Pacific Ocean—Friendly Islands—Tongatabu—Shoal discovered.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 65 of 1899) of the existence of a shoal patch, with a depth of two fathoms least water on it, lying in Egeria channel, Tongatabu harbour entrance.

This shoal, which is marked by a red can buoy on its western edge, is about 10 yards in extent, and lies with

east extreme of Atata bearing S. $\frac{3}{4}$ E., distant $5\frac{1}{2}$ cables and Malinoa, E. by N.

Approximate position: lat. $21^{\circ} 2' 15''$ S., long. $175^{\circ} 15' 10''$ W.

Eastern Archipelago—Borneo, North-west Coast—South Natuna Islands—Robin Hood and Lightfoot Shoals not shown on certain Charts.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 75 of 1899) that Robin Hood and Lightfoot shoals, Koti passage, do not appear on certain copies of the Admiralty Charts Nos. 2660a and 2104. They should be placed on those Charts with P. D. against them as follows:—

- (a) Robin Hood shoal (on which a ship of that name struck in 1863, the shoal being reported to dry at low water) is situated with Tumbalo

bearing W.N.W., distant $8\frac{1}{2}$ miles, and the eastern of the two hills on Panjang S.W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.

Approximate position: lat. $2^{\circ} 48' 20''$ N., long. $109^{\circ} 2' E.$

- (b) Lightfoot shoal (on which a vessel of that name struck in 1854) was reported to lie about $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles westward of Sirhassen island.

Approximate position: lat. $2^{\circ} 32' N.$, long. $108^{\circ} 55' E.$
Variation, 3° easterly in 1899.
