*Bay of Bengal—Burma Coast—Spit Lightvessel temporarily removed.*

A telegraphic communication has been received from the Port Officer, Rangoon, stating that the Spit lightvessel showing 12-mile light has been temporarily removed for repairs. She has been replaced by another vessel exhibiting masthead lights, back to back, visible 5 miles.

*Pacific Ocean—New Caledonia—Noumea—Dubouzet Island—Leading Light established.*

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 151 of 1899) that on and after April 15, 1899, a red fixed light, Elevated 59 ft. above high water, and visible in clear weather from a distance of about 8 miles, will be exhibited to the southward of Ducrot summit, Dubouzet or Nu

island, Noumea, to serve with Ducrot summit light as a leading mark between Ile Maire and Ile aux Canard.

It is shown from a pyramidal structure of masonry, 6 ft. high, and has been placed on the charts, near the water's edge,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  cable S.S.E. from Ducrot summit light.

Approximate position : lat.  $22^{\circ} 16' 15''$  S., long.  $160^{\circ} 25' 55''$  E.

*Pacific Ocean—New Caledonia—Port Mueo—Alteration in Buoyage, &c.*

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 155 of 1899) that the following buoys have been placed in Port Mueo, New Caledonia :—

(a) A black can buoy moored in  $3\frac{3}{4}$  fathoms, with south point of Didot Island bearing N.  $71^{\circ}$  E., distant  $2\frac{2}{3}$  miles, and Observation rock N.  $20^{\circ}$  W.

Approximate position : lat.  $21^{\circ} 22' 55''$  S., long.  $164^{\circ} 58' 30''$  E.

(b) A black can buoy moored in  $4\frac{1}{4}$  fathoms, with south point of Didot Island bearing N.  $57^{\circ}$  E., distant  $3\frac{2}{3}$  miles, Observation rock N.  $3^{\circ}$  W.

Approximate position : lat.  $21^{\circ} 23' 45''$  S., long.  $164^{\circ} 57' 50''$  E.

Information has also been received through the Board of Trade that the beacon situated 2 miles south of Observation rock has been removed.

Note.—Mariners proceeding to New Caledonia should understand that Noumea being the only port for entry and clearance, as stated in Pacific Islands, vol. I., Part II., page 56, merchant ships must proceed there to obtain leave to visit any other port. There are no pilots elsewhere.

*Australia—Cairns Harbour, Trinity Bay—Depth of Water in Entrance Channel.*

The Port Master, Brisbane, has given notice (No. 7 of 1899) that the available depth of water in the dredged entrance channel to Cairns Harbour is 12 ft. 6 in. at low water springs.

The depth available at any time is to be obtained by adding 12 ft. 6 in. to the height shone on the dial of the tide-gauge at the Fairway Beacon, instead of 13 ft. 6 in. as hitherto.

SHANGHAI DISTRICT.—No. 335.

*South Channel Entrance to the Yangtze—Change in position of Lightship "Kiutoan" and Buoys.*

Notice is hereby given that the lightvessel Kiutoan has been shifted to mark the channel to the southward of the Middle Ground, and is now in the following position :—House island beacon bearing N.  $32^{\circ}$  E., distant 3.8 miles.

The Middle Ground Lower buoy has been altered in character, and is now a red and black vertically striped buoy bearing a black spherical cage.

The Blockhouse Shoal buoy has been discontinued.

A red and black vertically striped buoy bearing a black cylindrical cage has been placed in 19 ft. of water to mark the north-western end of the Middle Ground. From it House island beacon bears S  $81^{\circ}$  E., distant  $4\frac{2}{3}$  miles. This buoy is named the Middle Ground Upper buoy.

A red buoy bearing a black diamond cage has been placed in 13 ft. of water to mark the bank which forms the northern edge of the newly-formed channel to the northward of the Middle Ground. From it House island beacon bears N.  $71\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$  E., distant  $2\frac{1}{10}$  miles. This buoy is named the Kiutoan Flats Buoy.

*Directions.*

Inward-bound vessels crossing the Flats to the south-eastward of the Middle Ground should do so with the Kiutoan lightvessel ahead bearing N.  $73^{\circ}$  W. On this course the least depth is 15 ft. at low water of spring tides.

All bearings and courses given are magnetic.

Caution.—The existence of the wreck of the Fairy renders it unadvisable to take a more northerly course over the Flats than that recommended above.

Owing to the transitional state of this neighbourhood and the rapid changes that are now taking place, the above alterations should be looked upon as temporary only.

*North Channel Entrance to the Yangtze.—Liu-chiao Lighthouse.*

Notice is hereby given that the light at Liu-chiao-chiang was exhibited for the first time at sunset on the 3rd instant.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, occulting, of the fourth order, showing a fixed white light varied by an eclipse every 15 seconds, thus :—

Light	...	...	13 seconds
Eclipse	...	...	2 "

The lighthouse stands on the site marked Tied beacon on the British Admiralty Chart No. 1,602, and the light, which is elevated 52½ ft. above the level of the sea, should be visible in clear weather at a distance of 12½ nautical miles.

The light is obscured by trees on bearings more westerly than N. 63° W.

This bearing is magnetic and taken from seaward.

The tower is an iron screw pile structure, 40 ft. high, with a total height from the base to the lantern vane of 53 ft.

The tower is painted white.

Approximate position : lat. 31° 29' 54" N., long. 121° 41' 10" E.
