "acquired," and in all other respects do confirm Our said Proclamation of the said Fourteenth day of September, One thousand Nine hundred.

Reduction in Rate for Conveyance of Cattle by Train.

On and after the 1st October, 1900, and until further notice, imported cattle for all stations between Hatton and Bandarawela inclusive will be conveyed from the Colombo Terminus at the reduced rate of Rs. 27.25 per truck load on production of the usual Customs pass within one week from the date the cattle are landed from the ship.

Transport of Liquid Fuel by Train.

On and after November 1, 1900, liquid fuel in consignments of not less than four tons will be accepted at any goods station on the Ceylon Government Railway for conveyance by goods train at sixth class rate, provided that each consignment is from one consignor to one consignee.

2. If forwarded in quantities of less than four tons, the charge will be as for four tons at sixth class rate or on actual weight at third class rate, whichever is lower.

T is hereby notified that the Local Board of Health and Improvement of Matara has, with the sanction of His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council, in terms of section 30 of the Local Board Ordinance, No. 13 of 1898, made and assessed for the year 1901, over and above the sum necessary for the maintenance of the police for the said town, a rate of two and one-half per centum on the annual value of all houses and buildings of any description and of all lands and tenements whatsoever within the limits of the Local Board of Matara, subject to the provisions of the aforesaid section.

THE following rules proposed to be made under section 4 of Ordinance No. 2 of 1896 are published for general information.

By His Excellency the Governor's command,

Rules referred to.

1. It shall not be lawful for any one to employ workmen or work in a pit which, in the opinion of the Inspector of Mines, is not sufficiently ventilated, or under circumstances which are in the opinion of the Inspector such as to render it probable that injury may result to any person either in the mine or its vicinity. In all such cases it shall be the duty of the Inspector of Mines to deliver to the owner, manager, superintendent, or some one in authority at the mine, a written memorandum stating the causes which in his opinion are likely to lead to injury, and prohibiting further working in the mine until the Inspector of Mines has certified by an endorsement on the memorandum that the causes complained of have been removed or remedied, or until His Excellency the Governor has cancelled the prohibition.

It shall be the duty of the Inspector of Mines to send within 48 hours of the issue of such prohibition a full statement to His Excellency the Governor of the facts leading to such issue and a record of the time when such order was communicated to the manager, superintendent, or owner of the mine, and His Excellency shall then make such order as seems to him desirable. This order shall be communicated in writing to the owner, superintendent, or manager of the mine.

2. The following rules shall be observed with regard to the use of explosives :—

(a) No explosives shall be kept in a mine for a longer period than 12 hours.

(b) No person, with the exception of the man directed to light the fuses, shall remain in the mine when any charge or charges of explosives are being fired. Arrangements must be made to enable him to reach the surface before the charges explode.

(c) No person employed in charging holes with powder or other explosives shall use or have in his possession while engaged in this work any implement of iron or steel. All implements used for charging must be of wood or copper. Every mine where explosives are used must be furnished with sets of copper implements for charging sufficient for the use of the mine, and spare implements shall be kept in stock.

(d) If a charge misses fire, no one must enter the mine until a period of four hours has elapsed from the time at which the fuse was lighted.

(e) A charge of explosive which has missed fire must not be withdrawn from the hole. Another hole shall be made not less than six inches from the original one; by firing this hole the original charge will be exploded.

3. All the approaches to the pit must be protected by means of strong rails, entrance being provided by means of a gate in the rails. The gate shall open inwards towards the face of the tunnel and shall be so constructed that it will not open over the mouth or opening of the pit.

4. In every mine in which persons are raised and lowered by machinery when the depth of such lift exceeds fifty yards, provision must be made for the communication of distinct and definite signals between each of the stages in the lift and the surface.

5. A chain shall not be used for lowering or raising persons in the mine. Every rope that is used for such purposes must be tested before it is used, and at least once in every 24 hours afterwards. The test shall consist in raising by it double the weight which it will ever have to carry when working.

6. A brake on the drum shall be attached to every machine used for raising or lowering persons, if worked by steam, water, or mechanical power. The brake to be one approved by the Inspector of Mines.

7. Every working mine shall be provided with a supply of timber in good condition and suitable for timbering and sufficient to completely timber a space in the pit of six yards in depth.

This supply shall be kept in a shed within forty yards of the mine and at all times available for use.

8. In any mine in which persons ascend or descend by means of dubras or machinery it shall not be lawful to load the bucket at the other end of the rope.

9. Every pit which is sunk to the depth of over twelve feet must be properly timbered to secure the sides, unless the owner or manager has received a special authority in writing from the Inspector of Mines exempting the pit from the provisions of this rule. IS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR has ordered that the annexed copy of a circular despatch received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies be published for general information.

SIR,-I HAVE been in communication with the Seamen's Hospital Society as to the conditions under which officers in the service of the Colonies suffering from tropical ailments can be admitted as paying patients to the Society's hospitals; and I have now the honour to acquaint you that the Board of that Society are prepared to receive into the hospitals, at rates varying according to circum-stances from one guinea to two guineas a week, officers in the Colonial Services whose cases the Medical Staff consider to be suitable for treatment as tropical cases within the wards of a hospital in which tropical diseases are specially treated, provided that their salaries are under £400 per annum. Officers in receipt of a salary of £400 per annum and upwards would not be admitted unless under very exceptional circumstances.

I have caused the Society to be informed that the Secretary for State will guarantee the payments due from any officer in the service of the Colonies who may be admitted to the hospitals, provided that admission at the privileged rates is made in each case with his knowledge and sanction. It will then be possible to arrange, if necessary, that deductions to cover the cost of the hospital treatment shall be made from the officer's salary.
