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PREFACE.

INTRODUCTION.

THIS Index contains every reference to every name, whether that of a person, place, book, or ceremony. A few general headings, such as Irrigation and Seafaring, have been included.

To facilitate reference to subjects which are found throughout the book, such as Bo-tree, Tamil, or Tooth Relic, and to names which occur frequently, such as Devanampiya Tissa or Parakkama Bahu, short synopses have been added.

In Turner's Mahawansa (i.e., the first thirty-eight chapters) many mistakes have been corrected by the translator (L. C. Wijesinha) of the remaining chapters, the correct reading being given in foot-notes at the bottom of the page. Where names have been thus altered, the Index refers to the new rendering.

As the first thirty-eight chapters are not divided into verses, the references given are to chapter and page; for the remainder the figures indicate chapter and verse. These differences of reference have been rendered: ch.—, p.—; and ch.—, v.—.

Following the Index will be found a list of Wars and Battles arranged in chronological order.

Finally are given Genealogical Trees of the various dynasties which reigned in Ceylon, with a short alphabetical index to the references from which these have been compiled.

On examining the Genealogical Trees appended, it will be seen that in several instances results do not agree with Turner's "List of Kings" given in the beginning of the First Part of the *Mahawansa*, or with the "Chronological Table of Sinhalese Sovereigns from Kasyapa I.," given at the commencement of the Second Part.

From the former Table Upatissa No. 2 has been omitted. The regency was at the town Upatissa; but the name of the regent is not given. Also between Nos. 4 and 5 has been placed King Tissa I. His name is not given in Turner's list.

From the "Chronological Table" no king is omitted, nor is any added; but in the instances given below the Tables show different relationships from those in the older Table. The following differ, the numbers referring to the "Chronological Table":—Nos. 70, 75, 76, 80, 93, 94, 95, 105, 106, 108, 110, 113, 123, 135, and 157.

In order to justify the placing of the various kings and their relations given in the following Trees, a small index has been prepared, giving merely references which refer to relationships. It will thus be easy to immediately verify any relationship shown in the trees. Where two or more references are given they should be read in conjunction.

The short index does not pretend to give all the references to any person. Where further information is required it will be found in the General Index.

For convenience the Trees have been arranged in sevon Parts :-

Part I. begins with Mahasammata kings.

Part II. begins with Subbha.

Part III. begins with Pandu and Dhatusena.

Part IV. begins with Sanghatissa II.

Part V. begins with Udaya III.

Part VI. begins wth Sahassamalla.

Part VII. begins with Parakkama Bahu VI.

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
