Vice-Chancellor's Review:

Vice-Chancellor's Report

The year 2013 had a challenging beginning for the University of Colombo. The post of Vice-Chancellor was vacant from the end of January of 2013, as the former Vice-Chancellor was appointed as the Chairperson of the University Grants Commission. Due to unavoidable circumstances it took nearly four (4) months until end of May 2014 to appoint the new Vice-Chancellor.

The preveiling uncertainly was aggravated with the Trade Union action of University teachers leading to a pay rise, and rescheduling of teaching programs of The Campus, Institutes and all Faculties except the Medical Faculty. However, this was overcome by motivated teachers by conducting extra-classes with a slight delay in commencing the new term. There were no new development activity under this uncertain situation, but the Acting Vice-Chancellor, Professor TR Ariyaratne managed the University very well, while progress of activity were maintained in HETC Projects. New student intake was delayed due to legal cases for the entire University system, but under minimum facilities, a significant number of additional work were carried out to achieve unexpected targets which were not in the Strategic Plan of the University of Colombo. However, the continuation of the renovation of the Mathematics Building Which is 179 years old in collaboration with the Sri Lanka Army was completed very successfully, setting an example for teamwork with commitment for quality output for the University community. Although, there were initial obstacles, research activity of the University of Colombo was continued due to increased research allowance added to the salary of the leader, and time availability for researchers during intervals in holding regular teaching programs.

The second half of the year 2013 has started under my guidance as the new Vice Chancellor where the highest attention was paid to provide decent and acceptable hostel facilities for the residential student community. Most of the hostels were in deteriorated beyond acceptuale levels. These buildings were refubished with the maintance of Sri Lanka Army.

- University of Colombo Annual Research Symposium was held on 3rd 4th October 2013 at the New Arts Theatre of the University of Colombo on the theme "Higher Education through State Sector in the Competitive Knowledge Economy".
- Faculty of Graduate Studies was presented with the Asia's Best Business School Leadership Award for 2013, for the third consecutive year.
- The 8th International Research Conference on Management and Finance, 2013 was organized by the Faculty of Management and Finance, University of Colombo, Sri Lanka on 13th December at the Sri Lanka Foundation.
- International Colloquium on Leishmaniasis was held from 25th to 26th March 2013 at the
 auditorium of the Sri Lanka Institute of Development Administration (SLIDA). Resource persons
 were 9 Indian scientists well known in the field of leishmaniasis and it was attended by
 representatives from all universities in the country, Ministry of Health and local research
 institutes.
- Newly constructed building named the Clinical Medicine & Research Centre (CLINMARC) was opened in the premises of the National Hospital of Sri Lanka (NHSL) on 3rd July, 2013. Hon. 


1.5 OVERALL PERFORMANCE

In 2013 the University continued to deliver its academic activities through its seven faculties and 4departments of study.

The University of Colombo marched towards its goals with the assistance of 1418 staff members comprising 45% academic, 3 % administrative and 52% as non-academic staff (figure I-01)



The proportional distribution of the academic staff among Senior Professors, Professors, Associate Professors, Senior Lecturers and Lecturers were 5%,18%,5%,60% and 12% respectively (Figure I-02)



Academic Performance

The University of Colombo with a proud history of over 143 years continues in its endeavour to meet the challenges of maintaining its position as a "Metropolitan University, Modern and International in Outlook and Character". The location of the University affords the student population all the advantages of a "Metropolitan University", with easy access to international information/resource centres, libraries, theatres, sports complexes etc. Its central location within the City of Colombo provides easy access to a wide range of cultural, entertainment and business facilities. Backed by its long and proud history, together with a solid academic and administrative infrastructure which has stood the test of time, the University has progressed towards its goals in accordance with the Performance Improvement Strategic Plan (PISP) by embracing modern and innovative approaches to teaching, research and service to the community. The University of Colombo has a multi-cultural, multi-ethnic, multi- religious student and staff population fostering social harmony, cultural diversity, equal opportunity and unity. The faculties, campus, institutes and school of the university functioned very smoothly in a conductive environment for teaching, learning and research without any interruption during the year under review.

2. FACULTIES, CAMPUS, CENTERS AND UNITS

2.1 FACULTY OF ARTS

Introduction

The Faculty of Arts, located between Reid Avenue and Prof. Stanley Wijesundara Mawatha, is the largest Faculty in terms of student population. The Faculty has nine academic departments comprising the Departments of Demography, Economics, English, Geography, History, International Relations, Political Science & Public Policy, Sinhala and Sociology. In addition, Faculty has six Teaching Units comprising Arabic & Islamic Civilization Unit, English Language Teaching Unit, Computer Unit (comprising the Student Computer Unit and the Computer Teaching Unit), Journalism Unit, Mathematics Unit and Pali & Buddhist Studies Unit. These Departments and Units offer courses in the Humanities and Social Sciences. Apart from undergraduate programmes of Study, several Departments offer extension programs and Postgraduate programs leading to the Masters, M.Phil and Ph.D. degrees. Many students, who successfully complete the

four year BA degree programs, eventually register for postgraduate degree programs offered by these Departments of the Faculty.

During the year 2013, Prof Athula Ranasinghe continued as the Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Mr R. Logendra continued as the Senior Assistant Registrar of the Faculty. Prof. Premakumra De Silva former Head of the Department of Sociology was appointed as the Deputy Vice Chancellor of the University of Colombo.

During the year, the following teachers functioned as Heads of Departments. Mission of the Faculty

The Mission of the Faculty is "to promote collectively scholarships, critical inquiry, competencies and skills in the Social Sciences and Humanities in keeping with the highest academic and ethical standards in teaching, research, training and evaluation. To provide students with not only specific skills and competencies but also a broad social and humanistic orientation, so that they could fit into the changing world of work with a sense of social responsibility and moral commitment".

Major Events of the Faculty of Arts -2013

During the year under review, the Faulty academic staff contributed to the Annual Research Symposium of the University of Colombo which was held on 04th October 2013 under the theme "Higher Education through State Sector in the Competitive Knowledge – Economy" by providing 35 Research papers. It included the subject areas of Demography, Economics, History, International Relations, Geography, Sinhala, Sociology, Political Science and Public Policy, Journalism, Buddhist Studies, English Language Teaching, English Literature and Linguistics.

As in the previous years, 04 undergraduate students from the Department of Economics participated in the South Asian Students Meet (SAESM). The Department has been involved in this programme since 2004. Dr. D.D.P.M. Dunusinghe and Ms. S.R.S.D.K. Weerawansa took the leading role in encouraging students to submit papers and prepare their presentations for the event that was held from 24th December 2013 to 29th December 2013 at the Lahore University of Management Sciences, Pakistan. Ms. C.K. Uduwela, one of the undergraduate participants from the Department of Economics won the best "Budding Economist in South Asia" award in this meet.

The Faculty of Arts commemorated the International Day of the Persons with Disabilities on 3rd December, 2013 at the Faculty of Arts premises under the patronage of Prof. Athula Ranasinghe, the Dean, Faculty of Arts and Prof. Premakumara de Silva, the Deputy Vice- Chancellor, University of Colombo. Her Excellency Michele J. Sison, US Ambassador for Sri Lanka and Maldives graced the occasion as Chief Guest. To mark this important day, the Faculty of Arts launched its 'Equal Access to Education' Project recognizing the needs to improve the facilities to the students with disabilities in order to protect their rights. The US Ambassador made a donation of \$ 20,000 to improve the facilities in the Disability Centre, Faculty of Arts.

The 03rd Annual Research Symposium of the Department of Sinhala was held on 09th December 2013 at the M.B. Ariyapala Auditorium. At this event, several scholars representing all Universities of Sri Lanka presented their academic papers under the general theme of 'Modern challenges to Sinhala Language and Literature". Undergraduate Research Symposium - 2013 of the Department of Sinhala was held on 02nd May 2013 at the M.B. Ariyapala Auditorium Department of Sinhala, For the first time, this symposium was organized by the Department of Sinhala, enhancing the research capacity and Proficiency of undergraduates. Selected papers from the final year undergraduates were presented at the sessions which were chaired by eminent professors in the decipline.

The student and academic staff exchange programme between Department of English and the Institut fur Anglistik, Justus Liebig University, Germany successfully continued in 2013. Three students from the department were selected to visit Germany in the first semester of 2013, and Dr. Sandra Goetz from JLU visited the Department of English on a short term lecturership in August 2013. Four German Students from JLU enrolled for the second semester of 2013 at the Department of English. Shyam Selvadurai, a veteran English Writer introduced his latest book '*The Hungry Ghosts'* on 23rd August 2013 at the Department of English.

The Faculty of Arts of the University of Colombo emerged victorious at the Hulftsdorp Debate 2013 organized by the English Literary Association of Sri Lanka Law College in Hulftsdorp, Colombo. The Debate took place on the 13th and 14th of July 2013 at Sri Lanka Law College premises. The Hulftsdorp Debates were held under the auspices of the Debaters Council of Sri Lanka, which was the officiating body for the tournament.

Dinithi Uthpala Ranasinghe, a final year undergraduate from the Department of Sinhala, Faculty of Arts was selected the "Best Lyricist" of the year at the Kavitha Talent Competition 2013 of conducted by the Ministry of Higher Education recently. She received this title having completed with thousands of university students who took part in this event. She also received merit certificate for the category of poetry at the same event

The Department of Sociology exchange programme the MOU signed between the University of Colombo and the University of Ljubljana for the 6th year. The Department organized a Symposium on "Suicide in Sri Lanka: Past, Present and Future Transformations" on 21st and 22nd March 2013, which was sponsored by the National Science Foundation and the World Health Organisation.

The Pali and Buddhist Studies Unit received a donation of a large collection of books in Buddhist Studies from Gunasekara Trust, Kitulwatta Road, Colombo 8. In addition to that, Dr.Toshilchi Endo, Associate Professor of Buddhist Studies at University of Hong-Kong, Centre for Buddhist Studies, donated a collection of about one thousand volumes of Buddhist academic works to Buddhist Studies Unit, University of Colombo.

Leadership Development Programme for newly elected office bearers of the Students' Union of the Faculty of Arts was held on 4th March 2013 at the Sri Lanka Foundation Institute. This was organized by the Faculty of Arts in collaboration with Sri Lanka Foundation Institute.

The Annual Arts Festival - "Esala Sathsara", organized by the Faculty of Arts, was held from 16th September to 20th September 2013. This festival is annually organized to identify and develop the various talents of the undergraduates, especially focusing on the first year students. The exhibition was followed by a musical program "Rasa Kandura" on the 17th September 2013 and a drama show was staged on the 18th September. The festival was concluded with the prize giving ceremony on 20th, September 2013.

The Dean's Award, Literary Competition was held in parallel to the "Esala Sathsara" cultural festival. The competition covered many areas such as fictions, short stories, lyrics, poetry, literature criticism, and short drama scripts. The certificates and awards were presented after evaluating their performances in the above areas.

Faculty Appointments

Prof. Gameela Samarasinghe attached to the Department of Sociology steped down from the Post of Director of Studies as she had availed herself of sabbatical leave. Dr. Shermal Wijewardane attached to the Department of English was appointed as the Director of Studies with effect from 01.07.2013.

Dr. Chandrasiri Niriella has resigned from the post of Co-ordinator / Academic Counsellor of the Information and Documentation Centre (IDC) with effect from 31.05.2013 as he was appointed as the Senior Student Counsellor of the University of Colombo. Dr. U.P.P. Serasinghe attached to the Department of Economics was appointed as the Co-ordinator /Academic Counsellor of the Information and Documentation Centre (IDC) with effect from 01.06.201

Undergraduate Programs

In the year 2013, the total undergraduate population in the Faculty numbered over 2465 students. The academic activities for the new batch (2011- A/L) commenced on 07th May 2013 enrolling about 900 students. The course unit system is continued by offering a range of course units to the students including internship component for credit.

The Department of Demography also offered courses for General and Special Degree students. The Department continued to offer Demography as a subject for the General Degree and as a second and third subject for other Special Degree students.

The Department of Economics continued to offer the Special Degree Programme in Economics and the General Degree programme. The department turned to English medium for Special Degree Programs from the 2nd year, so that in two years time all special degree students will follow their degree programs in English medium. All final year students of the Special Degree Programme in Economics were attached to different public and private institutions for a period of three months to undergo an Internship Training programme.

The Department of English continued to offer a range of course units for the General and Special Degrees in English Literature, English Language and ELT, and Cultural Studies.

The Department of Geography continued to offer courses for General and Special Degree students. The mission of this department was to continue the task of developing new areas of teaching in the undergraduate programmes

The Department of History continued to offer courses for General and Special Degree students. After the bifurcation of Department in year 2010, and functions as a separate Department.

The Department of International Relations offers General and Special Degree courses. It has become one of the most sought after subjects by the first year undergraduates. In 2013, two new courses were introduced and two courses were revised. Overall, new curricula was incorporates to the core established areas of the International Relations Discipline. The Department also offered Internships for the 4th year special degree students.

The Department of Political Science & Public Policy continued to offer courses for General & Special Degree students and Department of Sinhala also offered courses for General & Special Degree students. The Department of Sinhala organized a series of monthly seminars to encourage students' research ability.

The Department of Sociology offered a Special Degree program in Sociology as well as Sociology as a subject for the General Degree. The Department continues to improve its infrastructure and other facilities in order to create a better Learning Environment for its students.

Pali & Buddhist Studies unit offered three major study programmes for the undergraduates: Buddhist Studies (General Degree), Buddhist Studies (Special Degree), Pali Studies (General Degree).

In the year 2013 also, the English Language Teaching Unit, continued to serve all six faculties with intensive and ongoing courses. The ELTU made a concentrated affort this year to revise the course material used for teaching in order to align the teaching —learning activities with the new general benchmark introduced by the UGC. Special emphasis was laid on the material for Level I and Level II Proficency courses of the Faculty of Arts.

Arabic & Islamic Civilization Unit (ICV Unit) in the year 2013 was strengthened by developing its infrastructure facilities in order to give better teaching and learning experience for its undergraduates.

The Journalism Unit engaged in a syllabus review in the year 2013 in order to offer Special degree programmes in the near future and establish as a separate Department.

Mathematics is an interdisciplinary subject for various disciplines and the Mathematics Unit (MU) offered three course units for students of the Faculty of Arts.

Computer teaching unit offered two course units and short courses for the undergraduates for the year 2013.

Extension Courses and Community Service Delivery Programmes -2013

A number of Extension Courses were offered by the Faculty of Arts during 2013, providing professional enhancement skills to the community at large and enabling the Faculty to remain the largest contributor to the University Development Fund.

The Department of Demography conducted a seminar series to support the G.C.E. (O/L) students in two rural schools in Hambanthoata in November 2013.

The Department of Economics offered two diploma courses: Diploma in Tourism and Travel Economics and Hotel Management, and Diploma in Micro Finance.

The Department of English offered Extension Courses in English catering to about 3000 members of the general public, and undertook consultancies to various government and private institutions. It offered Certificate Courses in English for Careers (Part 1 & 2), and English for Law (Part 1 & 2). It also conducted Diploma courses in Advanced English for Administrative and Academic Purposes, and English for Teachers of English (DETE) and a Diploma in English for English Medium Instruction Teachers (DEEMIT).

The Department of International Relations offered an extension course titled "Certificate Course in International Relations (CCIR)" in the year 2013.

The Department of Political Science and Public Policy continued its Certificate programme "Certificate Course in Politics and Governance" in the year 2013 as well.

The Department of Sinhala also continued its Diploma Programme "Diploma in Sinhala" in the year 2013.

Dean's office of the Faculty of Arts started a "Certificate in Spoken Tamil" course in the year 2013.

The ELTU offered Certificate Courses in Business English (Preliminary and Intermediate Levels), and e-Diploma in Business English using M-learning platform. In addition to that an Intensive course in English was conducted this year for the students of the National Institute of Fisheries and Nautical Engineering while a three month course in Practical English was conducted at the Ceylon National Chamber of Industries.

The Journalism Unit conducted its Diploma in Journalism programme which was commenced in the year 2012

2.3 FACULTY OF GRADUATE STUDIES

The FGS of the University of Colombo is one of the leading postgraduate degree awarding institutions in Sri Lanka. With the introduction of liberalized policies in 1977, the market for higher education has changed significantly. In fact, a bachelor's degree is now considered a basic qualification for academic or employment prospects and postgraduate training has become an essential component of career development.

The FGS was established by the Faculty of Graduate Studies Ordinance No: 03 of 1987. It is headed by the Dean of the Faculty, and managed by the Board of Graduate Studies, accountable to the Senate and the Council of the University of Colombo. The Boards of study constituted under the ordinance, the Board of Study for Development Studies and the Board of Study for Professional Studies function as the first layer of policy making and forward their recommendations to the Faculty Board for approval. The Faculty Board reviews these decisions and recommends them for Senate approval.





The introduction of online teaching in 2007 was a major step towards offering greater flexibility to students in terms of selection of courses, their duration, new methods of teaching, learning and evaluation. The

other important development was the continuation of highly structured M Phil/ Ph D programmefor the 5th time in 2013 for the benefit of students interested in multi-disciplinary studies.





The FGS conducted

three (03) Executive Diplomas and fourteen (14) Postgraduate Diploma programmes and fifteen (15) Mastersprogrammes and two (02) MPhil/PhD pogrammes during the year under review. The Faculty continued its MPhil in Clinical Psychology programme and restructured its MPhil/PhD degree programme including minor amendments to its by-laws. Due to the increased demand for admission to the Postgraduate Diploma in Business Management (PgD. BM), Masters in Business Studies (MBS) and Postgraduate Diploma in Development Studies (PgD.DS) programmes, the Faculty took steps to enroll two batches of students (weekdays and week –ends) for each of these programmes during the year.

Quality enhancement is one of the key priorities of the Faculty and two (02) strategies have been adopted to realize this objective

- curriculum development by revising and updating existing study programmes,
- provide knowledge inputs to students through well qualified staff drawn from the University and Industry

These strategies also strengthen the linkage between university and industry. In 2013, the FGS managed to maintain its student enrolment levels in spite of competitive pressures from public and private sector service providers.

2.6 FACULTY OF MEDICINE

Introduction

The Faculty of Medicine is the second oldest medical school in South Asia and the forerunner of university education in this country. For nearly a century it was the only medical school in the island and its contribution to the health of the nation by way of providing health services, medical education and medical research is difficult to measure. At present there are 14 departments in the faculty of Medicine. The Departments of Biochemistry and Pharmacology branched off from the Department of Physiology, Parasitology and Microbiology from the Department of Pathology, and Paediatrics and Psychological Medicine from the Department of Medicine. There are 7 Units in addition to these departments - the Parasitic Diseases Research Unit, the Human Genetics Unit, the Medical Education Development and Research Centre (MEDARC), the Curriculum Implementation Unit, the Publications Unit and the Audio-Visual Unit. The Allied Health Sciences Unit was established in 2006.

The Faculty of Medicine continued under the Deanship of Professor Rohan W Jayasekara. Mr. PMS Bandara, Ms. HGD Sriyani and Mr. Kolitha Bandara continued as Deputy Registrar, Assistant Registrar and Senior Assistant Bursar respectively.

Two hundred and fifteen (215) medical students and thirty six (36) Physiotherapy students from the 2011 A/L batch began their undergraduate programmes on the 18th of April, 2013 and May, 2013 respectively. This included ten (10) Bhutanese Medical undergraduates who joined the faculty under the MOU signed between the Faculty of Medicine and the Royal Government of Bhutan.

The B.Sc. Physiotherapy programme is conducted in a rented house with many difficulties as it is located far away from the Faculty premises. The faculty hopes to rent or lease a new building towards the end of this year in order to address the insufficient canteen facilities and study areas for students.

The Department of Pharmacology conducts a B.Sc. (Pharmacy) special degree programme in collaboration with the Science Faculty of the University and ten (10) students from the 2009/2010 A/L batch began their undergraduate studies in the Faculty. This was the 14th batch undertaking this degree course.

In addition to training medical graduates, the Faculty plays an important role in training paramedical staff by participating in the training programmes of the School of Radiography, School of Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy, School of Cardiography, Optometrists Training Programme, Nurses Training Schools, and the Post Basic Nurses Training School. The Department of Pharmacology conducts the Internal Pharmacy course for the Ministry of Health and assists the Ceylon Medical College Council by conducting the External Pharmacy Examination.

In the Faculty of Medicine the Postgraduate programmes are conducted by course work as extension courses. However, the Faculty provides research training to medical and non-medical graduates leading to the research degrees of PhD, MPhil, DM and MSc. The Research and Higher Degrees Committee of the Faculty reviews the project proposals and monitors their progress periodically. Three (03) students completed Ph.Ds.during the year.

Seventy four (74) students from the following countries attended foreign elective programmes in the departments of Clinical Medicine, Paediatrics, Surgery, Obstetrics & Gynaecology, Community Medicine, Parasitology and Forensic Medicine as at 28th October 2013 from January 1st 2013.

With a student population of over one thousand one hundred (1,100), and academic and non-academic staff amounting to about four hundred and fifty (450), space is an acute problem in the Faculty. However, initiatives for commencement of the second stage of the Pre Clinical Building are being finalized and the construction work is expected to begin in early 2014.

The Following are the major achievements/events during the year under reviewed.

- ➤ International Colloquium on Leishmaniasis was held from 25th to 26th March 2013 at the auditorium of the Sri Lanka Institute of Development Administration (SLIDA). Resource persons were 9 Indian scientists well known in the field of leishmaniasis and it was attended by representatives from all universities in the country, Ministry of Health and local research institutes.
- ➤ The launch of "Enhancing Healthcare Education in Sri Lanka" a three-year programme with a grant of S\$ 385,130/- by the Temasek Foundation (TF) and the Singapore International Foundation (SIF) in partnership with, the Ministry of Health, Sri Lanka and the Faculty of Medicine, University of Colombo was held on 2nd July 2013 at the Faculty of Medicine. The main objective of the project with experts from Singapore and Sri Lanka is to enhance healthcare education in Sri Lanka. They are planning to train 210 Medical, Nursing and Allied Health personnel. The Project will also help to develop the Library with modern facilities. The launch event was attended by the Singapore and Sri Lankan partners which included the SIF Governor, Mr. Kesavapany, Minister of Health in Sri Lanka, Hon. Maithripala Sirisena and Minister of Higher Education in Sri Lanka, Hon. SB Dissanayake.
- > Opening of the newly constructed building named the Clinical Medicine & Research Centre (CLINMARC) in the premises of the National Hospital of Sri Lanka (NHSL) on 3rd July, 2013. Hon. Minister of Health, Mr. Maithripala Sirisena and the Hon. Minister of Higher Education Mr. SB Dissanayake participated as Guests of Honour at the Opening Ceremony.
- > Establishment of the Physiotherapy Clinics at the Allied Health Sciences Unit with a view to;
 - a. providing an outpatient basis / clinical case centered education for the students at the AHSU

- **b.** developing their physiotherapy skills, behavioural sciences, managerial skills
- **c.** developing clinical and professional skills of the demonstrators / probationary lecturers currently employed at the AHSU
- d. providing a better and effective service to patients, disabled children and elderly
- e. conducting research based on the clinics.
- The Department of Community Medicine was designated as a WHO Collaborating Centre for Training & Research in Occupational Health.
- Curriculum reforms and developments:
 - **a.** Curriculum reforms are underway with emphasis on an outcome based curriculum (series of workshops have been held by CD&EC, Applied Science Stream and Behavioral Sciences Stream).
 - b. Shortening of the total duration of the MBBS Course (in keeping with the SLMC requirements)
 - **c.** Greater time efficiency through integrated teaching and reallocation of time (with attempts at maximizing clinical training while maintaining community stream learning activities)
 - **d.** Enhancement of soft skills (workshops have been held with funding from HETC)
 - e. Reduce assessment overload on students by restructuring module examination schedules.
 - **f.** Greater emphasis on patient safety, prescribing skills, cancer control, [primary care and learning management systems.]
- The Organizing Committee of the 44th Asia Pacific Academic Consortium for Public Health (APACPH) Conference had saved a sum of Rs. 16,202,204.76 from the proceeds of the above conference which was successfully concluded in October 2012.
- The "Journey Through the Human Body" an Educational Workshop which was organized by the Department of Anatomy with the students of Year 2011 batch as a part of the Anatomy Block Centenary Commemoration Project was successfully concluded on 3rd August 2013. Over 3500 students from both government and private schools in the Colombo District had participated at this event.
- ➤ The Annual Health Education Campaign and Health Camp organized by the Medical Students' Hindu Society was held on 24th of May 2013 and 2nd of June 2013, at Udappu, Aandimunai Tamil Maha Vidyalayam, with the participation of the members of the society, Faculty staff members and extended Faculty staff members. 600 school students and 500 members of the public benefited through this campaign.
- A health camp, the first phase of the Wassana Diyawara which is organized by the Medical Faculty Buddhist Association was successfully completed on the 6th of January 2013 at Bateyaaya and Kandilpaana villages of Deniyaaya, Matara district, with the participation and cooperation of a number of consultants from National Hospital and many other hospitals as well as the academic staff members of the Medical Faculty.
- The Annual Scientific Research Symposium 2013 of the Faculty was successfully concluded on 4th of October 2013 where Professor Uditha Liyanage, former Director of the Postgraduate Institute of Management of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura participated as the Chief Guest and Professor S Rajapakse delivered the Faculty Oration on "Predicting outcome in Leptospirosis: Towards a severity score."
- > The departments of Anatomy, Clinical Medicine & Physiology, Dean's Office and Allied Health Sciences Unit under the guidance of the Dean and the leadership of the Deputy Registrar and the Senior Assistant Bursar of the Faculty organized a stall at the Deyata Kirula National Exhibition which was held in March 2013 at Ampara. It was one of the major attractions for the public where more than 250,000 people including school children attended during the period.

Services provided by the Department of Clinical Medicine

The University Medical Unit is the teaching facility in Medicine for final year clinical students of the undergraduate programme. All students undergo this programme. At a given time there are 4-6 Registrars / Senior Registrars training for the MD (General Medicine) and MD (Nephrology) of University of Colombo. The unit has also gained recognition as a training unit for MD Endocrinology and Diploma in Elderly Medicine. In addition, we supervise and train 4 intern medical officers every year.

The Department's academic staff provides clinical services through the University Medical Unit to approximately 9000 in-patients and 35,000 outpatient visits per year, and therefore students are exposed to a wide range of clinical cases for their practical learning. The University Unit provides patient care through two wards (41 & 48 B) and four weekly outpatient clinics at the National Hospital of Sri Lanka (NHSL) Colombo. In 2013 these units shifted to the new Third Medical Block of NHSL and offer excellent facilities for student learning.

The Department opened the Clinical Medicine Academic and Research Centre (ClinMARC) on 3rd July, 2013 at the National Hospital of Sri Lanka (NHSL). This is a joint undertaking with the Ministry of Health and provides teaching and research facilities for staff from the academic staff as well as the NHSL. The facility is now regularly used for examinations of the Faculty and student teaching. Two research units (Diabetic Research Unit and the Tropical Medicine Unit) are functioning at the centre.

Academics of the Department conduct research on a range of topics, with key focus on research in tropical and infectious disease, herpetology, toxicology, nephrology, non-communicable diseases, and medical education. It has a wide network of research collaborations with University of Oxford, Mohidol University, University of New South Wales, and Monash University. The department pioneered the Faculty of Medicine Kidney Transplant Programme and performed the first kidney transplant in Sri Lanka.

The laboratory of the Department provides services free of charge for some of the tests done for patients admitted to the University Unit at NHSL. There is also a fee-levying service provided to patients for certain specific investigations.

Building on this strong background in kidney diseases, the Department established professional clinical facilities at the National Institute of Nephrology, Dialysis and Transplantation, Maligawatte, 2011. The Department staff also provide expertise to the Ministry of Health in policymaking through various expert committees and advisory committees.

Services provided to the Health Ministry from the Human Genetics Unit

The Human Genetics Unit of the Faculty of Medicine is the only Center in the Public Health Sector in Sri Lanka dedicated to providing Clinical Genetics and Genetic Diagnostic Services. Coupled with subfertility referred from the Obstetrics and Gynaecology wards, children with dysmorphic features referred from Paediatric wards, adults with hereditary neurodegenerative disorders referred from adult medical wards, patient with malignancies referred from oncology wards and thrombophilias and haematological conditions referred from pathology laboratories are some of the referrals that are seen in the Unit. We have dedicated staff for both genetic counseling and for cytogenetic and molecular genetic testing. The referrals to the Unit comes from all parts of the country therefore, it provides an island wide service.

2.7 FACULTY OF SCIENCE

Introduction:

Prof. T.R. Ariyaratne continued to serve as the Dean of the Faculty of Science. The Faculty has successfully carried out its academic activities during the year under review. However, the academic year had to be

extended up to 09/02/2014 due to the trade union action staged by the Academic and Non Academic Staff during the previous year and also due to the stoppage of university activities for CHOGM 2013.

2013 student intake was 503 from all 4 streams which included an additional intake of 23 students. Faculty has made a considerable progress with regard to the 04 major HETC grants received to upgrade and enhance its activities related to teaching and research and will also continue to make progress in coming years.

One of the major achievements of the Faculty, during the year under review was the establishment of the Colombo Science and Technology Cell in order to foster Research Dissemination and Commercialization projects. Considerable achievements were also made in the formulation two external degrees i.e.Financial Engineering(BSFE) and Electronics & Automation Technology. During this year the faculty was able to establish the Centre for Mathematical Modelling.

The Faculty was able to make certain revisions to the syllabi of the 4th year General Degree programme and also to the Syllabi of level I and level II new course units of Biology programme for 2013 admissions. The Faculty sessions of the Annual Research Symposium was held on 4th October 2013.

Career Guidance Committee introduced two novel projects to undergraduate students named Service Learning and Career Planning (EC 1016) this year. They also successfully conducted a career fair in collaboration with the Rotaract club of the Faculty of Science.

The rehabilitation work commenced in the Mathematics building will be completed at the end of December 2013 and rehabilitation work will be carried out in the Old Chemistry building.

Faculty of Science conducted a series of workshops for its academic staff members on curriculum development, teaching, learning and assessment methods as a part of an activity to improve the quality of undergraduate program of the faculty through teacher training which was supported by the HETC/QIG/W2 Project. The Faculty has conducted a workshop on Radiation Protection in Medical Radiography too.

"Pranajeewa 2013", a blood donation campaign organized by the first year students of the Faculty of Science, University of Colombo, in collaboration with the Blood Transfusion Unit of the National Cancer Hospital of Maharagama was held in November at the Faculty premises.

2.9 STAFF DEVELOPMENT CENTRE

Introduction

The Staff Development Centre (SDC), University of Colombo has successfully completed its sixteenth year since its establishment. The Staff Development Centre of the University of Colombo was launched in 1997 as the first SDC in national university system in Sri Lanka, due to a need to commence and establish planned staff development in Sri Lankan universities.

The Mission of the Staff Development Centre (SDC) is "to enhance the quality of academic work undertaken by the university to meet the national targets of higher education in Sri Lanka in general and within the University of Colombo in particular.

In order to achieve this objective the SDC is enhancing and improving the university teaching/learning more effective, more relevant, student oriented and of internationally high standards. Accordingly, the SDC

is to develop skills and competencies necessary for more effective and efficient performance among all members of the staff of the University (University of Colombo Council Minutes 252/34 p.75).

Currently, the SDC is successfully continuing its contribution to develop university education in an array of well-focused and diversified training programmes targeting all academic, administrative and other supportive staff members of the university.

The SDC is making its significant contribution to enhance and to improve the capacity of academic and non-academic staff of not only University of Colombo but also other universities/institutes in Sri Lanka. During the year 2013 the SDC successfully trained more than 726 university staff members altogether.

Certificate in Teaching in Higher Education (CTHE) Course

The 16th Certificate in Teaching in Higher Education (CTHE) course was successfully completed by the SDC for University Staff, and was followed by 88 academics from several universities in Sri Lanka.

2.11 NATIONAL EDUCATION RESEARCH AND EVALUATION CENTRE (NEREC)

Introduction

The National Education Research and Evaluation Centre (NEREC) is functioning with the objective of providing research based findings for policy formulation, initiate and facilitate international cooperation in research and evaluation and disseminate the findings of research and evaluations carried in Sri Lanka.

National Assessment of Achievement of Students Completing Gr. 08 in Year 2012 was completed in May 2013. This project was commissioned by the World Bank and the leadership was given by the Ministry of Education. A dissemination seminar of the findings of the study was held on 5th November 2013. Minister of Education, Bandula Gunawardhana, Deputy Minister Hon. Mohan Lal Grero, Secretary, Ministry of Education, Vice Chancellor, University of Colombo, Dr. Amit Dar, Education Sector Manager, the World Bank and Dr. Harsha Aturupane, Lead Education Specialist, the World Bank were the Guests of Honour of this dissemination seminar.

Future Plans

 A new project is being carried out by NEREC for the year 2013/2014 on National Assessment of Achievement of Students Completing Grade 04 in Year 2013 in Sri Lanka. This project is carried out with the leadership of the Ministry of Education, Sri Lanka and the sponsorship of World Bank. Nearly 15,000 students (Sinhala and Tamil) representing 9 provinces are participating in this project.

2.12 HEALTH CENTRE

Medical Staff

Dr. K.D.I.Wasudeva works as Chief Medical Officer. Dr.C.R.Rabel was appointed as University Medical officer with effect from 01.10.2012. There are two vacancies for University Medical officers and it has not been filled yet due to lack of applicants. There are two medical officers on contract basis to cover up thosevacant possisions.

Technical staff

There are two public health inspectors, two nurses and one resigned from service with effect from 02.02.2013 and one post is vacant now. There are two nursing officers and one pharmacist. one post of nursing officer is vacant.

Laboratory technical officer passed away on 07.11.2012 and this post is now vacant.

Services:

In addition to routine medical and dental treatment following are some additional services provided by the health centre.

- All new entrants are given a medical questionnaire to be filled by their practitioners. The filled questionnaire and medical examination forms are filed of at Health centre.
- All Medical students undergo a comprehensive Medical checkup by UMO.
- All new recruits to University services (University of Colombo /UGC/PGIM/IIM/Horana Sripalee) are examined by University Medical officer regarding fitness for duty and relevant investigations are done.
- Similarly all employees of these institutions are also examined for extension of service.
- Medical and fitness screening of students for special events of sports such as weight lifting, rowing, wrestling, Road races etc.
- The staff of UGC/PGIM/IIM is provided with health care facilities.

Public Health Service

The spraying of insecticide to potential mosquito breeding places (as a routine public health services activity) is carried out. The problems of frequent blocks in the sewage system are resolved by obtaining the services of private contractors and the municipality when health centre sanitary laburers were unable do this jobs. A special program was carried out covering hostel canteens and all University buildings during dengue epidemics.

3.2 Employability of Graduates

Despite the increase in the enrollment during the last year and with the limited facilities, the University has maintained the quality of its graduates. It was reported that at the employability rates of Science, Medicine, Law and management graduates were 100% and the employability of Arts graduates were 60%-65%. Government and foreign funding are available for academics through processes of competitive application.

The University has shown progress by receiving 7 Higher Education for Twenty First Century (HETC) Grants from the World Bank including UDG, QIG, HRD and EDP grants.

Also the University allocated Rs. 10 million as research grant. The University used the funds to award Postgraduate Research Scholarships, Collaborative Research Grants and Infrastructure Development Grants and improve University and Faculty research promotional activities.

University Annual Research Symposium for the year 2013 was held successfully on 3rd October 2013 at the New Arts Theartre, University of Colombo on the theme "Higher Education through the State Sector of Sri Lanka in a Competitive Knowledge Economy". Professor Lakshman Jayathilake, Chairman, National Education Commission delivered the Keynote address. Dr Chandra Embuldeniya, Founder Vice Chancellor, Uva Wellassa University of Sri Lanka delivered the guest lecture.

His Excellency, Major General (R) Qasim Qureshi, High Commissioner of the Islamic Republic of Pakistan, Prof. Kshanika Hirimburegama, Chairperson, University Grants Commission, Prof. T R Ariyaratne, Acting Vice Chancellor, Deans of the Faculties the Registrar, Bursar and administrative staff, Senior Professors and other members of the academic staff, and Non academic staff and students attended this occasion Faculties, held their Faculty Research Symposia separately in conjunction with the University Research Symposium and a large number of papers were presented at the Symposia.

Research Forums

During the year under consideration, Faculty of Management & Finance organized its 8th International Research Conference on Management and Finance on 13-12-2013 successfully. The Conference created a unique platform for local authors to meet with their international counterparts to deliberate and debate their research fundings in a mutually beneficial atmosphere.

Annual Research Symposium of the University of Colombo which was held in 04th October 2013 under the theme "Higher Education through State Sector in the Competitive Knowledge - Economy." by providing 35 Research papers. It included the subject areas of Demography, Economics, History and International Relations, Geography, Sinhala, Sociology, Political Science and Public Policy, Journalism, Buddhist Studies, English Language Teaching and English Literature and Linguistics.

The Annual Research Symposium of the Faculty of Medicine was successfully concluded on 4th of October 2013 where Professor Uditha Liyanage, former Director of the Postgraduate Institute of Management of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura participated as the Chief Guest and Professor S Rajapakse delivered the Faculty Oration on "Predicting outcome in Leptospirosis: Towards a severity score."

The Annual Research sessions of the faculty of Graduate studies was held on 12th October 2013 at the FGS Auditorium. Hon Prof. G .L Pieris, Minister of ExternalAffairs delivered the key note adress. 6. INTERNATIONAL UNIT UNIVERSITY OF COLOMBO

1. Vision

The University of Colombo has a strong commitment towards developing strategic links with internationally recognized centres of academic excellence towards becoming a global player in knowledge production through high quality teaching and research. Established in 2008, the International Unit of the University of Colombo seeks to foster and develop such linkages through international collaborations with renowned Universities, Educational Centres, Academic Programmes, Professional Academic Associations and International Organizations through student exchange programs, staff mobility programs, conferences, seminars, workshops and joint research.

2. Mission

The International Unit of the University of Colombo (IUUC) was established to facilitate the development of international links of the University of Colombo, provide relevant information on the University of Colombo

to prospective international students, liaise with faculties, and help overseas faculty and students affiliated to the University of Colombo with their stay in Colombo.

Since its inception in 2008, the IUUC has been instrumental in promoting international collaborations of the University of Colombo. The IUUC currently has a number of successful student exchange and staff mobility programs.

The objectives of the IUUC:

To promote collaborative and innovative research between the University of Colombo and partner Universities/ Institutions

- 1. Implement new study programs abroad and develop existing partnerships
- 2. Create Postgraduate opportunities for University of Colombo faculty abroad and develop curricula through institutional links and faculty exchange
- 3. Strengthen E-learning and distance learning programs for postgraduate students and development of Information Technology
- 4. Organize joint conferences, seminars and workshops with partner universities
- 5. Establish new research opportunities for undergraduate and postgraduate students with partner institutions and strengthen existing Research networks

In keeping with above objectives, in 2013, the IUUC took part in a number of activities and formed new links with universities and institutions abroad.

Collaborations with International Universities:

Georgia State University, USA

The University of Colombo and Georgia State University signed an agreement of cooperation in the area of student exchange in September 2013. Discussions are underway with regard to the implementation of the agreement.

Queensland University of Technology (QUT), Australia

In October 2013, the University of Colombo signed an agreement with the Queensland University of Technology, Australia for a joint PhD programme. The signing of the agreement took place further to the MoU between the two Universities established in 2012, formalising the long-standing links between QUT, Australia and the University of Colombo.

An awareness session on the joint PhD programme was held in the form of a workshop on 17 December 2013 at the University of Colombo. The workshop entitled "Journey of the Higher Degree Research" was organised collaboratively by the IUUC, Staff Development Centre (SDC), and QUT. Professor Acram Taji, the Director of International Graduate Research at QUT and Dr. Tony Sahama, Senior Lecturer in Information Security at QUT were the resource persons at the workshop. Professor K. Hirimburegama, Chairperson of the

UGC, Dr. W.K. Hirimburegama, the Vice Chancellor of the University of Colombo, Professor R. Senaratne, Vice-Chairman of the UGC, and Professor Indralal De Silva, Senior Researcher at the NCAS were present at the panel discussion. The workshop was attended by around 160 participants.

Potential Collaborations for 2014

Following successful discussions initiated in September 2013, the University of Colombo is looking forward to collaborations with the University of Southampton, UK in the areas of Executive MBA and a split-site PhD programme. The MoU sent by the University of Southampton is currently under review by the University of Colombo.

Following discussions between the Faculty of Education, University of Colombo and Umea University, Sweden, plans are underway towards the signing of a MoU between the two Universities in 2014.

Following a visit by His Excellency Arjuna Jongmoon Choi, the Ambassador of Korea, to the University of Colombo in December 2013, the University is discussing a student exchange programme with Korea University to be implemented in 2014.

Student Exchange Programmes:

Since 2008, the University of Colombo has been taking part in two very successful student exchange programmes in partnership with of La Trobe University, Australia and Justus Liebig University (JLU) Giessen, Germany.

A student from the Sri Palee Campus was selected to follow a semester of study abroad at La Trobe University, commencing February 2013. She has returned to Sri Lanka after successfully completing her semester of exchange.

Three students from the Department of English successfully completed a semester at Justus Liebig University (JLU), Giessen Germany from March-July 2013. Four exchange students from JLU, Giessen arrived in Colombo in November 2013 and are currently affiliated to the Department of English. They will be affiliated to the University of Colombo until April 2014.

Three students from the Queensland University of Technology (QUT) Australia are affiliated to the University of Colombo under a Work Integrated Learning (WIL) international placement from November 2013 until January 2014. Their visit is under an agreement between the University of Colombo and the Queensland University of Technology.

Staff Exchange and Mobility Programmes:

Dr. Sandra Gotz from Justus Liebig University, Giessen, Germany was affiliated to the University of Colombo in August 2013 for a short term teaching/research fellowship at the Department of English. The collaboration between the two Universities is funded by the DAAD (German Academic Exchange Service)

<u>Sri Lanka Government Scholarships for Foreign Students 2012</u> Ministry of Higher Education:

The University of Colombo is part of the 'Sri Lanka Government Scholarships for Foreign Students 2012' scheme conducted by the Ministry of Higher Education. The scheme which offers undergraduate and postgraduate scholarships to foreign students from 48 countries is conducted by the Ministry of Higher Education with the expectation of bringing about stronger educational co-operation with friendly nations.

Currently, there are four students who are enrolled in postgraduate courses at the University of Colombo under this scheme.

Guest Lectures, workshops and Visits in 2013:

. Meeting with Prof. Neil Slater from the Northumbria University, UK

In February 2013, Prof. Neil Slater from the Northumbria University, UK visited the University of Colombo in order to recap discussions held previously and to discuss the possibility of signing a MoU between the University of Northumbria and the University of Colombo. The goal of the MoU would be to share common research interests and to have joint research projects based on Chemistry, Analytical Chemistry, Plant Sciences, Plant Bio Technology, Architecture, Sports Sciences, Business and Science, Forensic Science and Life Science. Also to discuss possible Student Exchange Programmes.

Meeting with Prof. Abdullah Gani from the Malaya University, Malaysia

In February 2013, a meeting was held between Director of UCSC Prof. Gihan Wickramanayake and Prof. Abdulla Gani (Associate Dean-Malaya University) to discuss possible collaborations between the UCSC and Malaya University. It was decided that they would have web based lectures, joint student partnerships and joint conferences in the future.

Workshop for outgoing Giessen Students

In March 2013, a workshop for the 3 outgoing JLU Giessen students from the University of Colombo was held by Mr Dennis Schroeder of the DAAD (German Academic Exchange Service). The purpose of this workshop was to give the former outgoing students to share their experiences with the current outgoing students and to educate them about living in Germany and other details about the student exchange.

Meeting with Prof. Suzanne Zyngier, La Trobe University, Australia

In March 2013, Prof. Suzanne Zyngier, Dean of International Affairs at the La Trobe University (LTU), Australia met Acting Vice Chancellor Prof. T.R. Ariyaratne, and the Acting Director of the IUUC to discuss

the possibility of extending the existing student exchange programme between La Trobe University, Australia and the University of Colombo. As a result of the discussions, three students from La Trobe University are hoping to be affiliated to the University of Colombo as exchange Students in 2014. The student from Sri Palee Campus who was at LTU returned to Sri Lanka after successfully completing her semester of exchange.

Guest Lecture by Professor Marc Vervenne

Professor Marc Vervenne, Honorary Rector - University of Leuven (KU Leuven), Belgium visited the University of Colombo on 04 April 2013 and met Prof. Premakumara De Silva- Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Professor Marie Perera, Dean of the Faculty of Education, Mr. K.A.S. Edward- Registrar, and Dr. Shravika Damunupola Amarasekara, Acting Director, IUUC. The meeting was followed by a guest lecture on "The challenges in higher education at a global level."

During the lecture, Professor Vervenne highlighted the importance of the concept of 'brain mobility.' He stated that instead of giving way to 'brain-drain,' Universities should look at how best ideas and knowledge could be shared with other countries. He brought in examples from his own experience to demonstrate that one of the greatest challenges in higher education is the lack of diversity. Prof. Vervenne reiterated that such challenges could be overcome through exchange programmes and research collaborations between Universities. He also stated a University should be a "place of conversation" and emphasized the importance of exchanging views amongst students, academics, and the community. The guest lecture was attended by academics, administrators and students of the University of Colombo.

• SAARC University Student Invitation Program 2013

In May 2013, the Government of Japan announced the JENESYS 2.0 Project as a new initiative of Japan's commitment to promote people-to-people exchange and build closer relations between Japan and regional countries. This project was aimed at strengthening friendship and deepening mutual understanding between Japanese and regional youth.

The Ministry of Higher Education, Ministry of External Affairs and the Embassy of Japan, selected five students and one supervisor from the University of Colombo to be part of this youth exchange programme. They were Dr. Samantha Padmasiri Kaluarachchi, Senior Lecturer (Faculty of Management and Finance – Supervisor), Mr. Ishanka Praneeth Munugoda (Faculty of Medicine), Ms. Madduma Ralalage Hemalee Abaayawickrama (Faculty of Law), Ms. Shayani Raneesha Jayasinghe (Faculty of Arts), Ms. Sulakkhana Prabashwari Diyabalangei (Faculty of Law) and Mr. Sudham Udana Dewaraja (Faculty of Science). The team from the University of Colombo took part in the SAARC University Invitation Program 2013 in Japan from 10 – 15 of June 2013.

Meeting with Macquarie University, Australia

In July 2013, Academics of the Faculty of Arts met with academics from Macquarie University, Australia in order to discuss possible collaborations.

Visiting Academic from Queensland University of Technology, Australia

Professor Clevo Wilson from the QUT Business School, Australia visited the Department of Economics, University of Colombo on 06th August 2013 to discuss possible research collaborations with the academics from the Department.

• Guest Lecture by Professor G. K. Chadha

Professor G. K. Chadha, President of the South Asian University and the Former Vice Chancellor of the Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi visited the University of Colombo on 05th September 2013 and met with Prof. K. Hirimburegama- Chairperson of the University Grants Commission, Dr. W. K. Hirimburegama-Vice Chancellor, Prof. Premakumara De Silva- Deputy Vice-Chancellor and other academics. The meeting was followed by a guest lecture on "Problems and challenges of higher education in South Asia".

During the lecture, Professor Chadha highlighted the importance placing value on the quality and quantity of education. His research involved many statistics from primary, intermediate and higher education in Asia and other parts of the world. He congratulated Sri Lanka for its significant improvements in the education sector.

• Ethiopian Honorary Consul General Fekade Tadesse's visit to the University of Colombo

Honorary Consul General Tadesse visited the University of Colombo on 02nd October 2013 and met the Vice Chancellor Dr. W.K. Hirimburegama. Consul Tadesse discussed possible collaborations between the University of Colombo and the University of Addis Ababa in Ethiopia. He also emphasised the mutual need for both Sri Lanka and Ethiopia for self-development, economic growth, security, and education. The Consul General spoke of introducing to the Sri Lankan market the countless natural resources and raw material Ethiopia has to offer and Sri Lanka's valuable contributions in the fields of information and technology exchange, agriculture, health, and education.

• Meeting with Representatives of the International Relations Office at the NUS

A preliminary meeting was held on 31st October 2013 between delegates from National University of Singapore and the University of Colombo. Mr.Michael Klemm, Senior Manager and Ms. Ong Kai Yi, Senior Executive of the International Relations office at NUS met with the Acting Director of the IUUC to discuss possibility of holding a summer exchange programme. Delegates from NUS expressed their interest in a short term outreach programme. Their fields of interest were community programmes, company internships, bio diversity of the country, wild life and conservations, tourism and field trips throughout the country. The interest was on a cultural exchange programme rather than on a credit transfer programme. Discussions are to be continued.

President of KOICA, Kim Young Mok's Visit and Guest Lecture the University of Colombo

President of the Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA) and veteran diplomat Ambassador Kim Young Mok visited the University of Colombo on 24th October 2013 and met the Vice Chancellor, Dr. W.K. Hirmburegama and senior administrators of the University. Ambassador Mok has served in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Korea for 35 years, predominantly in the areas of international security,

trade and finance, energy development, and culture and media. He has also served as a Head of Mission in USA and Asia.

During his visit to the University of Colombo, Ambassador Mok was accompanied by senior delegates of the Korean Embassy and KOICA. The Chairperson of the University Grants Commission, Professor Kshanika Hirimburegama and the Vice-Chairman of the UGC, Professor Ranjith Senaratne were also present.

Following a preliminary meeting, the president of KOICA conducted a guest lecture on 'Korea's Economic Development at a Glance: Sharing Korea's Development Experience and Know-how.' The lecture, held at the Senate Hall of the University of Colombo, was open to the public and was well-attended by university students, academics, and representatives of public and research institutions. The event was organized by the University of Colombo in collaboration with the KOICA office in Sri Lanka

During his lecture, Ambassador Kim Young Mok elaborated on the Korean development experience. He spoke at length on how Korea had risen from a state of abysmal poverty less than half a century ago to the 15th largest economy and to an officially recognized donor country (OECD) in recent times. Identifying the stages of Korean socio-economic transformation, Ambassador Mok outlined the gradual development of Korea from an export-led industrialization in the early 1960s and the 1970s, to the heavy and chemical industry planning of the 1970s, to the technology-intensive policy and economic liberalization in the 1980s, to the globalization and IT revolution from the 1990s onwards. Ambassador Mok emphasized that today Korea is a frontrunner in *creative economy* which he defined as a new model for economic development "that builds on the creative ideas of economic actors to combine science and technology with IT and to promote consilience between industry and culture, creating in the process new markets and new jobs."

Responding to questions from the audience on the factors that had contributed to Korea's success story and what lessons Sri Lanka could learn from the Korean experience, Ambassador MDK identified visionary political leadership, effective bureaucratic administration, strong investment in education, timely and strategic economic planning and efficient uitilisation of foreign capital as key factors behind Korea's socio economic advancement.

7. CAPITAL WORKS & PLANNING

Introduction

Seven (07) building projects, nine (09) Renovation and Improvement projects were in progress during the year 2013.

Main Buildings Projects

The Construction work of the new building complex for the Faculty of Graduate Studies by using university generated funds of Rs.152 million was commenced and progressed during the year 2013. The Stage-I includes the completion of Ground & First Floor and it will be completed by January 2014. At present, bidding process is in progress to commenced the Stage-II (remaining floors from second to seventh including roof) and it is intended to be completed by end of the year 2014.

The generated fund based construction of a multipurpose building for the University of Colombo (Construction of an Examination Hall) received the approval from the Cabinet of Ministers during the year 2012. As the first step to construct this building complex, demolishing of the existing Old Library Building was completed during the year 2013 and accordingly, it is expected to commence the construction by the each part of the year 2014. The University decided to commence the Stage-I by using generated funds of Rs.152 million so that a few stories of this building could be used for academic purposes on completion. The University decided to construct the largest building complex (with an approximate floor area of 36176m² with fourteen stories excluding ground floor, lower and upper basements) for the Faculty of Medicine. The bidding process was in progress for the Stage II (Construction up to first floor slab level excluding Auditorium) during the year under review and the University is awaiting the approval from the Cabinet of Ministers to award the contract. Accordingly, it is expected to commence the construction work by mid-January 2014. The Cabinet approval was received by mid 2013 to commence three projects: the construction work of Expansion of Canteen and Student Facilities for the Faculty of Science, the Extension to the Faculty of Education Building and for the Facultyof Management and Finance East Wing project . All these projects were approved on "Turn Key" basis and accordingly, the procurement process is in progress and expected to commence the construction work by April 2014.

Major Buildings Renovation and Improvement projects

The Project of Renovation and Improvements to the New Arts Theatre (NAT), was completed and stage two progressed during the year under review and was ready to be used for functions. The Refurbishment of Existing Building at No.11, Hewa Mawatha, Colombo 07 also progressed and taken over by the University considering its practical completion. In addition, procurement work is also progressed during the year under review to complete remain work of Hewa Mawatha project. Construction of an extension to the pavilion – two exercise rooms to the Pavilion were also completed during year the 2013. Construction of a elevator (Lift) Well and Supply and Installation of the Ten Passenger Lift of the Administration Building (Including Civil Work), at College House also was completed in the year under review and was ready for function since April 2013. The construction of toilet complex for the East Wing building of the Faculty of Management and Finance also progressed and was completed and taken over by the University in September 2013. Redevelopment of existing Mathematics Building at the Faculty of Science also progressed during the year and it is expected to be ready for occupation by February 2014. In addition, the University decided to renovate and up grade the condition of existing hostels. Under the project Renovation of Toilet blocks at the Sujatha Jayawardane Memorial Girls' Hostel progressed during the year 2013 and it is expected to be completed by June 2014. Renovation of Thelawala Hostel Project also commenced and progressed and it is expected to be completed by March 2014.

Renovation of Toilet Block for the Kittiyakara Hostel was in progress during the year 2013 and it is targeted to be completed by March 2014. In addition, preliminary works progressed to renovate the roof of the Faculty of Arts main building. In addition, the preliminary work to install an Elevator for the differently abled people at the Faculty of Arts also progressed during the year and is expected to be ready for use by June 2014.

All the Building projects and the Renovation and Improvement projects were monitored continuously by the Planning and Development Committee.

- o.) Renovation of toilet block at the Sujatha Jayawardana Memorial Girls' Hostel progressed during the year 2013 and it is expected to be completed by June 2014.
- p.) Renovation of Thelawala Hostel Project also commenced and progressed well it is expected to be completed by March 2014.

- q.) Renovation of Toilet Block for the Kittiyakara Hostel progressed during the year 2013 and it is targeted to be completed by March 2014.
- r.) The preliminary work progressed to renovate the roof of the Faculty of Arts main building. In addition, the preliminary work was commenced to install an elevator for the differently abled people of the Faculty of Arts it is expected to be ready for use by June 2014

Financial Review - 2013

Reporting Entity

The University of Colombo has been incorporated under the Universities Act No.16 of 1978. The main administration is located at the College House, No.94, Cumaratunga Munidasa Mawatha, Colombo 03.

Financial Highlights of the year

- Operating Surplus = Rs.214.339 Million
- Total Treasury Grant Recurrent = Rs.1581.69 Million
 Capital = Rs.359.15 Million
- Total Income from fee Levying Courses = Rs.463.226 Million
- Staff cost were 75.34 % of total Recurrent Grant
- Net Assets increased by Rs.39,555.22 Million

Income

Total Recurrent Grant for the University has increased by Rs.311.3 Million in 2013. Total Income from fee levying courses of the University has increased by Rs.155.47 Million in 2013. Overseas students' income has increased by Rs.26.3 Million which reflects increase in numbers of students from Bhutan to the Faculty of Medicine. Investment income has increased by Rs71.51 Million

As a policy student tuition fees are recognized on revenue only on the receipts of fees.

Expenditure

Staff cost has increased by Rs.248.81 Million. Salaries costs have increased by 25% compared to previous year. Other operating expenditure has increased by Rs.78.9 Million.

Balance Sheet

The net assets of the University have increased by Rs.2,579 Million to Rs.42,134.7 Million in the year 2013 due to revaluation of lands & buildings of the University of Colombo. The carrying amount of lands & buildings has been increased by Rs.38,196 Million.

Tangible fixed assets have increased to Rs.38,389 Million. This movement includes Capital grant spend of Rs.428.174 Million in the year, a depreciation charge of Rs.256 Million and revaluation surplus of Rs.40,089 Million in lands &buildings of the University of Colombo.

Capital Projects

The University's Capital expansion plan, dedicated to improving the student infrastructure facilities,

continued over the past year.

In February 2013 the University started to rehabilitate Mathematics Building with the help of the Sri Lanka

Army and scheduled to be open on 03rd March 2014. Rehabilitation of the Thelawala Hostel started in June

2013 to provide 450 beds to support the current and future need for student living space.

Building for Faculty of Graduate Studies started on January 2013 and 1st stage of the building completed on

December 2013 spending Rs.126.3 Million from the generated funds and procument approval for the stage II

of the building is waiting.

Procument approval for the Stage II of the 14 story building of the Faculty of Medicine amounted to Rs.809.8

Million has been received. Construction of the building is expected to begin in March 2014 with completion

in full in 2015.

World Bank Grant

Higher Education for the 21st Century (HETC) Grant has provided funds to increase IT, English and Soft Skill

activities of Undergraduate students and also in improvements of research and development of

Postgraduate students. Rs.56.6 Million has been received in year 2013.

Conclusion

The University was able to achieve the expected targets for the year 2013 mainly because of the high

contribution received from Postgraduate Education and consultancy services offered by the University in addition to the contribution given by the Treasury. The University continued to reduce its dependency on

treasury funds with regard to operational activities except for salaries, supplies and utilities. This was by

promoting the consultancy services and increasing the earning capacity from Postgraduate &other Extension

Courses and thereby generating external income.

Notes to the Financial Statements University of Colombo

1. Reporting Entity

University of Colombo has been incorporated under the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978. The main administration is located at the College House, No. 94 Cumaratunge Munidasa Mawatha, Colombo 3. The Financial Statements of the University of Colombo are prepared for the year ending 31stDecember 2013.

2. Significant Accounting Policies

2.1 Basis of preparation

The Financial Statements of the University of Colombo are prepared under the Historical Cost convention in conformity with Sri Lanka Public Accounting Standards for the accrual basis of accounts. All accounting policies adopted by the University are applied consistently with those of the previous year, where necessary comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to the changes, in presentation of current year figures. The Financial Statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

The Financial Statements do not include those of the university students' societies as it is a separate legal entity over which the university does not exercise control or significant influence over policy design.

2.2 Events after the date of the Statement of Financial Position

All material events after the date of the Statement of Financial Position are considered and appropriate adjustments or disclosure made in the financial statements where necessary.

3. Significant Accounting Policies

3.1 Property, Plant & Equipment

Lands, Buildings, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment, Fixtures & Fittings, Library Books and Periodicals, Motor Vehicles, Cloaks and Other Assets include the items acquired out of government grant, research grants, internally generated funds, and donations.

a) Basis of Recognition

Property, Plant and Equipment are recognized if it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the entity and the cost of the item can be reliably measured.

Equipments are capitalized on the basis of nature. Equipment is capitalized if it is tangible, has a life of more than one year and has a purchase cost greater than Rs.2,500.00.The life of asset is dependent on its category within 9 categories, ranging from 5 to 20 years.

b) Revaluation of the Fixed Assets

Lands and Buildings were revalued as at 31.12.2013 on the basis of current market value for continuation of existing use where appropriate. Furniture and Office Equipment and Laboratory and Teaching Equipment have been revalued as at 31.12.2009 and Motor Vehicles revalued as at 31.12.2010 by the Chief Valuer of the Department of Valuation. The carrying amount of these assets have been included by the Rs.40,089 Million as at 31.12.2013 as a result of revaluation, Deeds are not available for the following assets.

- 1. College House premises, No. 94, Cumarathunga Munidasa Mawatha, Colombo 03.
- 2. Premises of Faculty of Art & Faculty of Law.
- 3. Premises of Faculty of Management & Finance & Faculty of Education.
- 4. Premises of Faculty Science & Play Ground.
- 5.Bullers Hostel, 37/15 Bullers Lane, Colombo 07.
- 6. Harschandra Flats, 7/7 Harschandra Mawatha, Colombo 06.
- 7. Havelock Hostel, 90, Havelock Road, Colombo 05.
- 8. Kithyakara Hostel, 87, Ananda Rajakaruna Mawatha, Colombo 10.
- 9. Premises of Faculty of Medicine, Norris Canal Road, Colombo 10.

Lands, Buildings and Motor Vehicles of the Sri Palee Campus were revalued as at 31.12.2013 on the basis of current market value for continuation of existing use where appropriate. As a result of the revaluation value of the Land increased by Rs.147.9 Million, value of the Building increased by Rs.86.17 Million and value of Motor Vehicle increased by Rs.4.4 Million.

c) Subsequent expenditure on existing Fixed Assets

Expenditure incurred on tangible fixed assets is charged to the Statement of Financial Performance in the period it is incurred, unless it meets one of the following criteria, in which case it is capitalized and depreciate on the relevant basis.

- Market value of fixed assets has subsequently increased.
- Asset capacity increase.
- Sustainable improvement in the quality of output or reduction in operating cost.
- Significant extension of the asset life beyond that confirmed by repair and maintenance.

d) Depreciation

Depreciation is recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on a Straight –Line Method over the estimated useful life of Property, Plant and Equipment items from the date that they were made available for use. Lands are not depreciated. The estimated useful life periods are as follows.

Depreciation is provided from the year of purchase and up to the year of sale based on the period used, with full depreciation being provided in the month of purchase and sale of assets.

e) Fully Depreciated Assets

Fully depreciated assets as given below have been included in the carrying amount of Fixed Asset Rs.40,753,201,148. These assets have been used for operating activities of the University during 2013.

f) Capital Works in Progress

Capital expenses incurred during the year which are not completed as at the date of the Statement of Financial Position are shown as Capital Work-in-Progress, whilst the capital assets which have been completed during the year and put to use have been transferred to Property, Plant and Equipment.

3.3 Inventories & Stocks

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value. In general, cost is determined on a first-in-first-out basis and includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories and bringing them to their existing condition and location.

Following categories of stocks have been included in the stock value of the University as at 31.12.2013.

3.4 Current Assets

Current Assets classified in the Balance Sheet are those which will be recovered within one year after the Statement of Financial Position date.

3.4.1 Cash in Hand

Cash & cash equivalents of Rs.109,676,660 include Rs 184,250 received on 31-12-2013. Cash in hand has been deposited in the bank on 01-01-2014.

3.5 Receivables

A sum of Rs 43,801,373.24 is due from employees on account of Breach of bonds and agreements as at 31.12.2013.

3.6 Current Liabilities

Liabilities classified as Current Liabilities in the Statement of Financial Position are those that fall due for payment within one year from the Statement of Financial Position date. All known liabilities have been accounted for in preparing the Financial Statements.

3.7 Provision for Gratuity

Provision has been made in the Financial Statements for retiring gratuities payable under the payment of Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983, based on the amount payable if all employees retire on the date of the Statement of Financial Position, subject to the assumption that every employee would be entitled to the payment even if any or some of them may not have completed the minimum period of service required to be eligible for the payment under the Act on the date of the Statement of Financial Position.

3.8 Contingent Liabilities

No provision has been made in the accounts with regard to liabilities arising out of litigation. The total estimated amount of liabilities as at 31st December 2013 is Rs. 5 million.


3.9 Income and Expenditure

3.9.1 Government Grants

Grants received from the General Treasury of the Government of Sri Lanka, and Tuition Fees received from the foreign and local students are recognized as income in the period in which the related costs are recognized.

Government grants utilized to acquire assets that will be expensed in subsequent period are recognized as deferred income. Government Grants represent by other assets including cash and cash equivalents less liability.

The total Capital Grants received for the year was Rs.359.15M which has been used as follows:

3.9.2 Recognition of Revenue

- (a) The Government Recurrent Grants are recognized in the period in which they were received. Students Tuition Fees are recognized as revenue only on the receipt of fees.
 - (b) Interest income received and receivable for the period is recorded as revenue in the Financial Statements as except for the investment income earned on externally restricted endowments, for which only the amount made available for spending is related as revenue. In the year where the investment income earned is in excess of the amount made available for spending, the excess is recorded as a direct increase in endowments.
 - (c) Sums of Rs.36,947,556.30,Rs.2,566,272 and Rs 2,367,335 have been received as interest from investments relating to the University of Colombo Development Fund, Centre for Studies of Human Rights, and National Education Research and Evaluation Centre respectively and they are added to the fund.
 - (d) The fees on fee-levying courses recognized to the income statement based on the stage of completion of each course as at the end of the year. Lecture fees and payments relating to future periods are shown in the Statement of Financial Position as deferred income

3.9.3 Higher Education for the 21st Century (HETC) Grant

HETC project has provided funds to increase IT, English and soft skill abilities of under graduate students and also in improvement of research and development of Post Graduate Students.

Financial contribution of HETC project for the year 2013 is given below. These expenses have not been included in the Financial Statements.

3.9.4 Recognition of Expenses

- (a) All expenses incurred in respect of undergraduate education have been charged to the government recurrent grant.
- (b) All expenditure incurred in the acquisition, or improvement of assets of a permanent nature in order to carry on or increase the learning capacity of the students has been treated as capital expenditure.
- (c) Expenses are recognized in the income statement on the basis of direct association between cost incurred in the running of the University and in maintaining the capital assets in a state of efficiency has been charged to revenue in arriving at the surplus/deficit for the year.

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements of the University of Colombo for the year ended 31 December 2013 in terms of Sub-section 108(1) of the Universities Act, No 16 of 1978

The audit of financial statements of the University of Colombo for the year ended 31 December 2013 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2013 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity and cash flow statement and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with Section 13(1) of the Finance Act, No. 38 of 1971 and Sub-section107(5) of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978. My comments and observations which I consider should be published with the Annual Report of the University in terms of Subsection 108(1) of the Universities Act appear in this report. A detailed Report in terms of Subsection 108(2) of the Universities Act was furnished to the Vice Chancellor of the University on 20 November 2014.

1:2 Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements whether due to fraud or error.

1:3 Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards consistent with International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAI 1000-1810). Those Standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatements of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the University's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. Sub - sections (3)and (4) of Section 13 of the Finance Act, No. 38 of 1971 give discretionary powers to the Auditor General to determine the scope and the extent of the audit.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.

1:4 Basis for Qualified Opinion

My opinion is qualified based on the matters described in paragraph 2.2 of this report.

2. Financial Statements

2:1 Qualified Opinion

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matters described in paragraph 2.2 of this report, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the University of Colombo as at 31 December 2013 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

2.2 Comments on Financial Statements

2.2.1 Accounting Deficiencies

The following observations are made.

- (a) Income of Rs.16,462,244 earned as at 31 December of the year under review by hiring cloaks belonging to the University and the expenditure of Rs.1,430,010 incurred during the year under review had not been identified as income and expenditure of each year and brought to account. Instead, those had been retained in a specific Fund.

3.1 Financial Results

According to the financial statements presented, the operation of the University for the year ended 31 December 2013 had resulted in a surplus of Rs.214,339,468 as compared with the corresponding surplus of Rs.33,033,435 of the preceding year. Increase of Government grants by a sum of Rs.312,143,538 had mainly attributed to the increase of Rs.181,306,033 in the surplus of the year under review as compared with the preceding year.

4. Operating Review

4.1 Performance

Delays ranging from 06 to 14 months were observed in the release of results of 17 internal examinations and 33 external examinations held during the year under review.

4.2 Management Inefficiencies

A sum of Rs.43,086,046 was recoverable by the end of the year under review from 34 lecturers who had breached the agreements and bonds. Further, the following observations were made in this connection.

(a) The Vice Chancellor had informed the audit that the Department of Attorney General had informed that even though Court cases had been filed in the year 1985 to recover a sum of Rs.1,892,023 from 07 lecturers, their addresses could not be found. Even though the sums recoverable from those lecturers due to the breach of agreements should be recovered from their Provident Funds at earliest, action had not been so taken in terms of Section 94 of Universities Act. Instead, recovery from Provident Funds had been delayed by defining the shortcomings in the Agreement in a manner unfavourable to the institution.

(b) Even though 08 years had elapsed, action is still being taken to file a Court case in respect of the recovery of Rs.6,229,373 due from a lecturer who vacated the post in the year 2005.

4.3 Library Administration

In the examination of the main library, it was observed that 144 books borrowed by 76 University Lecturers had not been returned while the lapsed period ranged from 01 to 65 months. Further, action had not been taken during the years from 2011 to 2013 for the recovery from the parties concerned, the loss resulting from the loss of 562 book costing Rs.853,563.

5. Accountability and Good Governance

5.1 Staff Vacancies.

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There were 414 vacancies in the academic and non- academic staff during the year under review while twenty three lecturers had obtained academic leave and twenty nine lecturers had obtained sabbatical leave. The University had paid a sum of Rs.25,719,870 in respect of Visiting Lecturers during the year under review.

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6. Systems and Control

Deficiencies in systems and controls observed during the course of audit were brought to the notice of the Vice-chancellor of the University from time to time. Special attention is needed in respect of following areas of control.

Qualified bids were compared against the Engineer's estimate of Rs. 18,613,830.00 (excluding VAT). The details of which are given in the (Annex O3).Annexure gives a comparison of evaluated BOQ bill totals and bid prices (excluding VAT) of respective bidders.

The bidders vary up to - 15.85% in comparison to the Engineer's Estimate (Annex 04).

5.4 Observations of bidders

R.E. Weerakoon Constructions

The second lowest evaluated bid received from R.E. Weerakoon Constructions for Rs. 15,663,225.25 including NBT and excluding Vat and other the Government Levy and the taxes and statutory duties at the time of clearing of the materials, qualify for the post qualification verification.

6. 0 CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATION
