India, South—Ceylon Coast—New Light at Kovilam on the Island of Karaitivu, North Coast of Ceylon.

The Master Attendant at Jaffna has given notice dated May 6, 1899, that on and after May 15, 1899, a red light will be shown from sunset to sunrise from a steel mast painted white at Kovilam, on the island of Karaitivu, north coast of Ceylon, in latitude about 9° 46' north, and longitude about 79° 50' 20" east.

The light is a fifth order dioptric lantern, and will be hoisted to an elevation of 60 ft. above sea-level, and should be visible from all directions seaward at a distance of about 6 to 8 miles in clear weather.

N.B.—This notice supersedes the notice which appeared in the *Ceylon Government Gazette* of March 3, 1899.

China Sea—Philippines—Luzon—Lingayen Gulf—Shoal and Coral Patch.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 240 of 1899) of the existence of the following shoal and coral patch in the entrance to Lingayen Gulf, east coast of Luzon island:—

(a) A shoal, about 4 miles in extent in a north and south direction, the depths on which vary from 5½ to 20 fathoms. The southern part of this shoal is situated with the south-east extreme of Santiago island, bearing S. ¼ E., distant about 8 miles.

Approximate position: lat. 16° 32' N., long. 119° 58' E.

(b) A small coral patch, steep to, with a depth of 6½ fathoms on it, situated with the north extreme of San Fernando point bearing N. 85° E., distant 10 miles, and Mount St. Thomas S. 60° E.

Approximate position: lat. 16° 37' N., long. 120° 6¼' E.

Note.—Vessels are recommended on rounding Silakwi island to give it a berth of at least 8 miles.

*Japan—Kiusiu—Yebukuro no Minato—Shoals,
Particulars of.*

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 44, dated February 22, 1896, issued by this Office, the British Admiralty has given further notice (No. 241 of 1899) that a recent survey shows the depths and positions of the under-mentioned shoals in Yebukuro no Minato to be as follows:—

(a) Yaja se (incorrectly named Mebarusone on the Charts) has two rocky heads, with a depth on each of them of 2½ fathoms low-water springs, the outer head is situated with Gokwan (Goquan) sima summit bearing S. 21° E., distant 3½ cables, and north extreme of Hadaka se S. 80° W.

Approximate position: lat. 33° 23' 10" N., long. 129° 31' 40" E.

The inner head lies due east of outer head, distant ¼ cable.

(b) Ka se is a reef extending S.E. by E. for 1½ cable from the summit of Gokwan (Goquan) sima. The least depth of water on it is 3 ft., situated with Gokwan sima summit bearing N. 56° W., distant ⅓ cable, and west point of Hirago sima N. 54° E.

Variation, 4° westerly in 1899.

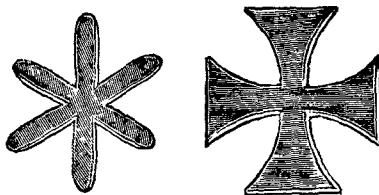
