*Remarks on the Country &c. from Colombo to  
Jaffna and thence to Trincomalee.*

From Colombo to Pasbetal, is a distance of  $4\frac{1}{2}$  miles, the road good, houses and Cocoanut plantations all the way: the river Mutwal is crossed here.

From Pasbetal to Jaille Rest House is  $7\frac{1}{2}$  miles, good road, rather elevated above the common level of the Country: on the left is a large plain (originally cultivated) which extends as far as Negombo Lake, and thro' which runs the navigable canal to that place.

From Jaille to Negombo, distance  $10\frac{1}{2}$  miles, the road is good & pleasant, crosses cultivated lands, some jungle with fine intervals of green pasture, about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles from Jaille the Dandogam River, is crossed and thence to Negombo is a fine extensive sheet of water of that name on the left.

Negombo is a pleasant Village, and has a small Fort. There are some good Houses in the Pettah and it is the residence of a Magistrate.

From Negombo to Maravilla distance 14 miles the road is very sandy, bordered to the Kaymele River by an uninterrupted tope of Cocoanut Trees. Boats attend here for the convenience of Passengers; at Maravilla there is a good Rest House.

From Maravilla to Chilaw distance  $12\frac{1}{2}$  miles, the same sandy beach continues. The Country is barren and almost uninhabited; Near the Sea shore is the Collector's Cutcherry. The fort of Chilaw is situated on the opposite side of the River.

From Chilaw to Oedepencarre the distance is  $10\frac{1}{2}$  miles from the former place a narrow slip of land, about 2 miles in length, brings you to the Ferry of the Chilaw River, which is broad, and rapid and should be passed with caution in windy or after rainy weather; about half way there is a small Post Station, the only appearance of habitation in this desert and barren tract of Sand.

Oedepencarre is a small Village of Fishermen, and near it the Rest House, and ancient Pagoda of Andipane.

From Oedepencarre to Madramkooly distance,  $11\frac{1}{2}$  miles is over flat marshy ground full of bogs in wet weather, having on the right the Andapane water and on the left, a Cocoa Tope, in which are one or two Villages; about half way the road crosses a narrow Canal called Quiparawa (vulgarly known under the name of Blue Boots) here the passage is always difficult and in wet weather almost impracticable, an extent of about 500 yards of deep adhesive clay of a bluish colour, extending right and left of the Canal which is the communication between the narrow Gulph of Calpentyn and the Andipane Lake; from this the road is better but occasionally interrupted

by bogs of clay, on the left is a Canal extending to the before mentioned Gulph.

From Madramkooly Post House to Putlam distance  $8\frac{1}{2}$  miles. The road is pretty much the same until you arrive at Calpentyn Gulph about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles from Putlam, where there is a small square Fort. The Village is about 300 yards further on in the midst of Coconut Topes.

From Putlam to Wannitavilly distance  $11\frac{1}{2}$  miles the road is good for the first 4 miles, being over an extensive plain with large Salt pans on the left, hence on both sides it is a dreary Road with thick and impenetrable Jungle till Wannitavilly where there is a large Tank. From this place there is a Road to Caradivoe from whence the Calpentyn Gulph is crossed to the Village and Fort of that name.

From Wannitavilly to Pomparipoo, distance 11 miles, the road continues thro' a very barren and woody country, in wet weather extremely difficult to pass, being full of swamps and much infested with wild Animals, about 4 miles before reaching the latter place, the River of Pomparipoo, is crossed, which is fordable, but after Rain generally very deep and rapid.

From Pomparipoo to Mardodde a lonely rest House, distance  $8\frac{1}{2}$  miles, the road generally good, excepting over the Pomparipoo plains, where the ground being clayey the water stands in rainy weather.

From Mardodde to Marchicotty distance  $7\frac{1}{2}$  miles, the road continues good, with high Jungle on both sides; During this stage the Moderegam River is crossed.

From Marchicotty to Arripo distance  $16\frac{1}{2}$  miles, there are two different roads—the inland road more used in former times than at present, (then called the Elephant Road, because these Animals used to be sent thro' it to the Peninsula of India) first goes off in N. N. E. direction, then North. It is generally good, sandy, and deep in some places, surrounded with thick Jungle, diversified by a few small plains; When it turns off to Condatchy, the country opens and the road becomes clayey and difficult in many places.—The other Road which passes along the Sea shore, and near the Kallar Pagoda, is extremely difficult to pass at high water from the nature of the shore, which is covered with Rocks; after some miles however there are fine hard sands, which for Palankeen bearers, and indeed any other conveyance than Carriages is by far preferable to the sands you meet with on the other road; at Arripo is the Doric a large stone building, built by the Honble F. North, (The Present Earl of Guildford) when Governor of Ceylon, and ornamented by a front of that order of Architecture—Here the Governor resides during the period he visit the Pearl Fishery, which takes place at Condatchy.

From Arripo to Bangalle distance 8 miles, the river of Arripo is crossed with Canoes, road rather sandy and muddy, there are several Nullahs, the Country being low; At Bangalle is a Roman Ca-

tholic Church. A separation of the Roads takes place here, the one leading to Manaar & the other to Mantotte and Jaffna.

From Bangalle to Tallaly, distance 4 miles, the country low, over open plains, and in the rainy season full of muddy water for an extent of about two miles; in the flood time there is near 2 feet of water and at ebb it is almost dry; close to Manaar its river is crossed: The Fort of Manaar is built of Coral Stones, contains several buildings and a reservoir for water which is difficult to be obtained good elsewhere; In the Pettah the Houses are good & the Collector's House is a very commodious one. The country well inhabited. Travellers cross from hence, viâ Ramisseram, to the Continent of India.

From Bangalle to Mantotte, is a distance of  $4\frac{1}{2}$  miles, here is a large building on an elevated spot commanding extensive plains, part of which are at certain periods overflowed by the sea.—The Rest House, (formerly a Church) is contiguous to the Paddy Store near Mantotte, the scite with some ruins (scarcely discoverable) are shewn, which prove it to have been formerly a place of Trade.

From Mantotte to Werteltivoe, distance  $9\frac{1}{2}$  miles, there is nothing remarkable: The Road is flat and sandy, leading thro' open Jungle and some large plains, with the appearance of Salt pans. This is a large Village inhabited by Moormen. The Country is much infested by wild Buffaloes and Elephants, and from hence there is a road through the Wanny by which the Post travels to Trincomalee.

From Werteltivoe to Ellepekarveh Rest House, distance  $5\frac{1}{2}$  miles, the road is much the same as the last stage, the Village of Ellepekarveh is of some size, the Country around fertile, and in some places cultivated but after that for a long extent of road nothing is seen but Jungle, beds of Rivulets, some with water, others dry, and as Polvorynkattoo is approached (a distance of 15 miles from the latter Village,) an extensive wood of very thick Jungle, is passed through; The Rest House is situated about a mile and a half from the Sea and from the same place eastward is the Village, with a very considerable Tank, affording means of cultivating an extensive range of Paddy Fields; At about 5 miles from the Sea shore in a north westerly direction are the two small Islands of Ireentivoe (or the two Brothers) where the Colts of the Delft Stud are turned out; the soil is sandy with short grass, Palmyra and Cocoa Trees.

From Polvorynkattoo to Poneryn, distance 16 miles, a sandy Road with low Jungle and much water, some open plains, and Paddy Fields; Elephants are here met with in the rainy season: This place is well inhabited, the Rest House is commodious and a Magistrate resides in the Fort.

From Poneryn to Kaloemony, distance  $13\frac{1}{4}$  miles, The Road is sandy & full of Palmyra Trees: here the sea is crossed to Colombogam a distance of about  $3\frac{3}{4}$  miles, on the opposite shore of Jaffnapatam.

From Colombogam to Jaffna, distance 3 miles, Road sandy: Here is a large Fort built of Coral Stones. The houses in the Pettah are regularly built, the streets broad, and the country well cultivated: from Jaffna there is a road to Point Pedro the most Northern Point of the Island, and from whence the Mails, are generally conveyed over to the Continent.

From Jaffna to Catetyay, distance  $17\frac{1}{2}$  miles, the road leads first through a well cultivated Country diversified with Palmyra Topes. At about 4 miles distance is passed a very narrow arm of the Sea called the Salt River, fordable, being shallow and not above 50 yards broad, the country continues to wear the same appearance to the Rest House.

From Catetyay to Elephant pass, a distance of 16 miles, little variation occurs in the road, low lands cultivated as Paddy Fields extend to the Eastward of it, and about a mile and a half to the Southward is situated a small Fort, for preventing the passage of Elephants, where the shallow branch of the Sea which divides Jaffna from the main land of Ceylon becomes so narrow as to allow them to ford it. The remains of an old Fort are still visible.

From Elephant pass to Chondicolom, distance 15 miles, the Country assumes a wilder appearance, Palmyras are scarce, and Jungle and bushes supply their place. The Country above Chondicolom is in some degree cultivated.

From Chondicolom to Matelle, distance  $12\frac{1}{2}$  miles; Five miles from the former place is the large Inland Salt lake, which extends as far as Mulletivoe and the Road leads on between it and the low land. Matelle is a village chiefly inhabited by fishermen & situated in the midst of a tope of Cocoa Trees. From Matelle the road leads through the same kind of country; On the right, are extensive Fields of Paddy until within two miles of Mulletivoe, a distance of  $10\frac{3}{4}$  miles, where there is a channel of water, through which at times, the sea communicates with the Mulletivoe lake. This may be crossed on a natural bridge of rocks, formed by a ridge of sand stone, it is about 400 yards long, very slippery, on account of its being generally covered with water and green moss, and difficult for man or Horse.—A green shady walk leads from hence to Mulletivoe: Instead of crossing the difficult pass before alluded to and known by the name of the stone bridge, another path leads to the left, where the sea sand is very heavy; the mouth of the inlet of water being generally choaked up and dry: The small Fort of Mulletivoe is garrisoned by Sepoys, and is the residence of a Commandant and Collector of the District.

From Mulletivoe to Alambiel, distance  $8\frac{3}{4}$  miles, there is a succession of picturesque and verdant plains, surrounded with fine Jungle and

**Forest Trees, & watered by several small tanks. The Hamlet of Alambi** is situated on the right of the road in a grove of Cocoa Trees.

From Alambi the route to Kokelay, a distance of  $15\frac{1}{2}$  miles, offers some difficulty. The lake of the former place has several branches generally full of water, which, tho' not deep and difficult, are on account of the blue clay at bottom, (resembling that of Quiparawa canal on the other side of the Island,) dangerous for Horses and Cattle to cross; Palankeens travel through them however without much difficulty; After this there is a path leading thro' verdant plains, similar to those before described, to the banks of the lake of Kokelay, an extensive sheet of water rendered picturesque by some billy projections of its Western shores. The Post and Rest Houses are situated in a grassy plain a few hundred yards from the lake. Another Road is by the sea shore, but this is rendered difficult by a projecting ridge of rocks about 4 miles from Alambi and is very difficult to pass.

From Kokelay to Teriah, distance  $11\frac{1}{2}$ ; At a very short distance from the Rest House of Kokelay is crossed the inlet by which the sea communicates with the lake and which at low water is fordable, but at high water deep & the current rapid. The channel is about 60 yards broad and crossed in canoes. It is here for the first time, that, after leaving the uniform flatness of the Northern extremity of the Island, some idea, is formed of the ranges of low hills, generally running in the S. E. and N. E. direction which gives the Trincomalie district quite a different character as to the face of the Country, and from those features of ground that render the neighbourhood of that place so very picturesque.—After crossing the stream abovementioned, the traveller must pass the sandy shore of the sea for several miles to the Kalloe Avar, fordable in general, tho' very broad and deep: From hence the road is over extensive plains and jungle paths to the Rest House of Teriah, remarkable by two small rocky Hillocks in its immediate vicinity; it leads to some cultivated plains and to the small Hamlet and Rest House of Cutchavelly, a distance of  $8\frac{1}{4}$  miles, remarkable by the enormous and beautiful Banyan and other Trees, which shew it to have been formerly a place of worship.

From Cutchavelly, thro' some tracts of land, once cultivated, and over several different branches of the Pelavicaddar to an extensive plain containing a sheet of water of above two miles in length, remarkable by some Hillocks situated to the N. W. of it and close to its shore; one of which is surmounted by a piece of rock having the appearance of a Statue and forming a picturesque object; from hence to Nillavelly is a distance of  $13\frac{1}{2}$  miles.

From Nillavelly to Trincomalie, distance  $7\frac{1}{2}$  miles—Not far From this place, to the Westward are, two of those small Hillocks which characterize this tract of country, and a few miles further, on reaching the banks of the fordable sheet of water called the Salt River, chains of

low connected Hills make their appearance, running about East and West and forming the Northern enclosure of the capacious bason which contains the Bay of Tamblegam.—Through jungle and paddy fields the Pettah first appears, then the Esplanade and afterwards the Fort of Trincomalie; This place is well fortified, contains a considerable Garrison, possesses the finest harbour in India and is the chief Naval Depôt for His Majesty's Ships of War in the Indian Seas.

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*Remarks on the Country &c. from Colombo to Trincomalie thro' the Mahagampattoo.*

From Colombo to Pantura is 16 miles; The Road excellent all the way, and most delightfully shaded; on the right, distant 7 miles from Colombo, is Mount Lavinia, the Country Residence of His Excellency the Governor; At Pantura, close to the Rest House, is a broad and rapid River, which there empties itself into the Sea.

From Pantura to Caltura, distance 10 miles, the road equally good as the last stage; Here there is a most excellent House belonging to Government. The surrounding country is most picturesque. The Collector of the District resides in the Town. River crossed here.

From Caltura to Bentotte, distance 12 miles, roads good, Country in some places Hilly; Here there is a Rest house, and a river to be crossed close to it

From Bentotte to Amblangodde distance 15 miles, the road continues good, & the country beautiful.

From Amblangodde to Hiccodde, distance 8 miles, from thence to Gindurah 8 and Gindurah to Galle 3½. This place has a considerable Fort & Garrison and a large Harbour; The road in two or three places lies over steep rocks and high hills. A River is passed with good boats at Gindurah. Face of the country much the same as last stage. The Collectors House is without the Fort.

The Traveller must provide at this place, a stock of Wine, Bread, Biscuit, Tea, Sugar &c. &c. to serve him until he arrives at Trincomalie.

From Point de Galle to Matura, a small Fortified place, distance 28 miles; Road tolerably good, with some hills. In the rainy season there are several outlets across the road, and one river with a Ferry and Boats; the country in general is planted with Cocconut trees; To the left near to Matura is a large river with a wooden Bridge. The Collector resides here.

Provisions of every description, that the country produces must be procured here, it being the only place where they are to be had in plenty until the Traveller arrives at Batticaloa.

From Matura to Tangalle, a Military Post, distance 22 miles, water bad, and scarce; Road very indifferent over large hills, and along the sea Beach, with several outlets; face of the country, plantations of Cocoanut trees, interspersed with jungle, the soil sandy and mixed with gravel and stones.

From Tangalle to Hambantotte (the Collector's residence) is a distance of 27 miles; Here is a Military Post of consequence having the charge of all the Salt Pans in the Mahagampattoo.—Several wells of tolerable good water are met with here. The Roads are good except through the paddy fields.—At Rannie there is a deep Nullah of fresh water and also a large fresh water river at Walawe, and a Ferry with small Boats. The Face of the country, near Hambantotte, large plains, soil blue, and low jungle, very little fresh water on the road.

From Hambantotte to Magam, is  $14\frac{1}{2}$  miles, a solitary Village, near a plain, with few inhabitants, no cultivation, but good open roads; There are salt pans here and the country is covered with low jungle, very little fresh water is to be met with until reaching the Magam river.

This part of the country is much infested by Elephants, and other wild animals; soil sandy, with low jungle and some salt water lakes.

From Magam to Palitoopane distance  $9\frac{1}{2}$  miles, within three miles of which, is a newly established Military Post to protect the Salt Leways, road open and good, over large barren plains, bad water, and very little of it, this place is surrounded with jungle: Face of the country sandy and barren.

From Palitoopane to Yalla river (North bank) distance  $11\frac{1}{2}$  miles road indifferent, with thick low jungle, sandy and barren. No inhabitants or water except at Puttana where there is a large rock with a reservoir of good water on it. The Yalle or Maniock River is fresh and good & fordable in fine weather;—about one mile from it, is a scattered village situated on a plain, consisting of a few Huts, the inhabitants apparently very poor.

From Yalle to Puttana, distance 10 miles, through a thick jungle, and barren, no inhabitants, very little water, and that not good, (from small wells,) soil sandy with little vegetation.

From Puttana, to Kombockan river, (the limits between the Districts of Batticaloa and the Magampattoo.) Distance 8 miles; The road a little better than last stage, over large plains of pasture & high jungle, no cultivation, or inhabitants, & water very scarce.

The Village Kombockan has the appearance of more industry than any part of the Mahagampattoo, a few Cocoanut trees begin

to appear, and the banks of the river are covered with fine Forest trees, and some Grass in the plains. The inhabitants are chiefly Malabars, who are very civil and ready to accommodate strangers with the produce of the Country.

The Traveller in passing through the Mahagampattoo in the dry season should supply himself & followers with water for the journey, at the Magam river, Yalle river, and Kombokan river, as the water from the wells, and tanks, is subject to various impregnations from the great numbers of wild animals which frequent this part of the Country.

From Kombokan to Ogandamalle, a large rock with several tanks on it of fresh water, distance  $12\frac{1}{2}$  miles; the road is a little rough and rocky; Face of the country large plains, some cultivation, and a few inhabitants; towards the end of the stage the general appearance of the country, and vegetation, begin to look a little better, the Village (or rather scattered huts,) is at a small distance from the road.

From Ogandamalle to Arroekgam, a distance of  $18\frac{1}{2}$ ; over large plains, through villages, some of which are cultivated, and surrounded with high jungle, and rocks, and very sandy from the rains, which overflow the whole country, and leave the sand and gravel in the paths: Fresh water in several places on the road; here is a large Government Storehouse: Water from the wells not very good.

From Arroekgam to Tricoil, distance 23 miles, road through several populous villages, and a fine cultivated country, surrounded with large forests of very fine Timber, the water is bad, chiefly from wells: here is a large Malabar Temple, and a village well inhabited by people of that caste; This place is situated on a sandy Beach, near the Sea. The general appearance of this part of the Batticaloa district, is high jungle, large plains, salt and fresh water lakes, and many extensive plains well cultivated, the soil is of marle, and dark coloured sand.

From Tricoil to Bambeemoody, distance 16 miles, through a well cultivated and populous country, road chiefly on the tops of the banks of the Paddy fields, which makes it a little tedious for the Traveller—large plains, level all the way, with several Nullahs which are very difficult to cross in the rainy season.

From Bambeemoody to Neypattimony, the road is  $7\frac{1}{2}$  miles, on the side of a large cultivated plain, with several villages at a small distance, water not very good: face of the country much the same as last stage.—There is a large Government Storehouse situated on the bank of the Batticaloa river or lake, part of the country well peopled, and they are very industrious in cultivating the Paddy fields.

From Neypattimony to Batticaloa, distance  $17\frac{1}{2}$  miles, is an open road near the sea side, and very sandy, well cultivated with



Cocoanut, and some Palmyra trees; several populous villages; the inhabitants Malabars, and Moors, who appear to be very industrious and comfortable; Batticaloa is a considerable place, the residence of a Collector and a Military post with a small Fortress, situated on an Island in the lake, or river, that extends from Neypattimony and is navigable for Boats or Canoes, which are chiefly used for conveying the produce of the country from one part to another.

The traveller may be supplied here, with Fowls, Rice &c. in great plenty and at a very moderate rate.

From Batticaloa to Errour a good Rest House, the distance is 9 miles, the road leads along the sea side, having the lake of Batticaloa on the left, with Cocoanut plantations; soil generally sandy and barren with but little good water.

From Errour to Nallor river, (south bank) distance 10 miles, road good with several villages and many inhabitants: some high jungle; no Rest House; the river (salt water) runs from the lake mentioned before, near Neypattimony & Batticaloa, and empties itself into the sea at Venloos Bay about 4 miles to the East.

From Nallor to Comolandemonie, is  $4\frac{1}{2}$  miles the road tolerably good & over large plains, some of which are cultivated; two or three small villages are passed but thinly inhabited, and not so comfortable as those to the southward of Batticaloa; no good water, and the country in every direction, much frequented by Elephants, Buffaloes, and other wild Animals.

From Comolandemonie to Panachenkanie River (south bank) distance  $15\frac{1}{2}$  miles, road over large plains, uncultivated and barren, with high jungle on every side, and large salt water lakes, the inhabitants chiefly Veddass, who live in the jungle; very little good water—no Village or Rest House.

From Panachenkanie river to Kadaravilly, distance  $9\frac{3}{4}$  miles, road open and good, by the side of a salt water lake or river, with high jungle, no cultivation, and few inhabitants; Kadaravilly, is a considerable Malabar village with good water from a stream that runs from the Virgel or Moleado river.

From Kadaravilly to the Virgel river, (North bank,) distance, 4 miles, road very bad, chiefly through old paddy fields, and over some rocks, with thick high jungle; this place is situated on the banks of the river, and is the limit between the Batticaloa and Trincomalie Districts: Rain in the interior makes the ferry difficult and dangerous to cross, from its great depth and rapidity, and it often overflows the country.

From the Virgel river to Arnetievoe,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles, the road very bad and narrow, this place is situated on the side of a large plain; There is a small pool here used occasionally by Travellers.

From Arnetievoe to Topoor,  $13\frac{1}{2}$  miles, over large uncultivated

plains some thick jungle, and a barren sandy country, several Nullahs, most of which are fordable: Here is a Rest House, and good water from the Virgel river, the inhabitants but few and principally Malabars and Moors,

From Topoor to Cotiaar, distance 6 miles, is a very bad road over high rocks and hills, with jungle on both sides. The village of Cotiaar is situated on the south side of the Inner Harbour of Trincomalie, is very populous, inhabited by Malabars, the country around well cultivated & the soil fine, with large pastures for feeding cattle, of which there are great numbers; Here is a large Rest House for the accommodation of Strangers. From this place the Traveller must cross to Trincomalie by water which is a few miles over; in general, several Boats, (or rather large Canoes,) are lying at this place, of from three to four Tons burthen and which may be engaged by those who require them.

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### *Remarks on the Country from Colombo to Kandy.*

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From Colombo to Pannebakerry, distance 4 miles, the road good, with Houses and Coconut plantations the whole way.

From Pannebakerry to Kadoowelle, 6 miles, the road good in dry weather but after rains the Country is subject to be overflowed by the rising of the Kalana Gongga; from hence to Hanwelle distant 10 miles, the road good, in some places hilly and finely shaded: Here is a Fort on the left bank of the Kalana Gongga which River empties itself into the Sea about three miles to the N. of Colombo.

From Hanwelle to Avissahawelle a distance of  $11\frac{1}{2}$  miles, the road is hilly but extremely beautiful; At this place a very picturesque Cantonment has been formed upon a high hill, which commands the Country around. There was formerly a Portuguese work of great extent here; at a short distance appears a most remarkable rock of considerable height which in rainy weather has a grand and awful appearance.

From Avissahawelle to Sittawaka,  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile distant, here a branch of the Kalana Gongga is crossed and was formerly the boundary of the British and Kaudyan Territories.

From Sittawaka to Ruanweylle 9 miles, the road excellent, over a fine level and well cultivated Country—about a mile and a half before reaching the latter place, the road passes through a Royal Garden, which, although planted only with Cocoanut trees is far from being despicable—the distance and regularity which has been observed in planting the trees gives it a pretty appearance and the new road through it, formed since the capture of the country, has tended much to its beauty: Before reaching Ruanweylle the Kalana Gongga is crossed at its confluence with the Gooragooya Oya: Here a large Fort has been constructed by the British Government—the supplies for the Interior are brought to this point from Colombo by water, to which place you can return (a distance of 40 miles) in 7 or 8 hours—Ruanweylle is entirely surrounded with high hills.

From Ruanweylle to Idamalpane, a distance of 14 miles: Soon after leaving the former place the Gooragooya Oya is crossed, & the road is good; At Idamalpane there is a small Fort, the Country around one entire chain of majestic hills; from hence to Hittymoele, distant 5 miles: a journey of considerable difficulty and fatigue, being over a very rocky and rugged country with some very steep ascents: Within a short distance of Hittymoele there is a steep hill to descend—This place lies low. The next Station is Attapittia, distant 10 miles: where a Military Post is now constructing under the able direction of Capt. King of the Royal Staff Corps & A. D. C. to His Excellency the Governor: The first part of the road is through the bed of a River which in rainy weather is difficult to pass: The road in many places rocky with some very steep hills to descend—In this journey the traveller has some grand views of this wonderful Country, hills that appear to the eye impracticable to ascend, are cultivated to their very summits.

From Attapittia to Gannithene, distant 3 miles, the road much the same as the last stage, the country well cultivated and inhabited; Gannithene is a romantic situation having in its front the stupendous mountain called Bailany.

From Gannithene to Amnapoora, distant 4 miles, a most fatiguing journey, being directly over the mountain: some of the ascents are nearly perpendicular, and in rainy weather, dangerous to mount, but the traveller's labours are amply repaid when he reaches its summit at Amnapoora, from whence the view is beautiful beyond description, hills and dales are to be seen in all directions—a Convalescent Hospital has been formed here, & it is also a post of great importance.

From Amnapoora to Kaudy, distant 13 miles, the road good but very hilly: About 4 miles from Amnapoora is the village of Dodenwelle remarkable for its Temples dedicated to Budboo and its fine and majestic avenues of trees; large quantities of Ciunamon grow in the neighbourhood of this place & in fact the whole Country abounds

with this valuable shrub: Three miles previous to reaching Kandy, at Gonaruwa, the Maha Villa Ganga is crossed, a broad and rapid River which disembogues itself at Trincomalee: The suburbs of Kandy are soon after entered which resemble much those of other Towns on the Coromandel Coast, & there is a peculiar neatness in the buildings which renders the prospect extremely cheerful.

Nullahs or Rivulets are met with in almost every stage, and after Rains are so swollen as to be impassable for many hours.

Kandy is situated in a valley surrounded by three ranges of high Hills which form a triangular shape; from the top of which are some grand and beautiful views. The Palace was formerly a structure of considerable magnificence according to the native taste, that is massiness of wall & extent of Area: in the centre is the Hall of Audience where the late King received his Adigars; this apartment like most others in the Palace is in an unfinished state the Wooden Pillars of this room are well carved & have a very handsome appearance; in another square is the Chief Temple, an upstairs Building, the outside very plain, but the inner apartments in which the Sacred Relic is deposited are very superbly ornamented, the Doors to the centre Room, (of which there are four,) are very thickly cased with Gold; adjoining to this is a very elegant Octagon Pavilion, used by the deposed King as a pleasure House, from whence he viewed the different religious processions & where he also witnessed his cruel and arbitrary punishments; it is a building of great taste and of very fine workmanship; from it is a fine view of the Tank, a beautiful and extensive sheet of water, which, when Kandy was formerly in possession of the English was a Paddy Field, and to which was in a great manner to be attributed the diseases that proved so destructive to our unfortunate Countrymen:—In the centre is a Pleasure House, the Water round which, is upwards of 30 feet deep.—The Tank was intended to have been surrounded by a wall but it is not completed. The entrance to the Palace is rather handsome, being through a massive gateway with a draw bridge, from which there are two flights of large and broad steps leading right and left to different parts of the Palace: the buildings to the left were chiefly appropriated to the Women of the King's household. The whole front is surrounded with a deep ditch and outer wall. The water in the ditch flows into the Tank, over which, there is a bridge leading to Malabar street, where the late King's relations lived.—The Town of Kandy is very compact consisting of three straight streets, the longest of which is one mile in length, there are several smaller ones crossing them: great uniformity prevails in the buildings which in general are thatched with straw and white washed, which gives the Town a clean appearance: The Royal Garden leading to the Palace of Condosalay about 4 miles from Kandy affords a pleasant ride.

## *Remarks on the Roads from Trincomalee to Kandy*

From Trincomalee to Capalory, 8 miles, the road is over low ground round the Bay of Tamblegam, very marshy and several Inlets of the Sea are passed.

From Capalory to Tamblegam, distance 6 miles, through thick jungle: ground in most places low. From Tamblegam to Lake Candely, a distance of three miles: the country wears the same appearance: Lake Candely is an artificial Tank, the waters of which are collected by a strong embankment faced to a considerable depth with very large hewn stone, there are two sluices by which the water is carried off, which form two Rivers, one of which, waters all the Fields around the Bay of Tamblegam.

From Lake Candely to Permamoodoo, a distance of 9 miles: The road leads over very rugged ground for two miles along the Southern Bank of the Lake, and crosses both the Rivers that issue from it: near its western extremity the road winds off to the left and enters a low marshy jungle, which continues all the way to Permamoodoo, about 3 miles from the Lake; The boundary between the British & Kandyan Territories is marked by a very large & old Tamarind Tree.

From Permamoodoo to Pulean Cadavette,  $8\frac{1}{2}$  miles:—the road low and marshy with jungle from hence to Minery, distant  $14\frac{1}{2}$  miles:—the road for the first part of the Journey is over an open Country, but low: about 7 miles from Pulean Cadavette, to the right, is a considerable Tank with an embankment similar to that of Candely and on the high ground to the left, are considerable detached rocks: several Forest Trees of large size are met with in this Journey, amongst which are many Teak Trees: The lake of Minery is bounded by extensive plains, beyond which, the surrounding woods rise so very gradually as to render the scenery beautiful: Out of the Lake issues a stream called by the same name, which joins the Maha Villa Ganga in its course towards Cottiar.—To Moodoogall Mulle,  $6\frac{1}{2}$  miles; the road along the S. E. bank of the Lake, and from hence to Poycolam, (also called the Devil's Tank,) a place deserted many years ago on account of its insalubrity—the road on quitting the Lake enters a thick wood, which for three miles is low and marshy, it then passes over a Hill called Condra Malay, (a pass of considerable strength) where there formerly was a strong Cadavette: along the bottom of the Hill runs a considerable stream which the road crosses several times. From Poycolam to Agenewal Palassay, distance  $11\frac{1}{2}$  miles, the road leads through fine Forests and over plains where Ebony Trees of immense size abound. Agenewal Palassay is surrounded by high Hills, the tops of which are green and in many places cultivated, from hence to Noya Combera, distance  $6\frac{1}{2}$  miles, the road leads over extensive and beautiful plains.

From Noya Combera Nalendi, distant  $9\frac{1}{2}$  miles, the roads leads over fine open plains; Nalendi is a Military Post: from hence the road enters the chain of Mountains, which surrounds the Kandyan Capital.—The River of Nalendi is a considerable stream. To Panama distance,  $14\frac{1}{2}$  miles: the country from Nalendi to Kandy is along the vale of Malili, the country is rich, and populous: Panama was occupied and called Fort McDowall in the war of 1803. From Panama to the summit of the Balucadera Pass, or Koodoopelle on the Attagalle road, distance  $5\frac{3}{4}$  miles.—The road is usually taken by the Balucadera Pass but the shortest is over the Atgalle: There is a Cantonment at Atgalle which is a delightful post, and from which there are most beautiful and extensive views of the surrounding Country. From Koodoopelle to Kandy, distant 10 miles; the road excellent, over fine Downs: about 2 miles from Kandy the Maha villa Ganga (here called the Waterpaloga) is crossed: it is very broad and rapid. This place is distinguished for a large tree, where the unfortunate Major Davy surrendered.—The country from hence to the Gate of Kandy, is finely cultivated.

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### *Remarks on the Road from Galle to Kandy.*

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From Galle to Matura, distant 24 miles: road very good: from Matura to Hackman, distant 15 miles: road in many places excessively bad and hilly. From Hackman to Wallismoody, distance 8 miles; the road good in general, some hills and boggy ground are however met with—here is a large Tank of water.

From Hackman to Kattoon, 8 miles: the road very good through a fine grassy country, the appearance of which is beautiful in the extreme, there is a range of Hills to the left—A rapid River is crossed about three miles from Kattoon which during the rainy season causes considerable delay: From Kattoon to Wellalgodde, a distance of 8 miles. The Kandyan Limits are crossed about 4 miles from the former place at a village called Mollendiawella: the road is very deep and bad in many places owing to the stiffness of the clay and the depth of the mud: here is a fine plain and good pasturage for Cattle; a large River runs at about 500 yards distance in front on the road to Tambagammé.

From Wellalgodde to Tambagammé distance  $15\frac{1}{2}$  miles; the road in most places very bad and in some so narrow that they are hardly passable; about 3 miles from Wellalgodde at a place called Anda-

loo, a rapid river is crossed with a very steep bank—about 7 miles further is a village called Villaway, beautifully situated with a very high hill on the left, cultivated to the Top; with the exception of this spot, the Country presents very little appearance of cultivation, a mile or two from the latter place leads to the banks of a very fine River (a branch of the Welloway,) along which is the Road to Tombagamme: this river is very rapid and difficult to be crossed, the banks being nearly inaccessible—for the last four or five miles a large Forest is passed, the road extremely rough: About Tambagamme there is fine pasturage and a great deal of cultivation with a fine River as above mentioned, running in front: From Tambagamme to Ambovillavilla (on the road to Ballangodde) distant 5 miles, the road is very narrow and slippery through a thick jungle and a great deal of strong heavy clay—a river is crossed four or five times: the road runs in one place through a valley (the bed of a River:) the country around is cultivated.

From Ambovillavilla to Villaghepolla, 6 miles: the road for the first 2 or 3 miles is principally along the bed of a river which is crossed 7 or 8 times: in wet weather this route is impracticable as it rises several feet; about 2 miles further there is a very steep and rugged mountain to ascend of about one mile, from the top of which the scenery of the surrounding Country is very grand: Villaghepolla is surrounded by high Hills cultivated in many places: with Natchery—and abounding with Tallipot Trees. From Villaghepolla to Ballangodde, distance 9 miles; The road leads over two steep Hills through a thick jungle of the wild guava. A river is crossed near Ballangodde, from whence there is a Road to Batugedera, about 25 or 30 miles distant: The whole of this Country is very grand and picturesque but the road bad and broken; From Ballangodde to Alletnurah (on the Idalgashina road) the Welloway river is crossed on a raft; about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  mile from Ballangodde there is a Commanding pass; Alletnurah is about  $6\frac{1}{2}$  miles from Ballangodde, the road generally good: here there is a grand Malabar Temple dedicated to Vishnu, good water and pasture.

From Alletnurah to Motelogramme, distant 5 miles: the road winds to the left for about 3 miles along the base of immense hills and sometimes ascending steep heights and quite impassable for any wheel Carriage whatever; the scenery is extremely grand: about half way a river of very difficult access and strongly defended by its banks on both sides, is crossed—it is called Beli hole Oye near a village of the same name.

From Motelogramme to Kalupanhawn distant 7 miles: the limits that divide the Saffregam from the Ouwa province, are crossed at a river called Goora Kondera Oye, about 3 miles from Motelogramme: the whole of this road and particularly the latter place is difficult to pass.—At Kalupanhawn there is very fine pasturage. From hence

to the base of the Idalgashina mountain distant 11 miles.—A river  $\frac{3}{4}$  of a mile from Kallupanhawn is crossed called Velly Oye, and which is completely commanded by a battery, to get to which, the river, and a deep morass of some hundred yards in extent is crossed: These rivers are of the most difficult kind to be passed over: on reaching the high ground the road winds up the side of a mountain and continues ascending to the base of Idalgashina, it is in many places broken and rocky, & in others there is a succession of fine green hills without jungle and clothed with the richest lemon grass, the whole of this tract of Country is extremely high and cold, the water very pure; The summit of Idalgashina is distant about  $5\frac{3}{4}$  miles: the road still continuing to ascend through the same kind of country, about 2 miles further a village to the left is passed called Ginnigodpella, from whence the ascent continues higher, the road then leads through a Forest of large Trees and is nearly impenetrable to the right and left; this Forest contains a great variety of Shrubs and Trees, among the former the black berry thorn and many flowers; all this road is well supplied with fine torrents of very pure water—the road only to be traversed by Men or Cattle being rocky and with many abrupt precipices: another village called Hurrannah about 2 miles from the former, is passed to the right: it is surrounded for a considerable extent by paddy fields; near the summit of the mountain the road in many places is nearly perpendicular; at the gravet is a Rest House and a strong gate; The Rest House is situated in the gravet of Bonebahuna; the hill is descended for a mile through the same Forest & afterwards opens to the view a fine open country as far as can be seen, without any jungle, and having the appearance of a good deal of cultivation: about 3 miles further are the remains of a Portuguese Fort erected on a high hill.—The Road to Badulla lies to the right, close to this place: Badulla is the principal station in the Province of Ouwa: a Fort and extensive Cantonment having been built by Government since the conquest of Kandy in 1815 & the whole of the country is beautiful.—To Parengamme, distant from the summit of the mountain 16 miles, the road for the first 3 miles is very bad: a river called Raitkarenow Oye, is passed which is rough and rapid; the road from hence to Parengamme leads through a number of fine villages well cultivated and the finest pasture (without any jungle whatever) presents itself on all sides with extensive Paddy fields, the appearance of which is beautiful; at Parengamme another Road runs off to Badulla; fine cultivation is every where visible and there are some plains in which 5000 men could be manœuvred.

From Parengamme to Doda otter Kopale, distant 5 miles, on the road to Hangranketty, a steep hill all the way & in some parts very



dangerous, running along a steep precipice: the top of the hill over-looks the surrounding Country and commands a fine and extensive prospect: from this position more than 40 Villages and country apparently well cultivated are seen. From Doda otter Kopale to Mattarata 6½ miles, through a thick forest with a very broken & bad road, steep and narrow for the first 2 miles: The River Koreyda Oye is crossed which runs through a wood and leads to a fine rich plain with very luxuriant pasture: here two roads present themselves, one to the right runs to Hangrankatty by way of Kimblungantotte, the other to the left (and which was formerly the high road to Hangrankatty, but shut up by order of the then King of Kandy 19 years ago, as this road led directly to his dispense Houses,) which is by far the shortest way but the road extremely bad and intricate and interrupted by fallen trees & other obstacles: it leads principally through a thick jungle to a fine open country with rich pasture round the heights of Mittarata: From hence to Ballihoel Oye, five miles distant, some very fine Villages are passed to the right and left, and wear the appearance of fine cultivation, but the road is bad and over some heavy Paddy Fields. From Balihoel Oye to Hangrankatty, distant 12½ miles, the road runs in several places through a heavy swamp and deep Paddy fields, some part of the road very steep and hilly; The Country about Hangrankatty is mountainous and very wet, many Villages around— Here is also a Royal Palace (the favorite Residence of a former King, Raja Singa,) but now nearly in ruins: there is a spacious Tank near it and a Temple dedicated to Vishnu; there appears evident traces of its having been once a place of great importance. From hence to Kandy distant 16 miles, the road for the first two or three miles good, but on approaching the River (the Maha Oye) it is rough and difficult to pass, with a considerable ascent—the road to Kandy with this exception is very good & for the last four miles very beautiful, running through the Royal Gardens along the right bank of the Maha Villa Ganga.

**REPORT of the different Tenures of Land,  
and modes of Inheritance in the  
District of Matura.**

OF FIELDS.

1 Ratninde, Moet- } Signify lands belonging to Government—In the  
tettoo, Mallepalla, } first place, there is to be deducted one seventh  
& Nillepalla. } part of the produce of these lands which is called  
*Wallahan*, (this being for the trouble of those who are employed  
in reaping and threshing the Crop &c.) 2ndly. 3-7th of the remaining  
produce to be appropriated to Government, and the other 3-7th.  
to be taken by the *Goyas* or labourers—The manner in which In-  
dividuals become proprietors of these Lands, is either by right of  
purchase, or by Gifts or Grants from Government, and it has  
some times occurred that the Collector has on the report of the  
Modeliars allowed the Cultivators 2-3rd & 3-4th of the produce  
owing to the badness of the soil of some lands, and has appro-  
priated the remainder on account of Government.

2 Parveny Anda } Signifies lands originally the property of Govern-  
or Anda Parveny. } ment abounding with Jungle, which have been clear-  
ed, and cultivated by individuals without permission—One Seventh  
part of the produce of these lands (in the first place) to be given  
as *Wallahan*, and then Seed Corn to be deducted; after which  
one half of the remaining produce to be appropriated to Govern-  
ment, and the other half by the *Goyas*—The Cultivators or the  
persons who converted them into fields, are entitled to one half  
of the soil of this description of land, which they may either sell  
or Mortgage, and which is heritable by their Children in common.

3. Mallapalla Di- } Signifies lands Granted by the Portuguese and  
wel. } Dutch Governments to individuals on account of  
their services or situations under Government—One Seventh part of the  
produce of these lands to be deducted as *Wallahan*, and then  $\frac{1}{4}$   
of the remaining 6-7th to be appropriated by Government, another  
quarter by the persons to whom these lands have been granted as  
*Accommodessans*, and the two last quarters by the Cultivators.

4 Parveny Di- } Signifies lands originally the property of indivi-  
wel. } duals which paid 1-10th of the produce to Govern-  
ment—but under the Dutch Government, that one tenth was al-  
lowed to be possessed by their proprietors, as a remuneration for  
Service performed by them for Government, one seventh part of



the produce of these lands to be likewise deducted for Wallaban, one fifth of the remainder has been appropriated to Government (since the surrender of this Island to the present Government), and the other, or the last four shares to be divided between the Goyas, and the persons, who hold these lands on account of their Services.

The foregoing two sorts of Diwel lands are heritable by male heirs only, who possess them on performing service when required by Government—In case there should be no male heirs of any family, and if Government considers it unnecessary to continue the service or Office, by the succession of others, the Lands which have been granted to such family or families, revert to Government under the denomination of Nillepalla.

There was likewise under the Portuguese and Dutch Governments Weddewassan Parveny or Service Parveny, which signifies lands obtained by Individuals from those Governments, to be possessed by them as Parveny, on account of their Services to those Governments, and heritable by male heirs only; as these could not be exactly distinguished from Parveny Diwel lands on the surrender of this Island to the British Government, from Dessave Vanschuler's having burnt all the Thombo Records of this District on his departure for Galle, it is generally supposed some of these service Parveny lands are included amongst those which are now known under the appellation of Parveny Diwel, in consequence of which I am told a tax of one fifth of the produce has been imposed by these Governments on all Parveny Diwel fields or low lands, and one tenth on high lands of this description, the owners of which are still liable to perform Service to Government when required, but receive pay for the same.

5 Ratmaherre low } This description of lands when granted by the  
Lands. } Dutch Government and converted into Paddy Fields by cutting and clearing the Jungle &c. by permission, is called Parveny, and is subject to pay 1-10th of the produce to Government, and the remaining nine tenths to be divided amongst the Cultivators, and the persons who converted them into Fields, and the Goyas or labourers: but such lands granted by the Dutch Government to natives pay  $\frac{1}{4}$  of the produce of the low lands, and 1-10th of that of the high lands according to Governor North's Proclamation of 3d May 1800, and those granted to Europeans or their descendants pay 1-10th of the produce to Government as ordained by the Advertisement bearing date the 21st of July 1812. These lands are heritable by male and female heirs.

6 Parveny or purchase Parveny } Signifies the private property of Individuals, a full tenth of the produce of these lands (without any deduction being made) in the first place is appropriated to

Government, and then 1-48th share which is called *Uwandiram* is allowed to the Vidahns and Mayoraals for Superintending, and assisting agriculture, after which there is to be deducted Wallowan and seed Corn with interest at 50 pr. Cent on the whole quantity of produce, and what remains is to be divided betwixt the proprietors of the soil, and the Cultivators or the labourers, in such proportions as the nature of the soil will admit—these lands are heritable by male and female heirs.

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## OF GARDENS.

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<sup>1</sup> Bandare Gardens. Are Government property—most of which were planted by the late Dutch Government, The whole of their produce was annually rented out by Government for its own benefit, but in a few instances, some of these Gardens were planted by individuals, who possess the planting share of the trees only, in such proportions as the nature of the soil will admit, i. e. these Gardens on the Coast pay annually to Government 2-3rd of the produce of the trees (Chiefly Cocoanut trees), and the remaining  $\frac{1}{3}$  or planted share is enjoyed by the planter, and those Gardens situated in the Interior pay  $\frac{1}{2}$  to Government; or these Gardens are on the same footing as Mallapalla.

<sup>2</sup> Mallapalla. Signifies lands which have reverted to Government by the demise of persons who held them on account of their services and situations—These lands are in general planted by Individuals, in which case, leaving a share of the produce of the trees for their trouble, the Government rents out the other share for its benefit, that is, from Gardens of the best soil, Government is entitled to 2-3rd of the produce of the trees, and the Cultivator to the remaining  $\frac{1}{3}$  without the land, but Government is entitled to  $\frac{1}{2}$  of the produce of the trees planted in Gardens of inferior soil. The manner by which individuals become proprietors of the above two descriptions of Gardens is either by right of purchase, or by Grants from Government.

<sup>3</sup> Mallapalla Di- } Are lands which have reverted to Government  
wel. } as above—under the Dutch Government individuals obtained this description of land to be possessed by them on account of their Service—but at present Government receives 1-5th share of their produce which is annually rented out, & the remaining four shares are appropriated by those who hold them.

4 Parveny Di- } Signifies the property of such individuals who on well. } account of their service under the Dutch Government were exempted from paying the Tax (which was known by the denomination of *Piedie*.) being 3-8th of a Pice for every 10 Cocoanut trees and the same for 3 Jack trees bearing fruit, levied by that Government from all the Gardens of this description, but at present Government appropriates 1-10th of their produce which is annually rented out—These two sorts of Diwel Gardens can only be possessed by male heirs, but they are not authorized to dispose of them as they please—In case there are no male heirs, and if Government finds it unnecessary to continue the office or the service by the succession of others, the lands which such families held, revert to Government under the denomination of Nil-lapalla, being on the same footing as fields of this description.

5 Parveny & } Signifies the property of individuals, which under purchase Parveny. } the Dutch Government was subjected to pay the tax called *Piedie*, and the following distinction was made by the Dutch Government vizt. that Gardens situated in the 4 Gravetts paid  $\frac{3}{8}$  of a pice on every Jack tree, and without the Gravetts the same as Parveny Diwel Gardens, but since the present Government took possession of the Island, they are exempted from this Tax—These Gardens are heritable in the same manner as the Parveny Paddy fields, and are generally planted with Cocoanut, and in some instances with Jack plants, but it requires about 10 years for these Plants to blossom and yield fruit, and after that period they bear fruit for about 30 years, when they will gradually decrease in bearing fruit, and the soil of these Gardens is generally unfit for replanting at the expiration of 40 years, on account of the numberless roots of Cocoanut and other trees, unless all the trees are cut down, when the roots will rot, and the lands will then after 3 or 4 years be fit for replanting—but which never happened but once & that in the time of Dessave Burnat as an experiment, which succeeded.

6 Canoes Parveny These were originally Forests, or Jungles of large extent, cut down and cleared by individuals, which they sowed once every seven or eight years—these lands were free from all tax under the Dutch Government, but since the present Government took possession they are subjected to pay one-tenth of their produce, and the remaining nine tenths are divided between the Goyas and the persons who originally cleared them, or by their heirs—These are heritable in the same manner as Parveny or Ottoo lands.

OF INHERITANCE.

riage, } of whom he marries are consolidated, and both of  
them are equally entitled to the Estate, but in case he had Child-  
ren on his first marriage, and should happen to die without Child-  
ren on the second marriage, one half of the Estate is to be in-  
herited by his 2d wife, and the other half by the Children of the  
deceased's first marriage, should there however be issue of the second  
marriage, then the latter half of the Estate is to be equally divided  
amongst the Children of the first, as well as of the second marriage,  
and again after the death of the wife of the 2d marriage, her  
Estate is to be inherited only by her own Children; and the same  
with regard to a widow marrying a second time.—During the life  
time of man and wife, notwithstanding they have Children, they are  
authorized to bequeath to others any part, but not the whole of  
their property, unless they have no issue.

Either husband } For example, when a father and a son are living,  
or wife, and one } in the event of the father's death, the son inherits  
Child living and } the whole Estate, and when the son dies, without  
the Parent dies. } issue, the estate will then be inherited only by the  
next of kin on the father's side, and the same with regard to a  
mother and Child—This has only happened in one instance in this  
district, but still there is a doubt on this point, which is, whether  
in the event of the death of the son as before stated, his Estate  
is not to be equally inherited by the next of kin both of his father;  
as well as of his mother.

There is also a copper coin sent out from Europe of 20, 10, 5, and 1 cash value, the latter being worth 8-75ths or about the ninth part of a farthing.

## GOVERNMENT ADVERTISEMENT.

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**HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR** is pleased to publish the following particulars for the information and guidance of persons travelling from one station to another in this Island and all Officers of Government Civil and Military, to whom the same may relate, are required to govern themselves accordingly.

1st.—After the first of April next the Collectors of Districts are authorized from time to time to grant reasonable advances and assistance to Postholders or persons in charge of Rest Houses, for enabling them to purchase articles required by Travellers, such as Rice, Fowls, Eggs, & Milk, and such supplies may accordingly be had at all places where such persons are stationed.

2nd.—A quarterly tariff of prices will be fixed by the Collector and other principal servants of Government in each District, for the several articles of supply according to instructions, which will be published for general information, and the Postholder or keeper of the Rest House will be allowed to charge 25 per cent on these prices.

3rd.—All complaints of Travellers against those persons are to be addressed to the Collector of the district, who will enquire into the circumstance, and if necessary report the same to Government, that the Postholder or Rest House keeper may be removed if any instance of misbehaviour is substantiated against him.

4th.—All Gentlemen of His Majesty's service, Civil and Military, Dutch Inhabitants, Strangers and others travelling with conveyances & attendants, are required to subscribe their names in a Book to be kept by the Postholder, or Rest House keeper, and also to specify the Payment of any articles with which they may have been furnished, it being found that the abuses hitherto complained of have principally arisen from referring the payment of such accounts to servants.

5th.—The Postholder or Rest House keeper is to report to the Collector, any instance in which violence may have been used, the established charges not paid, or any other impropriety committed by Travellers or their attendants, and in addition to such redress as the Law affords. His Excellency hereby declares that such conduct will be marked with severe animadversion thro' the proper official channels of each service, Collector of districts are to be report all complaints of that nature to the Chief Secretary for His Excellency's information.

6th.—Complaints against persons not in the service or employ of Government, are to be enquired into by the Collector in his capacity of Justice of Peace, or referred to any other Magistrate hav-

ing local Jurisdiction, and it is particularly recommended, and expected by His Excellency, that abuses committed by servants, being of greater frequency and more complained of than any other, be in all cases prosecuted according to the existing Laws.

7th.—The Commandants of Corps and Stations from which Military Detachments may be made, the Officers in the charge of such parties, and all other Officers under whose command they may come, or who may in any manner be employed or concerned in conducting such service, are to consider it their particular and imperative duty to prevent and redress all attempts at violence fraud or impropriety by those under their command, and to report the occurrence of any material causes of complaint to proper authority.

8th.—The places undermentioned are those, at which Postholders or Rest House keepers are stationed at present and where supplies of Rice, Fowls, Eggs, and Milk may be procured.

9th.—At any station not above specified or hereafter notified as a station of supply. Travellers are not to expect or require supplies to be provided for them but are expected at the principal Towns to procure their necessaries without the assistance of Government, and for intermediate places not having an establishment they must bring with them whatever may be necessary, any attempt to obtain articles of supply from the neighbouring villages by compulsion will be rigorously prosecuted

10th.—It having been represented to Government, that very considerable hardship is frequently imposed on the Inhabitants residing in the neighbourhood of the Rest Houses on the Northern and other Roads, where the population is extremely scanty, by the practice of pressing them to serve as Chule-bearers without any sort of remuneration the following Restrictions, are hereby established.

1. The Postholder, or Heapman of any Resthouse, or station, shall provide Chules and Chule bearers for His Excellency The Governor, The Honble the Chief and Puisne Justices, The Chief

Secretary to Government, Members of Council, and His Majesty's Advocate Fiscal in such numbers as they may require, subject to the rate of Pay, herein after specified.

2. No other Gentlemen of H. M. Service Civil or Military, or any other person, shall be entitled to demand Chules or Chule Bearers, without producing an Ola or Road order to that effect, from the Chief Secretary to Government or the Collector of the District.

3. The Collector of each District, shall on application grant such order, only to the Commandant, Collector, Provincial Judge and Sitting Magistrate of his own, or any District, also to any European or Native Officer proceeding in charge of Troops, and to any Foreigner, or Stranger, of such rank as in his discretion may entitle him to this distinction—and to no other person on any occasion whatsoever; but this prohibition is not meant to deter the Postmaster from engaging the voluntary services of Chule-Bearers to any Traveller, European, or Native, who may think proper to pay.

4. On receipt of the Chief Secretary or Collectors order, the Postholder or Headman, shall provide Chules & Chule Bearers, allowing two men for each Palanquin, or Horse, and two to accompany a party of Baggage coolies,—receiving in advance for each man half his pay—at the rate payable to any other coolies—these Chule-Bearers shall not be compelled to proceed further than the next Resthouse or station, when they shall receive the remainder of their pay—and an entry of their names, and the payment, shall be made in the Postmaster's Minute Book.

No. 4. All Coolies who work at day labour are to begin their work at seven in the morning & leave off at half past 5, two hours to be allowed them for their dinner.

No. 5. Two places will be fixed, one in the Fort and another in the Pettah where Coolies are to be found at all hours.

No. 6. At the Fish bazar will be a Servant of the Police to procure Carts at all hours.

No. 7. Every Cart to be numbered.

No. 8. Those who hire a Cart to pay the taxes for the Cart. No Cart can be obliged to carry more than 10 sacks of Rice or 1500 lbs.

No. 9. The Carts will be permitted to pass in the Main-Street of the Pettah for the benefit of Merchants and the Proprietors of Carts.

No. 10. When this Regulation shall be published every Cooly or persons letting Carts shall be liable to punishment on any grounded complaint, or it being proved that he asked more than the stipulated prices.

*Present,*

**THE HONBLE THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL,**

WHEREAS it has been represented to us that a practise prevails of exporting the Copper Coin of this Island whereby very considerable inconvenience and distress are occasioned to the internal trade of the British Settlement.

And Whereas the Regulations at present in force have been found insufficient to restrain or prevent this mischievous practise.

It is therefore enacted by His Honor the Lieutenant Governor in Council that the Exportation of Copper Coin from the Island be and it hereby is strictly prohibited.

And it is further enacted that any Copper Coin exported or attempted to be exported from this Island exceeding in value Fifty Fanams, be and it hereby is declared to be confiscated to His Majesty's use.

And for the better detection of every such attempt be it enacted and declared that the persons who shall discover and seize or give such information as may cause to be discovered and seized on Board of any Vessel, Dhoney or Boat any quantity of the Copper Coin of this Island, exceeding the value of Fifty Fanams shall be entitled to one Third of the quantity so discovered and seized and shall receive the same immediately upon the condemnation thereof.

*For Establishing new rates of Postage for Letters in the British  
Settlements in the Island of Ceylon.*

WHEREAS the present rates of Postage for letters are found to be disproportioned, and inconvenient.

1st. It is enacted that from and after the 1st day of September next, the rates contained in the annexed Schedules and no other shall be the rates of postage for single letters within the British Settlements in the Island.

2d. That double, treble and quadruple letters be charged proportionably, according to the rates in the said Schedules; letters weighing one Rupee to be accounted single, from thence to one Rupee and an half double from thence to two Rupee treble from thence to two and an half quadruple.

3d. That letters weighing above two Rupees and a half and not exceeding three be rated as packets and subject to five fold the single postage—and for each half ounce above three Rupees shall be chargeable in addition with postage as a treble letter.

# REGULATION OF GOVERNMENT

*Present*

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL,

A. D. 1815.

*Regulation No. 9.*

*For the better Collection of Import and Export duties—and repealing all former Regulations relating thereto.*

1. **W**HEREAS the Regulations and Tariffs now in force for collecting the Import and Export duties throughout the Island have been found insufficient, His Excellency the Governor is pleased to enact and declare.

2. That from and after the publication of this Regulation in the several Custom Houses throughout this Island, all former Regulations for the Collection of the *said duties* shall stand repealed.

3. That from and after the said period, the duties on all goods, imported or exported, shall be collected according to the rates specified in the Tables hereunto annexed, 1 & 2.

4. That for regulating the amount of duties on all Articles of import, not enumerated in the Tables, the Importer shall produce, on oath, the invoice which he shall have received of the same, to the amount of which an addition of 25 per Cent shall be made by the Comptroller or Collector of the Customs, and the duty charged on the aggregate amount.

5. In cases where there is no Invoice, or where the Comptroller of the Customs shall have reason to suspect that the Invoice exhibited is not a fair one, he shall proceed to levy the duty to the best of his judgement on the principle of adding 25 per Cent to that which he shall estimate as the prime Cost, and should the proprietor or Consignee be dissatisfied with the Valuation, the goods shall be appraised, one appraiser to be appointed by the Merchant, one by the Comptroller or Collector of Customs, and one to be mutually appointed by both parties; These appraisers shall be sworn to deliver a just Valuation, and the decision of any two of the said three shall be final; and thereupon the Collector shall proceed as directed by the 3rd Clause.

6. In cases where goods *valued in the Tables hereto annexed* shall have been damaged, the duties may at the option of the Importer be levied on their actual Value instead of being subject to the

*Custom House Regulation*

Valuation specified in the Tables, provided that the damage be stated and ascertained to exist previously to the goods being removed from the Custom House: The Value to be so ascertained according to the manner prescribed by the preceding Clause.

7. With regard to Liquors however which may be found damaged or which may have leaked, they shall, in case the Importer shall claim the Indulgence granted by the preceding clause, be put up to public sale and the duties shall be calculated on the proceeds of such sale, due notice of such sale being first given, if the Owner or the Collector shall think the same necessary, in the Ceylon Government Gazette, and the Lots being divided and portioned with the concurrence of the Comptroller or Collector of the Customs.

8. Cloths in general shall be valued by appraisement to be made by the Government Appraiser in the proportion heretofore accustomed Vizt. 15 per Cent under the retail Prices and in case the Merchant shall think himself aggrieved the goods shall be valued as is prescribed in Clause No. 5.

9. No goods shall be landed from any Vessel anchoring in any port of the Island till the Commander, Supercargo, or Owner, shall have lodged the manifest or manifests of his Cargo at the Custom House, and in order that the Commanders of Vessels may not plead ignorance of this Regulation, a notification of their being required so to do shall in future accompany the Reports sent on board of Vessels in the offing by the Master Attendant.

10. In landing the Cargoes of Vessels, (the Commanders or Supercargoes of which are Europeans) each separate Boatload shall be accompanied by a note addressed to the Collector of Customs, specifying the quantity and quality of the goods, so sent with the marks and numbers affixed to them.

11. In case it shall appear, when the whole of the Cargo is landed, either on reference to the notes mentioned in the preceding Clauses or otherwise, that goods superior in quality, or greater in quantity than those inserted in the manifest have been landed, all such goods shall be liable to double duties.

12. No articles whatever shall be allowed to pass the Custom Houses till the established duties are paid, or Security, by deposit or otherwise, shall be lodged to the full amount of the said duties.

13. Provided however, that no deposit or Security shall be received except in cases of Cargoes from Europe or China or where the amount of duties exceeds the sum of one Thousand six dollars.— If the deposits are not redeemed within 3 months of their being lodged in the Custom House, they shall be sold for the satisfaction of the

*Custom House Regulation.*

Government claims, the duties and charges shall be deducted from the amount, and the balance of money, if any, paid, to the owner.

14. Where goods are passed on deposit, the original Invoices or Books shall remain in the Custom house and shall not be re-delivered till all accounts of duty are finally adjusted, and when there are no Invoices and the deposit is to be regulated by the Provisions of the Clause No. 5 the Owner or Consignee must give his assent in writing to the Valuation as thereby directed, previous to the deposit being received.

15. A Drawback shall be allowed on the re-exportation of all articles, with the exception of grain, equal to the amount of the Import duties, provided such articles shall be exported by the original Importer, and no other, within four months of their Importation.

16. All applications for Drawback to be made in writing to the Comptroller General or Deputy Comptroller or in their absence the Collector of Customs, and to be accompanied by a Certificate verified on oath agreeably to the form in Schedule A.

17. Provided however, that no Drawback shall be allowed on the re-exportation of articles, forming only a part of the package in which they were imported, or on any package which may not be entire and corresponding in marks and numbers as when imported, nor shall any Claim to drawback be admitted on goods under the value of 500 Rix Dollars, such value to be ascertained by reference to the original entries of the goods in the books of the Custom House.

18. No goods, subject to duty, shall be landed or shipped before 6 o'clock in the morning, or later than 6 in the Evening, but personal Baggage to the extent of Two Trunks and two Parcels and no more, for each person, shall be permitted to pass at all convenient hours on being duly searched.

19. No goods intended for exportation shall be lodged in the Custom House till the duties are paid, or allowed to remain there longer than three days, without the express permission of the Custom Master.

20. All Imported goods, save and except such as are in deposit, which are not removed from the Custom house within the term of 7 days shall be charged with Warehouse Rent agreeable to the rates specified in Schedule B.

21. Goods imported for re-exportation however may be landed by the Importers or Purchasers of them and lodged in the Custom Houses of Colombo, Galle or Trincomalee, or in Private Warehouses under the seals of the Officers of the Customs, and may remain, so deposited, for four months, such goods to be liable to no other charge than that of rent for Ware-house room at reasonable rates.

22. Provided however that the Merchant so landing and lodging such

goods shall declare in writing signed with his name, his intention of re-exporting the same, and deliver such declaration containing an exact specification of the articles to the Custom Master within three days after landing the same, otherwise such goods shall not be entitled to any such privilege.

23. *Provided always that if after making such declaration and lodging such goods for re-exportation, the owner thereof may desire to enter the same for importation he may be permitted so to do on payment of twenty five per Cent on the established Import duties.*

24. All wearing apparel ready made for private use which shall be brought by & with, and shall be truly and bonâ fide the property, and intended for the wear, of any of His Majesty's Servants, Civil, Naval or Military and their families accompanying them, or the Servants, Civil, Naval or Military of the Honble the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies and their families accompanying them shall be allowed to pass duty free.

25. *Provided always that it be lawful for the Comptroller or Deputy Comptroller of the Customs, or Custom Master at the Port where such wearing apparel may be landed, if they shall see occasion so to do, to require from the owner of such wearing apparel, a declaration in writing upon his Honor that the same are truly and bonâ fide intended for his use or that of his family as aforesaid.*

26. All articles consigned to any Officer of a Public Department in Ceylon, and being the Property of the Crown are to be passed duty free on the Public Officer, to whom they are consigned, delivering to the Custom Master a List of the articles, and certifying at the foot thereof that they are bonâ fide Public Property.

27. It shall not be lawful for any Ship or Vessel to leave any Port in this Island without a Port Clearance, and if the Commander or Principal Person in charge of any Ship or Vessel, shall presume to depart without a Port Clearance, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and be punishable by fine, not exceeding Fifty Rix Dollars and Imprisonment not exceeding two Months on conviction before any Sitting Magistrate in whose Jurisdiction such Person afterwards shall be found.

28. All goods which shall be transhipped in Port without the previous permission of the Comptroller or Collector of Customs or which shall be shipped on board of any other Vessel than that for which they have been passed at the Custom House, shall be liable to Confiscation or to treble the amount of duties at the discretion of Government.

29. Charges of Anchorage to be paid by the different classes of Merchant Ships and Vessels anchoring in the Ports of this Island shall be according to the annexed Schedule C. and it is declared

and enacted that the Port Clearance shall be the proper and the sole sufficient Voucher to authenticate the Payment of the said dues.

30. The exportation of the Island Coinage is strictly prohibited, and it is further enacted, that any Silver or Copper Money, the coinage of the Island, exported or attempted to be exported exceeding in value Ten Rix Dollars of Silver, or five Rix Dollars of Copper Money shall be confiscated.

31. The exportation of Cinnamon in any quantity exceeding 10 Pounds, being bona fide for the Vessels use and the exportation of Tobacco of the description commonly called the Travancore assortment, are prohibited without the Licence of Government to that effect, under the penalty of *confiscation of such Cinnamon or Tobacco, and a fine of Three Hundred Rix Dollars for every pound of Cinnamon and Fifty Rix Dollars for every pound of such Tobacco attempted to be exported.*

32. The Importation of the following articles without a special licence from Government is prohibited, namely Salt petre, Sulphur, Gun Powder, Lead, Ammunition and Arms.

33. All such articles which shall be landed without such licence shall be Confiscated.

34. All Goods subject to duty exported from any Port of this Island shall be entered in the Port Clearance or in default thereof shall be liable to Confiscation.

35. Every Commander or Principal Person in charge of a Ship or Vessel who shall be proved to have been privy to any act which by the foregoing Clauses subjects the Goods to Confiscation as aforesaid, shall himself be subject to pay a fine equal to the value of the Confiscated Goods.

36. That it shall be lawful for any Revenue Officer having a Warrant under the hand of the Comptroller or Deputy Comptroller, or in their absence of the Custom Master for that purpose, from time to time, and as often as may be necessary, to enter on board any Merchant Ship or Vessel, being within the limits of any Port of this Island, to search for prohibited Goods, or for any Goods liable to pay duties on Exportation, but which may be shipped without such duties having been paid, and there to remain during the stay of such Ship or Vessel in the Port or for such period as may be thought necessary for preventing any illegal proceedings.

37. That all Persons shipping or landing any Goods hereby prohibited or on which the duties shall not have been paid or receiving the same on board, or on shore or in either situation ob-

structing or molesting any Revenue Officer in the execution of his duty or bribing or offering to bribe any such Officer, or knowingly assisting in any such acts, shall on conviction thereof before the next Sitting Magistrate be liable to fine not exceeding 50 Rix Dollars and Imprisonment not exceeding 2 months according to the nature of the misdemeanor, and the Goods so attempted to be shipped or landed shall be liable to Confiscation.

38. Any servant of the Custom House convicted of receiving a present, free or gratuity *directly or indirectly from the Owner, Merchants, Master of a Vessel or any other person concerned in importing or exporting goods* under any pretence whatever shall instantly be dismissed from his office— and any Person who shall give such information as may lead to the discovery of any such proceeding shall receive a reward in the proportion of one fourth of the monthly salary of the offender.

39. All persons giving information which may lead to the discovery of any breach of these Regulations, shall be entitled to one third of the property confiscated, provided the Person seizing such property or giving such Information as aforesaid shall not be either Sitting Magistrate or Custom Master of the Port wherein the offence is committed.

40. No Confiscated goods above the value of 50 Rix Dollars shall be sold without the previous sanction of the Comptroller General or Deputy Comptroller of Customs.

41. That in carrying the present Regulation into effect, and in all matters of detail falling under the Provisions of the same, the Comptroller, Deputy Comptrollers, Custom Masters, and all other Officers whom it may concern, shall be guided by such Instructions as shall from time to time be established by authority of Government.

42. Every part of any former Regulation or Order which contradicts the Provisions of this Regulation is hereby repealed.

# REGULATION OF GOVERNMENT

*For establishing certain Rules for the business of the Ports and Harbours of Colombo, Point de Galle and Trincomalee and settling the rate of Port Charges and Prices of labour in the said Ports & Harbours.*

WHEREAS it is become necessary to establish certain rules and to settle the rate of Port Charges and the Prices of labour in the Ports and Harbours of Colombo, Point de Galle and Trincomalee.

His Excellency the Governor is pleased to enact and declare, that the rules, rates and Charges set forth in the three Schedules heretunto annexed be observed in the said Ports and Harbours respectively, and all persons concerned are hereby directed to conform themselves, and be obedient thereto, and the several Courts of justice and Magistrates, and all other His Majesty's subjects in and throughout His Majesty's Settlements in the Island of Ceylon, are hereby strictly charged and commanded to observe and enforce the same.

Every former Proclamation or order, which contradicts this regulation is hereby repealed.

## RULES AND ORDERS.

*For the Business of the Port of Colombo.*

### FOR VESSELS &c.

1s. All square rigged Vessels, Sloops and Schooners must employ the Boats attached to the Master Attendant's Department for the landing or shipping of their Cargoes or any part thereof and no other.

2d. As the Government Boats will not be sufficient for such purpose, the Master Attendant is to license a certain number of

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*Colombo Port Charges.*

Country Boats (called Battels) to ply to and from Vessels &c. for landing and shipping their Cargoes, these Boats are to be numbered & registered and Crews thereof subject to the Orders of the Master Attendant—Two thirds the hire chargeable for such Boats shall go to the Owners for themselves and crew and the remaining one third to Government.

3rd. Any Country Boat not licenced as above described, plying to square rigged Vessels, Sloops or Schooners for the purpose of landing or shipping any Merchandize, shall immediately be seized and on due conviction thereof for the first offence the whole Boat hire chargeable for use of such Boat by the Port rates shall become forfeited to Government, and for every subsequent offence three times the amount.

4th. Coast Dhonies may land and ship their Cargoes without using the Boats attached to the Master Attendant's Department paying for License for that purpose at the rate of one Rix Dollar the Garce.

5th. Cingalese Dhonies without Out Riggers commonly called Coolah Dhonies may land and ship their Cargoes at the established places free of all charge. No Dhonies however can be permitted to lay alongside the wharf for the purpose of loading or discharging Cargo without a permit in writing from the Master Attendant for which they are to pay in the instance of Arrack at the rate of six Fanams the Leaguer and for other Goods Twenty Rix Dollars the Cargo.

6th. The full hire of each Boat is to be paid for every day it is employed either in receiving or discharging Cargo.

7th. No Boats are to be employed in the landing or unloading of Vessels on Sundays, Christmas day and Good Friday, except in cases of emergency, when double hire is to be charged for the Boats so employed.

8th. Boats going off after sun set to be charged half more than the usual hire.

9th. Persons applying for Boats and not using them are to pay half the hire of such Boats.

10th. The Boatmen belonging to the Master Attendant's Department are not to be employed on Board any Vessels by the Commander or Officers of such Vessels.

11th. No goods are to be landed or shipped but at the wharf without a License from the Custom Master under penalty of confiscation.

12th. No Ballast to be thrown overboard but lauded and deposited in a place to be pointed out by the Master Attendant.

*Colombo Port Charges.***MASTER ATTENDANT'S DUTY.**

1st. He is on the application of Masters or Supercargoes of Vessels to provide them with Boats for the landing or shipping of their Merchandize with the least possible delay.

2d. He is to take care that all Goods liable to Custom House duties, are landed at the wharf, unless special permission be granted by the Custom Master for their being landed elsewhere.

3d. He is daily to give certificates to the Owners or Tindals of the licenced Battels or Country Boats of their service during each day and upon their production of those certificates every Saturday at his Office he is to settle with them for their share of Boat hire respectively.

4th. He is at the same time to settle with the Pilots for their share of Pilotage.

5th. He is not to give any credit for the Port Fees and Charges, if he does, it is at his own risk.

6th. He is not to countersign the Port Clearance granted by the Custom Master to any Vessels, until every demand has been settled in the current money of Ceylon, for Boat hire and every other Port charge.

7th. He is to keep regular accounts of the sums he receives during each month for Pilotage of Merchant Vessels, Boat hire, & other Port charges, and transmit the same attested to the Collector of the District on the 1st of the succeeding month.

8th. He is to pay the receipts of his department on the 28th of each month to the Collector of the District, taking that Officer's acknowledgement in duplicate, for the amount and forwarding the original to the Commissioner of Revenue.

9th. He is to keep a regular List of all Vessels arriving and departing with their Passengers, Lading and Tonnage, according to a prescribed form, he is to send a report of arrivals and departures as they occur, to his Excellency the Governor, the Chief Secretary to Government, the Comptroller General of Customs and the Commandant of the Garrison.

**OFFICERS AND SERVANTS OF THE MASTER ATTENDANT'S DEPARTMENT.**

1st. The Boatmen and other Servants attached to the Master Attendant's Department must obey the legal orders of their Superiors, relative to the discharge of their duties on pain of punishment, to be inflicted on them on conviction before the Magistrate of the Port, not exceeding two months imprisonment, 100 Rix Dollars fine and fifty lashes.

*Colombo Port Charges*

They are not to take or receive directly or indirectly any Fees or gratuity, if found offending herein to be dismissed and liable to punishment as aforesaid. The Pilots however in addition to their pay are to be allowed one half the specified rate of Pilotage for each Vessel they Pilot into the Roads or Harbour.

The attendance of the Boatmen and other servants belonging to the Department to be from six o'clock in the morning, till six in the evening.

A Head Boatman however is to remain constantly at the Beach House, day and night, and a Boat's Crew to be on Duty at night, in case of any Vessel requiring immediate assistance.

A Printed Copy of these rules and orders, and of the fixed rates of Boat Hire and Port Charges, is to be placed in the most conspicuous part of the Custom House and Master Attendant's Office for the information of the public.

All Vessels lying in Backbay are to come to an Anchor within 7 Fathoms water, beyond that depth double boat hire will be charged.

No goods are to be landed or Shipped but near Mr. Neil's house in the Inner harbour, at present occupied as the Cutchery of the District and by the Custom House in Backbay without License in writing from the Custom Master under Penalty of Confiscation.

Vessels are only permitted to land cargoes in Backbay between the first of April and the 25th of October in each year, during the North East Monsoon they must land their Cargoes in the Inner Harbour at the place above pointed out.

# REGULATION OF GOVERNMENT

*Present*

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

A. D. 1817.

*Regulation No. 1.*

*For lowering the Custom Duties in the Port of Trincomalee.*

**W**HEREAS it is deemed advisable to give encouragement to the resort of Shipping and the influx of Trade to the Port of Trincomalee by lightening in regard to that Port, the Export and Import Duties at present chargeable throughout His Majesty's maritime Settlements in this Island.

In order thereto it is hereby enacted that from and after the First day of January 1817, Goods brought in any Vessel arriving from any Port in Europe or America—and goods of the growth or manufacture of China or any part of the East Indies coming direct from the places of the growth or manufacture, or the ports at which in the ordinary course of trade they are originally exported—shall upon importation at the Port of Trincomalee be liable to one half of the duties now payable thereon and no more.

And it is further enacted and declared that the Port of Bombay shall for the purposes of this regulation be deemed and taken to be a Port of original export for goods of the growth or manufacture of the Countries bordering on the Persian Gulph and the Red Sea.

And that the Ports of Calcutta and Madras shall for the like purpose be deemed and taken to be Ports of original export for goods of the growth and manufacture of all the Countries, Settlements and Islands to the Eastward of the bay of Bengal, save and except China.

And whereas it is expedient to extend for a certain period the benefit of this remission to other descriptions of goods imported intermediately through the port of Madras.

It is further enacted for the purposes of this Regulation, that the port of Madras shall until the thirtieth day of April 1818 and no longer, be deemed and taken to be a Port of original export for goods of the growth or manufacture of Europe or America—and shall until the thirtieth of September next and no longer be deemed and taken to be, a port of original export for goods of the growth or manufacture of the Cape of Good Hope, the Island of Mauritius, China and the Countries bordering on the Persian Gulph and the Red Sea and shall until the thirtieth day of

June next be taken and deemed to be such port of original export for goods of every other Country.

And it is hereby enacted that goods imported into the said Port of Trincomalee under this Regulation shall upon re-exportation beyond the District of Trincomalee for the purposes of trade—whether by Sea or land carriage—be liable to the duties hereby remitted, Reserving however in the instance of reshipment for Exportation by Sea, all benefit and privilege provided for such cases by certain Clauses contained in the Regulation No. 9, of the year 1815, respecting Custom Duties in like manner as if this Regulation had not been made, which Clauses are as follow.

CLAUSE NO. 21 REGULATION NO. 9, A. D. 1815.

*“ Goods imported for re-exportation however, may be landed by the Importers or Purchasers of them and lodged in the Custom Houses of Colombo, Galle, or Trincomalee or in Private Ware Houses under the Seals of the Officers of the Customs, and may remain so deposited for four months, such goods to be liable to no other Charge than that of rent for warehouse room at reasonable rates.*

CLAUSE NO. 22, REGULATION NO. 9 A. D. 1815.

*“ Provided however, that the Merchant so landing and lodging such goods shall declare in writing signed with his name his intention of re-exporting the same, and deliver such declaration containing an exact Specification of the Articles to the Custom Master within three days after landing the same, otherwise such goods shall not be entitled to any such privilege.*

And for the further encouragement of the said district of Trincomalee it is hereby enacted that all goods being truly of the growth or manufacture of the said district, which, by due proof made upon oath to the satisfaction of the Deputy Comptroller or Collector of the Customs at Trincomalee shall appear to be Returns for goods imported under this Regulation, shall upon exportation be subject to one half of the duties now payable on exporting such goods and no more.
