PM MUST ACT 19056

The ruling of the special Trial-at-Bar Coup Court that it did not have the power to try the detenus, because the nomination of the Judges by the Minister of Justice was bad, has created a situation which calls for united, firm and decisive action by the Government and the progressive forces which cannot stand idly by at a juncture like this. So many mistakes have been made by the Government, particularly in the legal sphere, that it cannot afford to make any more mistakes, and for this reason the widest possible consultation is essential.

However necessary it is to draw the proper inferences from the situation that has arisen regarding persons and the advice tendered by them, it would be unwise to inhibit action with I-told-you-so and therefore do-nothing attitudes, or indulge in a postmortem about how it had all happened.

As we see it, the Government has to go before Parliament to rush through a new amending Bill to which objection cannot be taken on legal grounds, or file a plaint in the Magistrate's Court according

to the ordinary processes of the law. The special circumstances of the coup which had necessitated certain provisions and amendments in the criminal law would not be applicable if the suspects are bought before the Magistrate's Court.

Whilst the legal tussle goes on, the ordinary people are getting impatient that the trial of the coup suspects is getting inordinately delayed. The common people want to know just what the whole thing is about. And people also feel that the sooner the real trial is started the better. If the suspects are guilty, they should be dealt with. If they are innocent, they should be released.

But it must be also stressed that the people as a whole would be furious if the suspects

get away scot free on legal or technical objections, or because the existing criminal laws, as they stand, provide certain loopholes which can be utilised by subversive elements who want to destroy governments through coup d'etats.

Case

The result of attempts to save subversive elements and dangerous coup suspects from trial by legal objections has led in other countries to popular insistence on summary trials in People's Courts where the principles of the Anglo-Saxon concept of rule of law were not observed.

In this situation, the people are hoping that the Prime Minister would herself look into the whole matter and act after obtaining the best advice from every possible quarter which is interested in safeguarding the government.

Headlines of the Week

[A summary of some of the principal items of news in the dailypapers in the English language published in Colombo, September 24th to September 30th].

MONDAY, September 24

The speaker Mr. R. S. Pelpola has decided to give per-mission for the holding of a "pirith" ceremony in he ceremony in he House of Representatives. Finance Minister C. P. de Silva is to appoint a new Import Control Policy Committee to advise on the imports into the country. A "Grow More Food" campaign is to be launched by the Ministry of Agriculture, Lands, Irrigation and Power. Reports from New Delhi state that sporadic firing between Indian and Chinese troops is continuing on the North East frontier, Mr. Nehru has cancelled his visit to Accra at the request of the Ghana Government. President Ayub Khan of Pakistan is to meet President Kennedy of the United States for informal wide-ranging talks—the meet-ing will take place at Rhode Island. Mr. A. S. Suhrawardy, a former Prime Minister of Pakistan, has received over-

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whelming support for his move to form a broad-based National Front to work for a fully democratic constitution for the country. In Cairo President Nasser is expected to announce major changes in government organisation.

TUESDAY, September 25

A Bill to amend the Bribery Act has been tabled in the Senate by Justice Minister Sam P. C. Fernando. In Cairo, President Nasser has announced that Commander Aly Sabry will be the head of an executive council-it is understood that the executive will act as a Cabinet and the W/Com. Sabry will carry out the duties of Prime Minister. In Aden, riots have broken out against Britain's proposal to link Aden with the eleven-state South Arabia Federation. Talks between Presidents Ayub Khan and Kennedy ended with a communique pledging close alliance between Pakistan and the United States. In Argentina, the Argentine Navy has pledged support to President Jose Guido after last week's military and political crisis. West German Foreign Minister Dr. Gerhard Schroeder has said the Common Market countries should give top priority to their negotiations on Britain's application for membership. Switzerland too has applied for membership in the Common Market, on condition she could retain her neutral state. In Ghana more troop reinforcements have been brought into Accra. At the United Nations, Guatemala's Foreign Minister charged that Soviet "occupamala's charged that Soviet Occupa-tion forces" had taken over control of Cuba from its Prime Minister Dr. Fidel Castro. In Lagos (Nigeria) police have arrested fifty per-

Bandaranaike. In the Senate, referring to the European Common Market, Justice Minister Sam Fernando said "the Government of Ceylon is of the view that considerable progress has been made towards obtaining the economic safeguards we seek for our primary products." At a meeting of the Socialist Society of the University of Ceylon, Peradeniya, a resolution was unanimously adopted to "send the Peace Corps back to their country. It is a crime to pay them salaries out of public funds." In Algeria, M. Ferhat Abbas was elected President (Speaker) of the country's first national assembly. In Cuba, Prime Minister Fidel Castro said that the Soviet Union planned to build a major port in Cuba to serve as a base for its Atlantic fishing fleet. Ex-Civil Servant Ronnie de Mel at a RDS meeting has said "corruption is now rampant. After the "pirith" ceremony in the House of Representatives, the Ven Henpitagedera Gnanaseeha in his sermon said: "it was his belief that demons and evil spirits which had taken possession of some of the Parliamentarians have now left them in view of

this dena and pinkama." The MP for Galle Mr. Dahanayake said "I consider this speech a breach of privilege. The dena should never have been allowed." Health Minister Jayasuriya has observed that there are only 1,190 doctors in Ceylon to cater to the health and well-being of a growing population of ten million people. Official sources in New Delhi say that the Indian Government is determined to see that the Chinese intruders are dislodged from Indian territory. America's House of Representatives overwhelmingly approv-ed President Kennedy's "Fight if we must" resolution on Cuba—while the State department announced that a close watch will be kept on Soviet construction of a "Fishing Port" in Havana harbour. Tenku Abdul Rahman, Malayan Prime Minister, has warned Indonesia to keep its hands off the forthcoming formation of Malaya, Singapore and three British Borneo territories into the Federation of Malayasia. And the Phillipines are claiming ownership over North Borneo.

In Lagos, Nigeria, Mr. Nehru has said the Commonwealth was a "fluid institution and would probably continue even if Britain joined the European Common Market. Felix Dias Bandaranaike has resigned as Parliamentary Secretary to the Prime Minister and Minister of Defence and External Affairs.

FRIDAY, September 28

Permanent Secretary Alva-pillai who returned to the Island from Burma has reported that the rice negotiations with the Burmese Government were "very successful". The Ministry of Commerce and Trade anticipated a foreign exchange saving of Rs. 20 mil-lion if the Petroleum Corporation imports the total quantity of the country's petroleum requirements. The vote of No-confidence in the Minister of Local Government and Housing is' to be taken up in the House on October 11. Mr. U. B. Weerasekera, Parlia-

At the United Nations, Britain's Foreign Secretary Lord Home told that General Assembly that everybody knew that India was being subjected to aggression. Yemen's national radio reported that a revolutionary army had "destroyed" the monarchy and proclaimed the desert kingdom a "free republic". In Algeria, Ahmed Ben Bella has accepted a mandate from the Algerian Assembly to form a government and become independent Algeria's first Prime Minister.

BUDGET DEFICIT FORUM

BALANCE OF PAYMENTS

Mr. Felix Dias Bandaranaike said thus in his Budget speech on the 26th July 1962: "The possibilities of further reductions in import outlays have already been severely limited by the drastic restriction of imports of the non-essential or less essential category. There are hardly any items left in this category on which further restrictions for the purpose of saving foreign exchange could be imposed.

The elimination of the deficit in the Balance of Payments must, therefore, depend largely on an increase in export earnings or foreign loans to Ceylon."

The advisers to the Finance Ministry, whether it be the Central Bank, the Import & Export Departmenst, or Treasury, know only to go with the begging-bowl or hit the poor masses. An increase in export earnings in tea & rubber is a mere dream as many countries including Argentina are growing tea, and rubber is being replaced with synthetics.

What could we do then?

In 1961; Ceylon imported Rs.172,248,493/- in textile, yarn, fabrics, made-up articles and related products and Rs.33,367,174/in clothing. We have started a textile mill in Veyangoda and in practically every part of the island there are textile-weaving centres. Why cannot we ex-change our low country tea for Sudan cotton? I recapitulate the Imports from and Exports to the Republic of India for the past 5 years:-

1957 Rs.226,068,000/- Rs.49,817,00/-1958 220,278,000/- 37,247,000/-1959 246,536,000/- 53,139,000/-1960 269,405,000/- 34,727,000/-1961 206,821,000/- 36,361,000/-

Rs1168,108,000. Rs211 291,000.

Whereas for 5 years the whereas for 5 years the imports from the Republic of India amounted to Rs. 1168,108,000/-, the ex-ports amounted to only Rs. 211,291,000/- showing a deficit balance of payment of Ps. 056 807 000/ the General Rs. 956,807,000/-. Is a financial wizard necessary to demonst-rate that our trade with India should be only on a reciprocal basis?

All the newspapers of South India including the Magazine "Kalki" are dumped on this country. Should these be not stopped forthwith in order save exchange. Your paper has spotlighted that Radio Ceylon does propaganda for Indian films and whether exchange has been received by this country. Should this matter not be probed and our dues recovered?

Why should all these Indian films be allowed to be dumped on our country? If trade is done with the Republic of India on a reciprocal basis, our Balance of Payments trouble is solved. Mahatma Gandhi stopped the flow of British textiles by asking the people to dress the home-spun stuff although it was coarse. Why should not we do the same?

A large sum in foreign exchange is involved in the import of the back-issues of newspapers to this country. This trade is wholly in the hands of Nadars and Indians. Why should not the govern-ment stop the import of this item ?

Ratwatte

In 1961, Machinery other than electric, for Rs. 107,223, 283/-, Electric Machinery. apparatus and appliances for Rs. 45,026,253/- and Transport Equipment for Rs. 82,788, 355/- were imported. Are all these necessary for a people who cannot afford to buy a measure of rice for -/25 cents? For whose benefit are Air-conditioners and such apparatus imported? Surely not for the benefit of the masses in whose name governments are elected. When private people owned buses, they made full use of the bus When before they went in for new chassis, thus conserving foreign exchange. What is happening now? Let the government open wide its eves.

The ex-Minister of Finance together with the entire Cabinet wanted to "hit" the stomach of the masses who elected this government with the help of the Leftists. The Member for Balangoda, Mr. C. S. Ratwatte, explained in plain language which the electors could understand, not in the jargon of the Central Bank economists, how foreign exchange could have been saved in the matter of rice.

He said, " If land had been given, and people have been asking for land for many years, the peasants could have produced the food. People have been asking for land for the last so many years. We backbenchers have been fighting on their behalf, and when they applied for land, the stereotyped reply they got was 'Wait for Land Kachcheries.' When the peasants ask for land we are told that Middle Class Colonisation Schemes will be started. But it is not the Middle Class that can produce food, it is the village peasant"



much on grandiose schemes and waiting with open arms to receive from the World Bank and other organisations and which sometimes may not even come. Instead of that I would advise the Hon. Minister to concentrate more on smaller village irrigation schemes which take less time to construct and yield better results. Some of these schemes have been abandoned. We have been constantly pointing that out at D.A.C. Meetings and so on but they have turned a deaf ear.

He further said, "I would request the Hon. Minister concerned to stop the importation of onions if there is an excess of this commodity in Ceylon. This will help us in two ways, firstly the cultiva-tors will be able to market their produce, secondly, it will conserve foreign exchange, which we are trying to do."



Mr. Felix Dias Bandara-naike said, "The Government of Ceylon had every right to make these two borrowings. It is correct that generations yet to be born should be mortgaged to take loans bemortgaged to take loans be-cause they have a right. In 1961 and February 1962 Rs. 107.6 million have been taken on a 3 to 5 year pay-ment on an interest of 5¹/₄ amounting to Rs. 5,850,000/-per annum. In 5 years, interest alone would amount to Rs. 29.2 million: For whose benefit were these two loans raised from the International Monetary Fund? By no stretch of the imagination for the benefit of the vast millions who live in huts and shanties and under leaking roofs.

Dr. E. M. V. Naganathan, in analysing the External Assets of Rs. 545.2 million, has shown that only Rs. 100 million or $\pounds T_2^1$ million remain after deducting for commitments. Why should not the government take the help extended from Socialist countries whose one aim is release from their economic-bondage ex-colonial countries which are even now threatened by a neo-colonialism of Associate Membership of the European Common Market?

The government must be able to distinguish its friends.

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If there was no pact with the Leftists in July 1960, when the unshakable left vote was cast in favour of the S.L.F.P. candidate where no left candidate contested—if there was no pact, they would have contested S.L.F.P. candidates and what was there to prevent the U.N.P. winning? If we are self-sufficient in our clothing then the necessity for foreign currency does not arise. Forty vears ago the people of Ceylon were less dependent on foreign

SCHROEDER'S DOCTRINE **IS RIBBENTROP'S**

Blitz

I have asked for this intervied, Herr Winzer, in order to acquaint myself with your views on the so-called Schroeder Doctrine about which the Western press is making such an ado.

Herr Winzer

The press department of our Ministry has passed on your request to me. I am pleased to accede to it and have provided myself with documents which will some certainly also be of interest to Indian readers in evaluating the so-called Schroeder Doc-

Blitz

Thank you, Herr Winzer. I should like to proceed to my first question. What, in your view, should be understood under the so-called Schroeder Doctrine ?

Herr Winzer

The so-called Schroeder Doctrine, named after the Foreign Minister of the West German Federal Republic, is no more nor less than a varia-tion on the Hallstein Doctrine, by means of which the Bonn government takes the liberty of dictating to the Governments of non-imperialist countries the relations they are to entertain with the German entertain with the German Democratic Republic. The Bonn Foreign Minister now announces that a third state which takes part in bringing about a peace treaty with the German Democratic Republic will be committing an "un-friendly act" towards the Federal Republic, which will be treated accordingly. A West German newspaper has labelled the Schroeder Doc-trine an attempt "to force friendship with the first".

Blitz

Active opponents of Hitler such as yourself, Herr Winzer, do not number among the confidants of Foreign Minister Schroeder who, as a former SA man, was a fellow-traveller of Hitler. Nevertheless, per-haps you can tell us whether in the case of this so-called Doctrine, more is involved than a passing statement ?

Herr Winzer

So far as I am informed, the Bonn Foreign Office has made the so-called Schroeder Doctrine the subject of diplo-matic action, especially with the governments of non-aligned countries in Asia, Africa and Latin America. In the press organs of Herr Schroeder's party there has been talk in this connection that coun-tries such as Indonesia, Afghanistan, the United Arab Re-public, Brazil and Finland had received a "preliminary warning", discreetly a n d

through diplomatic channels, against participating in the signature of a German peace treaty. The "Industriekurier", a paper representing West German monopoly capital, wrote on August 16th 1962 that the BonniForeign Office had though it advisable "to give voice to this warning that is at a time when conclusion of a peace treaty is not yet a settled matter' As you see, the gentlemen in Bonn are in a positive panic about the conclusion of a Ger man peace treaty.

Blitz

This diplomatic activity in opposition to a peace treaty, despite the fact that no conference of states to take part in it has even been announced, is indeed surprising. This appears to me to be a curiosity even in the history of diplomacy.

Herr Winzer

The curious fact is that after a war to defeat and eradicate the Hitler regime, fellow-travellers of Hitler again occupy posts in the Govern-ment in Bonn and carry on Ribbentrop's practices in foreign policy. The mention of Finland in the CDU party press, that is the press of the Bonn Government party, re-minds me of the fact that in March 1943 Hitler's Foreign Minister Ribbentrop uttered the same warning to Mr. Ramsay, the Finnish Foreign Minister at that time, as Adenauer's Foreign Minister has uttered in 1962 to the non-aligned countries.

In 1943 public demands increased in Finland to end the war and reach a Finnish-Soviet peace settlement. Ribbentrop considered it necessary at that just as Schroeder does in 1962, to utter a "preliminary warning" to the Govern-ment of Finland. According to notes taken down by the special German Ambassador von Rintelen, Ribbentrop stated to Finnish Foreign Minister Ramsay on March 26th 1943 that :

"The Fuehrer is of the opinion that any response by the Finnish Government to the American offer to mediate

as treason to Germany, Finland's comrade in arms.. with all the resulting conse-quences....The Reich Government expects the Finnish Government to make a precise statement to the German Government that it will not conclude an armistice or peace with the USSR without the agreement of Germany.'

I have quoted the text of this note, which you will find in this volume of documents Ribbentrop's Foreign Office, "Geheime Reichssache - Finland", because it clearly indicates that the so-called Schroeder Doctrine is quite definite rooted in the evil spirit of fascist German imperialism Herr Schroeder takes the liberty of treating the Gov-ernments of neutral countries in exactly the same way as Ribbentrop once treated the satellites of the Third Reich.

In addition, "preliminary warnings" and threats of this nature were also uttered against the Governments of Hungary and Rumania at that time by Hitler's diplomats. A Putsch was even carried out in Hungary with active participation of Nazi diplomats for the purpose of preventing an armistice and a peace settlement, for which in 1944 even the "Reich administrator" Horthy and the Hungarian Government of that time under Lakatos were prepared. The present West German Ambassador in Sweden, Herr Werkmeister, was one of the Nazi diplomats who at that time pulled the strings in Rib-bentrop's headquarters to instigate the Putsch which obstruc-The Bonn Governted peace. ment is obviously making use of his experiences under the Nazi regime to influence the Scandinavian countries against a German peace settlement.

The cat can't give up mousing, as we say in German. I should like to point out that a Nazi does not give up threats and the use of force against other peoples, even if he drapes himself in peaceful and democratic garments, a habit which is considered good form is considered good form amongst Bonn's Nazis today.

Rlit'z

Of course this threat only expresses the fact that with its so called development aid the Bonn Government intends to deprive the neutral countries of their independence and their right of free decision in home and foreign policy. In this res-pect, too, Herr Schroeder is Ribbentrop's successor. In June 1944 Ribbentrop demanded in Helsinki, in accordance with a telegraphic directive from Hitler, that:

"A clear public statement on Finland's political attitude is to be obtained. If this clear statement (rejection of any peace settlement – O.W.) is not forthcoming, assistance to Finland will case."

The same people continue to use the same methods. The same anti-peace aims are to be achieved by means of the same threats. But even Hitler's and Ribbentrop's threats could not delay the final military defeat of the fascist German imperialists. No better prospect face the anti-peace policy of the Bonn Government. It is bankrupt and can no longer delay the conclusion of a German peace treaty. The German Democratic Republic will conclude it in any case.

If the non-aligned countries give in to the threats of the Bonn Foreign Minister they will also be placing themselves, quite unnecessarily, in danger of again losing their national independence, in most cases achieved with heavy sacrifices. This would be the first step towards renewed, neo colonialist dependence. Before permitting themselves to be frightened by the Bonn Government's threats they should recall that the West German economy cannot possibly renounce its foreign sources of raw materials and its markets abroad.

The so-called development aid is developing more and more into a weapon in the struggle by the imperialist powers for a share in what remains to them of the capitalist world market- The present economic and political situa-tion in the world is such that West German imperialism can no longer afford to isolate itself through rigid adherence to the Schroeder-Ribbentrop Doctrine. It will all the less be able to do this the more numerous the states are which support a German peace treaty and take the road to normali-sation of their relations to the German Democratic Republic,

THREAT TO PEACE

West German Militarism

GERMAN Fascism could throw the world into an incredible holocaust because of the mad desire of the monopolists to capture and subjugate the world and because of the strongly entrenched German militarists who considered no crime beneath their dignity. In cruelty and barbarity, the German General Staff has been scarcely surpassed by anybody in the world's long history.

Today, under the protective umbrella of the Federal Republic of Germany, the monopolies, battered in the war, are slowly gathering strength. And what of the militarists? Have they any feeling of remorse or regret for what they have done to the world? None whatsoever! In fact, they are securely in the saddle, and, instead of feeling and repentance for their barbarity, are rather trying to find out the 'mistakes' that led to their 'failure'. They are preparing rather energetically to bring in the doomsday, of course, but it remains to be seen, for whom?

Its Fascist Outlook

A striking fact about the West German General Staff today is its unrepented Hitlerite past. As many as 81 out of 140 Generals of present day West Germany were on the German General Staff at the conclusion of the War. Heusinger, former Operations Chief of the General Staff, is the principle architect of the West German army today. Spiedel, who was the Chief of the Western Armies Division in Hitler's days, now occupies the most influential position in the military organisation of West Germany.

As early as 1944, when the defeat of German arms was imminent, Von Stulpnagei, then Commander-in-Chief of the German forces in France, wrote a memorandum which, inter alia, said:

"No defeat is ultimate. Defeat is a lesson that must be learnt while preparing the next more powerful blow.

"Our defeat in the present war must be regarded merely as an unfortunate incident in Germany's victorious advance towards conquest of the world".

Indeed, an appropriate philosophy for the agents of death ! This, preparing for the "next powerful blow", was indeed a worthy ideal; as if the world had not had enough of war butchery and destruction. But the mad dream of capturing the world knows no limit!

More recently, in 1958, a book titled "Germany's Trump Cards" was published in West Germany. The author painted a lurid picture of a "victorious campaign in the East". How will this fascist army behave?

prepares for Says the author : "Acting as a fearful force, the army will break a road for itself through chaos, cries of horror and seas of blood". In a moment of

chaos, cries of horror and seas of blood". In a moment of delirium, the author rails to remember the long sad trek back of the armies from the East involving suffering and deaths to the German soldiers.

But the war-like intentions are transparent. And how was the book received in official circles? The Radio thought it was "the most significant publication". The West German Minister of Defence told that he had read the hate-song with "tremendous attention".

Theory of Quick, Decisive

Nuclear Attack

But still more recently, in July 1960, Colonel J. Krumpelt (a former member of Hitler's General Staff) wrote an article in the semi-official journal, *Die Wehrkunde*, in which he stated: The main job is to launch "an atomic assault on the enemy at the right moment". And: "In general, the first use of the atomic weapons is decisive. If the blow is dealt at decisive targets in the enemy camp, he will have no opportunity to reply at that stage of the battle with either atomic or conventional weapons".

The German Generals make no secret of the fact that they have in mind the Soviet Union. the German Democratic Republic, Czechoslovakia, Poland for attack. But they are not averse to fighting with the other European nations. The General Staff is extremely keen to avoid a "war on two fronts", the 'mistake' which cost Hitler the war and his life. But a strong Germany, out to enslave Europe, cannot escape a mili-tary combat with the Western nations. In fact, despite Hitler's raving campaign against the Soviets for years, his activities touched off a war with his reluctant Western enemies first; it was only later that he marched his troops into the Soviet Union. The German top brass has no love for any nation, Western or Eastern. It is interested in world domi-nation. It uses anti-Communist cover to hoodwink some Western politicians, who, it may be said, are too ready to be cheated.

In developing the theory of quick and decisive attacks, Hitler's successors are only sharpening his theory of Blitzkrieg. Today the Soviets have more powerful atomic and nuclear weapons which can deliver instantaneous blow to any enemy. How will a 'quick, decisive' atomic blow by the Soviets affect the German Generals? Secondly, how did Hitler's own theory of Blitzkrieg end in the simpler world of 1939-40? Did it give him success? But these German Generals are not concerned with the past or future; they want to live in their own paradise. And when their paradise is destroyed, they set about reconstructing it with ever greater cruelty and aggressiveness.

war

It is of interest to note the many steps the West German fascists are taking to give shape to their philosophy of aggression and war.

Concrete Plan for War of Conquest

The fascist top brass of West Germany has kept before itself five principal aims and is assiduously working to achieve them. The aims may be put in a capsule form as follows:

*To organise the strongest army in Western Europe.

*To supply the gendarmes of that army with latest weapons capable of mass-murder.

*To follow political and military policies, so as to reduce Western Europe and Africa as its sources of supply.

*To establish German supremacy in the NATO organisation and take it over from American hands.

*To prepare and execute concrete aggressive plans for the final adventure of world domination.

With these aims the West German army is being reorganised and remodelled. Even Hitler may learn a lesson from his smart boys!

The army in West Germany is being built at a tremendous rate. Its present size of 350,000 is only a temporary phase. It can be expanded at the shortest notice. A simple indication of this is that while Hitler had only 4000 officers, West German army will soon have 22 000! The nucleus is already strong and solid, the superstructure can be built in no time.

But a merely large army is not enough. It must be armed with nuclear weapons. It is already equipped with simple, American-supplied guided missiles. But it shortly plans to have from America the Polaris rockets with nuclear warheads.

The West German leaders are silently preparing to have an atom bomb of their own shortly. Consistent with this aim, atomic and rocket industries are receiving the most favoured treatment in West Germany. Thus within a short time the West German army threatens to be the best equipped atomic force at least in Western Europe.

German Troops 43 per cent of NATO Forces

The design of taking over control of NATO is not so woolly. Already West Germany supplies 43 per cent of NATO land forces. That is an enormous power inside the NATO. More recently, Heusinger was appointed Chairman of the NATO Permanent Military Committee in Washington. This gives him control over all NATO military planning. This is, needless to say, a coveted top post and its capture by the fascistic forces shows their strength in NATO circles. No wonder, they are banking on the fact that with effective control of NATO, its nuclear armaments stationed in Europe will naturally fall into their hands without much noise.

Thus slowly and silently they are working their way to get nuclear weapons and control of NATO.

West German military influence is not restricted to the German borders alone. The ambitious Generals of the twice-defeated army are slowly and silently arranging to get war-bases beyond their own country. And there are some old 'friends' who will help. The fascistic regimes are there. The West German authorities were having talks with the Spanish Government for use of air and rocket bases. Similarly, Switzerland was sounded on identical lines.

Portugal still has colonies in Africa. Portugal is ruled by dictator Salazar who makes no secret of his pro-fascist leanings. The West German leaders can naturally find no better ally who will offer 'military co-operation' both in Portugal and on African territory.

The West German authorities have already secured permission to build bases in Sardinia through the good offices of the Italian Government. Similar talks with Greek authorities are also started, and not without hope.

Besides, France, Norway, and England have agreed to give necessary facilities to the fascist rulers of West Germany.

These bases and 'military co-operation', believe the West German fascists, will enable them to establish firm control over Europe within a short time.

Further, German Navy is being refashioned on modern lines for aggressive purposes. Heusinger has given the command as early as on January 25, 1957. "The West German Navy must be built up as an offensive force. The fleet must attack and deliver its blow in the Baltic Sea."



The Communist regime is tearing down the last churches.


Observation:

RECOGNITION AN URGENT QUESTION

CEYLON&G.D.R.

An year ago today the writer had the privilege of publishing in the columns of the "Tribune" an account of the German Democratic Republic and its relations with Ceylon. Much has happened since, both in the German Democratic Republic and Ceylon, and in the world outside.


But the main question that was raised a year ago remains still unanswered. It has become necessary again to enquire why in the face of all the statements and pronouncements made by several responsible members of the Government, in the face of the undoubted declared views and intentions of the late Prime Minister S. W. R. Dias Bandaranaike himself, in the face of the acclaimed policy of the Government to pursue the Bandaranaike line, Ceylon has still not recognised the German Democratic Republic.

Almost two years ago, in November 1960, the former Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of External Affairs, Felix Dias Bandaranaike, replying to Pieter Keuneman had stated in Parliament as follows: "The problem of West Germany and East Germany has also been raised by the Hon. the Second Member for Colombo Central, and he made the point that if you are following a principle of nont alignment, indeed you oughto recognise the de facto exis tence of these German Republics. I should like to indicate here and now that there is no objection in the mind of the Government of Ceylon to such a recognition". What has happened to the "mind of the Government of Ceylon" since? Has it remained static for two long years?

Decisive

This is not a matter where one could suppose that somebody is trying to fool the German Democratic Republic. It is the people of Ceylon who are beginning to feel that they are being fooled. It is time for the Government of Ceylon to make a decisive move in the direction of implementing its own declared resolutions.

What or who is obstructing the Government fullfilling its own pledges? This is the question that is now causing anxiety among the friends and supporters of the present Government. During the course of the recent debate on the Budget, the Parliamentary Sec-

retary to the Minister of Defence and External Affairs has denied that the Federal Republic of Germany is placing any pressure on the Government to and lasting bond of friendship with the developing nations of Asia,Africa and Latin America on a basis of equality and reciprocity.

This is most reassuring news, although one finds it very hard to believe it knowing full well the ways and machinations of the present regime of the Federal Republic of Germany.

In April 1961 Gerhard Weiss, Deputy Minister of Foreign Trade in the German Democratic Republic, visited this country, and soon afterwards a Trade and Payments Agreement was signed between the German Democratic Republic and Ceylon. A careful study of the Customs Returns since April 1961 would show a rapid and amazing increase in the volume and variety of trade between the two countries. It had developed on a reciprocal basis, although at the time of writing the balance of trade stands very much in Ceylon's favour.

Coconut

At a critical time like this when we are doing our utmost to conserve our foreign exchange, it is heartening to note, that a country such as the German Democratic Republic has really come to our aid by being one of the largest purchasers of our Coconut Produce. Far from going with a begging bowl we have entered into a straight forward business relationship with the German Democratic Republic, and with our national self-respect and political independence unimpaired we can proudly acknowledge that this relationship is presently making a notable contribution to our national effort for economic recovery.

From the writer's own personal experience, it can be said that there is a genuine desire in the German Democratic Republic to build a permanent Republic in March 1962, Ceylon was represented for the first time, and the results achieved at this Fair had exceeded all expectations. A State Trading Enterprise in the German Democratic Republic had purchased on the spot, at this Fair, Ceylon Coconut Oil to the value of several million rupees, and from that time onwards there has been a steady flow of Ceylonese coconut products into the German Democratic Republic. On this score alone the Ceylon Government should hasten to accord non-discriminatory and equal political and diplomatic treatment to the German Democratic Republic as it is presently offering to the Federal Republic of Germany, whose purchases from Ceylon has progres-

sively decreased possibly because of commitments in the European Common Market. During the end of 1961 Max Sefrin, Deputy Prime Minister of the German Democratic Republic and its Minister of Health, led a Delegation to this country with a view to bringing about a closer relationship between Ceylon and the German Democratic Republic. Max Sefrin was cordially received by our Prime Minister in the same way as her husband Solomon Dias Bandaranaike had received the Parliamentary Delegation of the German De-Republic led by Dieckmann some mocratic Johannes time before Bandaranike's tragic death. Max Sefrin tendered a special message from his Governmeut and had hoped that before long, Ceylon would accord recognition to the Ger-man Democratic Republic. But this is still being delayed for no apparently accountable

Comment SARAH WOLVES LAKE HOUSE

* THE LAKE HOUSE PRESS has compelled us to comment editorially on a topic which is fit only for the gossip columns that deal with matters on the fringe. It is the story of Sarah de Vloo as presented by Lake House. On Sunday last, (30/9) Lake House's top circulation (ABC) English week-end paper, the Sunday Observer, had a front-page sensation about a Canadian girl, Sarah de Vloo. Her story was that she had "snubbed" bigshot Ceylonese wolves, and that her visa had therefore been cancelled and that she was being packed off like What was even worse was that the Sunday "criminal". Observer listed five of such wolves, who had invited her (indirect-ly) to bed, but whom she had "snubbed". What was significant about the items listed (persons) was that knowledgeable circles were able to identify the persons slandered immediately, and others who were not so well informed were provided with confidential news" in a blitzkrieg whisper campaign about who the persons were by the Lake House reporter who claimed to have secured this scoop for the paper. If Lake House were so certain of the facts and its capacity to prove them, it should have named the persons (although many journalists rightly believed that the story was prompted by a desire to force an investigation and thereby enable Sarah de Vloo to stay on longer in the island to help in the investigation. in the island to help in the investigations). The comments of Sarah de Vloo, as reported by the Sunday Observer, about the kind of "cads" Ceylonese middle-aged men were, the less said the better. The owners, directors, and the entire staff of Lake House (most of them middle-aged) should hang down their heads in shame for having carried on the front page of their paper this "interview" with a woman who should have been investigated by a Vigilance Society (even Balendra's, which foolishly following the Lake House lead wanted the "wolves" investiga-ted) Sarah de Vloo's complaint was that she was being turned out of the island because she would not "co-operate" with middle-aged Ceylonese bigshots. Did the Sunday Observer reporter, or the editorial chieftain who had interviewed her in the holy of holies, investigate whether there were Ceylonese, middle-aged and otherwise, whom she did not snub. Sarah de Vloo's activities and habits are not as material as the journalistic ethics of Lake House. This monopoly press was prepared to slander a whole nation in a last desperate attempt to keep this bundle of notoriety in Ceylon for sometime longer.

* Lake House, however, was not satisfied with this Sunday morning outburst. On Monday morning, the pretentiously staid Daily News not only repeated the Sunday Observer story on the front page but delivered itself of an editorial about "Wolves in Office" calling for an investigation into the complaint of Sarah de Vloo. If the Daily News were really stations about such investigations about such is also a such in the second serious about such investigations to cleanse public life of "wolves", then it should start by cleansing such life nearer home. The wolves in the newspaper offices of Lake House—what with massage clinics and market surveys?—are as much a part of the public life of this country as a Govt. M.P., an ex-police officer with a guest house out of Colombo, an officer in the C.I.D., a private investigator, and a senior civil servant. The only difference is that whilst the wolves in Lake House have national dailies to espouse the cause Sarah de Vloos', the wolves outside have no newspapers to carry on similar campaigns espousing the cause of females who are caught in the Lake House net through beauty contests, jobs and the like, by the wolves and cubs in Lake House.

* This disgraceful Lake House saga does not end with the Daily News. The Observer on Monday afternoon, 1/10/62, had a cheesecake shot of Sarah de Vloo on her bed "relaxing at home", on the front page with a story "I worked to pay my way". This interview knocked the bottom out of the entire Lake House story. She and her friend Alice Solochen, who had kept very much in the background and who had quietly slipped out when the visa was cancelled, had arrived in Ceylon as "tourists" and had extended their visas on the ground of "absorping the culture and life of Ceylon" on money which they were getting from abroad. But both of them had secured employment to "work their way" and which was consistent with the "stranded "work their way", and which was consistent with the "stranded in Ceylon as hitch-hikers story" which had been first put out in the newspapers in Ceylon. Many had thought that this "stran-ded" story was only a public invitation to the "wolves" in this country in the newspapers, in the public services and in political life. In her Monday interview, Sarah de Vloo had said in political life. In her Monday interview, Sarah de Vloo had said that she had worked at office of the Pakistan International Airways. The local boss of PIA, Haji Omar (the well-known), had sought to wriggle out of this employment business. A proper investigation, however, would show that the places where these "teachers" had worked whilst in Ceylon are in the orbit of political influences of a particular kind. The fact is that the activities of these "stranded globe-trotters" had created such a stink in political circles for the last two months that the Immigration & Emigration Department would have been arraigned if it had not taken prompt action to throw them out of the country as "undesirables". Biography

From 1949 to 1951 he worked for the U.S. Army Map Service and from 1951-53 served in the U.S. and in Germany in the Corps of Engineers, with the final rank of first lieutenant. He spent the years 1953-56 travelling in Europe and Asia and returned to India in 1958-59 as a Research Fellow of the Social Science Research Council. He joined the staff of the Depts. of South Asia Regional Studies and Geography and Industry of the University of Pennsylvania in 1960, with the rank of assistant professor.

Of course, there are people in Ceylon who would turn somersaults in order to tell the Americans what they like to hear, but Tribune is different in that it insists on its own. Ceylohese point of view and repeats them to all who are willing to listen. And Tribune is also willing to listen.

TOWARDS SOCIALISM



The German Democratic Republic is now engaged in a battle to reinforce the economic foundations of the state, to accelerate technical progress and a general advance.

It is difficult to overestimate the achievements of the people in the German Democratic Republic who in a brief period have advanced their country to eighth place in the world for industrial output and simultaneously reorganized agriculture along socialist lines. This would not have been an easy task even if the German Democratic Republic had the necessary raw material resources.

As it is, the work of industry and the supply of the population largely depend on imports. In 1960, the G.D.R. imported almost three-fourths of the coal and 40 per cent of the iron ore it needs, all the cotton, large quantities of wool, timber, cellulose and foodstuffs.

To cover the imports, the republic has to increase its exports. For this reason the latest metalworking machine tools and other equipment were at times exported instead of being used to replace obsolescent equipment. Delay in he renewal of plant naturally restricted the rise of labour productivity and production growth rates.

Moreover, prior to August 13, 1961, when the border with the capitalist world was open, the country was actually robbed by the West-German monopolies. Taking advantage of the artificially lowered rate in exchanging marks of the Democratic Republic for marks of the Federal Republic, their agents bought up high-quality manufactured goods and foodstuffs, carried these goods across the open border to West Germany at a huge profit. By all kinds of ruses, not excluding outright blackmail, they lured to West Germany specialists and skilled workers, on whose training the German Democratic Republic spent huge sums.

The damage thus inflicted on the economy of the German Democratic Republic amounted to at least 30,000 million marks. Had this sum been additionally invested in industry during the last 10 years, it would have been enough to renew its plant and make it highly efficient.

Swifty

The reorganization now under way aims to introduce new technology as swiftly as possible, above all in key industries such as coal, iron and steel chemical, electrical equipment and general engineering. The next stage will be a similar reequipment of the textile and other industries which directly satisfy the needs of the people.

But this involves another problem: the need to increase accumulations in industry. Bigger investments have to be made. In recent years when the open border impeded economic development the targets of the seven-year plan were not fully met. Instead of the planned increase in capital investments of 6,500 million marks in the first three years of the seven-year period, the actual increase was only 3,700 million.

To raise the share of the national income assigned for capital investments, even if it meant slowing up growth of the share going for consumption for a time, became an urgent task. Consumption of foodstuffs by the population in the G.D.R. is now approximately equal to that in the G.F.R. (and much more evenly distributed than in the G.F.R.). The consumption of manufactured goods has risen substantially in recent years. Consequently, a redistribution of the national income would not spell excessive "burdens" for the population, as claimed by the reactionary West-German press.

Re-equipment

The plan for 1962, approved by the People's Chamber in March, is fully in line with the task of consolidating the economic foundations of the G.D.R. Industrial production will rise by 5.8. per cent on the average and much higher in key branches. For example, the electrical industry will register an increase of 14.6 per cent and the engineering and building materials industries, 9.3 per cent. Such proportions will make it possible to undertake the re-equipment of industry. Many more modern machines manufactured in the G.D.R. will go for the renewal of plant in industry. Karl Mewis, Chairman of the State Planning Commission, pointed out in his report made in the People's Chamber on March 28 that this year, for example, 162 automatic circular multipurpose machines will be manufactured, as against 128 in 1961; 49 of them will be installed at plants in the republic. The output of automatic metalworking machine tools will be increased by 23 per cent. More than 4,000 new items and technological processes will be mastered this year. All this means the transition of industry to a qualitatively higher stage.

To accelerate scientific and technical progress, the large sum of 1,200 million marks is assigned for research work.

Light industry will increase output by 5.5 per cent. So far the renewal of fixed assets cannot be undertaken here and these branches continue to depend on raw material imports. Nevertheless, the output of consumer goods in big demand will rise considerably. For example, the production of women's and children's apparel will grow 10 per cent as compared with last year; refrigerators, 22 per cent; furniture, 9 per cent, etc.

On the whole, the stocks of consumer goods available for sale will increase by more than 1,000 million marks and amount to 49,000 million marks. The population will get 90,000 new flats this year.

Production

One specific feature of economic development this year is that the bigger production plan will be fulfilled without increasing the number of people engaged in the economy. This brings to the fore the task of raising labour productivity. In recent years the growth of labour productivity at times lagged behind the rise in wages. The proper proportions have to be restored. This year the plan calls for a 6.4 per cent increase in labour productivity with almost no change in the total wages bill. This will make it possible to reduce production cents by 2.2 per cent and obtain additional funds for capital investments. Other socialist countries, the Soviet Union in the first place, are rendering considerable assistance to the republic. The credits of 1,300 million marks given by the Soviet Union this year represent, as Walter Ulbricht said, a good initial position for further consolidating the economic foundations of the republic. Cooperation with other member countries of the Council of Mutual Economic Assistance, participation in the specialization of production all this facilitates the accomplishment of the tasks confronting the republic. But "everything else," Walter Ulbricht said, "depends on ourselves, our own efforts and an increase of our production."

Party and public organizations in the republic are now conducting an explanatory campaign among the masses to stimulate their initiative in bringing to light production reserves, making the best use of available new technology, and introducing new, technically justified quotas.

Thus, a movement is developing not only for higher output indices and the reorganization of industry, but also for a creative attitude by each worker to his job, for stimulating initiative and developing the new, socialist consiousness. A production mobilization (produktionsaufgebot) movement arose in the republic last September on the initiative of the workers of the Elektrokohle Factory in Berlin. The slogan of this movement is: "to produce more in the same time and for the same money." The personnel of the May 8 Engineering Works in Karl-Marx -Stadt supplemented it by the motto: "Think more profoundly, be economical, improve technology, work conscientiously." This article briefly sums up the progress made by the G.D.R. in the economic field. A peaceful democratic socialist German state is perhaps the greatest obstacle in the way of the revivalof Prussian militarism and the outbreak of a European war which will engulf the world in nuclear destruction.

Press

The press keeps the people constantly informed about the progress of the production mobilization movement. Here are some facts. Workers of 20 of the biggest industrial enterprises in Dessau succeeded in reducing by more than one million hours the working time called for by the production programme in the period from January 1 to May 20. Since the beginning of the year 1,838 workers' suggestions have been applied and they yield an annual saving of nearly three million marks. Miners and metallurgical workers in the Mansfeld nonferrous metals area topped the plan for labour productivity by 2.9 per cent in the first four months of this year, saved 0.3 per cent of the total wages bill and producd considerable quantities of copper, lead aud sulphuric acid above plan.

Workers and engineers are striving to improve technology. Here are some examples. At the Treptow Electrical Instrument Plant one woman worker painted 30 scales on measuring instruments in one shift. Designer Sielder and engineer Salewski proposed a method of printing the scales, sending up productivity to 1,000 scales

An Interview with HITLER

When the full moon plays upon the white nights of Berlin in summer time the macabre ruins of the Third Reich around the Brandenburg Gate and the Chancellory that was Hitler's become grotesquely alive. Here indeed is a setting Wagner could have conceived for his great NIBELUNGEN-LIED operas. Here stands the climax of his nostalgic GOTTERDAEMMRUNG, the twilight of those barbaric pagan gods of German mythology, transmuted into a terrible and terrifying reality. Here rises his Valhalla put to fire and ashes by Wotan in a typical Teutonic orgy of pre-determined self-ambition.

On a night such as this, West Berliners say, 'Hitler returns to his fata! Brandenburg bunker, where in 1945 the madman emulated Wotan and took Germany down in blood and flames with him : and plans with his dead Cabinet a Fourth Reich to reunite all Germany peoples in a greater Germany and reconquer the lost territories of the East for the master race.

And it was on a night such as this that, while returning from a visit to the Berlin Wall into which a hole had been blasted by a midnight explosion, I crossed the bunker of the Nazi GOTTERDAEM-MERUNG. It was a beautiful white night and the moon had focussed its fantasy upon the scene.

Ghost?

In the grass, behind the barbed wires surrounding the bunker, I saw something moving. Suspecting it could be the saboteur who had dynamited the wall, I called :

"Hi, there !"

"Heil Hitler!" answered a ghostly voice; and from behind a thicket emerged a a strange figure looking like a cross between Charlie Chaplin, Ayub Khan and Minoo Masani.

"Sorry, I am not Hitler," I protested.

"But I am !" he insisted.

"Glad to meet yon, Mr. Hitler," I laughed, "my name's Napoleon!"

"Now look here," he reported angrily, "this is no matter for joking!"

I looked—and Godamit, he was Hitler, every bit of him ! Somehow "the spirit of the Nibelungen" overcame me and I found myself talking to the ghost of Adolf Hitler. Here is a record of that fantastic midnight interview. K: Weil, Herr Hitler what the hell are you up to again? I mean, HELL!

- H: If that is not meant to be a rude question, young man, my answer is: CONTINU-ING MY WORK, COM-PLETING THE GLORI-OUS DESTINY OF GER-MANY, PLANNING THE FOURTH AND FINAL REICH.
- K: But aren't you supposed to be dead and gone?
- H: What a stupid question !
- But I suppose one must expect such imbecility from an inferior race like yours. It is difficult to explain to a blockhead that I, the Fuehrer of Germany, am not a mortal being whom death can destroy. I am the German nation, the Germanic spirit and culture. I was Fredrick the Great. I was also Bismarck, Kaiser and Hitler of course. Fichte a n d Hegel, Trietschke, Nietzsche and Wagner dwell in me. I am Siegfried and Kriemhiln, Brunhild and Hagen, Wotan...
- K: To cut it short, Mr. Hitler, you are simply a primitive Germanic myth!

H: Oh, you utter fool! Myth, you say? Don't you know that in mythology rest both the source and the destiny of a people?

Myth?

- K: That I can see all around in the destruction wrought by your mad fixation with Wotan and Wagner. You all but annihilated Germany. Was that the purpose and destiny of the Third Reich?
- H: The purpose of the Third as indeed the First and Second Reich was to make Germany strong, united, dominant and aggressive

THE SUPER-NATION OF THE MASTER RACE! And inspite of all your crazy old wives' tales of "destruction" and "annihilation," each succeeding Reich has brought the German people nearer that goal. It is only out of their baptism of blood and trials by fire that the German race shall emerge hard as steel and strong as granite to fulfill its godlike destiny.

K: By God, Sir, this is the most extraordinary explanation I have heard of two most humiliating German defeats in two successive wars!

land is very clearly mapped to include German territories taken by Poland. Czechosolovakia and Russia after we were stabbed in the back during the last war.



Four-Power Administration destroyed by the West

In their statement of August 23, 1962, the three Western Powers maintain that the abolition of the Commandatura of the garrison of the Soviet troops in Berlin allegedly violates the 4-Power statute of Berlin. In regard to this, Dr. Michael Kohl, head of the Department for Legal and Treaty Affairs at the GDR Ministry for Foreign Affairs, made the following statement :

A false assertion does not become true or more convincing by being repeated to satiety. The fact is that the latest statements on this question of the city commandants in the GDR, represents a necessary conclusion to the development in Germany and Berlin. The remilitarisation of West Germany and the in-corporation of this state into NATO went on parallel to the development of West Berlin into an outpost of this aggressive pact. Due to their unilateral breach of the anti-militarist directives of Yalta and Potsdam, the Western Powers lost all rights to refer to any subsidiary treaties of these basic agreements of the Anti-Hitler Coalition.

The Commandatura was controlled by the Allied Control Council

As an institution of the Allied Control Council the former 4-Power Commanda-tura was established for the joint administration of Berlin. This is clearly proved by the respective agreements of the former Allied Powers. Article a paragraph 4 of the agree 3, paragraph 4 of the agreement on the control institu-tions in Germany says, in the version of May 1, 1945, that "the administration of Greater Berlin with the help of the organs set up for this purpose the task of the Allied Control Council. To which organs this refers to was laid down in article 7 of the same agreement:

"An inter-allied government "An inter-allied government authority (in Russian: Kom-endature) will be established. The inter-allied government authority works under the general direction of the Control Council and receives orders from the Coordinating Committee."

In 1958

The fact the Allied com-mandatura was created as an institution of the Allied Cont-rol Council and was only authorized to coordinate the occupation policy in all of Germany in connection with Control Council activities, is stressed in the communique on a conference of representatives of the Allied Supreme Command on July 10, 1945. This says in part:

"The Commandatura works under the general supervision of the Allied Control Council for Germany."

United administration destroyed already in 1958

The Western Powers underlined in their declaration of August 23, 1962, that the former Commandatura was "part of the administrative machinery for Berlin". The major, leading part of this machinery was already destroy-ed in 1948 as the Western ed in 1948 as the western Powers sabotaged the Allied Control Council by disregard-ing existing treaties. Thereby the Allied Commandatura for Berlin, which was dependent on the Allied Control Council to remain effective, lost all legal basis for existence and all effectiveness by and through the economic and political policies of division followed by the Western Powers...

The Western Powers' attempt to justify their illegal occupation regime, created by their unilateral arbitrary measures in West Berlin, by placing it under the jurisdiction of the Ambassadors of the three Western Powers to Bonn, has nothing whatsoever to do with the decisions of the 4-Powers on all Germany and cannot justify any right or competence in regard to the German Democratic Republic including its capital.

Three Power Occupation Statute

The Western Powers them-selve have formally and judicially confirmed the end of the 4-Power statute on Berlin which they brought about themselves. On December 21, 1948, they established a sepa-rate commandatura for West Berlin and on May 14, 1949, they passed arbitrarily a so-called Three Power Statute for that part of the city they occupy in contradiction to international law. In the beforementioned statement by the Western Occupation Powers of December 21, 1948, it was also acknowledged explicitly also acknowledged explicitly that the newly created autho-rity, which was further illegally called "Allied Commanda-ture". "would only be able to earry out its decisions in the Western sectors". Therefore, even according to the wording of the former statements by the three Western Powers, it is not at all sure when, in their state-ment of August 23, 1962, the Western Powers maintain that the occupation troops in West Berlin would have the possi-bility to refer to the 4-Power statute of the first pre-war years.

The occupation regime which the Western Powers

arbitrarily created in West Berlin has nothing to do with the occupation machinery, formerly planned, not to speak of the occupation provisions set up at Yalta and Potsdam. Peace Treaty - Only possible

The former 4 Power Com-mandatura in Berlin, which was to serve the implementa-tion of the democratic, anti-militarist and anti-nazi direc-tives of the Potsdam Agree-

ment under the supervision of the Allied Control Council, and the 3-Power Commanda-tura in West Berlin, practically developed by the Western Powers into an institution of NATO, represent an un-surmountable contradiction. With full right the Govern-ment of the GDR emphasized ment of the GDR emphasized in its statement on the abolition of the Commandatura of the garrison of the Soviet troops in Berlin:

"Nobody can say that the aim of the anti-militarist and peace securing directives of Yalta and Potsdem was to create a stronghold of NATO in West Berlin which serves the West German and West Berlin extremists as a platform for their revanchist policy."

The USSR and the GDR acted in full accordance with the goals of fhe Potsdam Agreement when they rejected every attempt to use the remnants of World War II in the service of the imperialist policy of power and by clarifying the facts concerning the legal situation, they have opened the way for the conclusion of a German peace treaty and the peaceful solution of the West Berlin problem.

the wrong war; that's why they are fighting communism and helping Germany today. per worker in a shift. An automatic machine for assembling tubular miniature condensers has been designed at the Keramische Werke in Hermsdorf, enabling three workers to produce as much as twenty did before.

Many such examples are reported in the press. Each particular instance many sound simple, but behind it is a wealth of labour initiative and ingenuity, struggle of the new and the old, struggle against backwardness and in some cases also against the conservative attitude of managers.

The initial results of this movement are summed up in the figures of plan fulfilment for the first five months of this year, made public at the 16th Plenary Meeting of the Central

Committee of the Socialist Unity Party. Total industrial production rose 7. 8. per cent between January and May; the output of the electrical equipment industry increased more than 17 per cent and the engineering industry, nearly 12 per cent. Labour productivity grew 9.9 per cent. The plan for cutting production costs was overfulfilled. In other words, the development of industry is running somewhat ahead of the 1962 plan. Socialist agriculture too has made a good start this year. These facts fully refute the malicious inventions of the West-German press about an economic crisis in the G. D. R.

This six months is usually given in two instalments. Even when Ceylonese who e "settled" in Malaya are come to Ceylon, they are given a maximum of four months, and if they desire to stay longer with their relations or in their ancestral homes they are called upon to pay a visa tax of Rs 400 for a further stay of one or two months. S o m e progressive U.S. publications have expressed the view that China differs from the Soviet Union by its rigid classification of nations as either "imperialist" or "socialist", not recognizing the "neutral" category. China is pictured as viewing the "neutrals" as hostile, and as resent-ing socialist aid to them.

Americans, generally unin-

Nothing could be further from fact. China was the first of the socialist nations to stress the role of the "independent nations," a term she pre-fers to "neutrals". In 1954, when most of the world's communists still wondered if India and Burma could be taken as enemy or friend, Chou En-lai flew to New Delhi and Rangoon and created with Prime Minister Nehru and then Premier U Nu "five principles of peaceful co-exist-ence" which, the next year. ence" which, the next year, became the base of the Bandung Conference, the historic first meeting of independent Asian and African nations.

One recalls how the U.S. tried to disrupt the meeting through delegates such as Carlos Romulo of the Philip-pines, who baited Chou; how reporters questioned Chou, and Chou replied: "I did not rome to quarrel: I came for the success of all the people here." It was clearly no socialist success Chou expected; he sought the success of Afro-Asian independent nations and his attitude helped make that success.

After Bandung

China has stressed the emergence of independent nations and their struggle for full liberation as a historic development and a major force for world peace, second only to the growth of the socialist camp. Far from decrying aid to these nations, China, while still in need and without surplus, probably has given to small, non-socialist but independent nations more free gifts in aid than she herself has received from the entire socialist camp. For China rates as a strong power and the "aid" she gets is largely in therefore the strong power and the "aid" she gets is largely in short-term credits, while the aid China gives is often in the form of gifts or long-term loans without interest.

China's gifts are not large but they are decided upon carefully, for a clear aim.

They may go to a feudal nation or even to a backward, absolute monarchy such as Yemen. But they go to nations trying to establish economic independence: and they are gifts that help in this. Some recent instances reflect this policy.

In Cambodia on Jan. 24, a gathering was held to bid fare-well to two groups of Chinese specialists. A team of Chinese geologists had finished a three. year job of prospecting for minerals in Cambodia. A group of radio specialists had finished building a radio sta-tion as a gift to Prince Sihanouk.

Hung Long, Cambodian director of mines and indust-ries, reported that the Chinese geologists had discovered for Cambodia 25 kinds of minerals in 130 deposits, and also had found resources on which Cambodia might base her



By contrast one may note that Cambodia's air space has been violated by U.S.-made planes from three neigh bor nations—South Vietnam, Laos and Thailand. Sihanouk's press department has shown many foreign reporters the havoc caused in a Cambodian village by three planes from South Vietnam which strafed the peasants, killing several.

In Rangoon last January an open-air theater seating 3,000 was opened with a perform-ance of "Swan Lake" by a Chinese ballet troupe. Burmese engineers and workers, with the aid of Chinese experts, had completed the building at double speed.

U Nu attended the ballet with other Burmese leaders and then went on the stage to greet the artists. He wired to Chou: "My personal impres-



own iron and steel industry and her own cement works. They had located more than 9 million tons of limestone and 800,000 tons of clay, adequate for a cement works to run for 80 years at a capacity of half a million tons a year. They had found also 6 million tons of iron ore, coal, quartz, chromite and manganese.

"The effect on our country's development is beyond reckdevelopment is beyond reck-oning," Hung Long said. He declared that "cooperation of the Chinese specialists with the Cambodian government organs was perfect," and said they had shown "magnificent adaptability to Cambodian conditions" and had trained Cambodians to carry on their work.

Cambodia is a feudal Kingdom with a modern prince who supresses Cambodian Communists. He gets aid from the U.S., France, the U.S.S.R. and China. But Sihanouk's insistence on his nation's independence, and especially his rejection of "protection" from SEATO, makes him in China's view a force for world peace. So China does what she can to help Cambodia to independence, in news broadcasts, in iron and steel, in cement and in some other industries.

Burma has other things by which to remember China, including a modern textile mill with full training of Burmese personnel.

Another example of aid involves Yemen, one of earth's most isolated, backward absolute monarchies at the south tip of the Red Sea, in one of earth's hottest deserts. On Jan. 27 a 144-mile highway connecting the desert capital with a Red Sea port was opened. Then, thousands came to the cermony, among them 130 Chinese specialists who had helped build the road which is Yemen's link to world 'trade.

The Crown Prince of Yemen cut the ribbon and said, "This highway is symbol of a new era." He lauded the Chinese experts for their diligence, high morale and "quality." He said: "They got on very well with the Yemenite peo-ple." Rare words in a fanatical Moslem land that has always excluded foreigners.

China's Ambassador Chen Chia-kan offered in his reply

a key to China's aid. He said, "The road will help develop the economy of Ye-men. So the Yemenite people are happy and the Chinese people chara their hearings: people share their happiness. Chiness people and Yemenite people both love peace and oppose imperialism."

empty handed, buy up the concerns with capital-reserves built up in this country And ad infinitum the process is carried on, till this country is bled white.

If this country is to stan on its legs, please stop foreigners investing here and foreigners coming here. Let the Government take over their business already here be-fore they form into Company-Groups, and run them, of cours not like the C. T. B. nor the Port Cargo Corporation, but as real mercantile concerns.

If at a latter stage, we will have to nationalise, we will then have to pay not only what was originally brought by them, but also capital created by the energy of local labour. Did our patriots strive for independence to be economically subservient to foreigners? If a man is indebted to an Afghan or Chettiar nobody cares for him, but if a person tries to live within one's means everyone respects him. Let us build up an economically stable Lanka by our own efforts isntead of going with outstretched hands to the World Bank and the I. M. F. to replete our external assets. We must cut our coat according to the cloth. Why should there be deficit Budgeting?

Income Tax

Why have the poor been roped in for 'ncome Tax? The first objective of Income Tax is prevention of capital formation, but which capital formation the Central Bank economists want. Secondly it is to rope in money for the annual expenditure. What should the Government have done to see that it received its due share from the capitalists, if it was really in earnest? When the Kaldor system was introduced, a law should have been enacted that all Accounts of Limited Liability Companies, whether private or public, must be audited by the Auditor-General.

Is it more moral to discourage racing and consuming alcohol where the Government could reap a rich harvest than for the Government to resort to to inflation with impunity?

The Katunayake Aerodrome is to be enlarged. One hundred odd acres of coconut land in the best coconut growing area is to be acquired. Who is going to pay for all these expenses? In how many years can the capital outlay be recovered together with all the interest that has to be paid? This is to be made a First Class Tourist Air Port for whose benefit? what is the visualised income per annum ? The danger of a determined and ruthless military junta, far removed from any ideas of world happiness, and pursuing its plans with an unsurpassed thoroughness is clear enough. The danger is as serious as it The danger is as serious as it could be. The prospect of the top brass trained by Fascism, using heedlessly the destructive a'omic and nuclear weapons against a peaceful people should make all democrats cise in anger. The world had had enough of war and des-truction in the two wars foist-ed upon them by crazy Ger-man militarists and their blind friends. friends.

And particularly the havoc wrought by Fascism in the last war has made all people sick of such adven-turers. At present there are forces in England and America who look trindly to these who look kindly to these adventurers, because their activities may help destroy the Soviet Union. It is no wonder therefore that more and more people come from West Germany to the German Democratic Republic in order to find answers to their questions: they come to Berlin, the capital, to Weimar where Goethe once lived, to Dresden known for its art treasures, and to other places. Some of them really come in order to discover the gloom of which Bonn talks; but many of them come with a host of questions; is this or that true of which we have heard in the Federal Republic?

What do they discover? In the GDR people go to work just like West Germans do; there is but one differencework is assured for everybody and there is equal pay for equal work. People in the GDR like to amuse themselves just as people in West Germany do; there is but one differencethere is no prostitution, no In the GDR it is possible to study just as in West Germany; there is but one difference -students pay no fees and most

Germans in east and west suffered the same horrors of the most gruesome of all wars, and many West Germans are now asking doubtfully whether their government has done right in pursuing a policy of atomic arming and cold war against the other part of the nation, in striving for inte-gration of foreign territories. Such queries are justified, for neonle who ack do think people who ask do think.

In an uncertain and partly instinctive way, many West German citizens desire social and political changes. This determination grows as they come to grips with the lessons of history, with the aggressive attitude of the powers that be, as they are confronted with realities in the GDR. Particurealities in the GDR. Particu-larly young people take stock of the die-hards. Many wor-kers, professional people and others too undergo a process of political maturity which is sometimes rather slow though. It is slow because those who make public opi-nion well know the effects of their publicity and are capable of obliterating tempo-rarily the knowledge that it rarily the knowledge that it is better to stand for good neighbourly relations with the GDR. hem Foundation


* American* Buddhist Statue

I was pleasantly surprised the other day when a friend showed me a book on Ceylon he had borrowed from the Holborn Public Library. I was even more pleased to discover the author was my old boss Dr. Argus Tressider, one of earliest Public Relations Offi-

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Asbestos Cement Industries Ltd. cers at the U.S. Embassy in Colombo. If ever there was an American friend of the Ceylonese it was Dr. Tressider, and this fact is evident all through the book in which he describes some of the most intimate aspects of Ceylon life. Even his assessment of the Ceylon Communist Party and its future is astonishingly objective for an American.

Dr. Tressider and his wife hail from Buffalo in New York although originally Nancy his wife comes from the Deep South. Thus immediately after they had seen their first Ceylonese visitors to their home off at the door, Mrs. Tressider turned to her husband with the exclamation, so he says: "Did you notice? That was the first time I've sat at the same table with blacks !"

But, to give them credit, I believe they made a sincere effort to cure themselves of this mental disorder that still affects the Deep South !

Yet, certain other U.S. diplomats were not prepared to knuckle down so easily. Bruce Palmer, for instance, who followed Tressider, had a very observant wife. In a woman's magazine article back in the U.S. she wrote of the habits of the natives as she saw them. "The cook-appu", she wrote, "does the day's marketing and one has to get used to his habitual Ceylon trick of pinching a certain percentage of the day's marketing money !"

Palmer did not last long here after that. As a result of this article he had to be quickly posted elsewhere.

In his place came tall, Mexican-looking Les Squires. The first thing he did was to storm into Lake House. That day the Ceylon Observer ran the thickest headlines in its early edition claiming that Squires had threatened to assault the editor. "The Communists will shoot you if they took over this country", he allegedly yelled at them, because it so happened that at that time the Observer was serialising Stan K en y on's "The Ku Klux Klan".

But best of all was the U.S. Marine Guard. The Singhalese driver of the Ambassador's car had driven into the portico — as he always did — a few minutes before the Ambassador was due to leave for lunch. The guard, just arrived in Ceylon, was not having any such nonsense and ordered the driver to take the car away. The latter refused, whereupon the irate Texan shouted out abuse, including the terms they use on Negroes in the Deep South — "You filthy, black b......"

This was too much for all the local employees of the dollar establishment and one of the local clerks was bent on redress. An inquiry was held and the American guard was quietly but promptly flown back.

DULLES

Incidentally I wonder how many know that a relative of that notorious cold-war merchant and brinkman John Foster Dulles lies buried in a cemetery in Jaffna. If I remember well, it is his grandmother. Any how when Dulles visited Ceylon in 1954 on one of his missions to SEATO nations, some residents of Jaffna handed him a scroll containing details of his ancestor's grave. The ceremony took place at the U.S. Embassy in Colpetty and so touched was this initiator of the bankrupt "positions of strength" policy that there were tears in his eyes.

But perhaps none of the U.S. personnel in Ceylon were more colourful than the four or five Marine Guards. Their utter contempt for the laws of our roads when driving their vehicles brought a stern warning from our Motor Commissioner until the unusual order had to be made by the Ambassdor himself that no marine was permitted to drive any vehicle.

Herr Winzer:

It is above all a violation of the German people's right to self - determination that no peace treaty has yet been signed seventeen years after the war's end and that in one part of Germany, ie. in West Berlin, the occupation regime is maintained, and that the Western Powers have retained for themselves, through the Paris Treaties with West Germany, the right to dictate to the German people in all basic questions of their national policy.

But has Herr Schroeder, who wishes to dictate to India and all the other neutral countries what foreign policy they are to pursue, any right whatever to talk about "self-determination"? His talk of selfdetermination has no more value than that of Hitler and Ribbentrop, who always ranted loudest about the German people's right to self-determination when they were preparing for acts of aggression against other peoples, especially against Poland and Czechoslovakia.

Those in glass houses should not throw stones. After the establishment of the separate West Zone state, the so-called German Federal Republic, it was the conclusion of the Paris Treaties in 1954 and the inclusion of West Germany in the imperialist NATO military bloc that was the decisive breach of the Potsdam Agreement. The obdurate division of Germany also originated from this breach.

The main content and aim of the Potsdam Agreement was demilitarisation, denazification and democratisation of Germany, so that the peoples of the world should never again be threatened by a war emanating from German soil. That is why the inclusion of West Germany in NATO, re-militarisation of West Ger-many with its speed-up in rearmament — particularly in recent years — and the deve-lopment of its NATO Wehrmacht for atomic war against the Allies of the Western Powers in World War Two, i.e. against the Soviet Union, Poland and Czechoslovakia, is such a colossal breach of the Potsdam Agreement. In addition, there is the fact that in West Germany the govern-ment apparatus, the Wehr-macht, the judiciary, the diplomatic service and even the education system are riddled with and to a large extent

controlled by nazis, war criminals, racial and revanch pro-pagandists. There is no other country in Europe which has to such an extent elevated to its official government policy the spirit of revenge and con-quest of neighbouring terri-tory, especially of the GDR, Poland and Czechoslovakia.

The imperialist West Ger-man state, which fills the world with concern as a result of its revanchist demands and its loud demands for atom weapons, is also becoming a danger to the peoples of Asia, Africa and Latin America. The West German imperialists still think that all the peoples should bow down before their mad lust for power.

A statement on August 18th in "Der Tag" a West Berlin newspaper which supports Adenauer, expresses this lust for power.

"The economic and political power the gradually increasing striking force of the Bundeswehr are the decisive arguments in Africa against recognition of the GDR."

But the aim of the Potsdam Agreement was in fact to take measures to prevent this militarist language from ever again being used in Germany.

The Potsdam Agreement foresees the conclusion of a German peace treaty with a Government suitable — suitable, of course, in the sense of the basic principles of the

China's theory of world peace explains her aid policy. peace explains her aid policy. China stresses the importance of the "national liberation movement" as a force for progress and peace. When any nation—large, small, capitalist, feudal monarchia crimitime feudal, monarchie, primitive, tribal-breaks from the yoke of imperialism and struggles for independence, this nation's struggle wears down imperiastruggie wears down imperia-lism, and lessens its power for war. China will help any of these little nations if she can. All these "independent na-tions" together, says China, make up more than half the world's naced world's people.

Two characteristics of China's aid are worth noting. When Chinese experts go to help develop backward countries, China usually pays their salaries, but the country to which they go furnishes them with living and working ex-penses on the standard its own citizens have in similar jobs. This is not easy in countries of tropical Africa. It is a rule, I think, no other nation makes in sending "aid." American specialists in Laos have houses whose mere upkeep costs \$300 a month. Potsdam Agreement. The Government of the German Democratic Republic is such a Government, for the princi-ples of the Potsdam Agree-Potsdam Agreement. ment have been carried out in our workers' and farmers' state. The GDR champions disarmament, peaceful coex-istence and military neutrality of both German states and recognises the frontiers drawn as a result of World War Two. The conclusion of a peace treaty with the German De-mocratic Republic therefore accords with the main aim and content of the Potsdam Agreement.


First I should like to point out that the Soviet Union and the GDR have suggested con-clusion of a unified peace treaty with both German states. This peace settlement would also be the best way to bring the two German states together and to join them in a German confederation.

In order to take into account the different political and

social conditions in the two states, readiness was also ex-pressed to conclude two separate treaties. This was also rejected by the Bonn Government, because in fact any peace treaty is a contradiction of its revanchist policy. But the neutral states cannot, after all, commit themselves to this policy. On the contrary, they would undermine their neutrality through such a onesided support of the Bonn policy of revenge.

The conclusion of the Paris Treaties and inclusion of West Germany in the NATO imperialist military bloc - in breach of the Potsdam Agreement - was no hindrance to many neutral countries who had fought with the anti-Hitler coalition to take up normal diplomatic relations with Bonn. In view of the fact, it is the principle of neutrality itself which should lead them to give their active support to a German peace settlement in the spirit of the Potsdam Agreement, even if it is only signed with the GDR, and to establish normal diplomatic relations to our peace state. This should be the logical consequence arising out of the principle of neutrality.

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AUDITOR-GENERAL REPORTS ON

Dr. Ananda Guruge Vidyodaya Scandal

The Auditor General's Rereleased as a sessional paper, is an important document. It will help many to understand just what the present state of the machinery of government administration really is.

The item to which we wish to draw attention, this week, concerns the case of the overpaid Assistant Secretary of the Ministry of Education, Dr. Ananda Guruge. Readers will recall that we had on innumerable occasions pin-pointed the case of this official who has not only been the cause of the mess in Vidyodaya but also must take the responsibility for the present chaos in the Education Department.

What the Auditor General has now so authoritatively set out only confirms one of the matters we have raised in regard to this ubiquitous official who knows the secret of being a political favourite in the days of the UNP as well as the SLFP whilst at the same time being able to visit the United States (with his spouse) on special invitations by the State Department.

Financial

Regulations

The Auditor General makes The Auditor General makes a special point of stressing that amounts drawn from the University by this Assistant Secretary in the Ministry of Education, who was also a member of the University Council, exceeded the limits prescribed in the Financial Regulations. Regulations.

Mr. L. A. Weerasinghe, the Auditor General, in the report said: "On this being reported to me by the Secretary to the Treasury, the Assistant Secre-tary was ordered to refund Rs. 5,645 in monthly instalments commencing from September, 1962. After this order had been made, it was found that this Assistant Secretary had also been paid an allowance as Administrative Assistant of

the University (at the rate of Rs. 750 per mensem) during a period of approximately four months in 1960 while he was out of the Island on the invitation of the Island on the m-vitation of the State Depart-ment of the U. S. A. The pro-priety of this payment was under consideration by the Treasury at the date of this Report, and may necessitate a revision of the amount to be recovered from this officer."

The question that must be asked is how these overpayments came to be made. Mr. Guruge, who is said to be the Czar of the Education Minis-try, is a "senior" civil servant who should at least know the Financial Regulations. That is the least he should know. If he did know his way about Financial Regulations (if he doesn't, he should be downgraded and be asked to study the Financial Regulations once again), then, the question must be asked as to how these overpayments came to be made or received.

Can an official who flouts the Can an official who flouts the Financial Regulations of the government so brazenly and blatantly be permitted to run the affairs of the Education Ministry? It would be a terrible reflection on the government itself if officials like Mr. Guruge are not dealt with severely.

If no action was taken, then other officials would take the other officials would take the line that they can play ducks and drakes with government money: that if they are caught, all that they would be called upon to do was to refund the money in easy instalments. It is not always easy for the Auditor General to spot these frauds and overneyments: he frauds and overpayments: he has too much work and too little staff. Moreover, it is years before these actions by erring public servants are detected, and then it may be too late to do anything about them them.

The Peace Corps must be regretting the day when they called upon Wijeyabahu Wijesinghe to welcome them to Ceylon. The UGLY AMERICAN (now the classic) has the supreme capacity to pick on the wrong "native" to espouse his cause. If the Peace Corps wanted to make a joke of the whole business of aiding the country through teacher volunteers no better person than Wijeya-bahu could have been chosen. The U.S. State Department has also honoured him with more than one leadership grant. On his way back from the States, he had sojourned in the land of the rising sun where cherry blossoms and geishas flourish. The impact of Wijeyabahu Wijesinghe's stay in Japan has been felt even in Colombo with stirring reports (some may call them complaints) about his great exploits in that land. If the Peace Corps hope to survive for any length of time they should keep clear of the cocktail circuits organised by Wijeyabahu.
