



Australia-Cairn's Harbour-Trinity Bay-Depth of Water in Entrance Channel.

The Port Master, Brisbane, has given notice (No. 22 of 1898) that a shoal patch of about 20 square ft. in extent, with 121 ft. over it at L.W.S.T., exists about midway between No. 8 Pile and the Front Leading Beacon. Masters of vessels entering the harbour are therefore cautioned to open the leading beacons slightly to the westward after passing No. 8 Pile and until within two ships' lengths of the front leading beacon, when proceed as before.

Australia, South-Wallaroo Bay-Spencer Gulf-Shoal Water in the vicinity of Riley Shoal is of larger extent than shown on the Chart.

The President, Marine Board, Port Adelaide, has given notice (No. 2 of 1898) that the shoal water in the vicinity of the shoal patch south of Riley shoal, which is marked by a red buoy, is of larger extent than shown on the chart.

Within a radius of 200 ft. from the buoy, there is, in places, not more than 2½ fathoms L.W.S., which, however, quickly deepens to 4 fathoms to the north, south, and

To the westward (over a narrow ridge some 100 ft. wide), the water gradually deepens from 17 to 23 ft. for

a distance of three cables.

Eastern Archipelago-Sumatra, North-east Coast-Babalan Channel-Light exhibited.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 710 of 1898) that a white fixed light of the 6th order, elevated 36 ft. above high water, and visible from a distance of 10 miles, has been established at the entrance to Babalan river, north-east coast of Sumatra.

It is shown from an iron frame, 38 ft. high, painted white, situated on the west bank of the river.

Approximate position: lat. 4° 4′ 45″ N., long. 98° 17′

30″ E.

Note.—This light is placed for entering the mouth of the Babalan river only, not for use in the channel outside.

China-Shantung-Wei Hai Wei.-Lights exhibited. Shoals, Buoyage.

Notice to Mariners, No. 716 of 1898, issued by the British Admiralty, is republished.

The following information, dated October 4, 1898, has been received from the Commander-in-Chief, China, relating to the lights recently established; and the shoals and buoyage of Wei Hai Wei anchorage:—

1. Flagstaff Point.—A group occulting light of the 6th order, showing three eclipses every thirty seconds, was exhibited from Flagstaff point on September 29. It is elevated 52 ft. above high water, and shows the following sectors: white between the bearings of S. 44° W. and S. 52° W. (over the fairway through the western entrance), red between S. 52° W., through west, and N. 84° W., white between N. 84° W. and N. 75° W. (over the fairway through the southern entrance), red in other directions.

It is shown from an iron white column, 12 ft. high, near a white dwelling situated on the islet off flagstaff point, with north-west extreme of observatory island

bearing N. 58° E., distant 145 miles, and north-east corner of Wei Hai Wei town wall N. 53° W.

In clear weather the white light is visible from a distance of 10 miles, and the red light from a distance of 5 miles.

Approximate position : lat. 37° 29′ 40″ N., long, 122° 9′ 0″ E.

Chao Pei Tsui light (flashing every half minute) has been re-exhibited, showing the same characteristies as given in the Admiralty List of Lights, Part VI., 1898,

Approximate position: lat. 37° 27′ 45″ N., long. 122° 15′ 10″ E.

A red fixed light of the 7th order will be shown from the end of the coaling pier, Leu Kung Tau island.

Shoals .- With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 401 of 1898:-

The rock reported to lie 2 or 3 cables to the northward of the north point of Leu Kung Tau island has a depth of 18 ft. on it at low water, and lies 81 yards from the shore off the north west point of the island.

A rock awash at low water, a quarter of a cable in extent north and south, lies with the south-east extreme of channel island (Itau) bearing N. 31° W., distant 13 cable, and white sandy point S. 58° W.

Approximate position: lat. 37° 28′ 40″ N., long. 122° 12′ 55″ E.

Buoyage.—A large red conical buoy has been moored in 5 fathoms on the west side of the western channel, with the west extreme of observatory island bearing east, distant 34 cables, and east extreme of west point of western entrance N. 10° E.

Small cask buoys moored in 5 fathoms low water mark the limits of the pocket of the anchorage under Leu Kung Tau; they are painted red on the south and black on the north limit.

Variation, 3½° westerly in 1898.
