"Provided also that Chief Headmen and Shroff may, at the Governor"s discretion, be exempted from the operation of this rule."

## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J. West Ridgeway, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

## West Ridgeway.

W
HEREAS by the 4th section of "The Local Boards' Ordinance, 1898," it is enacted that it shail be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation to be for that purpose published in the Government Gazette, to bring any town or towns under the operation of the said Ordinance, and to define the limits of such town or towns respectively for the purposes of the said Ordinance, and such Proclamation to amend, alter, or revoke as and whenever the Governor shall, with like advice, determine: Provided that no Proclamation shall be necessary to bring under the operation of the said Ordinance any town which has already been brought under the operation of the Ordinance No. 7 of 1876, intituled "An Ozdinance to provide for the establishment of Local Boards of Health and Improvement in certain Localities," in which town the said "Local Boards' Ordinance, 1898," shall come into operation on the day in section I thereof mentioned; that is to say, on the First day of September, 1898 :

And whereas by Proclamations dated the Fourteenth day of December, 1877, and the Fourteenth day of August, 1879, the town of Gampola, in the Central Province, was brought under the operation of the Odinance No. 7 of 1876 aforesaid, and the limits of the said town were, for the purposes of the said Orlinance, defined in the said Proclamations:

An 1 whereas it is expedient to amend the said Proclamations of the Fourteenth day of Docem')3r, 1877 , an 1 the Fourteenth diy of Augast, 1879 , respectively, in respect of the limits of the said town of Gampola, and to re-define the limits of the said town for the purposes of "The Local Boards' Ordinance, 1898 ":

Now know Ye that We, the eaid Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby amond the Proclamations of the Fourteenth day of December, 1877, and the Fourteenth day of August, 1879, respestively, by further extending the limits of the said town as defined therein, and We do hereby define, for the purposes of the suid "Local Bourds' Ordinance, L898," the limits of the town of Gainpola to be those set ont in the schejule hereto as from and after the Thirty-first December, 1898.

Given at Kandy, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Thirtieth day of December, in the jear of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-eight.

## Schedule.

And whereas the Legislative Council, at a public session thereof held on the Seventh day of December, 1898 , by a resolution established canal tolls at Tarakuliya and at Gorakagahatotripola on the Hendala canal, in the Western Province, as from and after the First day of January, 1899:

And whereas it is expedient, to appoint the rates at which the said tolls so established in respect of the said Hendala canal shall be levied :

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, under and by virtue of the powers iu that behalf on Us conferred as aforesaid, do hereby appoint that the rates at which the tolls so established in respect of the Hendala canal, in the Western Province, shall be in accordance with those set out in the schedule hereto.

ONE Scholarship of the value of \(£ 150\), tenable for four years, will be awarded by the Government of Ceylon on the results of a special examination, to be conducted by the Oxford and Cambridge School Examination Board and which will be-held at the Colombo School of Agriculture, commencing on the third Monday in May, 1900, and following days.

No candidate will be admitted to this examination who has not been resident in the Island for the five years next before the examination, or who was born on or before the 31st day of May, 1880. or who has not previously passed the "London Matriculation Examination" or the "Cambridge Senior Local Examination" with honours, or the "First in Arts Examination" of the Calcutta University. The description of the flowering plant in technical language. The paper will include questions on the Flora of Ceylon.

2. Candidates shonld notify to the Director their intention to present themselves at the examination six clear months prior to the date of such examination, in order that application may be made in time for the examination papers.
3. Each candidate is required to forward to the Director, one month prior to the examination, an admission fee of \(£ 2\) sterling by Banl draft or Post Office order on England payable to the Registrar of ihe University of London, and also a certificate of birth showing that he has comp eted Gis sixteenth year.
4. If a candidate withdraws his name, or fails to present himself at the examination, or fails to pass it, the fee shall not be returned to him, but he shall be allowed to enter for any subsequent Matriculation Examination upon payment, at every such entry, of an additional fee of \(£ 1\) sterling. The certificate of age need not again be produced.
N.B.-An Indian candidate, who is not resident in the Island, cannot be admitted to the examination unless he shows an attendance of six months or more in one of the English High Schools or Colleges of the Island. He should forward, with his application, a certificate from the Manager or Principal of the High School or College which he has been attending, stating that he has been attending the School or College regularly for a period of six months. He should also forward. in addition to the University fee, a local expenses fee of Rs. 5 by Money Order or Bank. draft in favour of the Director of Public Instruction.
