*Remarks on the Country &c. from Colombo to
Jaffna and thence to Trincomale.*



From Colombó to Pasbetal, is a distance of $4\frac{1}{4}$ miles; the road good, houses and Cocoanut plantations all the way; the river Mutwal is crossed here.

From Pasbetal to Jaille Rest house is $7\frac{3}{4}$ miles; good road, rather elevated above the common level of the Country: on the left is a large plain (originally cultivated) which extends as far as Negombo Lake, and through which runs the navigable canal to that place.

From Jaille to Negombo, distant $10\frac{1}{4}$ miles; the road is good & pleasant, crosses cultivated lands, and some jungle with fine intervals of green pasture: about $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Jaille the Dondogam river, is crossed, and from thence to Negombo is a fine extensive sheet of water of that name on the left.

Negombo is a small pleasant town and has a Fort. There are some good houses in the pettah and it is the residence of a Magistrate.

From Negombo to Maravilla distance 14 miles; the road is very sandy, bordered to the Kaymle river by an uninterrupted tope of cocoanut trees. Boats attend here for the convenience of passengers; at Maravilla there is a good rest house.

From Maravilla to Chilaw distance $12\frac{1}{2}$ miles; same sandy beach continues. The Country is barren and almost uninhabited; Near the shore is the Collector's Catcherry. The Fort of Chilaw is situated on the opposite side of the river.

From Chilaw to Oedepencarre the distance is $10\frac{3}{4}$ miles; from the former place a narrow slip of land, about 2 miles in length, brings you to the Ferry of the Chilaw river, which is broad, and rapid and should be passed with caution in windy or after rainy weather; about half way there is a small Tappal Station, the only appearance of habitation in this desert and barren tract of sand.

Oedepencarre is a small Village of Fishermen, and near it the Rest house, and ancient Pagoda of Andipanc.

From Oedepencarre to Madramkooly, distance, $11\frac{1}{4}$ miles; is over a marshy ground full of bogs in wet weather, having on the right the Andapanc water and on the left, a Cocoanut Toppe, in which are one or two Villages; about half way the road crosses a narrow Canal called Quiparawa (commonly known by the name of blue Boats) the passage is always difficult and in wet weather almost im-

practicable, an extent of about 500 yards of deep adhesive clay of a bluish colour, extending right and left of the Canal, which is the communication between the narrow Gulph of Calpentyn and the Andipane Lake; from this the road is better, but occasionally interrupted by bogs of clay, on the left is a Canal extending to the before mentioned Gulph.

From Madramkooly Post house to Putlam distance $8\frac{3}{4}$ miles. The road is pretty much the same until you arrive at Calpentyn Gulph about $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Putlam, where there is a small square Fort. The Village is about 800 yards further on in the midst of Coconut Tops.

From Putlam to Wannitavilly distance $11\frac{1}{2}$ miles, the road is good for the first 4 miles, being over an extensive plain with large Salt pans on the left, from hence on both sides a dreary road bordered with thick and impenetrable jungle to Wannitavilly where there is a large Tank. From this place there is a road to Caradivoe from whence the Calpentyn Gulph is crossed to the Village and Fort of that name.

From Wannitavilly to Pomparipoo, distance 11 miles, the road continues thro' a very barren and woody country, in wet weather extremely difficult to pass, being full of swamps and much infested with wild Animals: about 4 miles before reaching the latter place, the river of Pomparipoo, is crossed, which is fordable, but after rain generally very deep and rapid.

From Pomparipoo to Mardodde a lonely rest house, distance $8\frac{3}{4}$ miles, the road generally good, excepting over the Pomparipoo plain, where the ground being clayey the water stands in rainy weather.

From Mardodde to Marchicotty distance $7\frac{3}{4}$ miles, the road continues good, with high jungle on both sides; During this stage the Moderegam river is crossed.

From Marchicotty to Arripo distance $16\frac{1}{2}$ miles, there are two different roads—the inland road more used in former times than at present, (then called the Elephant road, because these Animals used to be sent through it to the Peninsula of India) first goes off in N. N. E. direction, then North. It is generally good, surrounded with thick jungle, diversified by a few small plains; When it turns off to Condatchy, the country opens and the road becomes clayey in many places.—The other road which passes along the Sea shore, and near the Kallar Pagoda, is extremely difficult to pass at high water from the nature of the shore, which is covered with Rocks; after some miles however there are fine hard sands, which for Palankeen bearers, and indeed any other conveyance than Carriages is by far preferable to the other road; at Arripo is the Doric, a large stone building, built by the Honble F. North, (The present Earl of Guildford) when Governor of Ceylon, and ornamented by a front of that order of Architecture. Here the Governor resides during the period he visits the Pearl Fishery, which takes place at Condatchy.

From Arripo to Bangalle distance 8 miles, the river of Arripo is crossed with canoes, road rather sandy and muddy, there are several nullahs, the country being low; At Bangalle is a Roman Catholic church. A separation of the roads takes place here, the one leading to Manar and the other to Mantotte and Jaffna.

From Bangalle to Tallaly, distance 4 miles, the country low, over open plains, and in the rainy season full of muddy water for an extent of about two miles; close to Manar its river is crossed; The fort of Manar is built of coral Stones, contains several buildings and a reservoir for water which is difficult to be obtained good elsewhere; In the pettah the houses are good & the Collector's House is a very commodious one. The country well inhabited, Travellers cross from hence, viâ Ramisseram, to the continent of India.

From Bangalle to Mantotte, is a distance of 4½ miles, here is a large building on an elevated spot commanding extensive plains, part of which are at certain periods overflowed by the Sea.—The Rest House, (formerly a Church) is contiguous to the Paddy Store near Mantotte, the scite with some ruins are shewn, which prove it to have been formerly a place of Trade.

From Mantotte to Werteltivoe, distance 9½ miles, there is nothing remarkable: The road is flat and sandy, leading through open jungle and some large plains, with the appearance of salt pans. This is a large Village inhabited by Moormen. The country is much fested with wild buffaloes and elephants, and from hence there is a road through the Wannu, by which the tappal goes to Comalé.

From Werteltivoe to Ellepekarveh rest house, distance 5½ miles, the road is much the same as the last stage, the village of Ellepekarveh is of some size, the country around fertile, and in some places cultivated, but after that for a long extent of road no cultivation is seen but jungle, beds of rivulets, some with water, others dry. As Polverynkattoe is approached (a distance of 15 miles from the latter village,) an extensive wood of very thick jungle, is passed through; The rest house is situated about a mile and a half from the sea and from the same place eastward is the village, with a very considerable tank, affording means of cultivating an extensive range of Paddy Fields. At about 5 miles from the seashore, in a north westerly direction, are the two small Islands of Ireentivoe (or the two Brothers) where the colts of the Delft Stud are turned out; the soil is sandy with short grass, palmyra and coconut trees.

From Polverynkattoe to Poneryn, distance 16 miles, a sandy road with low jungle and much water, some open plains, and paddy fields; elephants are here met with in the rainy season. This place

is well inhabited, the rest house is commodious and a Magistrate resides in the Fort,

From Poneryn to Kaloemony, distance $13\frac{1}{2}$ miles. The road is sandy bordered with palmyra trees: here the sea is crossed to Colombogam a distance of about $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles on the opposite shore of Jaffnapatam.

From Colombogam to Jaffna, distance 3 miles, road sandy; here is a large fort built of coral stones. The houses in the pettah are regularly built, the streets broad, and the country well cultivated: from Jaffna there is a road to Point Pedro the most northern point of the Island, and from whence the Mails are generally conveyed over to the Continent.

From Jaffna to Catetyay, distance $17\frac{1}{2}$ miles, the road leads first through a well cultivated country diversified with palmyra tops. At about 4 miles distance, a narrow arm of the Sea lies, called the Salt river, fordable, being shallow and not above 50 yards broad, the country continues to wear the same appearance to the rest house.

From Catetyay to Elephant pass, a distance of 16 miles, little variation occurs in the road, low lands cultivated as Paddy fields extend to the Eastward of it, and about a mile and a half to the Southward is situated a small Fort, for preventing the passage of Elephants, where the shallow branch of the sea which divides Jaffna from the main land of Ceylon becomes so narrow as to allow them to ford it. The remains of an old Fort are still visible.

From Elephant pass to Choudicolom, distance 15 miles, the country assumes a wilder appearance, palmyras are scarce, and jungles and bushes supply their place. The country above Ghoudicolom is in some degree cultivated.

From Choudicolom to Matele, distance $12\frac{1}{2}$ miles; five miles from the former place is the large inland salt lake, which extends as far as Mulletivoe and the road leads on between it and the low land. Matele is a village chiefly inhabited by fishermen and situated in the midst of a top of Coconut trees. From Matele the road leads through the same kind of country: On the right, are extensive Fields of Paddy until within two miles of Mulletivoe, a distance of $10\frac{1}{2}$ miles, where there is a channel of water, through which at times, the sea communicates with the Mulletivoe lake. This may be crossed on a natural bridge of rocks, formed by a ridge of sand stone, it is about 400 yards long, very slippery, on account of its being generally covered with water and green moss, and difficult for man or horse.—A green shady walk leads from hence to Mulletivoe: instead of crossing the difficult pass before alluded to and known by the name of the stone bridge, another path leads to the left, where the sea sand is very heavy, the mouth of the inlet of water being generally choaked up and dry: the small Fort of Mul-

letivoe is garrisoned by Sepoys, and is the residence of a Comman-
dant and Collector of the district.

From Mulletivoe to Alambiel, distance $8\frac{1}{2}$ miles, there is a succession
of picturesque and verdant plains, surrounded with fine jungle and
forest trees, and watered by several small tanks. The Hamlet of Alam-
biel is situated on the right of the road in a grove of Cocoanut trees.

From Alambiel the route to Kokelay, a distance of $15\frac{1}{2}$ miles, offers
some difficulty. The lake of the former place has several branches
generally full of water, which, tho' not deep, are, on ac-
count of the blue clay at bottom, (resembling that of Quiparawe
canal on the other side of the Island,) dangerous for Horses and
Cattle to cross: Palankeens travel through them however without much
difficulty: after this there is a path leading through verdant plains, similar to
those before described, to the banks of the lake of Kokelay, an exten-
sive sheet of water rendered picturesque by some hilly projections of its
western shores. The Post and Rest Houses are situated in a grassy
plain a few hundred yards from the lake. Another road is by the
sea shore, but this is rendered difficult by a projecting ridge of rocks
about 4 miles from Alambiel and is very difficult to pass.

From Kokelay to Terriah, distance $11\frac{3}{4}$; at a very short distance
from the Rest House of Kokelay is crossed the inlet by which the
sea communicates with the lake and which at low water is ford-
able, but at high water deep and the current rapid. The channel is
about 60 yards broad and crossed in canoes. It is here for the
first time, that after leaving, the uniform flatness of the northern
extremity of the Island, some idea, is formed of the ranges of low
hills, generally running in the S. E. and N. E. direction which gives
the Trincomalé district quite a different character as to the face
of the country, and form those features of ground that render the
neighbourhood of that place so very picturesque.—After crossing the
ream abovementioned, the road lies over a sandy beach for several
miles to the Kalloe Avar, fordable in general, tho' very broad
and deep: from hence the road lies over extensive plains
and jungle paths to the rest house of Terriah, remarkable by two
small rocky hillocks in its immediate vicinity: it leads to some cul-
tivated plains and to the small hamlet and rest house of Cutch-
ally, a distance of $8\frac{1}{4}$ miles, remarkable by gigantic and beautiful
nyan and other trees, which shew it to have been formerly a
place of worship.

From Cuichavelly, through some tracts of land, once cultivated and
by several different branches of the Pelavicadder to an extensive
lake, containing a sheet of water of above two miles in length, re-
markable by some Hillocks situated to the N. W. of it and close
to its shore: one of which is surmounted by a piece of rock having
the appearance of a Statue and forming a picturesque object; from
hence to Nilavelly is a distance of $13\frac{1}{4}$ miles.

From Nillavelly to Trincomalè, distance $7\frac{1}{8}$ miles—Not far from this place, to the Westward arc, two of those small Hillocks which characterize this tract of country, and a few miles further, on reaching the banks of the fordable sheet of water called the Salt river, chains of low connected hills make their appearance, running about East and West, and forming the Northern enclosure of the capacious bason which contains the bay of Tamblegam.—Through jungle and Paddy fields the Pettah first appears, then the Esplanade and afterwards the Fort of Trincomalè; this place is well fortified, contains a considerable Garrison, has a Dock yard, the finest harbour in India, and is the chief Naval Depôt for His Majesty's Ships of War in the Indian Seas.

Remarks on the Country &c. from Colombo to Trincomale thro' the Muhayampaltoo.

◆

From Colombo to Pantura is 16 miles; the road excellent all the way, and most delightfully shaded; on the right, distant 7 miles from Colombo, is Mount Lavinia, the Country residence of His Excellency the Governor; at Pantura, close to the Rest House, is a broad and rapid river, which there empties itself into the Sea.

From Pantura to Caltura, distance 10 miles, (including the ferry over the river) the road is equally good as the last stage: here there is a most excellent house belonging to Government, the residence of the Collector. The surrounding country is most picturesque.

From Caltura to Bentotte, distance 12 miles, roads good, country in some places hilly: here there is a Rest house, and a river to be crossed close to it.

From Bentotte to Amblangodde distance 15 miles, the road continues good, and the country beautiful.

From Amblangodde to Hiccode, distance 8 miles, from thence to Gindurah 8, and Gindurah to Galle $3\frac{1}{2}$. This place has a considerable Fort and Garrison and a large Harbour; the road in two or three places lies over steep rocks and hills to the ferry of Gindurah. Face of the country much the same as last stage. The Collector's house is without the Fort.

The Traveller must provide at this place, a stock of Wine, Bread, Biscuit, Tea, Sugar &c. &c. to serve him until he arrives at Trincomalè.

From Point de Galle to Matura, a small fortified place, distance 28 miles, road tolerably good, but rather hilly. In the rainy season there are several drains across the road, and one river with

a Ferry and Boats; the country in general is planted with Coconut trees; To the left near to Matura is a large river with a wooden bridge. The Collector resides here.

Provisions of every description, that the country produces must be procured here, it being the only place where they are to be had in plenty until the Traveller arrives at Batticaloa.

From Matura to Tangalle, a Military Post, distance 22 miles, water bad, and scarce; road very indifferent over large hills, and along the sea beach, face of the country, sandy soil, plantations of cocconut trees, interspersed with jungle.

From Tangalle to Hambantotte is a distance of 27 miles: Here is a Military Post of consequence having the charge of all the salt pans in the Mahaganpattoo.—Several wells of tolerably good water are met with here. The roads are good except through the paddy fields. At Rannie there is a deep nullah of fresh water and also a large fresh water river at Walawe, and a Ferry with small boats. The face of the country, near Hambantotte, large plains, blue soil, low jungle, and very little fresh water on the road.

From Hambantotte to Magam, is $14\frac{1}{2}$ miles; a solitary Village, near a plain, with few inhabitants, no cultivation, but good open road; There are salt pans here, and the country is covered with low jungle, very little fresh water is to be met with until reaching the Magam river.

This part of the country is much infested with Elephants and other wild animals; soil sandy, with low jungle and some salt water lakes.

From Magam to Paliwoopane distance $9\frac{1}{2}$ miles, within three miles of which is a newly established Military Post to protect the Salt Leways, road open and good, over large barren plains, bad water and very little of it: this place is surrounded with jungle.

From Paliwoopane to Yalla river (North bank) distance $11\frac{1}{2}$ miles; road indifferent, with thick low jungle, sandy and barren. No inhabitants or water except at Putana where there is a large rock with a reservoir of good water on it. The Yalla or Manioc river is fresh and good, & fordable in fine weather;—about one mile from it, is a scattered village, situated on a plain, consisting of a few Hots; the inhabitants apparently very poor.

From Yalla to Putana, distance 10 miles; through a thick jungle, and barren, no inhabitants, very little water, and that not good from small wells; soil sandy with little vegetation.

From Putana, to Kombocken river, (the limits between the districts of Batticaloa and the Mahaganpattoo, distance 8 miles; The road a little better than last stage, over large plains of pasture and high jungle, no cultivation or inhabitants, & water very scarce.

The Village Kombockan has the appearance of more industry than any part of the Mahagampattoo, a few Coconut trees begin to appear, and the banks of the river are covered with fine forest trees, and some grass in the plains. The inhabitants are chiefly Malabars, who are very civil and ready to accommodate strangers with the produce of the country.

The Traveller in passing through the Mahagampattoo in the dry season should supply himself & followers with water for the journey, at the Magam river, Yalla river, and Kombockan river, as the water from the wells and tanks is subject to various impregnations from the great numbers of wild animals which frequent this part of the country.

From Kombockan to Ogandamalle, a large rock with several tanks on it of fresh water, distance $12\frac{1}{2}$ miles: the road is a little rough and rocky; Face of the country, large plains, some cultivation, and a few inhabitants; towards the end of the stage the general appearance of the country, and vegetation, begin to look a little better, the village (or rather scattered huts,) is at a small distance from the road.

From Ogandamalle to Arroekgam, a distance of $18\frac{1}{2}$ miles; over large plains through villages, some of which are cultivated, and surrounded with high jungle, and rocks, and very sandy from the rains, which overflow the whole country, and leave the sand and gravel in the paths; Fresh water in several places on the road; here is a large Government Storehouse; Water from the wells not very good.

From Arroekgam to Tricoil, distance 23 miles: road through several populous villages, and a fine cultivated country, surrounded with large forests of very fine Timber: the water is bad, chiefly from wells; here is a large Malabar Temple, and a village well inhabited by people of that caste; This place is situated on a sandy beach, near the sea. The general appearance of this part of the Batticaloa district, is high jungle, large plains, salt and fresh water lakes, and many extensive plains well cultivated, the soil is of marle, and dark coloured sand.

From Tricoil to Bambeemoody; distance 16 miles: through a well cultivated and populous country, road chiefly on the tops of the banks of the Paddy fields which makes it a little tedious for the Traveller—large plains, level all the way, with several Nullahs which are very difficult to cross in the rainy season.

From Bambeemoody to Naypattimony, the road is $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles: on the side of a large cultivated plain, with several villages at a small distance: water not very good: face of the country much the same as last stage.—There is a large Government Storehouse situated on the bank of Batticaloa river or lake, part of the country well peopled, and they are very industrious in cultivating the Paddy fields.

From Nappattimony to Batticaloa, distance $17\frac{1}{2}$ miles; road near the sea side, very sandy, under Cocoonut, and Palmyra trees leading through several populous villages; the inhabitants Malabars, and Moors, who appear to be very industrious and comfortable: Batticaloa is a considerable place the residence of a Collector and a Military post with a small Fortress, situated on an Island in the lake or river that extends from Nappattimony and is navigable for Boats or Canoes, which are chiefly used for conveying the produce of the Country from one part to another.

The traveller may be supplied here, with Fowls, Rice &c. in great plenty and at a very moderate rate.

From Batticaloa to Errour a good Rest House, the distance is 9 miles; the road leads along the sea side, having the lake of Batticaloa on the left, with Cocoonut plantations; soil generally sandy and barren with but little good water.

From Errour to Nallor river, (south bank) distance 10 miles; road good with several villages and many inhabitants; some high jungle: no Rest House, the river (salt water) runs from the lake mentioned before, near Nappattimony & Batticaloa, and empties itself into the sea at Venloos Bay about 4 miles to the East.

From Nallor to Comolandemonie is $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles; the road tolerably good & over large plains, some of which are cultivated; two or three small villages are passed which are thinly inhabited, and not so comfortable as those to the southward of Batticaloa; no good water, and the country in every direction, much frequented by Elephants, Bufaloes, and other wild Animals.

From Comolandemonie to Panachenkanie river (south bank) distance $15\frac{1}{2}$ miles; road over large uncultivated plains, with high jungle on every side, and large salt water lakes, the inhabitants chiefly Veddas who live in the jungle: very little good water — no village or Rest House.

From Panachenkanie river to the Kaderavilly distance $9\frac{2}{3}$ miles; road open and good, by the side of a salt water lake or river, with high jungle, no cultivation, and few inhabitants; Kadaravilly, is a considerable Malabar village with good water from a stream that runs from the Virgel or Moleado river.

From Kadaravilly to the Virgel river, (North bank,) distance 4 miles; road very bad chiefly through old paddy fields, and over some rocks, with thick high jungle; this place is situated on the banks of the river, and is the limit between the Batticaloa and Trincomalè Districts: rain in the interior makes the ferry difficult and dangerous to cross, from its great depth and rapidity, and it often overflows the country.

From the Virgel river to Arnetievoe, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles; the road very

bad and narrow, this place is situated on the side of a large plain; There is a small pool here used occasionally by Travellers.

From Ametivoe to Topoor $13\frac{1}{2}$ miles; over large uncultivated plains, thick jungle, and a barren sandy country, several Nul-lahs, most of which are fordable: Here is a rest House, and good water from the Virgel river, the inhabitants but few and principally Malabars and Moors.

From Topoor to Cotiar, distance 6 miles; is a very bad road over high rock and hills, with jungle on both sides. The village of Cotiar is situated on the south side of the Inner Harbour of Trin-comalè; is very populous, inhabited by Malabars, the country around well cultivated & the soil fine; with large pastures for feed-ing cattle, of which there are great numbers; Here is a large Rest House for the accommodation of Strangers. From this place the Traveller must cross to Trincomalè by water which is a few miles over; in general, several Boats, (or rather large Canoes,) are lying at this place, of from three to four Tons burthen and which may be engaged by those who require them.

The method of using the Table, will be understood from the following.

RULES AND EXAMPLES.

The complete decimal of the Interest on £1. for any given number of days less than a Year, at the rate of £ $\left\{ \begin{matrix} 1 \\ 5 \end{matrix} \right\}$ per Cent per Annum, may be found by inspection: thus,

Seek the given number of days, in one of the day columns; and take out the $\left\{ \begin{matrix} \text{three} \\ \text{two} \end{matrix} \right\}$ decimal digits which are placed directly $\left\{ \begin{matrix} \text{over} \\ \text{under} \end{matrix} \right\}$ that column in which the number of days is found. Observe the two letters that follow in the same horizontal line with the number for the days. At the angle of meeting these two letters in the Tablets for the circulating digits of the decimals at £ $\left\{ \begin{matrix} 1 \\ 5 \end{matrix} \right\}$ Per Cent. per Annum, is the first digit of that circle, which when annexed to the $\left\{ \begin{matrix} \text{three} \\ \text{two} \end{matrix} \right\}$ decimal digits already found will produce the complete decimal expression for the interest required.

Example. Required the Interest on £1. at £ $\left\{ \begin{matrix} 1 \\ 5 \end{matrix} \right\}$ Per Cent. per Annum for 155 days.

$\left\{ \begin{matrix} \text{Over} \\ \text{Under} \end{matrix} \right\}$ 155 days, are the $\left\{ \begin{matrix} \text{three} \\ \text{two} \end{matrix} \right\}$ digits $\left\{ \begin{matrix} .004 \\ .02 \end{matrix} \right\}$ Against 155 days are the two letters G a, and at the angle of meeting of these two letters in the Tablets of circulating Digits at £ $\left\{ \begin{matrix} 1 \\ 5 \end{matrix} \right\}$ per Cent

is the figure $\left\{ \begin{matrix} 2 \\ 1 \end{matrix} \right\}$ of the circle $\left\{ \begin{matrix} 24657534 \\ 12328767 \end{matrix} \right\}$, which being annexed to $\left\{ \begin{matrix} .004 \\ .02 \end{matrix} \right\}$, will be the answer thus: $\left\{ \begin{matrix} .00424657534 \\ .0212328767 \end{matrix} \right\}$, that is £ .00424657534, at £ 1 Per Cent. and £ .0212328767, at £ 5 Per Cent. is the Answer.

When the principal is greater or less than £1, or the rate greater or less than 1 Per Cent., the interest is first to be found for the given number of days, as if for £1, at 1 Per Cent: This Interest, multiplied by the given Principal, or by the given rate, or by both, as the case may be, will give the Answer required respectively. Thus,

Since £ .00424657534 is the Interest of £1, at 1 Per Cent., for 155 Days; $.00424657534 \times 400 = 1698630136$ will be the Interest of £ 400 at the same rate and for the same time.

Also, $.00424657534 \times 5 = 0212328767$ is the Interest of £1 for 155 days, at £ 5 Per Cent. as found from the above Table.

And, $.00424657534 \times 400 = 849315068$ shews the Interest of £ 400 at £ 5 Per Cent, for 155 Days. The amount of any Annual Salary, for any given number of Days, may also be readily found by the foregoing Table, as follows:—Having found in it the Interest of £1, at 1 Per Cent per Annum, for the given number of Days, multiply that Interest by the Annual Salary, and remove the decimal point two places to the right: the product, so altered, is the Answer.

Example.—Required the amount, for 155 days, of an Annual Salary of £20. Since £ .00424657534 is the Interest of £1 at 1 Per Cent. per Annum for 155 Days, and $.00424657534 \times 20 = 0849315068$, &c. by removing the decimal point two places to the right; the Product will become 849315068, &c. the Answer. And this Answer is the same as that for the £20 Per Cent. for 155 Days.

In practice it will rarely, if ever, be requisite to take out more of the decimal digits than will be sufficient, when multiplied by the given Principal, to produce three, or at the most four, decimal digits in the product; as that number will give the Answer to the nearest farthing. So in the first

Example, at £ $\left\{ \begin{matrix} 1 \\ 5 \end{matrix} \right\}$ Per Cent., seven or even six, digits will be quite sufficient. Thus, $\left\{ \begin{matrix} .0042465 \\ .0212325 \end{matrix} \right\}$

X 400 = £ $\left\{ \begin{matrix} 16980 \\ 84931 \end{matrix} \right\}$ the Answer.

It will moreover, greatly expedite the whole process to be able mentally and instantaneously to convert the above $\left\{ \begin{matrix} .6980 \\ .8931 \end{matrix} \right\}$, or any other decimals of a Pound Sterling into Shillings, Pence and Farthings, and the reverse: operations, of which the mode may easily be learned from almost every treatise on decimal arithmetic. In the above instance, $\left\{ \begin{matrix} 16980 \\ 84931 \end{matrix} \right\} = \text{£} \left\{ \begin{matrix} 1: 13: 11\frac{1}{5} \\ 8: 9: 10\frac{1}{4} \end{matrix} \right\}$. Results may thus be obtained, which, for ease and accuracy, can scarcely be produced from any of the voluminous Tables of Interest that have come under the Calculator's observation.

It is manifest from the above Examples, that the use of the Table is not confined to any particular Principal or fixed Rate of Interest. Nor, excepting in so far as regards inspection, is it limited to any determinate number of Days, for when the Interest of any given Sum, at any given rate, has been found for One Day, it is evident, that the Interest of that same Sum at the given rate, for any given number of Days, must be the Interest so found for one Day, multiplied into the given number of Days.

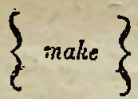

GOVERNMENT ADVERTISEMENT.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR is pleased to publish the following particulars for the information and guidance of persons travelling from one station to another in this Island and all Officers of Government, Civil and Military, to whom the same may relate, are required to govern themselves accordingly.

1st.—After the first of April next the Collectors of Districts are authorized, from time to time, to grant reasonable advances and assistance to Postholders or persons in charge of Rest Houses, for enabling them to purchase articles required by Travellers, such as Rice, Fowls, Eggs, and Milk; and such supplies may accordingly be had at all places where such persons are stationed.

2ndly.—A quarterly tariff of prices will be fixed by the Collector and other principal servants of Government in each District, for the several articles of supply according to instructions, which will be published for general information, and the Postholder or keeper of the Rest House will be allowed to charge 25 per cent on these prices.

3rd.—All complaints of Travellers against those persons are to be addressed to the Collector of the District, who will enquire into the circumstance, and if necessary, report the same to Government, that the Postholder or Rest house keeper may be removed if any instance of misbehaviour is substantiated against him.

4th.—All Gentlemen of His Majesty's service, Civil and Military, Dutch Inhabitants, Strangers and others travelling with conveyances & attendants, are required to subscribe their names in a Book to be kept by the Postholder, or Rest House keeper, and also to specify the payment of any articles with which they may have been furnished, it being found that the abuses hitherto complained of have principally arisen from referring the payment of such accounts to servants.

5th.—The Postholder or Rest House keeper is to report to the Collector, any instance in which violence may have been used, the established charges not paid, or any other impropriety committed by Travellers or their attendants, and in addition to such redress by the Law affords, His Excellency hereby declares that such conduct will be marked with severe animadversion through the proper official channels of each service. Collectors of districts are to report all complaints of that nature to the Chief Secretary for His Excellency's information.

6th.—Complaints against persons not in the service or employ of Government, are to be enquired into by the Collector, in his capacity of Justice of Peace, or referred to any other Magistrate having Local Jurisdiction, and it is particularly recommended, and ex-

pected by His Excellency, that abuses committed by servants, being of greater frequency and more complained of than any other, be in all cases prosecuted according to the existing Laws.

7th.—The Commandants of Corps and Stations from which Military Detachments may be made, the Officers in charge of such parties, and all other Officers under whose command they may come, or who may in any manner be employed or concerned in conducting such service, are to consider it their particular and imperative duty to prevent and redress all attempts at violence, fraud or impropriety by those under their command, and to report the occurrence of any material causes of complaint to proper authority.

8th.—The places undermentioned are those, at which Postholders or Rest House keepers are stationed at present, and where supplies of Rice, Fowls, Eggs, and Milk, may be procured.

9th.—At any station not above specified or hereafter notified as a station of supply, Travellers are not to expect or require supplies to be provided for them; but are expected at the principal Towns to procure their necessaries without the assistance of Government, and for intermediate places, not having an establishment they must bring with them whatever may be necessary, any attempt to obtain articles of supply from the neighbouring villages by compulsion will be rigorously prosecuted.

10th.—It having been represented to Government, that very considerable hardship is frequently imposed on the Inhabitants residing in the neighbourhood of the Rest Houses on the Northern and other Roads, where the population is extremely scanty, by the practice of pressing them to serve as Chule-bearers without any sort of remuneration, the following Restrictions, are hereby established.

1. The Postholder, or Headman of any Resthouse, or station, shall provide Chules and Chule bearers for His Excellency The Governor, The Honble the Chief and Puisne Justices, The Chief Secretary to Government, Members of Council, The Honble & Venerable the Archdeacon, and His Majesty's Advocate Fiscal, in such numbers as they may require, subject to the rate of Pay, hereinafter specified.

2. No other Gentlemen of H. M. Service Civil or Military, or any other person, shall be entitled to demand Chules or Chule Bearers, without producing an Ola or Road order to that effect, from the Chief Secretary to Government or the Collector of the District.

3. The Collector of each District, shall on application grant such order, only to the Commandant, Collector, Provincial Judge, and Sitting Magistrate of his own, or any District, also to any European or Native Officer proceeding in charge of Troops, and to any Foreigner, or Stranger, of such rank as in his discretion may entitle him to this distinction—and to no other person on any occasion whatsoever; but this prohibition is not meant to deter the Postmaster from engaging the voluntary services of Chule-Bearers to any Traveller, European, or Native who may think proper to pay.

4. On receipt of the Chief Secretary's or Collector's order, the Postholder or Headman, shall provide Chules & Chule Bearers, allowing two men for each Palanquin, or Horse, and two to accompany a party of Baggage coolies—receiving in advance for each man half his pay—at the rate payable to any other coolies—these Chule Bearers shall not be compelled to proceed further than the next Resthouse or station, when they shall receive the remainder of their pay—and an entry of their names, and the payment, shall be made in the Postmaster's Minute Book.

No. 1. The Head Cooly who is obliged to procure Coolies for a Journey, is responsible for them when he receives the money.

No. 2. All Coolies travelling, to receive 1 Fanam per day during the time they are detained at any place on the Road.

No. 3. No Cooly is obliged to carry more than 40 lbs. to any distance farther than 3 English Miles.

No. 4. All Coolies who work at day labour are to begin their work at seven in the morning & leave off at half past 5, two hours to be allowed them for their dianer.

No. 5. Two places will be fixed, one in the Fort and another in the Pettah where Coolies are to be found at all hours.

No. 6. At the Fish bazar will be a Servant of the Police to procure Carts at all hours.

No. 7. Every Cart to be numbered.

No. 8. Those who hire a Cart to pay the taxes for the Cart, No Cart can be obliged to carry more than 10 sacks of Rice or 1500 lbs.

No. 9. The Carts will be permitted to pass in the Main-Street of the Pettah for the benefit of Merchants and the Proprietors of Carts.

No. 10. When this Regulation shall be published, every Cooly or person letting Carts shall be liable to punishment on any grounded complaint, on it being proved that he asked more than the stipulated prices.

ABSTRACT of the Regulations in force for the collection of the Customs in Ceylon.

The Duties on Goods imported in British Vessels, and also on Goods exported in any Vessel, are in general levied according to Rates stated in certain Tables published with Regulation No. 6. of 1820.

In the instances of articles not enumerated in those Tables, the importer shall produce his Invoice, and shall be charged duty on the value at the rate of 6 per Cent on goods the produce of Europe and at the rate of 10 per Cent on other goods imported in British vessels, and 9 & 15 per Cent on goods imported in Foreign vessels.

Books, Maps, and Instruments of Science are free of duty.

Where no Invoice exists, or that produced is suspected, the Collector shall appraise the goods at his discretion.

If the owner is dissatisfied, three appraisers, one to be appointed by the Collector, another by the owner and the two to choose a third, are to value the goods, and the decision of two of them is final.

The duty on Cotton cloths except those imported from Great Britain or Ireland which pay 6 per Cent on the Invoice price, and Nankeens which pay 10 per Cent, is levied according to a Table annexed to the 1st Regulation of 1822. The cloths are assorted by the Importer and if the Custom House Officers are not satisfied with the assortment, it is referred to three arbitrators one named by the Collector, the second by the Importer and the two to choose a third and their decision is final—If the importer has put more than a third of any particular portion of his cloth into an inferior class he shall be liable to pay double duty—Such cloth as is to pay ad valorem is to be appraised by the Government appraiser at its price in this market subject to reference to appraisers chosen as above mentioned.

Where duty is ascertained from Tables or by assessment on appraised value; if the goods are imported in Foreign vessels, one half more to be added to the rate.

Duty on Tortoiseshell imported in British vessels Two Rixdollars per lb.

Duty on Spirits of every denomination Three Rixdollars per Gallon.

Tortoiseshell and Spirits imported in Foreign vessels to pay 50 per Cent additional on the above rates.

Spirits may be warehoused without payment of warehouse duty as long as convenient.

And be re-exported on payment of one tenth of the above duty.

No Spirits can be removed for Island consumption, or exported but in the same Packages as imported; and remain at the risk of the importer while in the Custom House.

In case of goods alledged to be damaged during the voyage and after shipment at the port of Export, the Collector of Customs being first satisfied that the damage did so occur, is to view the same, or on the request of the importer to cause the same to be inspected by two indifferent persons whom the Collector may select; and on such view or inspection to frame a report of the quantum of damage, on which, the same being approved by the Comptroller General or Deputy Comptroller of Customs, a proportionate abatement of duties may take place.

No Goods shall be landed until the Ship's papers and a full Manifest of goods on board are lodged at the Custom House.

No Goods may be exported from the Island for trade on vessels not regularly entered at the Port.

Goods exported or attempted to be exported contrary to this rule are to be confiscated and owner liable to a fine of double the value.

If it shall appear that any goods have been on board not mentioned in the manifest, either by search (which Custom House Officers are authorized to make) or otherwise, the Commander or principal person on board who gave in the manifest, shall be liable to a penalty, equal to the value of such goods, to be ascertained by appraisement; and the goods if landed are liable to double duty.

All Doney's and coasing vessels belonging to Ceylon are to be registered in the Custom House of the District to which they belong.

The Register to be kept agreeable to forms furnished by Government.

The owner to provide himself with a Certificate of Registry, to be kept on board the Doney always, except when she is in port, at which time it is to be lodged in the Custom House.

The Certificate to be on a Stamp of One Rix Dollar when the burthen of the Doney does not exceed Five Candies, and Two Rix Dollars if above.

Any Doney or vessel navigating without a Certificate on board, shall be confiscated with all Cargo on board, excepting such as navigate under the following exemption viz:

Such vessels having on board Permits from a Collector of Customs or Assistant Custom Master, may proceed to any part of the Coast of the same District, and take in goods of the description stated in the Permit and bring the same to the Port of Clearance for inspection and clearance—and with similar permit, may convey goods duly imported, from a Port of entry and export, to other ports in the same District; but during such voyages, within the limits of Districts; the Certificates of Registry are to remain in the Custom House from whence the Permit is issued.

When Europeans command vessels a note of contents is to be sent with each boat-load of goods sent on shore addressed to the Collector.

The penalty of disobeying this injunction is, fine not exceeding 100 Rix Dollars and imprisonment till paid.

And if such notes state falsely, the goods are liable to double duties.

No articles to pass the Custom House until duties are paid or Security given by deposit or otherwise, but no deposit can be received except when the duties exceed 500 Rix Dollars.

Deposits unredeemed are to be sold in six months, the amount of duties deducted, and the balance paid to the owners.

Interest is to be charged on duties not paid within two months at the rate of Nine per Cent per annum.

When goods are passed on deposit, the Invoices are to remain in the Custom House, and if there is no Invoice, the owner shall assent to valuation in writing, before the deposit is received.

Goods left in the Custom House above 18 months, without payment of duty unless by special permission of Government, to be sold by auction after Advertisement.

Proceeds to answer duty and Warehouse rent and surplus paid to owner but who shall have no further claim; perishable goods may be sold at an earlier period if deemed necessary.

If Goods lodged in any Custom House are destroyed by fire or stolen the owner is not to have any claim against Government.

Officers employed in the Custom House embezzling Goods or by negligence allowing them to be stolen, liable to make good double the value—action for the same to be brought in one year.

A Drawback is allowed on the re-exportation of all articles, except Grain, equal to nine-tenths of the Import duties, if the Goods are exported by the original Importer within twelve months; but the drawback does not extend to any additional duties imposed as penalties for breaches of the regulations.

Applications for drawback to be verified on Oath; and no drawback is allowed on articles of which the Packages are broken, or where the goods are in the whole of less value than 500 Rix Dollars.

No Goods to be landed or shipped but between six in the morning and six in the evening excepting personal Baggage of two trunks and two parcels for each person.

No vessel is to land or ship cargo except at regular ports, where there is a Custom House: and at places duly assigned within the same.

Goods not in deposit to be removed in seven days, or charged with Warehouse rent.

Wearing apparel, brought for the use of the Owners and their families free of duty, but a declaration in writing on honor that the apparel is for private use, may be demanded.

Public property is free of duty when certified to be so by the proper public Officer.

Every Ship, vessel or Doney sailing out of a Port of this Island, *excepting Ships of War and hired Transports*, shall take out a Port Clearance.

The Port Clearance is to contain a full and specific description of the cargo on board, and whether it has paid, or is liable to duty, or is to be signed in Duplicate by the master of the vessel.

Any goods which may be on board after such Port Clearance is signed, not inserted therein, shall be confiscated, also any goods discovered to be on board before the Port Clearance is issued if shipped without payment of duties.

Goods transhipped without permission or shipped on a different vessel from that for which they are passed, are to be confiscated, as well as the vessel, or at the discretion of Government the goods shall be liable to treble duties.

Charges of anchorage to be paid according to certain rates fixed. Port Clearance the voucher of their being paid.

Cinnamon in any quantity above ten lbs. for the use of Ships and the Travancore assortment of Tobacco, cannot be exported without special License, under the penalty of confiscation of such Cinnamon or Tobacco, and a fine of Three Hundred Six Dollars for every lb. of Cinnamon and Fifty Six Dollars for every lb. of Tobacco attempted to be exported.

Arms and Ammunition cannot be imported without special Licence, under penalty, in ordinary times, of a fine of Twenty Six Dollars for every pound of Sulphur, Saltpetre, Gunpowder or other Ammunition and One Hundred Six Dollars for every stand of Arms so imported, and imprisonment till such fine be paid: and in time of war or internal commotion, of transportation for seven years.

All articles landed or attempted to be landed at unlicensed places, or hours, or, if for trade, before the Ship or vessel is duly entered, or removed without payment of duties, shall be confiscated.

Commanders of Ships privy to importing or exporting goods liable to confiscation, subject to pay a fine equal to the value; as are also the owners or consignees of such goods.

Revenue Officers to have free access to vessels.

Persons concerned in shipping or landing goods prohibited, or without payment of duties, or impeding or molesting Revenue Officer, or offering to bribe or giving or offering any present, fee or gratuity to a Custom House Officer, liable to 1000 Six Dollars fine and imprisonment till paid; the goods above-mentioned to be confiscated.

Revenue Officers receiving presents to be liable to pay a fine of 1000 Six Dollars and to imprisonment at hard labour not exceeding six months.

Informers receive a reward in proportion to monthly salary of such Officer and circumstances of the case.

Informers entitled to one-third of property confiscated.

Excepting the Sitting Magistrate or Custom Master.

Confiscated goods above 50 Rix Dollars not to be sold without mention of the Comptrolier or Deputy Comptroller of Customs.

No person is allowed to land from any Ship or Square-rigged vessel anchoring in Colombo, Galle, or Trincomalé, till the vessel is visited by the Master Attendant or Deputy; and Certificate delivered by the Master, that none on board have Small-Pox or other contagious disease, of which a countercertificate is to be delivered by the Master Attendant to the Master.

No person is to land from a Doney in Colombo, Galle or Trincomalé, or from any vessel in other Ports, till a similar report is made to the Custom Master.

Penalty for breach of this Law, or a false report, fine of 500 Rix Dollars.

If any contagious disease should be on board, Custom Master to report at Colombo to the Chief Secretary; at outstations to the Collector of the District, and the Collector will take measures in concert with the principal Medical Officer to prevent communication; or remove infected persons; reporting the same to Government.

The above abstract being published by the sanction of Government a Copy is to be sent on board every Square-rigged vessel by the Master Attendant's or other Report boat; and Translations in Cingalese and Tamul are to be hung up in the most conspicuous parts of the Custom Houses and Master Attendant's Offices throughout the Island.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

Regulation No. 20. 1813,

*Corresponding with the Cingalese and Tamul Year
Sreemocga and Negira 1227.*

*For establishing new rates of Postage for Letters in the British
Settlements in the Island of Ceylon.*

WHEREAS the present rates of Postage for letters are found to be disproportionate and inconvenient;

1st. It is enacted that from and after the 1st day of September next, the rates contained in the annexed Schedules, and no other shall be the rates of postage for single letters within the British Settlements in the Island.

2d. The double, treble and quadruple letters be charged proportionably, according to the rates in the said Schedules; letters weighing one Rupee to be accounted single, from thence to one Rupee and an half double, from thence to two Rupees treble, from thence to two and a half quadruple.

3d. That letters weighing above two Rupees and a half, and not exceeding three, to be rated as packets and subjects to five fold the single postage—and for each half ounce above three Rupees shall be chargeable in addition with postage as a treble letter.

REGULATION OF GOVERNMENT.

For establishing certain Rules for the business of the Ports and Harbours of Colombo, Point de Galle and Trincomalé, and settling the rate of Port Charges and Prices of labour in the said Ports and Harbours.

WHEREAS it is become necessary to establish certain rules, and to settle the rate of Port Charges and the Prices of labour in the Ports and Harbours of Colombo, Point de Galle and Trincomalé;

His Excellency the Governor is pleased to enact and declare, that the Rules, rates and Charges set forth in the three Schedules hereunto annexed be observed in the said Ports and Harbours respectively, and all persons concerned are hereby directed to conform themselves, and be obedient thereto, and the several Courts of justice and Magistrates, and all other His Majesty's subjects in and throughout His Majesty's Settlements in the Island of Ceylon, are hereby strictly charged and commanded to observe and enforce the same.

Every former Proclamation or order, which contradicts this Regulation, is hereby repealed.

RULES AND ORDERS.

For the business of the Port of Colombo.

FOR VESSELS &c.

1st. All square rigged Vessels, Sloops and Schooners must employ the Boats attached to the Master Attendant's Department for the landing or shipping of their Cargoes, or any part thereof, and no other.

2d. As the Government Boats will not be sufficient for such

Colombo Port Charges.

purpose, the Master Attendant is to license a certain number of Country Boats (called Battels) to ply to and from Vessels &c. for landing and shipping their Cargoes, these Boats are to be numbered and registered, and Crews thereof subject to the orders of the Master Attendant two thirds the hire chargeable for such Boats shall go to the owners for themselves and crew, and the remaining one third to Government.

3d. Any Country Boat not licensed as above described, plying to square rigged Vessels, Sloops or Schooners for the purpose of landing or shipping any merchandize, shall immediately be seized, and on due conviction thereof, for the first offence the whole Boat hire chargeable for use of such Boat by the Port rates shall become forfeited to Government, and for every subsequent offence three times the amount.

4th. Coast Dhonies may land and ship their Cargoes without using the Boats attached to the Master Attendant's Department, paying for license for that purpose at the rate of one Rix Dollar the Garce.

5th. Cingalese Dhonies without Out Riggers, commonly called Coilah Dhonies, may land and ship their Cargoes at the established places free of all charge. No Dhonies however can be permitted to lie alongside the wharf for the purpose of loading or discharging Cargo without a permit in writing, from the Master Attendant for which they are to pay in the instance of Arrack the rate of six Fanams the Leaguer and for other Goods Twenty Rix Dollars the Cargo.

6th. The full hire of each Boat is to be paid for every day it is employed either in receiving or discharging Cargo.

7th. No Boats are to be employed in the landing or unloading of Vessels on Sundays, Christmas day and Good Friday, except in cases of emergency, when double hire is to be charged for the Boats so employed.

8th. Boats going off after sun set to be charged half more than the usual hire.

9th. Persons applying for Boats and not using them are to pay half the hire of such Boat.

10th. The Boatmen belonging to the Master Attendant's Department are not to be employed on Board any Vessels by the Commander or Officers of such Vessels.

11th. No goods are to be landed or shipped but at the wharf without a license from the Custom Master under penalty of confiscation.

12th. No Ballast to be thrown overboard, but landed and deposited in a place to be pointed out by the Master Attendant.

*Colombo Port Charges.***MASTER ATTENDANT'S DUTY.**

1st. He is on the application of Masters or Supercargoes of Vessels to provide them with Boats for the landing or shipping of their Merchandize with the least possible delay.

2d. He is to take care that all Goods liable to Custom House duties, are landed at the wharf, unless special permission be granted by the Custom Master for their being landed elsewhere.

3d. He is daily to give certificates to the Owners or Tindals of the licensed Battels or Country Boats of their service during each day, and upon their production of those certificates every Saturday at his Office, he is to settle with them for their share of Boat hire respectively.

4th. He is at the same time to settle with the Pilots for their share of Pilotage.

5th. He is not to give any credit for the Port Fees and Charges, if he does, it is at his own risk.

6th. He is not to countersign the Port Clearance granted by the Custom Master, to any Vessel, until every demand has been settled in the current money of Ceylon, for Boat hire and every other Port charge.

7th. He is to keep regular accounts of the sums he receives during each month for Pilotage of Merchant Vessels, Boat hire, & other Port charges, and transmit the same attested to the Collector of the district on the 1st of the succeeding month.

8th. He is to pay the receipts of his department on the 28th of each month to the Collector of the district, taking that Officer's acknowledgement in duplicate, for the amount and forwarding the original to the Commissioner of Revenue.

9th. He is to keep a regular list of all Vessels arriving and departing with their passengers, Lading and Tonnage, according to a prescribed form; he is to send a report of arrivals and departures as they occur, to his Excellency the Governor, the Chief Secretary to Government, the Comptroller General of Customs and the Commandant of the Garrison.

Officers and Servants of the Master Attendant's Department.

1st. The Boatmen and other servants attached to the Master Attendant's Department must obey the legal orders of their Superiors, relative to the discharge of their duties on pain of punishment, to be inflicted on them on conviction before the Magistrate of the Port, not exceeding two months imprisonment, 100 Rix Dollars fine, and fifty lashes.

Colombo Port Charges.

They are not to take, or receive directly or indirectly any fee or gratuity; if found offending herein to be dismissed and liable to punishment as aforesaid. The Pilots however in addition to their pay are to be allowed one half the specified rate of Pilotage for each Vessel they Pilot into the Roads or Harbour.

The attendance of the Boatmen and other servants belonging to the department to be from six o'clock in the morning, till six in the evening.

A head Boatman however is to remain constantly at the Beach house, day and night, and a Boat's Crew to be on duty at night, in case of any Vessel requiring immediate assistance.

A printed Copy of these rules and orders, and of the fixed rates of Boat hire and Port Charges, is to be placed in the most conspicuous part of the Custom House and Master Attendant's Office, for the information of the public.

REGULATION OF GOVERNMENT.

PRESENT,

THE HONBLE THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR

IN COUNCIL.

A. D. 1821.

Regulation No. 10.

For declaring the Penalty which shall attach to the landing of Goods at Colombo, Galle and Trincomalè contrary to the Provisions of the 19th Regulation of 1813; and for preventing all doubts as to the confiscation of Goods shipped without payment of duties altho' discovered before the issue of a Port Clearance, and for making it penal to offer a Fee or Present to a Custom House Officer and altering the Punishment of such Officers for receiving such Present or Fee.

1. **W**HEREAS by the Rules and Orders enacted by and annexed to the 19th Regulation of the year 1813 for the business of the several Ports of Colombo, Point de Galle, and Trincomalè, It was ordered that all square rigged Vessels, Sloops and Schooners should and must employ the Boats attached to the Master Attendant's Departments of those Stations respectively, or other Boats licensed by the Master Attendant in manner as by the said Rules and Orders is set forth, for landing and shipping their Cargoes or any part thereof, and none other: And whereas it is expedient to declare what Penalty shall attach to a breach of such order, and to the landing of goods from Vessels as aforesaid, at the Ports aforesaid, in any other than in the Boats above described.

2. It is therefore enacted by the Lieutenant Governor in Council that if any goods shall be landed from or shipped to any square rigged Vessel, Sloop, or Schooner anchoring or being in either of the Ports of Colombo, Point de Galle, or Trincomalè, save and except in Boats belonging to the Department of the Master Attendant of the Port, or licensed by him, either generally or specially to land or ship such goods, by license under his hands, the said goods, and the unlicensed Boat in which they may be landed or shipped, shall be confiscated, and one half of the value thereof shall be paid to the person or persons who shall give information touching the landing or shipping of the goods in such unlicensed Boat.

3. Provided that the penalty above enacted shall not attach to Clothing or personal Baggage landed or shipped to and with any person belonging to or being a Passenger on board any such square rigged Vessel, Sloop, or Schooner, in the Boats belonging to such Vessel, Sloop, or Schooner, nor to the Property of the Crown, nor to the actual Property of Officers of His Majesty's Navy or Transports landed, or shipped in the Boats belonging to Vessels of His Majesty's Navy or of His Majesty's Transports, and that it shall

be competent to the Governor or Lieutenant Governor of this Island to remit the whole or any part of any penalty incurred under the foregoing Clause.

4. And whereas doubts have arisen whether goods actually shipped from the Island on board of Ships, Vessels, or Dories lying in the Ports, or off the Coasts thereof or otherwise, without payment of the Duties of Customs by law established, and which may be discovered to be therein, before the Ship, Vessel, or Doney takes out a Port Clearance, are by law liable to confiscation; It is therefore enacted, that any goods which shall be discovered to be on board any Ship, Vessel or Doney at any time before she shall have taken out a Port Clearance, being shipped from any part of this island without payment of the Duties of Customs by law chargeable thereon, shall be confiscated, and the Commander or Principal person on board the Vessel, the Owner or Exporter of the goods who shall be proved to be privy to the shipment thereof without payment of Duties, shall be liable to a fine equal to the value thereof, and to be imprisoned till the said fine is paid; and the half of the value of such goods and of the said fine, shall be paid to the person or persons who shall give information of such unlawful shipment. Provided always that it shall be competent to the Governor or Lieutenant Governor of this Island, to remit the whole or any part of the Penalty incurred under this Clause.

5. And it is further enacted that any person who shall be convicted of giving or offering to any person employed in the collection of the Customs directly or indirectly any Present, Fee or Gratuity shall be liable to pay a fine not exceeding One Thousand Six Dollars, and to be imprisoned till such fine be paid, and that any such person so employed in the collection of the Customs convicted of receiving any such Present, Fee or Gratuity, shall be punished therefore by fine and Imprisonment under obligation to hard labour without at the discretion of any Provincial Judge, Sitting Magistrate or Justice of the Peace before whom he may be convicted, a fine not exceeding One Thousand Six Dollars and such Imprisonment not exceeding six months.

6. And it is further enacted that so much of the Thirty fourth Clause of the Sixth Regulation of 1820 which declares the dismissal from Office of Servants of the Custom House, the Punishment for the Offence stated in the foregoing Clause, shall be and the same is repealed.

Colombo Flag-Staff signals on vessels appearing in sight.

A blue white and red flag to be hoisted at the outer yard arm, on a square rigged vessel being off. As soon as it is ascertained to be a ship, a ball is to be placed over the flag—if a brig, a ball under the flag.

A ball suspended at the inner yard arm will indicate a sloop, schooner or any other small vessels, excepting dhonies, being in sight.
