Report from the President

I am delighted to present the year 2017 annual report of the Medical Institute of Tamils (U.K.).

The MIOT (U.K.) is a non-political, non-religious & non-profit charitable organisation, committed to help our people from the Homeland and other countries. Our aims and objectives are laid out in the constitution. We continue to excel in our aims, especially focus on education, relief of poverty and sickness, and the preservation and protection of the health and wellbeing of our community.

Our people have been badly affected by one of the ferocious wars seen in South-East Asia, in recent memory. Their health needs have multiplied, and it was essential for us to increase our effort to rebuild their health and medical infrastructure, and help the communities get back on their feet again. Despite the multipronged challenges faced by our members, we are determined to double our effort to overcome the barriers, and together we will meet them.

The MIOT UK through its Central Committee and regional branches has made remarkable contributions towards the needs of our community in Sri Lanka. We continue to support numerous projects ranging from medical students' scholarships to children's homes. The flagship projects such as mobile medical clinics in the Vanni area, the health promotion project in Mullaitheevu and eye camps in Vanni area have all been well appreciated by our local community. Some of these projects have been described elsewhere.

In January 2017, MIOT's CC members participated at the North-East Development Congress in Toronto. The conference was well attended by Ministers and numerous high-ranking Officers. We contributed towards the Health Ministry's rehabilitation strategy for disabled people affected by the war.

The MIOT Central Committee has also organised a musical event (the MIOT MUSICAL EVENT) on the 16^{th} of September 2017.

In order to visit the MIOT projects which have been supported by our members over the last 28 years, we have agreed to arrange a 'MIOT Group tour' to the North-Eastern part of Sri Lanka. We hope this will reconnect us with our people, beneficiaries, students, officials, and local partner organisations at grass root level.

The South-East MIOT committee has arranged a National Education Conference in October 17.

I am proud of our achievements so far, and the impact of our health projects on the well-being of our community.

I am grateful to the members of the MIOT for their unwavering enthusiasm, compassion and support towards the noble tasks of MIOT. I thank you all for your time and goodwill, which continues to be our greatest strength.

Report from the General Secretary

It gives me great pleasure to present this year's annual report. It's been another busy year where we have initiated some new projects, and also continued with existing projects mainly to serve the poor and less advantaged population in our homeland.

Medical Mobile unit:

This project initiated by Dr. Sivayoganathan, who worked very hard to purchase a vehicle, modified it as a medical mobile unit and this is now serving the people of Vanni. Siva has personally visited Vanni several times and oversees this project. He will present a separate report about this project in the MIOT newsletter.

Eye camp projects

This is another ongoing project started in 2002 and continuing to serve the poor and disadvantaged. This year's eye camp was held in the war affected area of Mullaitheevu. The patients were seen at Mullaitheevu district General Hospital, and those who needed surgery were taken by bus to the Jaffna Teaching Hospital. We again worked with the Jaffna Consultant eye surgeon Dr. Chandrakumar. The patients were selected by local Medical Officers and the programme was well appreciated by our society.

Health Promotion Project- Mullaitheevu

This much-needed health care project has been designed by Dr Saratha Natkunarajah, who single handedly arranged a successful fund raising programme in January of this year. She visited this war affected area, and established a local partnership. A group of young volunteers were recruited for the initial training. The aim of the project is to train the trainers to improve the health of female population by health education programmes at grass root level to minimise the health risks such as teenage pregnancy.

Medical student sponsorship

MIOT continue to sponsor the less advantaged medical students in Jaffna, currently sponsoring 20 students. This includes sponsorship from the central committee and the regions as well.

Electronic BMJ to the University of Jaffna

MIOT (UK) has arranged the access to the BMJ for the research workers, academics, and student population at the University. The cost also included two hard copies of the BMJ research journal to the library.

MIOT MUSICAL EVENT:

This fundraising event was held on the 16th of September. The Central Committee members worked very hard to organise event in conjunction with R&D Entertainers. A sizable amount was raised at this event and the money has been allocated to the central budget.

Nursing student training

MIOT has agreed to funded 15 nursing students in Jaffna to get proper training in order for them to get appropriate accreditation. Dr. Surenthirakmaran, the head of Community and Family Medicine department of the Jaffna Medical Faculty has been supervising the project.

Neurology unit Jaffna Teaching Hospital.

Dr A.Nitkunan, an ardent supporter of MIOT raised money through "Just Giving" and has been working with the local Neurologist at the Jaffna teaching hospital. They are embarked on a project of stroke awareness campaign among the local population in the Northern Province.

ThilagavadiarIllum:

MIOT continues to support this orphanage with annual donations. This girls orphanage in Vaharaiin the Eastern Province is under the direct supervision of Dr. Vellauthapillai.

Moolai hospital project

MIOT continues to support the free health clinics conducted weekly at this hospital with a annual donation of £1000.00 via Dr. Kugathasan. We continue to work with our friends and colleagues in Sri Lanka and without their support and commitment most of our projects wouldn't have been possible. I hope you all will continue to support our activities.

Report from Northern Region (MIOT-NR) - 2017

Another successful year has gone by and we are pleased to send this annual report from the Northern region.

Orphanage donations

This year we have provided continued support to the Thilagawathiyar Illam in Vaharai and Hari Boys Home in Batticaloa.

Thilagawathiyar Illam

This houses 38 orphaned girls – up from 34 from last year and there is an overwhelming need to house orphans in Sri Lanka – the orphans are well settled in the home and the admission process is strictly controlled by the courts of law and the probation office. The courts of law see this orphanage as fully functional and successful home and are yearning to send girls into the home

The orphaned girls are now having extra classes in English, Mathematics, Science, Computing and dancing in the orphanage itself.

We have 5 members of staff to look after the orphans.

The orphans go out as a group once a year in an outing – they have been to Jaffna, Colombo and Kathirgamam.

Hari Boys Home

This orphanage is situated in the middle of Batticaloa housing nearly 64 orphaned boys. The orphans are very grateful for the help that MIOT provides in sustaining these children

Vivekananda Girls Home – Valaichenai

The Northern region provided funding to construct a study hall in this orphanage this year.

Mental Relaxation classes

In order to help with relaxation meditation classes are funded by the Northern Region in Northern Sri Lanka — this is conducted in a school in Nelliady and also in the deaf and blind school in Nelliady

Help with mental health well being

We supported the Mathavan mental health society in Tellipallai to support children with learning difficulties with providing learning aids to these vulnerable children

Jaffna Hospital Development Association

This region (Northern region) helped purchase resuscitation equipment and training in basic and advanced life support in the main teaching hospital in Jaffna

Report from North Thames Region (MIOT-NTR)-2017

The NTR AGM 2016 was held in December 2016 at Holiday Inn Newbury Park and the Christmas get-together at Rush Green Medical Centre.

Development of primary healthcare in Sri Lanka continues to be the prime focus of MIOT North Thames Regional branch. The Institute of Family Medicine Centre in Jaffna, the Co-operative hospital in Moolai and Green Memorial hospital in Manipay are being developed into model academic primary care centres and to provide support for post graduate training in primary care. In October 2017, MIOT NTR sent £65,000 for the development of a state of the art family medicine centre in Moolai which is estimated to cost £230,000. This project is being funded by a MIOT member in memory of his parents.

We are also collaborating with other UK based charities which work in Sri Lanka to develop primary care centres at various places. In this respect a collaborative project with Amparai District Vipulananda Rehabilitaion Organisation (ADVRO) has resulted in opening of a family medicine centre in Kurukkal Madam in the Batticaloa district. MIOT NTR had donated £15,000 for this project in previous years.

Progress is underway in working out a joint post graduate exchange training programme with the support of the Royal College of General Practitioners for Sri Lankan medical graduates to work in the UK as well as the model primary care centres in the North and East.

We held three clinical meetings in London for the benefit of healthcare professionals in the UK to support their continuing medical education needs.

We continue to encourage people in the Tamil Diaspora to support our projects and create lasting memorials for their loved ones that benefit our community for generations to come.

The MIOT NTR annual general meeting of 2017 will be held on 14 December 2017 at 7:00 pm at Manderine Palace, Hornchurch.

Our committee has actively continued to focus on the development of medical education and to support people from underprivileged areas.

MIOR- ER has continued its venture, working with the Dean of the Jaffna Faculty of Medicine organised medical students elective for students from Australia & UK.

We are also working closely with the Inner Wheel Club of Colombo South, focusing on building a strong foundation for students to enter University education by helping them from A-Level. This project is our new vision on students who obtained good results in O-Level examinations, but were unable to continue to A-Level studies due to family circumstances. We are continuing to help the 5 students from various rural areas in Sri Lanka.

We continued our annual sponsorship to the 3 medical students from Jaffna Medical. Our educational committee, especially the junior committee helps them with their projects and offering support via e-learning.

MIOR-ER is actively working in UK as well. We have engaged with the local consultants in different specialties to find elective placement for AL students and also identify clinical attachments/job opportunities for those completed the Medical degree in Europe and other parts of the world.

We have been successfully running the MIOT Chirumiar Illum, Thambiluvil since 2005. We are very fortunate to have close friends who donate to the home by monthly direct debit and also received donations from other well-wishers. We are lucky to have a good management committee. Dr. Ramasubbu, one of our batch-mates living in Colombo, is overseeing the management of this home.

MIOT –ER continued the sponsorship of the 'Orphanage & School' in Kaithady, one of the deprived villages in Jaffna, is thriving well. This venue is also hosting a weekend school to serve the local children, offering classes in music, education & community projects.





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Report from Wales Region(MIOT-WLR)-2017

The MIOT-Wales is a branch of the MIOT organisation, which was formally inaugurated in South-Wales in 2004 by the central MIOT. It has been continuing its charitable activities since 2004. It is, indeed, a small organisation currently consisting of 17 members and 3 associate members.

We generate funds not only through members of their monthly desired donations, but also through other voluntary donations. MIOT-Wales does an annual charity walk to raise money. MIOT-Wales was proud to celebrate its 10th anniversary, by having a cultural event, called 'Kalaikathambam'. It also helped generate income to the charity. We are, in fact, planning to have similar events annually in the future. We also had a social evening, called 'Thamasha' in which we staged music, drama and songs with the help of the talents from our MIOT members. It was an integrated event, with local tamil school and 'Swasi' group par.t-taking with us. This also helped raise money.

We, so far, have done many charitable actions. We would like to highlight some of the most important ones, below.

- 1. Neonatal unit in Jaffna Teaching Hospital: In the past we have donated an Incubator which was of immense help to the unit and to the community. In addition, we donated a pulse-oximeter and a few cots to the unit. We have recently raised money and donated another Pulse-oximeter and a couple of 'Dual channel oxygen+air blender' to the Special Care Baby Unit.
- 2. Charity walks: Every year this helps raise money for a specific cause. The one we did in 2015 raised £1141 which was donated to the Annailllam, an orphanage home, in Mannar. The last year we raised £700 and donated this to the Puthukkudiyiruppu hospital for their unmet needs in the newly built Male ward. It is also worth mentioning that we also separately made another donation to the same ward when the building was completed. The fund was used to furnish the ward with furniture. We, recently, have done another walk for this year which took place on the 29th of April 17. Although, we have not received the full collection yet, the proceeds will go to an Orphanage home in Vanni.

- Orphanages: We, in the past, also have donated funds to an orphanage Home in Mulankavil, called AmalaAnnaiAnpaham and to an Elderly Home in Mannar - each receiving Rs,100,000/=
- 4. Artificial Limb: We have donated money to the artificial limb fitting unit in Mannar to help those victims who lost their limb in war.
- 5. Stroke Unit: MIOT-Wales has, in the past, given donation to the newly opened Stroke Rehabilitation Unit in Valaichenai.
- 6. Save Act Foundation: We have donated £902 to the Save Act Foundation- a charity that has acquired a Home to look after disabled spinal Injury patients who were re-located from Puthukkudiyiruppu Hospital to Vavuniya.
- 7. Assist AR: The organization Assist AR, made a request to us for helping the displaced residents from Sampoor. They fled from their homes due to war. The Assist AR needed money to build toilets for the displaced families. The MIOT-Wales's contribution to build 13 permanent toilets at the cost of £200 for each (£2600 in total) was appreciated.
- 8. MIOT-Wales has been supporting 5 medical students to-date. From 2015 this has been extended. Additionally, we are now supporting 3 more allied students who are linked to medical profession

Charity Projects

- Educational Bursary: We have continued to support five medical students, two
 nursing students and two allied professional students of the University of Jaffna
 with a monthly bursary.
- Educational grant: We donated £550 via the Alumni association, University of Jaffna to sponsor Dr. Mathanki Balasubramaniam, lecturer at department of physiology, to attend a workshop on techniques in physiological sciences at the all India institute of medical sciences.

Puthukudiyiruppu hospital development: We donated £3500 via Assist RR charity
to furnish the newly built male ward with 24 beds, mattresses and side cupboards.
The ward was opened on 18th April and is serving approximately 45,000 people in
the locality.

The proceeds of the charity walk mentioned above will be donated towards buying medical equipment for this ward.

- Sampoor phase 2 resettlement We donated £2500 via assist RR to build 13 permanent toilets to benefit the families resettled in the area.
- Vavuniya Save Act Foundation We donated £900 to this institution which is being set up to care for 10 paraplegic patients in the community. This money will be utilised to cover medical expenses.
- Jaffna Teaching Hospital NICU Funds have been raised to donate essential equipment to this unit. Details will follow in the next year's report.

Fellowship Event

This was a self-sponsored weekend out in August to nurture team building. This took place in Devon with all the MIOT Wales families.

Membership changes

Dr. V. Ravimohan has left the membership after moving to England.

The new committee was elected on 7th August 2016.

Trustees Report and Financial Statements

Trustees Report - Year Ended 30 June 2017

The trustees present their report together with the financial statements of the Charity for year ending 30th June 2017. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting policies set out in the notes to the Financial Statements and comply with applicable law.

Trustees

The members of the management committee are the trustees of the organisation. The names are as shown in the AGM Report.

Management and Decision Making

The management structure and the decision making process of the organisation are in accordance with the constitution of the organisation appended to this report.

Aims and Objectives

Medical Institute of Tamils is a registered charity, its objectives are:-

- To relieve poverty, sickness and the preservation and protection of the health of the Tamil Community in the countries they live, including UK.
- To advance education and training in our community in the science and art of medicine.
- To provide facilities in the interest of social wellbeing, primarily for persons within our community with the object of improving their quality of life.

The Charity aims to harness the extensive network of Tamil medical professionals working across the whole of the United Kingdom through its regional branches Northern, Wales, Eastern, North Thames and South Thames regions and also by collaborating with like minded organisations operating in the rest of the world to achieve its objectives. The main objective of our charity is to support health related projects and only the orphanage under the name of MIOT.

Financial Review

Income

Total income generated for the year end 30th June 2017 was £110,834 (2016 - £97,976). Each region has contributed in different ways in generating funds. MIOT youth forum, consisting of younger generation across all regions, continue to grow. The income is shown under 'Central', which is the administration cost centre encompassing all regions.

The above amounts include funds generated in prior years but utilised in this financial year. The charity is managed entirely by volunteers. The Trustees provide their services voluntarily and do not derive any financial benefit.

Risk Management and Reserve Policy

The North and East of Sri Lanka, the area in which this Charity's beneficiaries mostly live has now been accessible as the war has come to an end. We are now in the process of doing rehabilitation work in these areas, funding humanitarian and health projects.

Trustees will ensure that both central committee and regional committees raise additional funds through fund raising activities such as cultural programmes and charity dinners to avoid incurring financial deficits.

The Trustees review the major risk, which the Charity faces on a regular basis and believe, in maintaining reserves at current levels with constant review of controls over financial operations, will provide sufficient resources in the event of adverse conditions. The following resources are available to meet future requirements.


