General Notes of the weather at Cochin, the temperature about 86° Fahr. monthly variation never exceeding 3° Fahr.

JANUARY.

This month may be conveniently taken as the commencement of the meteorological as well as of the civil Year. The rains which accompany the setting in of the N. E. monsoon are usually just over, the soil is moist, the sky is clear and the nights cold, with an along-shore or land wind blowing, which must be guarded against.

FEBRUARY.

The along-shore wind (a strong parching wind from the N. E.) often continues to blow the greater part of this month night and day. It carries off the moisture of the ground and the skin rapidly and gives rheumatism &c. to those who expose themselves incautiously to it. The difference between the wet bulb and the dry thermometer sometimes amounts to 12°.

MARCH.

The dry earth now receives far more heat from the sun than it parts with by evaporation or terrestrial radiation. The weather is becoming very warm. The calmness of the ocean however and the alternate sea breezes by day and land winds by night give a pleasing variety. But the heat is oppressive compared with that of the rest of the Year.

APRIL.

Indications of the approach of the S. W. monsoon are to

be observed in a ground swell in the sea and S. W. breeze more steady than the sea breeze of last month. The temperature however continues to rise and all who can afford it obtain leave or escape are among the mountains, some time ago.

MAY.

By the middle of this month genial showers usually begin to fall. The wind is steadily in the S. W. and towards the close of the month there are usually thunder and lightning every afternoon in the S. W. with heavy showers, each preceded by a squall.

JUNE.

It now rains heavily with squalls from the S. W. The sky is often clouded for a fortnight; but it seldom rains 24 hours without intermission.

JULY.

The rains are now over and a steady S. W. wind blows day and night, perfectly balmy and innocent, the difference between the wet and dry thermometer seldom exceeding 6°.

AUGUST.

Weather the same as July but somewhat warmer in consequence of the smaller amount of evaporation.

SEPTEMBER.

Weather the same as July and August but still warmer in consequence of the still smaller amount of evaporation. These months are usually cool however compared with March April and May and towards the end of this month heavy showers usually fall, which are thankfully accepted.

OCTOBER.

The first half of this month is usually marked by rains which are very heavy though of short duration. By these the air is cooled and the soil refreshed, though extensive inundations often result.

NOVEMBER.

The pleasant weather of the latter part of October is usually continued to the middle of this month when thunder clouds gather every afternoon in the N. E. and night rains fall followed by land winds. It is the N. E. monsoon.

DECEMBER.

The Rains from the N. E. of the preceding month often continue during this, usually with much thunder and lightning and with alternate sea breezes and land winds so that the new year usually sets in with the soil saturated with moisture and colder than at any other time, from the enjoyment of which however the along-shore wind now set in a blowing fresh detracts not a little.

The Year 5608 of the Jewish Era commences on September 11, 1847.

Ramadan (Month of Abstinence observed by the Turks) commences on August 13, 1847.

The Year 1264 of the Mohammedan Era commences on December 9, 1847.

ECLIPSES.

On the 1st of April, a partial Eclipse of the Moon visible in Ceylon, commencing at 22m. past 1 in the morning and ending 29m. past 3 A. M.; about one-fourth of the Moon's northern limb eclipsed.

On the 15th of April, a partial Eclipse of the Sun visible over the south-eastern extremity of Ceylon (invisible at Galle or Batticaloa;) it will commence at Hambantotte at $\frac{1}{2}$ past 11 and end at noon, and will require very good instruments to distinguish it, as it is little more than a mere contact of the limbs.

On the 24th of September, a partial Eclipse of the Moon visible in Ceylon; it will commence a little after the Moon rises at $\frac{1}{4}$ to 7 P. M. and will end at 9 P. M. about 2-5 of the Moon's southern limb eclipsed.

On the 9th of October, an Eclipse of the Sun visible in Ceylon, commencing at 29m. past 11 A. M. and ending at 9m. past 4 P. M.; about 8 digits will be Eclipsed. This Eclipse will be central and annular across the centre of India about latitude 18°.

The Solar Cycle, or Cycle of the Sun, is a period of 28 years, in which all the varieties of the Dominical Letters will have happened, and they will return to the same order as they did 28 years before. This Cycle commenced 28 years before the Birth of Christ.

The Lunar Cycle, or Cycle of the Moon, commonly called the Golden Number, (and sometimes the Metonic Cycle, from Meton, an Athenian, who invented it about 432 years before the Birth of Christ,) is a revolution of 19 years; in which time, the conjunctions, oppositions, and other aspects of the Moon, are within an hour and a half of being the same as they were on the same days of the months 19 years before. The prime, or Golden Number, is the number of years elapsed in this Cycle. At the Birth, the Golden Number was 2.

The Roman Indiction is a period of 15 years, used by the Romans for the time of taxing their provinces. Three years of this Cycle had elapsed at the Birth of Christ.

The Julian Period contains 7980 years, and arises by multiplying together 28, 19, and 15, being the Cycles of the Sun, Moon, and Indiction. This was also contrived as a period for Chronological matters, and is assumed as a correct and fixed rule in calculations, by all the astronomers and chronologers throughout the Christian world. Its beginning is supposed to have commenced, 710 years before the usual date of the creation of the world, or 4714 before the commencement of the Christian Era.

The letters for the first, second, and third years after every bissextile, are the three single letters placed under the double letters, in the same column with the bissextile they immediately follow. For example, as the Dominical letters for 1600 were B A, so the Dominical letter for 1601 was a, for 1602 e, and for 1603 e. So for 1796 the Dominical will be C B; consequently, 1797, 1798, and 1799 must have A, a, and F; and the letter for 1800, (which is to be accounted a common year,) will be E; therefore 1801, 1802, and 1803, must have the subsequent letters D, c, and B; and then 1804, being bissextile, will come under the letters A G; and from thence every fourth year will be Leap-year.

RULES TO BE OBSERVED ON APPLICATION FOR LOANS.

1.—Any person desirous of obtaining a loan from the Colombo Savings' Bank must make an application by letter addressed to "The Chairman of the Superintending Committee" in which he is to state the sum required, the nature of the security he intends to offer,—whether immovable or moveable property, the Title-deeds are to be forwarded at the same time. On superscription to be written, "Immediate" when it will forthwith be attended to.

2.—The Chairman of the Committee, on receiving an application for Loan will forward the same together with the Title-deeds to the Trustees, who if satisfied as to the legality, will cause the property to be appraised, and examine the securities as to their sufficiency.

3.—On the Trustees acquainting the Committee that they are satisfied with the security tendered, the applicant will be entitled to receive as a loan one-third, and in case he gives two or more securities, two-thirds of the sum at which his property may have been appraised.

4.—The applicant must deposit with the Accountant the appraisers' fees on the sum applied for, at the time of making his application; but should a Loan of less amount than that applied for be sanctioned, the surplus fees will be returned.

5.—Where moveable property is offered to be pledged, the applicant will be informed when and where it is to be produced for the purpose of being appraised.

6.—The fixed allowance of the appraisers to be employed one-half per cent on the amount lent, and where the property to be appraised is situated without the Pettah and Fort of Colombo, then each appraiser is allowed in addition one shilling per mile travelling expenses.

7.—In all cases where the borrower is not subject to, or the property to be mortgaged is situate without the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court, or of the District Court of Colombo, such borrower will be required to execute, in addition to his Bond, a Warrant of Attorney to confess judgment.

RULES.

1st.—Respecting Loans

1. The titles must be produced, where real property is offered as security.

2. The articles themselves, where gold, silver &c. is offered.

3. The property hypothecated must appear to be equal in value, if real property, to one-third more than the sum required to be borrowed; or, if it consists of gold, silver &c. one-fourth more. But if the property offered for hypothecation by the borrower, fall short of that amount, the property of another person, may be received to make up the deficiency. In such case, the person so contributing must be a party to the bond, which will state the circumstance of the case.

4. Every applicant must, besides the property hypothecated, enter into a bond with two securities for the repayment of the principal sum borrowed, whenever the same shall be demanded, and of the interest as it becomes due.

5. Each of the sureties will be required to give such an account of his property as may satisfy the Board that he is worth the amount of half the sum borrowed, after payment of all his debts; and should the Board deem it necessary, he shall be required to make affidavit to the truth of his statement.

Original rules framed in accordance with an order of the Supreme Court, dated 16th July 1834.

6. If the borrower should be unable to procure persons to become securities for him, the Board will at its discretion waive this condition on the borrower pledging property to double the value of the sum required.

If either of the securities should not have property to the value of the sum borrowed, others may be added, not exceeding four in all, to make up the deficiency.

Where the securities intend to rely on landed property in procuring themselves worth the sum required, they should bring with them the title by which they hold such landed property, (provided it be not mortgaged) when they attend for the purpose of justifying.

Original rules as above.

7. A certificate, a copy of which will be given by the Clerk of the Board, must be obtained from the Collector of the District, (Agent of the Province) in which the applicant resides, that neither himself nor either of his securities is a Government Debtor or Security for a Government Renter.

Order of Court—
21st November 1833.

In all cases in which the Board may deem it necessary, the oath of the parties (principal or security) will be required, in addition to the Collector's certificate, to the effect that he is not a Government Debtor or Renter, or Security for any such persons.

Original rules as above.

8. The property offered for hypothecation must in all cases be valued at the expense of the applicant by appraisers to be appointed by the Board; and the applicant must, if required, deposit with the Clerk of the Board the percentage, to which the appraisers will be entitled, and which, will be settled by the Board.

N. B.—The rate allowed in ordinary circumstances is $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent on the amount of the Loan.

Government Regulation No. 9 of 1824.

9. The Interest to be paid on all Loans is 7 per cent, which is to be paid monthly; in default of whichparate execution may be taken out for the recovery of the same.

2d Respecting Dividends of Interest.

Order of Supreme Court dated 21st November 1853.

1. The Loan Board will have one head of account with each Court; such account shall include all sums in deposits from that Court, whether the same be Suitors' monies, Estate monies, or otherwise; but the Loan Office will only take account of the aggregate sum.

2. The accounts of the Office will be made up, and the interest divided quarterly, commencing from 1st January 1854.

3. Every pound sterling of principal, which has been for one complete quarter available for the purpose of making Loans, shall be entitled to a dividend of the Interest; such quarter is to be calculated from one dividend day to the subsequent dividend day, (i. e. 1st January, 1st April, 1st July and 1st October.

4. Dividends shall not be calculated of lower fractions than one farthing on a pound sterling of principal, and any sum, the retaining of which would render such calculations necessary, shall be set over till the next dividend day.

5. The funds of the Weeskamer and Boedelkamer shall be kept separate from the accounts of the different Courts—the interest derived therefrom being wholly paid over to Government.

6. At the end of each quarter the Board will audit the accounts of the interest received, and declare the dividend to be allowed; in the first place setting over two-sixth thereof to the use of Government, towards the expenses of the establishment, as heretofore.

7. The surplus fund which has been accumulated by deductions from interest received in former years and now amounts to £720 or thereabouts, or about 8 per cent on the capital lent out; and as it is equitable that the Cash in the District Courts, now about to receive the protection of that fund, should contribute towards it, a deduction of one-sixth of the interest received on monies from District Courts shall be made quarterly, until such deduction shall have accumulated to a similar amount per cent on the principal sums

Government Regulation No. 6 of 1827 Clause 4.

lent out on account of those Courts; after which such deduction shall cease, and the whole shall be formed into one general fund to provide for unforeseen losses of principal lent out.

8. After the deductions have been made the residue of interest received shall be divided as declared in the 4th and 5th Rules: and the amount set over to the credit of each Court according to the total sums which they may have in deposit, and entitled to interest under article 3.

N. B.—The average rate of Dividends (eighteen in number) paid over to the use of the Intestate Estates and Suitors since the establishment of the Loan Office in 1824 amounts to six pounds two shillings per cent per annum, but as the rate of interest charged on Loans has been reduced from 9 to 7 per cent it is not expected that future dividends will average more than 5 per cent per annum.

The Society is supported by voluntary monthly contributions and occasional donations. Its design is to relieve by pensions or otherwise cases, which, upon the personal investigation of the visitors, are considered real objects of charity. Strangers in distress have also received its aid, many of them having had the means afforded them to return to their native country. The circumstance of the society continuing prosperous enables it to meet all claims in the sphere of its operation. The society has now on its list 34 fixed and 2 provisional pensioners.

Sick paupers are admitted and treated in the society's hospital a commodious and well ventilated building, with separate wards for the accommodation of patients of different sexes, according to the character of the diseases. The patients are regularly attended by the resident medical attendant, and have also the benefit of the advice of the consulting surgeon. They are directed under the immediate supervision of one of the members of the hospital Sub-committee, are clothed at the expense of the society, and are also allowed every medical comfort the nature of their respective cases requires—medicine is also afforded gratuitously in particular cases to out-door patients.

The Committee have lately made arrangements for the establishment at Trincomalie of a general dispensary under the auspices of the Friend-in-Need society, on the same principle as that of the Colombo General Dispensary. The society expect to receive its stock of medicine (for which application was made to England in June last) before the end of this year.

The Committee meet for the transaction of business at the Trincomalie Government Rest-house (late Trincomalie Library) on the first Monday of every month at 6—30 P. M.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. That the object of the Colombo General Dispensary be the gratuitous Medical and Surgical relief of the poor; and of those who from any temporary difficulties are unable to procure the same elsewhere.
2. That the Dispensary be opened for the attendance of the sick poor every morning—Sundays excepted, from 7 to 8 o'clock when a Medical Officer shall be in attendance.
3. That every person requiring the aid of the institution do make application to some Member of the Committee of the Friend in Need Society or any Subscriber to the Dispensary, who, if he see fit, shall recommend him, to the attention of the Medical Officer in attendance.
4. That on the ticket being received from the said Member, and duly signed by him—the applicant be required to attend; at the hour prescribed, at the Dispensary, and present himself or herself to the Medical Officer in attendance; and that the applicant shall on no account transfer his or her ticket to any other person.
5. That the Patients, do attend regularly and punctually at the Dispensary, as they may be desired by the Medical Officers; and that they be required at all times, to bring their cards or tickets of recommendation with them.
6. That no person shall be allowed Medical relief or attention, if he or she neglect to bring to the Dispensary some sort of bottle, or other convenient vessel to contain the Medicine prescribed.
7. That no patient be allowed to neglect the instructions given for his or her cure or relief; or to be guilty of irregular attendance on the Medical Officers, without pain or dismissal.
8. That a Dispenser of Medicines shall be appointed, who shall be held responsible to the Medical Officers for the correct

compounding of all prescriptions, and for the proper discharge of his duties. That the care of all Medicines and Equipment be entrusted to him, and that he shall attend at the Dispensary at the hours appointed by the Medical Officers.

9. That the strictest economy and discrimination be exercised in the purchase of Drugs and equipment, and that and every other responsibility as concerns expenditure be vested in the Committee of management.

10. That the formula of recommendation be kept clean, and returned into the hands of the Medical Officer, when the Patient from any cause shall discontinue his or her attendance at the Dispensary.

11. That an annual report of the Dispensary be presented to the Friend in Need Society, to be contained in the General Report of the said Society, and submitted at its General Meeting.

The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts
was incorporated by Royal Charter, in the reign of KING WILLIAM
III., A. D. 1701, for receiving, managing and disposing of such funds
as might be contributed for the religious instruction of His Majesty's
Christian subjects beyond the seas, for maintaining Clergymen in the
British Colonies, Plantations and Factories, and for the general prop-
agation of the Gospel. It has been engaged in its appointed sphere
of duty for upwards of 141 years; and during a whole century, it
was the only Missionary Society in connexion with the Church of
England. In regard to its constitution, it is under the immediate
control of the Bishops of the United Church and is uniformly
conducted on Church principles.

The Society has at present in its employment, Missionaries in the
four grand divisions of the British Empire, viz., North America, West
India, East India and Australia, and the whole number on its List
amounts to 302, besides 230 Catechists and Schoolmasters; indepen-

dently of all which its funds are made available for supporting Colleges and building Churches and Schools. It was in 1818 that the Society extended its operations to the East. Here it has more than 82 Missionaries in its service. It has moreover established a College at Calcutta, called BISHOP'S COLLEGE, for the education of an indigenous Clergy, and the diffusion of sound and useful knowledge; and Grammar Schools at Madras for the instruction of the middle and lower classes.

At COTTA there is an Institution called the *Christian Institution*, where a number of Youths, of good promise selected from the other schools, are boarded and educated, with a view to their becoming useful Schoolmasters, Catechists, and Assistant Missionaries. This Institution contains *Twenty-two* Youths. The course of study pursued by them comprises Singhalese, English, (including Grammar, Composition, History, and Geography) LATIN, GREEK, ARITHMETIC, ALGEBRA, GEOMETRY, and THEOLOGY. There is also a Preparatory class, connected with this Institution, containing *Six* Boys.

At CHUNDICULLY there is a *Seminary* containing *Twenty-five* Youths, and another at BADDAGAMA, containing *Fifteen* Youths. From these Seminaries, Youths are selected for the COTTA *Christian Institution*.

The Youths in the *Christian Institution* and Preparatory class at COTTA, and in the *Seminaries* at CHUNDICULLY and BADDAGAMA, amounting to *sixty-eight* are boarded and educated at the expense of the Society, with the exception of a few who pay a monthly sum towards defraying the expense of their board.

At KANDY and at NELLORE there are *Female Boarding Schools*, the former containing *Thirteen*, and the latter *Thirty-three* Girls. The expense of these two Schools is borne, partly by the Society, and partly by Subscriptions and Donations.

The Holy Scriptures, and the Book of Common Prayer, have been translated into the familiar Singhalese, and printed at the

Cotta Press besides many elementary School Books, and a large number of Religious books and Tracts, which have been gratuitously circulated among the Natives.

It is proposed to form a Church Building Society in connection with this Mission, for the purpose of erecting churches in villages connected with the different Stations, where the inhabitants of such villages may request them, and where they themselves come forward with such readiness and liberality to further the object, as shall, in the judgment of the Committee justify them in rendering the desired assistance. To this fund, the contributions of both European and Native Inhabitants are solicited.

WESLEYAN MISSION.

South Ceylon District.

THE Wesleyan Mission in Ceylon was commenced in 1814, it is divided into two districts, the Tamil or North Ceylon District, and the Singhalese or South Ceylon District. Of the latter the Rev. D. J. GOSWAMI is the Chairman and the Rev. W. BRIDGNELL the Secretary. The stations are as follow:

1—*Colombo and Colpetty*—The Rev. D. J. GOSWAMI and the Rev. A. KESSEN, B. A. The Rev. JOHN POULIER and the Rev. DAVID DE SILVA Assistant Missionaries; 1 Catechist; 1 Chapel for Portuguese and Singhalese; 1 Chapel for English and Portuguese; 4 Chapels for Singhalese; 4 School Rooms used as Chapels for Singhalese; 10 Schools; 261 boys and 120 girls. Church Members 223.

The Wesleyan Institution at Jaffna has been strengthened by the addition of two European Missionaries recently appointed by the British Conference.

The course of study adopted in the Day and Boarding Schools includes, in addition to the ordinary branches of a plain education, Ancient and Modern History, Algebra, Geometry, Natural Philosophy, the Elements of Mental and Moral Science, and Latin.

BAPTIST MISSION.

The Baptist Missionary Society has in the Island 4 European, and 19 Native Missionaries who occupy two principal and 20 Sub-stations. Besides these agents there are 45 Schoolmasters and other Native Assistants. In 44 Schools instruction is given to about 995 children in their vernacular tongue. English is also taught in 3 of them. At Colombo there is a School in which 12 Singhalese girls are boarded, clothed, and educated gratuitously and at Kandy there is a Day School for girls in which English only is taught. The Stations are supplied with Tracts and School Books from the Mission Printing Office at Kandy, where both Letter Press and Lithographic Printing are done. In all the Stations the Gospel is regularly preached in the Singhalese Language, to which in some, are added Portuguese and Tamil; and, in the 2 Head Stations, English. The Coffee Estates around Kandy and Matelle are visited by Tamil preachers and Tracts distributed among the Coolies. The Mission is entirely supported by voluntary contributions received here and in England. The following List will show the number of Stations, and by whom each one is occupied.

3.—Two days previous to the period on which the Packet is advertised to depart, the remaining half of the passage money is to be paid up, or, in default the passage will be considered to be abandoned, and the money paid in advance to be forfeited.

REGULATIONS FOR THE SALE &c. OF CROWN LANDS.

His EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR has directed the following Extract from Her Majesty's Instructions to be published for general information.

By His Excellency's Command,

Colonial Secretary's Office,
Colombo, 1st May 1841.

P. ANSTROTHER,
Colonial Secretary.

Forty-first.—And whereas We have by Our said Commission appointing you Our Governor and Commander in Chief as aforesaid, given to you full power and authority in our name and on Our behalf, but subject nevertheless to such provisions as are in that respect contained in your General Instructions to make and execute in Our name and under the Public Seal of Our said Island Grants of Waste Land to us belonging within the same to private persons, and for the Public uses of Our subjects there resident. Now We do hereby require and authorize you from time to time as occasion may require to cause all necessary Surveys to be made of the vacant or Waste Lands to Us belonging in Our said Island, and to cause the persons making such Surveys to report to you what particular Lands it may be proper to reserve for Public Roads or other internal communications by Land or Water, or as the Sites of Towns, Villages, Churches, School Houses or Parsonage Houses, or as places for the burial of the dead, or as places for the future extension of any existing Towns or Villages, or as places fit to be set apart for the recreation or amusement of the Inhabitants of any Town or Village, or for promoting the health of such Inhabitants, or as the Sites of Quays or Landing Places or Towing Paths, which may at any future time be expedient to erect, form, or establish on the Sea Coast, or in the neighbourhood of Navigable Streams, or as places which it may be desirable to reserve for any other purpose of Public convenience, utility, health or enjoyment, and you are specially to require persons making such Surveys to specify in their Reports, and to distinguish in the Charts or Maps to be thereunto annexed such Tracts, Pieces or Parcels of Land within Our said Island as may appear to them best adapted to answer and promote the several purposes before mentioned. And it is Our Will, and We do strictly enjoin and require you that you do not under any pretence whatever grant, convey, or demise to any person or persons any of the lands which may be specified as fit to be reserved as aforesaid, nor permit or suffer any such Lands to be occupied by any private persons for any private purpose.

Forty-second.—And We do further charge and require you not to make any Grant of Land to or in trust for, or for the use of any private person unless in consideration of payment

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in money for the same after such Land shall have been previously put for sale by Public Auction at such an upset price per acre as shall from time to time by Our authority be fixed for the same, and for this purpose you shall cause such Lands as from time to time shall remain unoccupied and ungranted to be put up for sale by Public Auction from time to time as you shall judge proper and the highest bidding which shall at such Public Auction be made for any such Lands shall be accepted, provided that such bidding shall at least amount to such upset price per acre as aforesaid. Provided nevertheless that no such bidding shall be finally accepted until the person or persons making the same shall have actually paid a Deposit of ten per cent on the amount thereof, and shall have signed a Contract for the payment of the balance within one calendar month next thereafter. And it is Our Pleasure that all grants of Land to be made by you in Our name to any person or persons in consideration of the payment of money for the same shall be made to such person or persons, and to his, her or their Heirs and Assigns to be by him, her or them held in fee and common socage, yielding and paying to us, Our Heirs and Successors a Quit Rent of one Peppor Corn by the year for the same, and every such Grant shall pass in Our name under the Public Seal of Our said Island of Ceylon, and shall be executed and delivered to the purchaser or purchasers at the office of the Surveyor General of Our said Island on the payment of the purchase money for the same, and not before and then and not before the purchaser or purchasers shall be let in possession of the Land so bought by them and for the delivery of every such Grant, and the preparing the same, the Colonial Secretary shall be entitled to charge a fee amounting to forty shillings sterling money and no more or of such smaller amount as you from time to time with the advice of the Executive Council of Our said Island shall appoint, and every such Grant shall previously to its being so delivered be enrolled in the Court of the District where such Land may be situate, and for making every such Enrolment the Registrar of such Court shall be entitled to receive from such Grantee or Grantees a fee of five shillings Sterling money and no more.

MINUTE
BY THE GOVERNOR.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR is pleased to direct that the Government Advertisement of the 13th April 1839, the Notice of the 29th May 1841, the Minute of 3d August 1841 and the Minute of the 29th June 1844 be cancelled, and that in lieu thereof the following Rules be observed in respect to the Survey and Sale of Crown Lands.

- 1.—All Crown Land will be Sold by Auction, and no Waste Land will be exposed for Sale at a price below Twenty Shillings per acre.
- 2.—The Government Agents, in conjunction with the Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department, will make arrangements for bringing forward for Sale, from time to time, such portions of Waste Land as they may consider expedient.
- 3.—The preceding Rule shall not be held to preclude parties desirous of purchasing any particular tracts of Land, from applying to the Government Agent for the Sale of them accordingly. But the Government Agent will exercise his own discretion in respect to complying with any such application—and the applicant will not be at liberty to enter upon the Land for any purpose without his permission. It will also be distinctly understood that the making such application will give the applicant no claim whatever to the Land, if put up to Sale, in preference to any other person.
- 4.—The boundaries of all Crown Land will be cleared by Officers employed by the Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department—and the expenses attending the same will be recovered as hereafter mentioned.
- 5.—The following Fees will be recovered by Government for Surveys executed under the directions of the Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department.

- In cases where one or more contiguous lots are surveyed the purchaser will be required to pay the *Fees for Surveying* in proportion only to the extent of boundary actually measured, but the *Fees for preparation of Plans, &c.* will be payable in full.
- 6.—For Surveys of Roads, Rivers, Canals, &c. and appraisements special terms will be made.
 - 7.—Parties making application for the Sale of any Land un-

der the 3d Rule hereof, will be required to make a deposit, to the satisfaction of the Government Agent, of the probable cost of boundary clearing and the Fees for Survey.

8.—The Surveys when completed will be lodged in the Office of the Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department, where they will be marked off in a general Map which with a Register will be kept for public inspection—and Registers will also be kept for the same purpose at the Offices of the Government Agents of the Lands for Sale in their respective Provinces.

9.—The Sales will be held when practicable at the Government Agent's Office once a month, after public Notice by Proclamation in the Government Gazette—and care will be taken to prevent the days of Sale in the several Provinces from interfering with each other.

10.—On the day of Sale the Government Agent will specify, in three separate items, the upset price of the Lands, the expense of clearing the boundaries and the Fees for Survey recoverable under this Minute—and will stipulate that the two latter must be paid in full by the purchaser on the day of Sale, together with 10 per cent on the amount actually bid for the Land.

11.—The balance of the purchase money must be paid within one month from the day of Sale, and in default of such payment the sale will be considered void, the 10 per cent will be forfeited and the Government will be at liberty to re-sell the Land.

12.—The Colonial Secretary will be entitled to the following Fees for the preparation of the Title Deeds.

On all grants of Land sold for a sum not exceeding £5—one shilling.

On all grant of Land sold for more than £5—four per cent. But he is in no case to receive more than forty shillings for any one grant.

And the Secretary of the District Court of the District in which the Land granted shall be situate, will be entitled to a fee of five shillings for enrolling the grant.

13.—On the receipt of the purchase money in full and of the Fees allowed by the preceding Rule, the Government Agent will apply to the Colonial Secretary for a grant in Duplicate. One Copy shall be delivered to the purchaser, who shall forthwith be put in possession of the Land, and the other enrolled in the District Court.

14.—The Crown reserves to itself the right of making and constructing such Roads and Bridges as may be necessary for public purposes in all Lands purchased as above, and also to such indigenous timber, stone and other materials, the produce of the Land, as may be required for making and keeping the said Roads and Bridges in repair, and for any other

public works. The Crown further reserves to itself all mines of precious metals.

MINUTE
BY THE GOVERNOR.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR is pleased to direct that the following rules for the payment and adjustment of Costs attending the Survey of Lands intended to be brought to sale, be substituted for those laid down in the Minute of the 7th October 1844.

The Treasurer will, on his application, furnish the Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department with the necessary funds to meet the expenses of Survey; and he will debit these sums as Advances, for the settlement of which the Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department will be responsible.

The recovery of these sums from the purchasers of Land will be made by the Government Agents and remitted to the Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department, and by him forwarded to the Treasurer in liquidation of the Advances outstanding.

If any Land is not sold within one year from the date of its being advertised for sale, the expense of Survey on account of such Land is to be brought to account as a Charge by the Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department—in order to which it will be necessary in all cases, that proper Vouchers should be obtained for every payment as incurred.

Should any such Land be afterwards sold, the costs of Survey recovered are to be paid by the Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department to the Treasurer to be accounted for as an Incidental Receipt.

The Principal Officer in charge of the Survey Department will transmit to this Office quarterly a Return of all unsold Lands, the expenses of surveying which shall have been charged as an expenditure—making a note of such as may have been subsequently sold.

He will also furnish the Auditor General with a quarterly Account of all payments made by him out of the Advances received from the Treasurer, and of the recoveries on account—accompanied by a separate Account of the payments finally brought to account, and of the recoveries since made.

These rules are not however to apply to the Advances already made to Government Agents by the Treasurer, which they will settle in terms of the Minute of the 7th October 1844—returning to him any Balance that may be now in their hands.

Ordinance enacted by the Governor of Ceylon with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof.

No. 1.

C. CAMPBELL

An Ordinance to amend the Law relating to the Post Office and for revising the rates of Postage.

WHEREAS it is expedient that the Ordinance No. 8 of 1836, entitled "For protecting the Revenue derived from the Post Office and for revising the rates of Postage" and the Ordinance No. 10 of 1841, entitled "To provide for the transmission of Letters to and from this Island by extraordinary Express," should be repealed;

1. **IT IS THEREFORE HEREBY ENACTED** BY THE GOVERNOR OF CEYLON, with advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, that the said Ordinances No. 8 of 1836 and No. 10 of 1841 be repealed, except so far as the said Ordinance No. 8 of 1836 repeals any Regulations and Orders of this Government and except so far as the Ordinance No. 10 of 1841 indemnifies the Postmaster General for charges made previously to the passing of that Ordinance.

2. **AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED**, that it shall not be lawful for any person to transmit or convey any Letter or Letters from any part of these settlements to any other part thereof by any other means than by or through the Post Office Establishment, with the following exceptions that is to say, Letters from or to any place not being in the line of Road along which the Post travels, Letters concerning Goods or other Property to be delivered, such Letters being sent with or for the purpose of being delivered at the same time as the Property they concern, without hire or reward for receiving or delivering the same, Letters to be sent by any private friend or friends in their way, journey or travel, so as such Letters shall be delivered by such friend to the party to whom they may be directed, or by any Messenger sent on purpose for or concerning the private affairs of the sender or receiver thereof. And no person shall make a collection of such Letters hereby excepted, for the purpose of sending them in the manner hereby authorised. And the following persons are expressly forbidden to carry a Letter, or to receive or collect or deliver a Letter, although they shall not receive hire or reward for the same, that is to say,

Common known Coach proprietors, their drivers, servants or agents, except Letters sent by persons on any public line or road from one station to another where no Post Office is established between such two stations.

Owners, Masters or Commanders of Ships or Boats employed by Government for the conveyance of the public mails.

And every person transmitting or collecting or carrying or receiving or delivering any letter contrary to the provisions of this clause shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction to any fine not exceeding One Pound for every letter in respect of which any such offence shall have been committed. And it shall be lawful to

include any number of offences against this clause committed by the same person in one and the same information or complaint and it shall be competent to any Police Court to take cognizance of any number of offences so included as aforesaid and to award in respect thereof the full amount of punishment to which the offender is herein declared to be liable on conviction.

3. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that upon all Letters and Packets to be transmitted by or through the Post Office Establishment to or from any place within these settlements, there shall be levied the rates of Postage, according to distance, specified in the Schedule A to this Ordinance annexed.

4. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that Letters transmitted by the Post shall be charged by weight according to the following scale, and that the several numbers of Rates of Postage hereinafter set forth shall be thereon charged by and be paid to the Postmaster General for the use of Her Majesty that is to say,

On every Letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, one rate of Postage :

On every Letter exceeding half an ounce and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of Postage :

On every Letter exceeding one ounce and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of Postage :

On every Letter exceeding two ounces and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of Postage :

On every Letter exceeding three ounces and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight rates of Postage :

And for every ounce in weight above the weight of four ounces there shall be charged and taken two additional rates of Postage, and every fraction of an ounce above the weight of four ounces shall be charged as one additional ounce.

And all Letters transmitted from one part of these settlements to another not exceeding a quarter of an ounce in weight shall be charged as one half a rate.

5. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that His Excellency the Governor or Lieutenant Governor of these Settlements for the time being and the Hon'ble the Colonial Secretary shall be entitled to send and receive all Letters and Packets free of Postage except as is hereinafter excepted.

6. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that the following Persons not residing in Ceylon shall be permitted to send and receive all Letters through the Post Office of this Island free of Postage. The Governor General and Governors of the Presidencies of British India. The Commanders in Chief in British India and the Naval Commander in Chief, the Metropolitan Bishop of Calcutta, the Secretaries to the Supreme Government and the Secretaries to Government at the several Presidencies of British India, and the Governors and Colonial Secretaries of any of Her Majesty's Colonies within the limits of the Charter of the East India Company.

7. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that One Penny only shall be charged on every Printed Newspaper transmitted by or through the Post Office Establishment of this Colony, such Penny to be paid on putting the same into the Post Office when such Newspapers are sent to any place within or beyond these settlements, and such Penny to be paid on delivery when such Newspapers are received from places beyond these settlements.

8. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that no Newspaper shall be sent by Post at the above rate of one Penny, unless the following conditions shall be observed :

First, It shall be sent without a cover or in a cover open at the sides.

Second, there shall be no word or communication printed on the paper after its publication, or upon the cover thereof, nor any writing or marks upon it or upon the cover of it except the name and address of the person to whom sent.

Third, there shall be no paper or thing enclosed in or with any such paper.

9. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that the Postmaster General may examine and authorize to be examined any Printed Newspaper or Official Gazette sent by Post and if any other paper or writing whatsoever be enclosed or concealed in any such Printed Newspaper, or there shall be any communication or writing thereon or on the cover thereof, except the name and address of the person to whom it is sent or any other necessary direction as to its delivery or transmission, it shall be charged with treble the Duty of Letter Postage which the person to whom the same is sent, receiving the same after notice thereof, shall be obliged to pay, or in case he refuses to receive it, shall be paid by the person sending, if he can be ascertained and he residing within these Settlements. PROVIDED ALWAYS, that all Official Gazettes shall pass free of Postage within these Settlements.

10. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that all periodical Magazines and Printed periodical Pamphlets, whether issuing from the Press of this Island or elsewhere, shall be sent without a cover or in a cover open at the sides, be charged with a Postage of One Penny. Provided such Magazine or Periodical Pamphlet shall not exceed the weight of one ounce and if the same shall exceed the weight of one Ounce then at the rate of One Penny for every additional ounce or fraction of an ounce but no fractional parts of One Penny shall be charged, and the Postmaster General or persons by him authorized shall at all times have the liberty of inspecting such Magazines and Pamphlets, to ascertain whether any other paper or communication be concealed or inserted therein not belonging thereto, and in case any other paper or communication be found therein or it be not sent open at both ends as aforesaid, full Postage shall be chargeable on such Magazine or Pamphlet as on a Letter of the same weight. PROVIDED ALWAYS that nothing herein contained shall be construed to oblige any Person to send any Printed Newspaper, Magazine or Pamphlet through the Post Office, but that it shall be lawful for all Persons to send the same in any manner most practicable or convenient AND PRO-

VEDD FURTHER that the privilege of franking shall not extend to any Printed Newspapers Magazine or Pamphlet transmitted through the Post Office.

11. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that the transmission of Parcels by the Post shall only take place at such period or periods and to and from such parts of these settlements, and at such rates or charges, and with such limitations as to their weight size and the nature of their contents, as shall from time to time by previous Advertisement in the Gazette, be directed by the Governor or Lieutenant Governor for the time being.

12. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that it shall be lawful for the Postmaster General or any of his Deputies to detain any Post Letter or Parcel suspected to contain any contraband goods, and to forward the same to the nearest Collector or Sub-Collector of Customs that he may ascertain whether the contents thereof are liable to duty. And the Postmaster General or one of his deputies shall give notice to the party to whom such parcels sent to the Custom House may be addressed of their having been so sent and of the rate of Postage due on the same which Postage shall be collected by the Custom House Officers and sent to the Post Office.

13. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that all Letters received or sent by mail by way of Red Sea whether the same shall be received or sent by way of Bombay or Point de Galle or shall be brought to Ceylon by private Ships, shall be charged with the Postage duty of one shilling each single rate, at whatever place they may be delivered or from whatever place they may be sent within this Colony and that no additional inland Postage shall be charged on the same—and no privilege of franking shall extend to Letters transmitted or received by way of the Red Sea, the public Despatches and Letters being *bonâ fide* on the public service only excepted.

14. AND WHEREAS the Postmaster General may already have been, or may hereafter be, directed to levy certain charges on behalf of Her Majesty's General Post Office in London under the denomination of Red Sea Postage, Foreign Europe Postage, prepaid British Postage intercolonial Postage, or similar charge, it is hereby enacted that on such directions being published in the Government Gazette of this Colony, it shall be lawful for the Postmaster General to levy such extra charges in addition to the Colonial rates in the foregoing clause laid down.

15. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that on every Letter which shall be brought to Ceylon by any Vessel not sent by the way of the Red Sea from any Port or Place beyond Sea, there shall be a Sea Postage of Four Pence, and on every letter which shall be sent through the Post Office to any part beyond Sea, a Sea Postage of Two Pence, besides any Postage chargeable thereon for previous or subsequent transmission inland. And for the encouragement of the Masters or Commanders of Vessels, to deliver to the Post Office any loose letters or packets brought by any such Vessel it shall be lawful for the Postmaster General to allow to the Commander or Master of every Vessel arriving as aforesaid the sum of Two Pence for each Letter or

Packet and One Penny for each Newspaper not being enclosed in the Ship Mails of the General Post Office of the United Kingdom by him delivered or caused to be delivered, at the Post Office of the first port he may arrive at in these settlements.

16. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that the Master or other Person in Command of every Vessel sailing from any Port of these settlements shall receive on board and convey all Mails and Bags of Letters which shall be delivered or caused to be delivered to him by the Postmaster General or any of his Deputies, and every Master or other Person in Command of any Vessel about to proceed to sea shall be and he is hereby required either by himself or his Agent a *Bonâ Fide* at least 24 hours before the time of departure and every such Master or other person acting contrary to the provisions of this clause shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction thereof to a fine of Fifty Pounds.

17. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that on the arrival of any Vessel off the Coast of Ceylon the Master or person in chief Command thereof shall cause all letters on board to be collected and at the first Port send the same on shore by his own Boat or by the Pilot Boat, or any other safe and convenient opportunity, in order that the same may be delivered at the first regular Post Office which can be communicated with and shall at such Port sign a Declaration in the presence of the person authorized by the Postmaster General at such port who shall also sign the same, and the Declaration shall be in the form or to the effect following that is to say,
 "I A. B. Commander of the (state the name of the Ship or Vessel)
 "arrived from (state the place) do, as required by Law, declare, that
 "I have to the best of my knowledge and belief, delivered, or caused
 "to be delivered to the Post Office, every Letter, Bag, Package or Parcel
 "of letters that were on board the (state the name of the Ship)"
 And until such Declaration shall be made and produced, no Collector, Comptroller or Principal Officer of the Customs shall permit such Ship or Vessel to report, or to break bulk or to make entry in any port; and in case such Declaration shall be false, the person making the same shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine of Ten Pounds.

18. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that it shall be lawful for any Officer of Customs at any Port or place in these Settlements who in the due execution of his duty as a Revenue Officer shall discover any letters or packets on board any Vessel in any Port or place whatsoever contrary to the provisions of this Ordinance, to seize and take all such letters and packets and to forward the same to the Postmaster General or his Deputy at such Port or place; and that the Officer seizing and sending the same shall be entitled to one moiety of any penalty which may be imposed and be recovered for any such offence.

19. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that all letters or parcels directed to any place in India and transmitted by land shall be charged as far as the boundary of this Island, and that all letters or packets coming from India by land shall be charged as from the boundary of this Island.

20. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that Money, Jewels, Ornaments, or other valuable Articles sent by Post, shall be received and forwarded at the entire risk of the persons sending the same, and the letter or packet containing the same shall be charged with the letter postage according to the weight thereof.

21. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that all Letters which the persons addressed shall refuse to receive shall be returned to the Office from whence they were despatched, and the persons sending the same, if in these Settlements, shall be charged with the original postage, and all Letters addressed to persons who cannot be found at the place of address shall be returned (without charge) either to the person sending them or to the Office from whence they were first despatched, and in the latter case they shall be entered in a list to be exposed in the most public part of such Office, and, from time to time the list shall be sent to the Postmaster General to be published in the Government Gazette.

22. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that any person opening a letter or envelope to his address shall be bound to pay the postage of the same, whatever may be the contents, but it shall be lawful for the Postmaster General to remit the postage of any letter so opened, which shall appear to have been opened by mistake or sent maliciously to annoy or to have the person addressed charged with the postage thereof.

23. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that the following classes of Persons may both send and receive Letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight by the Post, on their own private concerns, at a Postage of one penny for each Letter; namely,

Every Seaman employed in Her Majesty's Navy, or in the employ of the Government of these settlements, whilst such Seaman shall be actually so employed at any Port of this Colony.

Every Serjeant, Corporal, Drummer, Trumpeter, Fifer, and private Soldier in Her Majesty's Regular Forces, Artillery or Royal Marines, whilst actually employed in Her Majesty's Service in this Colony.

But the Letters of Commissioned Officers or Warrant Officers whether in the Army or Navy, or Midshipmen or Master Mates of the Navy, are not included in this Provision.

And with respect to Letters sent by any such privileged Persons the following Conditions shall be observed; that is to say, the Postage of such Letter shall be paid on being put into a Post Office, and upon such Letter shall be superscribed the name of the writer, and his class or description in the Vessel, Regiment, Corps, or Detachment to which he shall belong; and upon such Letter there shall be written in the handwriting of the Officer having at the time the command of the Vessel, or of the Regiment, Corps, or Detachment, to which the privileged Person belongs, the name of such Officer and the name of such Vessel or of such Regiment, Corps, or Detachment.

And with respect to Letters received by the Post by any of the said privileged Persons the following conditions shall be observed; the Postage of such Letter unless sent from parts beyond the seas shall be paid upon putting it into a Post Office, and it shall be directed to the privileged Person specifying on the superscription thereof the Vessel or the Regiment Corps or Detachment to which he shall belong and the Postmaster General or his Deputy at the place to which such Letter shall be sent to be delivered shall not deliver such Letter to any Person except the Person to whom it shall be directed or to some Person appointed to receive the same, by writing under the hand of the Officer in command.

24. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that the said Privilege shall not extend to any Letters liable to any foreign rates of Postage.

25. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that any Letters received by the Post by any Commissioned Officer which may have been re-directed on account of the removal from one place to another of such Officer on public duty shall not be charged with any additional Postage on or in respect of such re-direction.

26. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that if any person having the command of the Vessel, Regiment, Corps or Detachment and who is hereby directed to write his name and the name of the Vessel, Regiment, Corps or Detachment commanded by him, upon any single letter from any such Seaman, Serjeant, Corporal, Trumpeter, Drummer, Fifer or Private Soldier, shall wilfully and knowingly write his name upon any such letter that is not from any such Seaman, Serjeant, Corporal, Trumpeter, Drummer, Fifer or Private Soldier, and on his or their own private concerns only, such Commanding Officer shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction thereof to a fine of Five Pounds. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that if any person not having at the time the Command of the Ship, Vessel, Regiment Corps or Detachment, shall write his name upon any such letter, in order that the same may be sent at a lower rate of postage than by Law established, every such person shall be guilty of an offence, and be liable on conviction thereof to a fine of Five Pounds.

27. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that if any person or persons whosoever shall knowingly and designedly address a letter or letters to any such Seaman, Serjeant, Corporal, Trumpeter, Drummer, Fifer or Private Soldier, which shall be intended for another person, or which shall be concerning the affairs of another person, with intent to evade the payment of the rate of postage by Law established, every such person shall be guilty of an offence, and be liable on conviction thereof to a fine of Five Pounds.

28. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that if any person whosoever shall procure any such Seaman, Serjeant, Corporal, Trumpeter, Drummer, Fifer or Private Soldier, to obtain the signature of his Commanding Officer to any letter or letters to be sent by the Post, which shall not be on the private concerns of such Seaman, Serjeant, Corporal, Trumpeter, Drummer, Fifer or Private Soldier; or if any such Seaman, Serjeant, Corporal, Trumpeter, Drummer, Fifer or Pri-

any Soldier shall himself obtain the signature of his Commanding Officer upon any letter or letters which shall not be from such Seaman, Serjeant, Corporal, Trumpeter, Drummer, Fifer or Private Soldier and upon his own private concerns only, in order to avoid the payment of the rate of postage by Law established, every such person shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction thereof to a fine of Five Pounds.

29. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that no person shall be deemed incompetent to give evidence at the trial of any party for any offence created by this Ordinance by reason of any reward or benefit to which such person would be entitled upon the conviction of such offender.

30. AND to the end that the Postmaster General and his officers may not be hindered in their respective employments, IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that no Postmaster General nor any person employed by or under the Post Office shall be compelled to serve on any Jury or Inquest, any Ordinance to the contrary thereof notwithstanding.

31. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that any person who being employed in any capacity in by or under the Post Office establishment shall secrete, steal, destroy, mutilate or break open any letter, packet or parcel which shall have been put into the Post for transmission, whether any thing valuable be therein contained or not, or who, being so employed shall steal or take out of any such letter, packet or parcel, any draft, promissory note or any other contents whatsoever, or who shall not duly account for any money received by him on account of postage, shall be guilty of an offence and liable on conviction to transportation or imprisonment at hard labor for any period not exceeding seven years and every act committed by any person so employed as aforesaid in respect of any letter packet or parcel or any thing therein contained or of any money received by him on account of postage which by the Law of England would amount to an act of embezzlement shall be deemed and taken throughout this Colony to be an act of theft in respect of such letter packet parcel or thing contained therein or money so received as aforesaid and shall be punished as such.

32. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that every person employed to convey or deliver a Post letter bag or a Post letter who shall be guilty whilst so employed of any act of drunkenness carelessness or other misconduct whereby the safety of a Post letter bag or a Post letter shall be endangered, or who shall collect or receive or convey or deliver a letter otherwise than in the ordinary course of the Post, or who shall not use proper care and diligence solely to convey a Post letter bag or a Post letter according to the Regulations of the Post Office for the time being shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction thereof to any fine not exceeding Five Pounds.

33. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that every person employed by or under the Post Office who shall contrary to his duty open or procure or suffer to be opened a Post letter, or shall wilfully detain or delay or procure or suffer to be detained or delayed a Post letter shall be guilty of an offence and on conviction thereof shall

be liable to any fine not exceeding Twenty Pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labor for any period not exceeding twelve months. PROVIDED ALWAYS that nothing herein contained shall extend to the detaining or delaying or opening by the Postmaster General of a Post letter returned for want of a true direction or of a Post letter returned by reason that the person to whom the same shall be directed is dead or cannot be found or shall have refused the letter or shall have refused or neglected to pay the Postage thereof.

34. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that every person who shall fraudulently retain or shall wilfully secrete or keep or detain, or, being required to deliver up by an Officer of the Post Office, shall neglect or refuse to deliver up a Post letter which ought to have been delivered to any other person, or a Post letter bag or Post letter which shall have been sent whether the same shall have been found by the person secreting keeping or detaining, or neglecting or refusing to deliver up the same, or by any other person, shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction thereof to any fine not exceeding Five Pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labor for any period not exceeding twelve months.

35. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that it shall be unlawful for any person whomsoever to detain a Post Office messenger whilst carrying the mails, or on any pretence to open a packet in transit from one Post Office to another within these Settlements, and any person so doing, whether he take any letter from such packet or not, shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction thereof to any fine not exceeding Five Pounds.

36. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that in every case where an offence shall be committed in respect of a Post letter bag or a Post letter, or a chattel, money, or a valuable security, sent by the Post, the property of the Post letter bag or of the Post letter, or chattel or money or the valuable security sent by the Post, shall be laid when necessary to be laid at all in Her Majesty and it shall not be necessary in any information or complaint to allege or to prove upon the Trial or otherwise that the Post letter bag or any such Post letter or valuable security was of any value, and in any information or complaint to be preferred against any Person employed under the Post Office for any offence committed against this Ordinance it shall be lawful to state and allege that such offender was employed under the Post Office at the time of the committing of such offence, without stating further the nature or particulars of his employment.

37. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that whenever any person shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance the punishment or any one of the punishments of which shall be a fine it shall be lawful for any Court which would have authority to try such offence to accept payment on behalf of Her Majesty from such offender of the amount of fine to which such offender would have been liable on conviction upon presentation to such Court of a Certificate signed by the Queen's Advocate or some Deputy Queen's Advocate that such officer is consentient to the receipt of such pay-

ment and no person having made such payment shall thereafter be triable for the same offence.

38. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that all Duties of Postage payable by virtue of this Ordinance shall be deemed and taken to be debts due to Her Majesty and may be sued and recovered in such and the same manner and form as any other debt of the like amount due to Her Majesty and it shall be lawful for the Postmaster General or any of his Deputies or for any person authorized in that behalf by writing under the hand of the Postmaster General or of any of his Deputies to appear and represent Her Majesty in any suit or other proceeding which shall be instituted in any Court of Requests for the recovery of any debt which shall have become due under the provisions of this Ordinance.

39. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that a share not exceeding one moiety of every fine imposed under this Ordinance and actually recovered shall be awarded to the Informer.

40. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that all powers and privileges vested in and all duties required to be performed by the Postmaster General under the provisions of this Ordinance shall and may be exercised and performed by any Deputy Postmaster General within such limits as he shall be appointed to act by or under the authority of the Governor.

41. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that it shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time with the advice of the Executive Council to make such rules as shall appear expedient for the transmission and payment of all Official letters and parcels and for regulating the hours during which the several Post Offices in this Colony shall be kept open for the reception of Letters Newspapers and Parcels and to direct that any or all of such Post Offices shall be open for the reception thereof out of such regular hours upon payment for every such Letter Newspaper or Parcel so posted out of the regular hours of such Extra charge as to the said Governor with the advice aforesaid shall from time to time appear expedient.

42. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that any person sending and any Public Officer permitting to be sent by Post under colour or pretence of an official communication any letter paper writing or other enclosure of a private nature shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction thereof to any fine not exceeding five pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labor not exceeding three months.

43. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that it shall be lawful, whenever any letters or parcels may have been forwarded by express from one place to another within this Colony for the Postmaster General to charge such extra rates for the conveyance of such letters or parcels by express as may be approved of by the Governor and the Executive Council.

44. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that for the purposes of this Ordinance the term Postmaster General shall mean the Postmaster General of this Island or person for the time being lawfully executing the duties thereof and that the term Letter shall include Packet and the

term Packet shall include letter and the term Newspaper shall include every bona fide Supplement to a Newspaper and the term Post letter shall mean any letter or packet transmitted by the Post under the authority of the Postmaster General and a letter shall be deemed a Post letter from the time of its being delivered to a Post Office to the time of its being delivered to the person to whom it was addressed and the delivery to a letter carrier or other person authorized to receive letters for the post shall be a delivery to the Post Office and a delivery at the house or office of the person to whom the letter is addressed or to him or to his servant or Agent or other person considered to be authorized to receive the letter according to the usual manner of delivering that person's letters shall be a delivery to the person addressed.

45. AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED, that this Ordinance shall commence and take effect from and after the first day of February 1845.

OPTIONAL PREPAYMENT OF THE BRITISH PACKET POSTAGE,

ON

OVERLAND LETTERS *via* SOUTHAMPTON.

1—Instructions having been received from the Postmaster General in London that the optional payment of the British Packet-Postage on Letters between Ceylon and the United Kingdom *via* Southampton should be forthwith commenced it is hereby notified for general information that, from the 1st of December next, the several Post Offices throughout Ceylon will be prepared to receive, at the option of the sender, the British Packet Postage on letters directed to the United Kingdom *via* Southampton, and Notice is hereby given that the system was to be carried into operation in England from the 1st of the present month.

2—The following are the British rates of Packet Postage fixed by the Lords of the Treasury, according to which all Letters received

"Unpaid" from, or despatched "Paid" to the United Kingdom via Southampton, will be taxed, in addition to the usual Ceylon postage, viz.

- When not exceeding half ounce 1 shilling
- Above half ounce and not exceeding 1 ounce 2 do.
- 1 do. and not exceeding 2 do. 4 do.
- 2 do. and not exceeding 3 do. 6 do.

and so on, increasing two shillings for every additional ounce weight, or any fraction thereof.

3.—The public will bear in mind that this Optional Prepayment of the British rate of Postage applies only to letters despatched via Southampton, and that letters sent by Marseilles cannot be Prepaid in this Island. It applies also only to Letters to be delivered within the United Kingdom.

RED SEA POSTAGE ON LETTERS WHICH DO NOT PASS THROUGH THE UNITED KINGDOM.

The following scale of Red-Sea Postage, as approved by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury in England, was established to be in force from the 1st April 1844, in supersession of the rates laid down in the Advertisement of 8th December 1839 under instructions received from Her Majesty's Postmaster General in London.

On every Letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, one shilling.

On every Letter exceeding half an ounce and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two shillings.

On every Letter exceeding one ounce and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four shillings.

On every Letter exceeding two ounces and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six shillings.

And on every Letter exceeding three ounces and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight shillings.

And for every ounce in weight above the weight of four ounces, there shall be charged and taken two additional rates of Postage or two shillings, and every fraction of an ounce above the weight of four ounces shall be charged as one additional ounce.

It must be clearly understood that the above scale applies to Letters of every description, except such as may be received from, or addressed to, the United Kingdom by way of Marseilles or Southampton, and will be levied in addition to the Island Postage laid down in the Ordinance No. 1 of 1846.

RATES OF POSTAGE ON LETTERS AND PAPERS

SENT BY THE

CONTRACT STEAMERS TO INDIA AND CHINA.

NOTICE is hereby given that, in pursuance of Instructions issued by Her Majesty's Postmaster General, London, in virtue of a Treasury

Warrant dated the 11th day of September last the following rates of British Packet Postage will be levied on all Letters, Newspapers and Prices-Current, conveyed between any port of Ceylon and any port in the East Indies, China, &c. by the Contract Steamers from Point de Galle, such rates being in addition to the usual Colonial postage: that is to say:

- On every Letter not exceeding half ounce weight..... one shilling
- not exceeding one ounce..... two shillings
- not exceeding two ounces..... four shillings
- and on every additional ounce or fractional part of an ounce..... additional
- On every Newspaper addressed to a foreign port..... one penny
- such as Manila, Canton, &c.....
- On every Price Current or printed Commercial list conveyed to a British port..... one penny.
- On the same addressed to a foreign port..... two pence.

It will be optional with the senders to prepay, or not, the above rates, so far as regards Letters addressed to the Island of Hong-Kong.

- From 6 to 8 p. m. of 3d. each
- From 8 to 10 p. m. .. 6d. "
- From 4 to 5 a. m. .. 6d. "

which sums will be carried to the public account.

OFFICIAL CORRESPONDENCE.

IN pursuance of the 41st Clause of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1846, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to direct that the following Rules for the regulating of the mode of transmitting Official Correspondence through the Post be strictly attended to by all Public Officers, Civil or Military:

1. All letters sent from any Civil Public Office shall bear on the cover the signature of the Head of that Office, or, in his absence, of his Chief Assistant present, and from Military Offices, the signature of the Commandants, Heads of Departments, or Officers Commanding Regiments or Detachments; and every Officer, Civil or Military, so affixing his signature, shall be answerable that such letters are strictly on Her Majesty's Service; and all letters to a Civil Public Office shall be opened only by the Head of that Office, and in his absence by his Chief Assistant present; and all Military communications must be sent unsealed under cover to the Commandants, Heads of Departments, or Officers Commanding Regiments or Detachments, and all Officers Civil and Military are hereby strictly enjoined to return to the Post Office any private communication found therein, with the name of the party by whom the letter or packet was sent, that the 4th Clause of the Ordinance may be carried into effect. This Rule is to be binding on Officers at outstations, with regard to the correspondence passing between them, as well as on Officers at the Head Quarters.
2. The Postmaster General is hereby strictly enjoined to send to the Colonial Secretary all letters whether received for transmission from, or delivery at, the General Post Office, which he may suspect to contain private communications, that they may be opened by the Colonial Secretary and dealt with according to the nature of their contents.
3. The only address henceforth required on letters to be sent by the Post, will be that of the Officer for whom they are intended, and the signature of the party by whom they are sent, and the words: "On Her Majesty's Service." The stamp of the Colonial Secretary's Office will no longer be necessary, nor the signature of the Assistant Military Secretary.
4. No Official Packet, to be sent by the Post on any road where there are other means of transmission, shall exceed the weight of 16 ounces.
5. It is hereby explained that Official correspondence will only be held to be communications strictly on Her Majesty's Service. Letters addressed to a Public Officer on the concerns of the sender will have to be paid on being sent, and letters from a Public Officer on the concerns of the party addressed, will have to be paid on delivery; and all privileges of sending Parcels or letters free of postage hitherto granted to private Offices or persons are hereby cancelled.

TRANSMISSION OF PARCELS.

IN pursuance of the 11th Clause of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1846, the Governor is pleased to direct that the following Rules for transmission of Parcels by the Post, be published for general information:

1. Parcels are only to be forwarded by the Post on lines of Road on which there are no private Establishments by which they can be conveyed.
2. Parcels are not to be forwarded on days when the weight of the mail would be thereby increased beyond the limit of 11 lbs.; and the Postmaster General in Colombo, or any person authorized to act for him at any Outstation, is permitted to detain any Parcel till a day on which the number weight of the mail will allow it to be sent.
3. No private Parcel is to exceed 1 lb. in weight, and every Parcel is to be made up in a form which can be conveniently carried by a Post Office runner.

4. No Glass or Glass bottle or other Vessel containing Liquid, or any article or thing which might by pressure or otherwise be rendered injurious to the contents of the mail, nor any vegetables, fruit or other perishable substance, is to be carried by the Post.
5. The Post Office is not to be held answerable for Parcels containing money or jewels or any other article of value. Persons sending the same by Post will do so at their own risk.
6. In order that the conveyance of Parcels may not interfere with the revenue of the regular Post, all Parcels must be certified on the direction of the parties sending the same by Post to contain no letters, and every single letter found in any Parcel so certified will be liable to a charge of five Shillings, to be paid by the person sending the Parcel, if it be refused by the person to whom it is addressed; and the Postmaster General or any person acting in his behalf may call on any person receiving a Parcel which is suspected to contain a letter to open it in his presence.
7. No Parcel is to be franked; all Parcels below one pound in weight shall be charged as a double letter; and an additional half rate of letter postage, according to the distance, is to be charged for each additional pound or fraction of a pound.
8. And to avoid all mis-understanding as to the nature of a Parcel, it is hereby explained that no parcel is to contain any written Papers whatsoever, or printed Papers partly filled up in writing, excepting legal documents unaccompanied by any letter, and as prescribed as such.

EXPRESSS.

UNDER clause 43 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1846 the Governor and the Executive Council are pleased to direct that no charge for express shall be made on letters sent in mails by the Post, when the amount of the postage to be levied on such letters shall fully cover the expense incurred in transmitting the same.

1. When the amount of the postage levied on such letters shall not equal the expense incurred in transmitting them, an extra charge shall be levied sufficient to render the postage equal to such expense.
2. Expresses may be sent at the instance of any private party when considered practicable by the Postmaster General or his Deputies: at a charge of *sd.* per mile.

POSTAGE BY THE "SEAFORTH".

UNDER the 43d Clause of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1846 regarding Expresses, the Governor and the Executive Council are pleased to fix the postage on Letters brought from any place in India by the SEAFORTH at the following rates, viz.

- One Shilling—for every Letter not exceeding half ounce weight
Two Shillings—for every Letter not exceeding one ounce "
Four Shillings—for every Letter not exceeding two ounces "
and two Shillings for every additional ounce or fraction of an ounce.

GENERAL ORDER.

Head Quarters, Colombo, 26th February, 1846.

No. 1.—With reference to the Ordinance No. 1 enacted by the Governor of Ceylon with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, under date 5th January 1846, the following Rules respecting Military Correspondence are published for the information and guidance of the Army.

All former orders relative to the transmission of Letters through the Post Office Department within this Island are hereby cancelled.

Non-Commissioned Officers and Soldiers in Her Majesty's Forces whilst actually employed in Her Majesty's Service in this Colony may both send and receive Letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight by the Post on their own private concerns, at a postage of one penny for each Letter on the following conditions;

With respect to Letters sent by any such Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier the postage of such Letter shall be paid on being put into a Post Office, and upon such Letter shall be superscribed the name of the writer, and his class or description in the Regiment, Corps or Detachment to which he shall belong, and upon such Letter there shall be written in the handwriting of the Officer having at the time the Command of the Regiment, Corps or Detachment to which the privileged Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier belongs, the name of such Officer and the name of such Regiment, Corps or Detachment.

And with respect to Letters received by the Post by any of the said privileged persons the Postage of such Letter (unless sent from parts beyond the seas) shall be paid upon putting it into a Post Office, and it shall be directed to such privileged person specifying on the superscription thereof the Regiment, Corps or Detachment to which he may belong.

The Postmaster General or his Deputy at the place to which such Letters shall be sent to be delivered is not authorized to deliver such Letter to any person except the person to whom it shall be directed or to some person appointed to receive the same, by writing under the hand of the Officer in Command of the Regiment, Corps or Detachment to which such privileged person shall belong.

But the Letters of Commissioned or Warrant Officers are not included in the above provision.

The said privilege shall not extend to any Letters liable to any foreign rates of postage.

Any Letters received by the Post by any Commissioned Officers which may have been re-directed on account of the removal from one place to another of such Officer on Public duty shall not be charged any additional postage on or in respect of such re-direction.

If any person having the Command of the Regiment, Corps or Detachment, and who is hereby directed to write his name and the name of the Regiment, Corps or Detachment commanded by him upon any single Letter from any such privileged Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier, shall wilfully and knowingly write his name upon any such Letter that is not from any such Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier and on his own private concerns only, such Commanding Officer shall be Guilty of an Offence and be liable on

conviction thereof to a fine of Five Pounds; and if any person not having at the time the Command of the Regiment, Corps or Detachment, shall write his name upon any such Letter in order that the same may be sent at a lower rate of postage than by Law established, every such person shall be Guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction thereof to a fine of Five Pounds.

If any person or persons whosoever shall knowingly and designedly address a Letter or Letters to any such Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier, which shall be intended for another person, or which shall be concerning the affairs of another person, with intent to evade the payment of the rate of Postage by Law established, every such person shall be guilty of an offence, and be liable on conviction thereof to a fine of Five Pounds.

If any person whosoever shall procure any such Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier to obtain the Signature of his Commanding Officer upon any Letter or Letters to be sent by the Post, which shall not be on the private concerns of such Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier, or if any such Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier, shall himself obtain the Signature of his Commanding Officer upon any Letter or Letters, which shall not be from such Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier, and upon his own private concerns only, in order to avoid the payment of the rate of postage by Law established, every such person shall be guilty of an offence and be liable on conviction thereof to a fine of Five Pounds.

Copies of the Ordinance No. 1 of the 5th January 1846 will be kept on record and for reference in the Offices of the Deputy Adjutant General, Deputy Quartermaster General, Respective Officers of Ordnance, Inspector General of Hospitals and Staff Officers of Colombo, Trincomalee, Galle and Kandy.

The following rules extracted from the *Ceylon Government Gazette* of the 31st January 1846 having reference to the Ordinance above alluded to are also published for the information and guidance of the army:

"In pursuance of the 4th Clause of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1846, His Excellency the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council is pleased to direct that the following Rules for the regulation of the mode of transmitting Official correspondence through the Post be strictly attended to by all Public Officers, Civil or Military:

"1. All letters sent from any Civil Public Office shall bear on the cover the signature of the Head of that Office, or, in his absence, of his Chief Assistant present, and from Military Offices, the signature of the Commandants, Heads of Departments, or Officers Commanding Regiments or Detachments; and every Officer Civil or Military so affixing his signature, shall be answerable that such letters are strictly on Her Majesty's Service; and all letters to a Civil Public Office shall be opened only by the Head of that Office, and in his absence by his Chief Assistant present; and all Military communications must be sent unsealed under cover to the Commandants, Heads of Departments, or Officers Commanding Regiments or Detachments—and all Officers Civil and Military are hereby strictly enjoined to return to the

- "Post Office any private communication found therein, with the name of the party by whom the letter or packet was sent that the 42d Clause of the Ordinance may be carried into effect. This Rule is to be held binding on Officers at Outstations, with regard to the correspondence passing between them, as well as on Officers at the Head Quarters.
- "2. The Postmaster General is hereby strictly enjoined to send to the Colonial Secretary all letters, whether received for transmission from, or delivery at, the General Post Office, which he may suspect to contain private communications, that they may be opened by the Colonial Secretary, and dealt with according to the nature of their contents.
- "3. The only address henceforth required on letters to be sent by the Post, will be those of the Officers for whom they are intended, and the signature of the party by whom they are sent, and the words "On Her Majesty's Service"—The Stamp of the Colonial Secretary's Office will no longer be necessary, nor the signature of the Assistant Military Secretary.
- "4. No Official packet to be sent by the Post on any road, where there are other means of transmission, shall exceed the weight of sixteen ounces.
- "5. It is hereby explained that Official correspondence will only be held to be communications strictly On Her Majesty's Service—Letters addressed to a Public Officer on the concern of the sender will have to be paid on being sent, and Letters from a Public Officer on the concerns of the party addressed will have to be paid on delivery; and a privilege of sending parcels or letters free of postage is hereto granted to private officers or persons are hereby cancelled."

OPTIONAL PAYMENT OF POSTAGE ON LETTERS
SENT BY THE
CONTRACT-STEAMERS TO INDIA AND CHINA.

WITH reference to the 14th Clause of the Post Office Ordinance No. 1 of 1846, Notice is hereby given that, under instructions received from Her Majesty's General Post Office in London, it will in future be optional with parties writing by the Contract Steamers from Point de Galle to the Presidencies of India or to Hong Kong, to prepay, or not, the British Packet Postage directed to be levied under the Treasury Warrant dated the 11th day of September last; but that postage must always be paid in advance on letters sent to any foreign country or possession.

The British Packet rate will be levied here on letters on which it shall not have been prepaid in the Presidencies of India or in Hong Kong.

The Colonial Ship postage, chargeable under the 5th Clause of the abovementioned Ordinance, will not in future be levied on letters sent by the Contract-Packets from Galle; but only inland postage in addition to the British rate.

By His Excellency Lieutenant General Sir COLIN CAMPBELL, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander in Chief in and over the British Settlements and Territories in the Island of Ceylon with the Dependencies thereof.

WHEREAS it has been determined by Her Majesty's Government that the Island of Ceylon and its Dependencies shall for the future, as regards the collection of the Revenue and the extent of the authority of the several Government Agents, be divided into six Provinces, to be denominated the Northern, Southern, Eastern, Western, North-Western and Central Provinces. And Whereas it is necessary to define the limits of these Provinces.

It is therefore hereby Proclaimed and appointed that The Northern Province shall consist of the Districts of Jaffna, Manar, the Wanny and Nuweiralawie, and the Island of Delft.

The Southern Province shall consist of the Districts of Galle, Matara and Hambantotte; and the Yakkawela Hatera Baagia of Saffragam.

The Eastern Province shall consist of the Districts of Trincomalie, Batticaloa, Tamankadewe and Bintenne excepting the portions comprised within the Central Province.

The Western Province shall consist of the District of Colombo, the Four Korles, Three Korles and Saffragam excepting the portion comprised within the Southern Province; and Lower Bulatgame.

The North-Western Province shall consist of the Districts of Chilaw and Putlam and the Seven Korles.

The Central Province shall consist of the Districts of Kandy, Yattinowera, Udunuwera, Herasiapattoo, Tumpane, Dumbera, Hewahette, Kotmalie, Uda Bulatgame, Welasse, Weyeloowa, Uwa, Matele, Udapalata and Wallapane; Wegampaha, Kolowakampaha and Meyanwewelle Palata of Bintenne, and as much of the remainder of Bintenne as lies on the left bank of the Mahavilla Ganga.

WHEREAS by the Ordinance No. 9 of 1843 entitled an "Ordinance to alter and amend in certain respects the constitution of the Supreme Court the power of the Judges thereof and the manner of proceeding therein" it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor with the concurrence of the Judges of the Supreme Court or the major part of them but not otherwise by any Proclamation or Proclamations to be by him for that purpose issued to apportion or divide this Island into three or more Circuits and to fix and ascertain the boundaries and limits of every such Circuit, and from time to time with the like concurrence but not otherwise to revoke alter and amend any such Proclamation or Proclamations as occasion may require.

And whereas by a Proclamation published on the thirtieth day of November last in conformity with the said Ordinance the said Island was divided into three Circuits as therein described.

And whereas by a Proclamation dated this First day of October it is declared that the said Island shall be divided into six Provinces, to be termed the Northern, Southern, Eastern, Western, North-Western and Central Provinces and has therefore become necessary to revoke the said Proclamation of the thirtieth day of November last. Now therefore with the said Governor with the concurrence of the Judges of the Supreme Court do hereby proclaim and direct that the said Proclamation shall from the date hereof be revoked and cease to have any effect.

And we do further with the like concurrence proclaim and direct that from the date hereof this Island shall be divided into three Circuits to be denominated the Northern, Midland and Southern Circuits.

And we do further proclaim and direct that the Northern Circuit shall comprehend and extend over the Northern and Eastern Provinces and the Districts of Chilaw and Putlam of the North-Western Province.

The Midland Circuit shall comprehend and extend over the Central Province, the District of the Seven Korles in the North-Western Province, and the Western Province with the exception of such portions thereof as are comprised within the Southern Circuit.

The Southern Circuit shall comprehend and extend over the Southern Province and the following portions of the Western Province, that is to say, the Pasloon Corle and so much of the Wallalawity Corle as is attached to it, Welapora Calura and all the villages between the River of Bentotte and the Calura River or Caloo Ganga which are situated between the Pasloon Corle and the Sea, Desaster Calura and all the villages attached to it of Ellenamade, Dedigewe, Coeswainamme and Oeggalbodde, the Raygan Corle and the Vidahney of Pantura excepting the two villages of Katooooroondoo and Egode Oyene.

WHEREAS by the Ordinance No. 9 of 1843 entitled "An Ordinance to alter and amend in certain respects the constitution of the Supreme Court the powers of the Judges thereof and the manner of proceeding therein," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor of this Island by any Proclamation or Proclamations to be by him for that purpose issued to sub-divide into Districts each of the Circuits into which the said Island shall be divided and from time to time to revoke alter and amend any such Proclamation or Proclamations as occasion may require and which appointment of the said Circuits and Districts shall be made in such a manner as may best consist with, and promote the prompt and effectual administration of Justice therein.

And whereas by Proclamations bearing date respectively the thirtieth day of November and the twelfth day of December last, the said Island has been apportioned and sub-divided into Circuits and Districts and Districts as therein described.

And whereas the said Proclamation of the thirtieth day of November last has been revoked by a Proclamation bearing date this First day of October and it has therefore become expedient to revoke the said Proclamation of the twelfth day of December last and to sub-divide the Circuits appointed by the said Proclamation of this First day of October in such a manner as may best consist with and promote the prompt administration of Justice in this Island.

Now therefore we the said Governor do hereby proclaim and direct that the said Proclamation of the twelfth day of December last shall from the date hereof be revoked and cease to have any effect.

And we do further proclaim and direct that from the date hereof.

The Northern Circuit shall be sub-divided into six Districts, to be called as hereunder expressed. And the places at which the Courts thereof shall be held shall be those subjoined to the names of the Districts respectively.

District Court to be held at

- The District of Chilaw Chilaw.
- The District of Manar Manar and Silawatorre.
- The District of Nuwerakalawiya Anarajahpoora.
- The District of Jaffna Jaffna.
- The District of Trincomalie Trincomalie.
- The District of Batticaloa Batticaloa.

And the limits of the said Districts shall respectively be as follows, vizt.

The District of Chilaw shall consist of the several divisions of Chilaw, Putlam, Calpentyn and the Demelapatto.

The District of Manar shall consist of the District of that name, together with the Parish of Illepedewe, Kelkombe North, Kelkomole South, Odeoor, Naloe Chetty Colom, Sime Chetty Colom, Meerkomole, Pannenganmo and Poonukay.

The District of Nuwerakalawiya shall consist of the Dessavony of that name.

The District of Jaffna shall consist of the Parishes of Nalloor, Wanarponne, Chundicooly, Copay, Poottoor, Aterowely, Oodoo-ville, Mallagam, Tellyalle, Mylitty, Mampalay, Vattocotta, Changane, Pandaterippo, Oodopitty, Calwey, Point Pedro, Nawacooly, Chavagacherry, Varrere, Eiledumutual, Catehlay, Mogomale, Tambogammo, Plopalle, Mullipattoo, Caretchy, Cayts, Velene, Alleparty, and Ponoryn, including Polverayencadeo and the Islands of two Brothers, the Islands of Pungertivoe, Aantivoe, Naynativoe, Carrativoe and Dent, and of Karkkattemolle North, Karkkattemolle South, Mulliawelle Melpattoo North, Melpattoo South, Melpattoo East, Carnewelpattoo North, Carnewelpattoo South, and Poodoo-coo herupoo.

The District of Trincomalie shall consist of the Harbour and District of that name and of Tamankalawe.

The District of Batticaloa shall consist of the Harbour and Dis-

trict of that name, and of Bintenne, excepting the portions attached to the Districts of Kandy and Badulla.

The Midland Circuit shall be sub divided into five Districts, vizt.

District Court to be held at

- The District of Colombo. Colombo.
- The District of Kandy Kandy
- The District of Kurnegalle Kurnegalle.
- The District of Badulla Badulla.
- The District of Ratnapoora. Ratnapoora.

And the limits of the said Districts shall respectively be as follows; vizt.

The District of Colombo shall consist of the Fort, Town and Harbour of Colombo and the space contained within the Four Gravets of Colombo, the Town and Harbour of Negombo, the Aloochoor Corle, the Cina Corle, the Hapitigam Corle, the Hewagam Corle, the Salpitty Corle, the villages attached to the Vidahney of Morottoo and the villages of Katoochoorondoo and Egode Oyene in the Adicary Pattoo of the Raygam Corle.

The District of Kandy shall consist of Matele, Dumbere, Hewahatte, Tumpane, Harasiapattoo, Udunuwera, Yattinuwera Udapalata, Uda Bulatgamme, Dolosbaga, Lower Bulatgamme and Kotmale, and Keerawelle Pattoo and Kandoopitty Pattoo of the Belligal Corle, Mawete Pattoo, Kandoopitty Pattoo, Kandaha Pattoo and Toonpalata Pattoo of the Parnekoor Corle, Egode Pattoo, Medde Pattoo, Ganny, Pattoo and Tanniperoo Pattoo of the Four Korles, and so much of the Bintenne as lies on the left Bank of the Mahavillaganga.

The District of Kurnegalle shall consist of the Dessavony of the Seven Corles and Otere Pattoo and Gondola Pattoo of the Beligal Corle, Degaladahamoone Pattoo, Mede-Medille Pattoo, Walgaane Pattoo and Galbodde Pattoo of the Four Corles.

The District of Badulla shall consist of Uwa, Wallapana, Welasse, Kandukara and Weyaloowa; Wegampaha, Kolowakampaha and Meyanwewelle Palace of Bintenne; and Dewiyanne Gampaha, Botilla and Botilla Wederatte.

The District of Ratnapoora shall consist of Saffragam except so much as is attached to the District of Galle, and of the Three Korles.

The Southern Circuit shall be sub-divided into four Districts, viz.

District Court to be held at

- The District of Caltura. Caltura.
- The District of Galle Galle.
- The District of Matura Matura.
- The District of Tangalle Tangalle.

And the limits of the said Districts shall respectively be as follows viz.

The District of Caltura shall consist of the Pasdoon Corle and so much of the Walallawitty Corle as is attached to it, Welapore Cal-

tura and all the villages between the River of Bentotte and the Caltura River or Caloo Ganga which are situated between the Pasdoon Corle and the Sea, Dewaster Caltura and all the villages attached to it, of Ellenamade, Dedirewela, Doowagamme and Oogellobde, the Raygam Corle and the Vidahney of Pantura excepting the two villages of Katoochoorondoo and Egode Oyene.

The District of Galle shall consist of the Town, Fort, Harbour and Four Gravets of Galle; the village of Akkimmene, the Gangeloddepattoo (of Galle) including the whole village of Hinnadoona; Talpepattoo; the Welloboddepattoo, the village of Amblangodde and the Bentotte Wailallawitty Corle; and the Yakkawella Hatera Baagia of Saffragam.

The District of Matura shall consist of the whole of the Belligam Corle and Totemoone; Matura Four Gravets and the Angooroo-gams; Makawitte, the Gangeloddepattoo (of Matura) and the four Baygams; the Kandeboddepattoo; the Welloboddepattoo (of Matura); and the Muruwa Corle.

The District of Tangalle shall consist of the Ginewaypattoo, Kireme Cattoene; Odochookka; Julampitye and the Magampattoo.

And whereas by a certain other Ordinance No. 11 of 1843 it was enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor of the said Island with the advice of the Executive Council by any Proclamation or Proclamations to be by him for that purpose issued to establish from time to time Courts of Inferior Criminal Jurisdiction to be called Police Courts which shall be holden and shall exercise Jurisdiction within such limits as shall be specified and defined in such Proclamation or Proclamations and from time to time to revoke alter and amend any such Proclamation or Proclamations as occasion may require. And the said Court so established shall be Courts of Record.

And whereas by a Proclamation bearing date the thirtieth day of November last we did direct and appoint that Courts of Requests and Police Courts should be established, and should be holden and should exercise Jurisdiction as therein set forth—and it has become expedient to repeal the said Proclamation of the thirtieth day of November last: Now therefore with the advice of our Executive Council we do hereby Proclaim and direct that the said Proclamation of the thirtieth day of November last shall be revoked and shall cease to have any effect from the date hereof.

And we do hereby direct and appoint that Courts of Requests and Police Courts shall be established throughout this Island under the names hereinafter mentioned. PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Lieutenant General Sir COLIN CAMPBELL, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander in Chief in and over the British Settlements and Territories in the Island of Ceylon with the Dependencies thereof.

C. CAMPBELL.

WHEREAS by an Ordinance No. 10 of 1843 entitled "An Ordinance for the Establishment of Courts of Inferior Civil Jurisdiction to be called Courts of Requests;" it was enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor for the time being by any Proclamation or Proclamations to be by him for that purpose from time to time issued to establish Courts of Inferior Civil Jurisdiction which shall be called Courts of Requests and shall exercise Jurisdiction and be holden within such limits as the said Governor in such Proclamation or Proclamations shall appoint, and to revoke after and amend any such Proclamation or Proclamations as occasion may require.

And whereas by a certain other Ordinance No. 11 of 1843 it was enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor of the said Island with the advice of the Executive Council by any Proclamation or Proclamations to be by him for that purpose issued to establish from time to time Courts of Inferior Criminal Jurisdiction to be called Police Courts which shall be holden and shall exercise Jurisdiction within such limits as shall be specified and defined in such Proclamation or Proclamations and from time to time to revoke after and amend any such Proclamation or Proclamations as occasion may require. And the said Court so established shall be Courts of Record.

And whereas by a Proclamation bearing date the first day of October One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-five we did among other things direct and appoint that the Courts of Requests and Police Courts of Kandy and of Kurnegalle should be established and should be holden and should exercise jurisdiction as therein set forth and it has become expedient to amend the said Proclamation in so far as the same relates to the said Courts of Kandy and Kurnegalle.

Now therefore with the advice of our Executive Council we do hereby proclaim and direct that Courts of Requests and Police Courts shall be established under the names of the Court of Requests and Police Court of Avishawelle and of the Court of Requests and Police Court of Madawalatenne and Kurnegalle.

And we do further direct and appoint that the said Courts of Kandy and Kurnegalle and of Avishawelle and Madawalatenne and Kurnegalle shall, respectively be holden and exercise jurisdiction

within and over the Districts or Limits set opposite to their names, any thing in the said Proclamation of the First day of October One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-five to the contrary notwithstanding.

The Court of Requests and The Police Court } of Kandy..... { The District of Kandy, except Tumpane and Harasipattoo.

The Court of Requests and The Police Court } of Kurnegalle..... { The District of Kurnegalle, except the portions attached to the Court of Madawalatenne and Kurnegalle.

The Court of Requests and The Police Court } of Avishawelle..... { The Three Korles and Lower Balatamme. The Kurawittakorie of Salfrazam. The Odoogaha Pattoo of the Una Corle so much of the Gangehodde Pattoo of the Una Corle as is situated East of the Road from Hangeulle to Attelegalle and the Odoogahapattoo of the Hewagam Corle.

The Court of Requests and The Police Court } of Madawalatenne and Kurnegalle. { Tumpane, Harasipattoo and the Madura, Wegodde, Hewawasse, Gandaha and Gannasaye Korles of the Seven Korles.

And we do further direct and appoint, that the Districts within which it is herein before directed and appointed that the Courts of Requests and Police Courts hereby established shall be holden and shall exercise jurisdiction respectively, shall be such and the same Districts as by any Proclamation for the subdivision of the several Circuits into Districts may be declared and appointed.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon this Twenty-fourth day of December in the year of Our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-six.
