PROCLAMATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR.

In the Name of Her Majesty VICTORIA, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J. WEST RIDGEWAY, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RIDGEWAY:

WHEREAS by section 5 of Ordinance No. 12 of 1862 it is enacted that the Governor may, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, when to him it shall seem advisable, by Proclamation, establish a general cemetery for the burial of the dead within such limits as shall be specified and defined in such Proclamation:

And whereas it seems to Us advisable to establish in the town of Gampola, Central Province, a general cemetery to be used by the residents of the said town as hereinafter mentioned for the burial of their dead within the limits hereinafter specified and defined:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, hereby proclaim that the land set forth in Schedule A hereto, within the limits therein

specified and defined, shall be and the same is hereby established a general cemetery to be used by the residents of the places enumerated in Schedule B hereto for the burial of their dead, as from and after the Fifteenth day of March, 1899.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twenty-seventh day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-nine.

SCHEDULE A.

The land described in title plan No. 140,192 called Ganetennawatta, situated in Gampola in Gangapahala korale of Udapalata division, in the District of Kandy, Central Province; and bounded on the north by Ganetenna estate now forming part of Mount Temple, west by land described in title plan No. 124,998, east by the lands described in title plans Nos. 49,111, 49,112, 49,113, 49,114, and 49,115, and on the south by the road from Gampola to Kadugannawa.

SCHEDULE B.

On the south the Kirapane-oya from its junction with the Mahaweli-ganga to the bridge over the said oya on the Nawalapitiya road, thence a line 100 yards south of the Dolosbage road up to a point 100 yards west of the junction of that road with the Four Korales road near the Sinhayapitiya ambalam; on the north-west and north a straight line drawn from the western end of the southern boundary to the western limit of the lands described in preliminary plan 4,514, and thence a straight line to the limit of the land described in preliminary plan 4,241, the western and northern boundary of lot H 735 in the said plan, and thence a straight line to the Kahatapitiya mosque, and a line due east from this point to the Mahaweli-ganga; on the east the Mahaweli-ganga up to its junction with Kirapane-oya.

The following shall also be included within the limits, viz :--

The road to Pussellawa from the suspension bridge up to the 14th milepost, the Nawalapitiya road up to the southern limit of the Government Civil Hospital premises, and all houses, buildings, and premises within 100 yards on each side of the said roads, and the whole of the hospital premises.

BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

 $1.-Time\ and\ Place\ of\ Meeting\ and\ Order\ to\ be\ observed\ thereat.$

- 1. The ordinary meetings of the Board shall be held on such days and at such time and place as the Board shall from time to time by resolution determine, provided that it shall be lawful for the Board to adjourn any meeting to any other day or hour. The resolution determining the time and place of the ordinary meetings shall be published for general information in the Government Gazette, and a copy thereof affixed at the office of the Board.
- 2. For all purposes connected with the Board at its meetings the precedence and seniority of the members shall be regulated as follows:—

(a) The ex officio Chairman.

- (b) The members appointed by the Governor, in the order in which they have been gazetted.
- (c) The elected members, in the order of the priority of their elections.
- 3. The Chairman shall preserve order and decide on all disputed points of order.
- 4. As soon after the hour appointed for any meeting (whether ordinary or special) as a quorum shall assemble, the member entitled to preside shall take the chair, and the Board shall proceed to business. Should a quorum not be present at the expiration of half an hour from the time appointed for the meeting, the meeting shall stand adjourned, if an ordinary meeting, to the day appointed for the next ordinary meeting, or if a special meeting sine die.
- 5. Any member desiring to ask a question or to make a motion, unless in the course of discussion or in case of emergency by special leave of the Board, shall give notice of such question or motion either at some previous meeting of the Board or by notice in writing at least four days before the day on which he intends to ask such question or make such motion.
- 6. Every member in giving such notice shall deliver to the secretary a copy of such question or motion.
- 7. All questions asked and motions made at a meeting shall be made in the order of the notices thereof unless the Board shall unanimously decide otherwise.
- 8. A motion negatived at a meeting shall not be again made until after the expiration of at least three months, and no motion in any way contrary to one passed by the Board at a meeting shall be entertained until after the expiration of the same period.
- 9. Any member presenting a petition or other communication will be held responsible for its contents being throughout respectful, and no document shall be laid before the Board unless the name and address of the drawer be legibly recorded on it.

- 10. When a petition or other communication is presented the purport thereof shall be concisely stated, and on the motion of any member duly seconded the question shall be put whether or not the document shall be read.
- 11. The business of the ordinary meetings of the Board shall be conducted in the following order :-
 - (a) The minutes of the former meeting shall be read and confirmed after being, if necessary, corrected.
 (b) Memorials, petitions, or other communications addressed to the Board shall be

 - laid before the meeting and orders made thereon. The other business shall be considered in the order set down in the Order Book

hereafter mentioned.

- 12. The Secretary shall keep an Order Book in which shall be entered and numbered in succession the subjects to be brought under discussion at each meeting, and he shall serve on each member or leave at his residence two days at least before each meeting a notice containing the order of the day copied from the Order Book.
- 13. He shall keep a book to be called the Minute Book, in which shall be minuted during each sitting in the order in which they occur the proceedings of the Board. And he shall keep another book to be called the Journal, in which he shall cause all minutes of proceedings to be fairly transcribed, and such Journal shall form the book required to be kept and to be signed by the Chairman and one member then present under the 23rd section of this Ordinance.
- 14. The Secretary shall also keep and submit to the Board at every meeting a Complaint Book, and he shall provide that this book shall be accessible to the public at his office between the hours of 11 A.M. and 4 P.M. on every week day, excepting Saturday and holidays, and excepting also on such days as the Board may sit. Every inhabitant of the town shall have access to this book on his furnishing the Secretary with his correct name and address.
- 15. The Secretary shall at each sitting of the Board lay on the table all reports made to the Chairman by the Inspector and other officers of the Board, and notes of any action taken thereon by the Chairman since the last previous meeting of the Board.

2.—Sanitation and General Conservancy.

16. All householders or other persons who are desirous that the dust, ashes, sweepings, rubbish, or other refuse from their premises should be removed by the scavengers of the Board shall deposit the same in proper boxes or other receptacles on the edge of the road outside their respective dwellings or shops daily between the hours of 6 A.M. and 8 A.M.; and it shall not be lawful for any person to place or cause to be placed such dust, ashes, sweepings, rubbish, or refuse in any street unless the same shall be contained in boxes or other receptacles as aforesaid, or after the hours notified by the Board; and every such person shall remove such boxes or other like receptacles within the space of one hour after the same shall have been emptied by the scavengers.

3.-Weights and Measures.

17. It shall be lawful for any Inspector or officer authorized in writing by the Board to take into his possession and test any weights or measures in use within the limits of the Local Board, and to seize any false weight or measure not in conformity with the standard weight or measure, and detain them subject to the order of the Board.

4.—Establishment and Regulation of Public Market.

- 18. Whenever it shall be determined to establish a public market the Local Board shall give not less than ten days' notice of the time when the same will be opened, and such notice shall be published by beat of tom-tom.
- The several rents, tolls, and fees payable in respect of a public market shall be paid in advance from time to time on demand to the Board or their lessee, or other person authorized by the Board or their lessee to receive the same.
- A table of the rents, tolls, and fees leviable at each market shall be printed in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and placed in a conspicuous place at each market, and it shall be unlawful for any person to demand or receive higher sums than those authorized
- 21. All payments to be made in respect of any stall for which no monthly permit has been issued shall be paid daily to the officer authorized by the Board to collect the same.
- No person holding a permit to use a stall in the market shall occupy any stall 22. other than the one assigned to him in his permit, and no person shall keep or expose for sale in any stall any article the keeping or sale of which therein shall have been prohibited by the Board by notice posted in the market.
- 23. No person shall sell or expose for sale in any fish market or stall any provisions or things other than fresh fish.
- 24. No person shall sell or expose for sale in any vegetable or fruit market or stall any meat or flesh or salted fish or cooked food.
- 25. No occupant of a stall shall enclose in any way any portion of a market or erect any awning or screen or fixture of any kind, nor shall he leave any goods in any market between the hours of 9 P.M. and 6 A.M., without having first obtained the sanction of the Chairman.
- 26. Every occupant of a stall or seat in any market shall keep such stall or seat clean and free from filth or rubbish.

- 27. No person affected with or suffering from any cutaneous, contagious, or infectious disease shall occupy any stall, seat, or place in any public market, or expose for sale thereat any provisions whatsoever.
- 28. All persons using or occupying any public market shall behave in an orderly manner, and shall not commit any nuisance in or about such market.
- 29. All public markets shall be open daily from 6 A.M. to 9 P.M., and it shall be the duty of the Board to make provision for the proper lighting of the market.
- 30. It shall be competent for an Inspector of the Board to order the removal from a public market of any meat, fish, vegetable, or fruit certified by a competent Medical Officer to be unfit for sale, and to order its burial at the expense of the owner.
- 31. It shall be the duty of the market-keeper or of the lessee of the market to maintain order within the limits of the market.
- 32. No cart or vehicle shall remain within any market premises for a longer period than is necessary for loading or unloading.

5.—Butchers and Slaughter House.

- 33. It shall be lawful for the Inspector of the Local Board to seize or cause to be seized all unhealthy and diseased animals exposed for slaughter, and to have the same destroyed or otherwise disposed of upon the authority in writing of the Chairman or, in his absence, of two members of the Local Board.
- 34. Every licensed butcher shall on the first Monday in every month register in the office of the Local Board a true and accurate report (as nearly as possible) of the age, sex, colour, marks, and description of all cattle slaughtered by him in the preceding month, and the names and places of abode of the persons from whom the same were purchased or obtained, which said report shall be in the Form H.

35. It shall be lawful for a person appointed by the Chairman of the Board to seize flesh suspected to be unwholesome and brought into the town or exposed for sale therein; and if the Sanitary Officer, upon due examination of the same, shall be of opinion that the said flesh is unwholesome, the Chairman may declare it forfeited and order the same to be buried or otherwise disposed of.

5.—Fishing.

36. No person shall use dynamite for the purpose of taking fish within the limits of the Local Board.

6.-Waste Lands.

- 37. No horses, cattle, sheep, goats, or swine shall be to thered or grazed upon any public ground vested in the Board without a license from the Chairman. Such license may be granted for a year or any shorter period at the discretion of the Chairman, and shall be subject to such fee as the Board shall from time to time appoint.
- 38. Any person thereto authorized in writing by the Chairman may seize any horse, sheep, goat, or other animal which he may find tethered or grazing without such license as aforesaid on any public ground within the town. No animal so seized shall be released except upon payment of a fee of one rupee and the charges leviable for pounding it in the pound, if it has been so impounded.
- 39. The Board may farm or let out the public grazing grounds or any part thereof for any period not exceeding twelve months on such conditions as to the Board may seem fit.
- 40. All cattle, sheep, and goats straying on the public roads or paths within the town shall when seized be placed in the pound established by the Board for that purpose, and the following charges shall be paid before removal of any animal so impounded:—

41. Every owner or occupier of any house, garden, building, or land within the town shall keep such house, garden, building, or land surrounded with a wall or good fence of not less then 4 ft. in height from the level of the ground.

7.—Bathing-places.

- 42. The following places are set apart for public bathing-places within the Local Board limits:—
 - (1) For the Public.—Demuwatta and Warakatota in the Kalu-ganga, Koraliwalatotupola in the We-ganga, Moragahayata in the Kalu-ganga and Angurumangewatta for females in the Kalu-ganga.
 - (2) For Cattle.—Fort ferry in the Kalu-ganga.
 - (3) For Dhobies.—Galwala in the Kalu-ganga.
- 43. No person suffering from any cutaneous, infectious, or contagious disease shall bathe or wash clothes or any other articles in any place set apart as hereinbefore provided for bathing or washing clothes, and no person shall allow any animal belonging to him or under his control to enter or remain in or upon or drink at any such place.

8.—Taxes on Carriages and Animals not plying for Hire.

44. An annual tax shall be levied at the rates specified in the Schedule A on every carriage, cart, hackery, horse, bullock, pony, mule, and ass kept or used within the limits of the Local Board. Such tax shall be payable half-yearly in advance.

9.—Dog Tax.

- 45. A tax of 50 cents shall be leviable upon each dog within the Local Board limits. The tax shall be due on January 1 in each year, and shall be paid before March 1 in each year. Provided, however, that no tax shall be levied on any dog in respect of which it is proved to the satisfaction of the Chairman that tax has already been paid for the then current year to any other Local Board or to any Municipality within the Island.
- 46. To facilitate the recovery of the tax the occupier of every house within the town shall, on or before February 15 in each year, furnish an officer thereunto authorized by the Board with a list in the Form B annexed of the dogs kept in such house and the names of the owners thereof.
- 47. On payment of the tax on any dog the Board shall furnish the owner with a stamped collar to be worn by such dog on payment of a fee of 25 cents.
- 48. Any dog found in any street, thoroughfare, or public place without a collar duly stamped supplied by the Board, or by any other Local Board, or by any Municipality within the Island, may be seized by any officer of the Board or other person specially authorized in that behalf, and may if unclaimed, or if claimed and a sum of fifty cents, together with a charge of six cents per diem for every day during which such dog has been under seizure, be not forthwith paid by the claimant, be destroyed after the expiration of forty-eight hours after such seizure.
- 49. Every inhabitant within the Local Board limits becoming possessed of any dog or dogs after the furnishing of the list referred to in by-law 64 of this chapter shall furnish the officer of the Board mentioned in the said by-law with a list of such dog or dogs within one month after acquiring the same, and such dog or dogs shall, subject to the provision of by-law 63 of this chapter, become liable to the tax for the current year within fifteen days after the list required by this by-law becomes due.

10 .- Waterworks.

- 50. Water shall not be drawn from the public standpipes otherwise than into a vessel or receptacle.
- 51. The public standpipes shall not be used for the purposes of bathing or washing of persons or animals or clothes or any other thing.
- 52. No contrivance of any kind whatever shall be used for fixing the handles of the standpipes in order to secure a continuous flow of water.
- 53. It shall not be lawful for any person to bathe, wash, or do any other act which may in any way pollute the water in the reservoir.
