





It gives me much pleasure to send this message of felicitations to the Canadian Tamil Congress on the occasion of their annual Pongal festival 2014. I am informed that this is an event in which Tamils participate in large numbers and which is also attended by democratically elected representatives of the three levels of government in Canada. This event provides an opportunity for close interaction between all its participants.

Canada and Sri Lanka have important common structural features. Distinct people with distinct identities, who speak different languages, populate the two countries: in the case of Canada - English and French and in the case of Sri Lanka - Tamil and Sinhala. These distinct peoples have largely inhabited different areas in their respective countries.

Substantial differences, however, exist in the structure of government in the two countries. Canada has a federal structure of government where substantial self-rule is granted to territories enabling the people who speak different languages to exercise and enjoy the right to self-determination in their respective areas they occupy within the framework of a united Canada. Both English and French languages have equality of status and the policy pertaining to such equality is rigorously and successfully enforced. Canadian citizens irrespective of whether he/she is English speaking or French speaking has a sense of belonging and feels that he/she is an equal citizen in their own country.

Very unfortunately, the position in Sri Lanka is quite different. Sri Lanka still has a unitary structure of governance. An inevitable consequence of which is that, the community, which is numerically in a majority, enjoys political supremacy. Attempts to resolve this conflict through devolution of power to provinces have proved to be inadequate, deficient, not workable and not durable. Attempts have also been made by the State to undo such devolutionary arrangements. Elections have been held to the provincial councils. The Tamil National Alliance despite these deficiencies has participated in these democratic processes and the verdicts of the Tamil people have been overwhelmingly in favour of genuine and adequate sharing of powers of governance. There is clearly a lack of willingness on the part of the State to recognize and implement the democratic verdicts of the Tamil people.

A civil war that lasted for nearly three decades came to an end a few years ago. An end to armed conflict provided an opportunity for lasting political and constitutional arrangements that could give an equal status to all its citizens. Despite the cooperation extended by the Tamil people and their democratically elected representatives, this opportunity is being frittered away by the Sri Lankan State.

Violations of International Human Rights Laws and Humanitarian Laws have been rampant. Lands belonging to the Tamil-speaking people in the Northern and Eastern provinces are being grabbed by the State and its armed forces on various pretexts. There is a deliberate policy being rigorously pursued by the State to change the demographic composition of the northern and eastern provinces and the linguistic and cultural identity of Tamil speaking areas.


It is in this background that this issue is now before the United Nations Human Rights Council. We need to work together to ensure that the Tamil people who have lived in Sri Lanka as long as anyone else or even longer are able to live as equal citizens with self respect and dignity and in security, fulfilling their legitimate political, economic, social and culture aspirations.

I wish to convey to the Canadian Tamil Congress and all participants at this event my warm regards and best wishes.

As members of the Tamil diaspora, we need to do all we can to protect and support our culture, given the continuing injustices faced by so many of our brothers and sisters in Sri Lanka and the erosion of their right to express their cultural, religious, and linguistic identity. Tamil heritage in our homelands is under existential threat from the Rajapaksa regime through the process of Sinhalisation and Buddhistisation. Therefore, it is imperative that the diaspora gives voice to the plight of our brethren on the island and we must engage concertedly with governments, parliamentarians and international organisations to end these human rights violations.

In addition, 2014, and the forthcoming UN Human Rights Council Session in March in particular, will be a crucial moment to secure an independent, international inquiry, which can credibly investigate the conduct of the final months of Sri Lanka's civil war. The establishment of such a mechanism, under UN auspices, is imperative to ensure truth and justice for the tens of thousands who perished, as well as to help lead the way towards a brighter future on the island. Given Canada's strong commitment to these issues and the country's important role within the Commonwealth and on the international stage, the on-going advocacy work of CTC is crucial in this regard.







ruling Party and the Opposition though the latter are few in number.

Thirdly we are in the process of exploring possibilities to engage and seek assistance from several sovereign Countries as well as INGOs to coordinate our efforts to provide alleviation to the People and their Province in need.

Fourthly we anticipate greater understanding by the Government in power towards our predicament and needs which would enable the passage of largesse from outside the Country to reach us with less red tape and delay. In this respect we have been directed towards the senior officials of the Treasury and others to work in cordiality to usher in a better future for our war affected citizenry.

Fifthly we anticipate certain changes in the Administrative set up. May be we would have a Civilian Governor to replace the former Commander of the Northern Province soon. We have brought to the notice of the President, even though we have absolutely nothing personal against the present Governor we prefer to work with a Civilian Governor. As I said elsewhere we prefer to have a Mathematics' teacher teaching Mathematics to our children rather than a Chemistry Teacher doing so! Lastly but not as a Provincial Council but as members of the larger world wide Tamil speaking population we are looking forward to the fulfillment of the Biblical saying 'Ye shall reap what you shall sow" at Geneva.

Thus we look forward to this year's Thai Pongal ushering in better times for us.

Of course Nature has not been too kind to us this season rains having failed. We might have to therefore expect difficult times ahead. Adversity helps us to join in unity at a time of calamity. Let us hope we would face all adversities with "May this year cement a relationship of brotherhood among all sections of the Tamil speaking people oblivious of Party, caste, creed and religious differences. Unity is the need of the hour."

fortitude and courage and be joined as a Nation. We are conscious that our Tamil speaking Nation includes our brethren from the East as well as our Muslim brothers and sisters. May this year cement a relationship of brotherhood among all sections of the Tamil speaking people oblivious of Party, caste, creed and religious differences. Unity is the need of the hour. There is no doubt that infiltrations are being undertaken surreptitiously as well as openly to change the demographic pattern of the Northern Province. Unless we stand together it is a matter of time when the North would be transformed into an East to pave way for a non Tamil administration at the Provincial Council level.

In this respect the diaspora has a role to play. Apart from the financial and infra structural benefits which no doubt we do expect from all of you, we would want you to adequately educate our people on the dangers of disunity. While we stand disunited our detractors would have their opportunity to transform the Tamil speaking areas into backyards of majoritarian manipulations.

This disunity seems to be the hallmark of Tamils all over the World. We are divided into three main groups. The first have a quid pro quo attitude. 'If we help them we could get what we want', seems to be the idea. But it has not worked so far to the benefit of the community. You may get something personally for your own personal glorification, gratification and benefit. But the community will suffer.

The second carry the unfulfilled dreams of a by- gone age. The dream no doubt was comforting until we were asked to wake up. While we do not criticize their desire to continue with their dreams conscious of the fact that dreams do sometimes get fulfilled in reality, let them not openly take to task others with popular support trying to forge ahead along a different route. Gandhi and Subbash Chadra Bose come to mind. The metamorphosis of Nelson Mandela comes to mind. The second group unfortunately also are disunited among themselves which is a tragedy.

The third have taken the reality into consideration, worked out a solution possible to obtain and are treading the path of law and order not for a moment searching for devious methods and means but steadfastly holding on to what they believe is the best way for the Tamil speaking Nation. Rightly or wrongly the people have endorsed their decision. We expect the people's decision to be respected.

Your Associations should explain the need for unity at this critical stage of our political struggle. May be there could be electronic and other medias which could help in this regard. The message must reach our people both within Sri Lanka and abroad. We are now preparing an assessment of our needs. They would need to be couched in proper technical language and prepared into Project Reports and so on. We have need for technical expertise in this regard. Your members

who are adequately qualified in this regard may consider spending some time with us to help us prepare such documents. Presently we are in consultation with UN Agencies to do this work for us.

Meanwhile micro financing projects could be undertaken after identifying areas of need and wants. Many such activities are presently undertaken conscious of our past that Jaffna has had an admirable history of success in the Cooperative Sector. It is our desire to set up a Trust in this regard to coordinate activities. We are in the process of identifying persons of repute well known for their honesty and altruism.

There is much to be done. Political goals while being at the back of our minds we must nevertheless ameliorate the conditions of our people without delay. By pursuing dreams at the expense of the regeneration of our people we may be left with none in our areas to reap the benefits of such pursuits.

May I wish all of you a very happy, prosperous and contented 2014 looking forward to working in unison and collaboration in this New Year with every single one of you if not directly at least in spirit!





CTC Advocacy Team at the UN Human Rights Council March, June & September 2013 United Nations, Geneva

On behalf of Lawyers Rights Watch Canada (LRWC), Gary Anandasangaree and Vani Selvarajah addressed the UN Human Rights Council during its 22nd, 23rd & 24th sessions in Geneva. CTC's Sutharsan Vasanthan and Kartiga Thavaraj also joined the international team in Geneva. Statements delivered to the Council repeatedly urged the United Nations and its member states to call for independent, international



investigation into allegations of human rights violations in Sri Lanka. The advocacy team lobbied various governments and groups at the UN to advocate for the passage of the follow up Resolution on Accountability in Sri Lanka that passed in March 2013. LRWC has been actively involved in UN lobbying and advocacy efforts on the international level since May 2009.

CTC directors and staff regularly meet with government officials on Parliament Hill to provide them with an update on the human rights situation in Sri Lanka. CTC also regularly meets with foreign embassics in Ottawa. These are important connections that CTC has made and ones that we maintain on a regular basis.


CTC Plants Hundreds of Trees in Remembrance October 13th, 2013 – Bob Hunter Memorial Park

Since the formation of the Centre for Leadership and Innovation (CFLI) in January 2012, we've made great strides in laying a strong foundation to develop future leaders. Our vision is to build and promote leadership and innovation amongst Tamil Canadian and other multicultural communities. Leaders aren't born, - they are nurtured and developed. Our goal therefore is to provide an inspiring and supporting environment that will help individuals become leaders and leverage their full potential to bring about innovative change.



Youth Leadership Program (YLP)

In April 2012 we launched our first YLP initiative, a public speaking forum for youth members aged 10-17. The goal of this program is to help youth members become strong leaders of tomorrow, with primary focus on public speaking, teamwork and leadership, something the school curriculum does not focus enough on. The response has been tremendous.

We've had over 70 youth members enrolled in this program so far. Each semester is for a duration of four months, which consists of 8 classes. The classes are held every other week for a length of 2 hours each. The final class for each term is held at a large venue, where the participants are given the opportunity to speak and debate on a wide range of topics, with their parents in the audience. Our last end of term event was held on December 21, 2013 at the Markham Council Chamber with over 150 parents and invited guests in the audience. The youth members delivered an exceptional program and the feedback from the parents was very positive.

Short Documentary Film Challenge

To challenge the youth members at YLP, we took the program to another level during the summer of 2013. The youth members in the program were divided into five teams and were asked to produce a short documentary film that highlighted a social cause. Our emphasis here is to further develop individual leadership and team building skills. The 6 to 8 minutes documentaries produced by the youth members were amazing. They produced documentaries on wide

ranging topics including High School Dropouts, Living with Autism, and Arranged Marriages. These documentaries were showcased at a gala event in front of an audience of 250 people. The summer program was a huge success with the youth members and the parents. We plan to offer this program again during the summer of 2014.

About the Founders of CFLI

Kumar Ratnam, Sivan Ilangko and I are the co-founders of CFLI. Sivan Ilangko and I qualified as Chartered Accountants in Canada, and Kumar Ratnam is an IT consultant. For volunteers like us, it is so rewarding to see the deference the YLP program is making in these youth members; youth members who were shy and introverted blossoming into confident public speakers. All three of us grew up in Sri Lanka,

where we weren't taught public speaking or leadership skills. When we entered the workforce in Canada, it was a significant hurdle for us to overcome, as we were innately reserved and afraid to speak up. Well, we don't want our youth to face the same challenges. Our



goal is to make a positive difference in their lives and to empower them to create their own success.

New Beginner Program in January 2014

Leaders for Change Award Prof. Craig Scott M.P.

The Leaders for Change Award honours the unique contribution of an individual who through his or her exceptional vision, perseverance and commitment has redefined or strengthened the need for change in our society. The recipient of this award will be someone who has demonstrated an effort to strive for change in a way that positively impacted the lives of others. This award recognizes a determined individual whose efforts are characterized by a dedication to leadership, a vision for change and a desire to enhance the lives of others.

2014 Award Recipient: Professor Craig Scott, M.P. Toronto-Danforth

Prof. Craig Scott is an ardent human rights lawyer and currently serves as the Member of Parliament for Toronto-Danforth. He is also the Official Opposition Critic for Democratic and Parliamentary Reform. Until his election, he was professor of law at Osgoode Hall Law School and, prior to that, professor of law at the University of Toronto, Faculty of Law.

As a human rights lawyer, Prof. Scott has spent years promoting justice in places like Sri Lanka, South Africa, Honduras and Afghanistan. Prof. Scott has been a strong advocate on anti-poverty issues and Aboriginal rights, and has done substantial work on the issue of Canada's transfer of detainees in Afghanistan to risk of torture. In recent years, Prof. Scott worked on issues such as accountability for human rights violations and environmental harms committed by Canadian companies in other countries.

Prof. Scott has been more than a parliamentarian for Tamil Canadians – he has been a dear friend. He has often voiced his concerns over the human rights situation in Sri Lanka and has advocated for the Tamil people, both on and off Parliament Hill. He co-founded the Sri Lanka Campaign for Peace and Justice, an extremely active and effective advocacy group, and played an active role on its Advisory Council until stepping down when elected to Parliament.

Prof. Scott has dedicated his life to an incredible display of leadership and devotion to the betterment of the Canadian community. We, as Canadians, are proud to have a friend like Prof. Scott and look forward to standing alongside him in his fight to defend human rights.



Service Excellence Award Uthayan Newspaper

As part of our ongoing commitment to volunteerism and promoting community involvement, the Canadian Tamil Congress will honour the contribution of an individual or organization that has supported the Tamil people. 
At a time when freedom of the media and free expression were under severe attack, Uthayan courageously reported about the human rights violations and day to day news stories in Sri Lanka. Uthayan's words reached worldwide – often times, the only way for Diaspora Tamils to remain informed about the tragedy unfolding in their homeland. Uthayan was the only newspaper published from Jaffna, which did not cease its publication during the Sri Lankan civil war. As a result, Uthayan premises and employees were victims of intimidation, harassment and countless attacks. Some of the staff members of Uthayan paid the ultimate price of being murdered.



As the civil war escalated to dangerous levels, newspapers published from Jaffna came under pressure from the Government of Sri Lanka. However, Uthayan has held remained committed to responsible journalism and has served the Tamil people since its humble beginnings. Uthayan officials stood up strong in an environment clouded with a complete disrespect for free, accurate and responsible journalism. Along with harassment and intimidation, the Sri Lankan government also attempted to shut down Uthayan in May 2000. The newspaper however re-opened days later; a symbol of Uthayan's sheer commitment to reporting the truth.

With over 45 years experience in journalism, Mr. Maruthappu Vallipuram Kaanamylnathan, served as the editor-in-chief of Uthayan. He was instrumental in ensuring that Uthayan continued to operate in the most difficult of times.

The end of the armed conflict in Sri Lanka in May 2009 resulted in the catastrophic loss of so many lives, gross violations of international human rights and humanitarian law, and the continued subjugation of Tamils on the island as second-class citizens. In the last four and half years, the Canadian Tamil Congress has been present at every UNHRC meeting. With the strength of members and dedicated volunteers — the singular mission has been to ensure that justice is served.

Since 2009, moral outrage from the international community has heightened against Sri Lanka's President and military - yet, the United Nations Human Rights Council (Council) is often paralyzed by geopolitics to bring about a proper set of accountability measures. While Sri Lanka has remained high on the Council agenda, it has failed to capture opportunities to seek truth, justice and accountability. The historical blunder, and the first lost opportunity was the Council's failure to come up with a fair resolution that sought accountability in the days following the end of the war during the Special Session on Sri Lanka in May 2009. After several aborted attempts at a resolution, and the Council passing two resolutions in 2012 and 2013 respectively, we may

finally see a Commission of Inquiry established by Council on Sri Lanka. The mandate, composition and the structure of the COI will ultimately determine if the UNHRC has finally got it right. If Council fails to seize this opportunity, and pass another toothless resolution, or equally, not pass a resolution at all, the prospects for future engagement and outcomes from the UNHRC may be dim, and the opportunity to seek accountability in Sri Lanka may forever be lost.


If the Council takes the right path this year - it will open the door to an international, independent inquiry into war crimes, crimes against humanity and genocide. The UN Panel of

> Experts concluded in 2011 that there is sufficient evidence, if proven, constitute war crimes and crimes against humanity. Beyond the grave civilian casualties - the attacks have been and continue to be calculated. The future remains bleak with prolonged state sponsored pogroms against Tamils: attacks on the very fundamental identity of Tamils, their language

and their culture on the island. With the increased "de-Tamilisation" of the traditional Tamil areas, the international community must step forward to examine if genocide has, and continues to be committed against the Tamil people in Sri Lanka. Whether it be genocide, war crimes,

or crimes against humanity - none is conclusive without an investigation by a properly constituted, international, and independent panel with the mandate to make a finding of fact.

The 25th Session of the United Nations Human Rights

Council this March is an important forum to call for an International Commission of Inquiry on Sri Lanka. For almost five years, the Sri Lankan government has had ample time to institute a genuine accountability mechanism. However, it has failed to bring about any credible process in which at least some form of redress can be given to the victims and their families. As a backdrop during these

years, the human rights and civil rights situation has deteriorated on the island and is a cause for greater international scrutiny. The hallmarks of a true a democracy - respect for the rule of law, freedom of the press, an independent judiciary, and clear separation of powers - do not exist in Sri Lanka. The calls for reconciliation have been masked by a "Sri-Lankan" centered approach involving the reconstruction of roads, hotels and tourist attractions

in hopes that citizens will forget the war. The recent calls for a South African styled Truth and Reconciliation Commission model, is frankly, too little, too late. In March 2014, the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights, Navi Pillai, will release her formal written report on her visit to Sri Lanka in August of 2013. For the first time, with the exception of the non-substantive Special Session in 2009, a discussion on Sri Lanka will be an official agenda item at the Human Rights Council.

Council ought to grasp this opportunity and constitute a Commission of Inquiry into war crimes, crimes against humanity and genocide in Sri Lanka. CTC will continue to advocate to bring those responsible for these heinous crimes to justice and to provide redress to the victims of these crimes.



restored and the island is ready for the next level of progress. This juncture is critical, as it will define the future of our motherland.


For generations, the human race has used the sun's energy for various purposes. We Tamils have the Pongal festival to



discussions. Following these paths, our own province of Ontario has already shut down coal power plants to reduce the risk of global warming. Countries like Germany and Japan have already committed to not build nuclear power plants; instead, they will increase electricity generation from renewable sources – solar, wind.

Motherland has no oil, gas or coal resources and all available hydro resources have been tapped. This has prompted the Sri Lankan government to address the shortage with coal power plants. As people recover from 30 years

of a mindset of war, economic activities will increase steadily as will the demand for electricity. It is therefore imperative to optimize the use of electricity, cut down on wastage and start generating electricity with locally available resources as much as possible.

We all know Sri Lanka is blessed with good solar resources year round and there are good wind resources in some parts of the island. We should make efforts to tap into these resources, as these are local and free. Another advantages of solar, wind resources is that they can be deployed at any size to suit the need at usage point. It

can also eliminate the infrastructures required with traditional electric generating systems. Technologies are now available to start a small micro grid level to provide the features of a fully functional grid. These micro grids can be constructed in a way to connect them to the grid when it becomes available in the areas. Starting with solar / wind powered micro grid has the advantage of rapid deployment and providing much needed electricity to the war affected areas. Free locally available solar and wind resources must also be used in agricultural, industrial and other applications.

There is also an immense need for reasonable shelters in war-affected areas of Sri Lanka. With the help of sun, wind resources and appropriate construction materials building energy neutral homes will not only result in affordable homes but also increase the comfort it provides.

Thirty years of war has left our motherland with a lot of catching up with rest of the world. We have come together with many communities here in Canada, keeping and working together with other Canadians to contribute to the collective success of Canada. Whether or not the communities in our motherland have come and kept together for centuries, now, the time has come to work together to create the much-needed success for the island.

ne of the biggest ironies of life is that "you never know how good you had it until it is gone" - or in this case, taken away from you. Your loss is permanent, irreplaceable and sometimes even inconceivable.

A mother, grandmother, wife, daughter, sister, sister-in-law, aunt, niece, friend, colleague, volunteer, and music lover was killed tragically in an unwarranted collision of a TTC Bus with a cube van on August 13, 2013. The collision occurred in our own backyard – the junction of Middlefield and Steeles, in Scarborough, on a perfect summer day around 11 AM. It was evident that the collision was not due to rush hour traffic, weather or bad visibility. In fact, the westbound TTC bus was standing still at the northeast corner of Steeles & Middlefield when it was

hit by a cube van travelling eastbound on Steeles. The van hit the parked TTC bus and killed one passenger, 52 year old Manoranjana Kanagasabapathy, fondly known as Ranjana and injured several others. We felt the immensity of the collision when we lost the life of our beloved Ranjana.

Please note that we cannot use the word "accident" loosely here. Most so called "accidents" do not happen just accidently. In fact, most of these so called accidents are preventable. In this incident, it was not the chaos of the peak hour traffic; it was not the visibility, nor the slipperiness of the road that caused the collision. So what contributed to this collision? The answer to this puzzle will be available when the authorities complete the investigations. However, media outlets reported witnesses alleging that the driver of the van was on the phone. Some reports alleged that the driver

was searching to pick up the phone that had fallen on the floor; he was speaking on the phone even after the crash!

For a driver going eastbound on Steeles, to change lanes, to veer left again to cross from the eastbound lane into the westbound lane and to drive east distracted with phones" has become a major cause of road collisions these days. It is this dangerous aspect of distracted driving that will be addressed in this article and any mention of distracted driving refers to the act of "holding and using phone while driving".



on westbound lanes and then to cross Middlefield and to ultimately collide with the stationary TTC bus - what caused this entire calamity?

This particular event has triggered the discussion on "Distracted Driving" in various media reports. "Being

Motor vehicles can be transformed into lethal weapons in the hands of distracted drivers. With the increase of cellular phone usage, the risk of roadaccidents is steadily on the rise. According to Driver Performance Studies1. "the use of a handheld cellular phone while driving may demand a variety of maneuvers: searching for the phone in the vehicle, reaching for it to initiate or receive a call, dialing, holding it to the ear while driving, picking up a phone that has been dropped, and so forth. Even the use of a hands-free phone can be distracting to the driver as conversation consumes the

driver's attention while driving, often resulting in unwarranted accidents."

Unfortunately, too many innocent lives are lost to distracted driving. Even one is too many.

"We need to prevent needless crashes caused by driver distraction and I believe this law will do just that." - Kathleen Wynne, the current Ontario Premier and the former Minister of Transportation said when the Distracted Driving Law was passed in the first instance.

Currently, Bill 116 known as "Manoranjana Kanagasabapathy Act" is before the Ontario Legislative Assembly. It has gone through the second reading and has since passed on to the review by the Legislative Assembly Committee. It will have to pass through the third reading and be signed by the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario before it becomes law.

The distracted driving law, as it stands, is not deterrent enough for breaking the law with a mere \$155 fine and no demerit points. This bill is therefore introducing the loss of 3 demerit points and an increase of fine between \$300 - 700 from \$155.

"I move this bill in honour of this person, who had the unfortunate situation of losing her life in an accident in my riding as a result of someone possibly using a handheld device while driving and losing control of their vehicle" stated Mr. Bas Balkissoon, MPP for Scarborough Rouge River, moving the Private Members Bill in the Legislative Assembly, Mr. Bas Balkisson deserves the credit for spearheading this initiative and galvanizing support from all quarters where it was able to pass the second reading with the support of all parties in the house.

This Bill is meant to make the roads safe for everyone. However, laws, fines and points alone are not going to solve the problem. A widespread campaign along with proper driver education is necessary to prevent further tragedies like Ranjana's unnecessary death. We are aware of the evils of drinking and driving. But when it comes to talking on the phone while driving, most of us do not realize that it is also dangerous and could cost innocent lives. Educating the masses should start with educating the younger generation.

Peer Pressure and the compulsion to respond immediately:

There often is an unnecessary need that every call and every text must be responded to immediately. This naturally results in talking and texting while driving.

We must change this mindset. We must make the younger generation realise that safety is paramount and calls can always wait. There is a time and place for everything. Multitasking does cost lives. The life lost could even be yours!

The Motto should be: Hands on the steering wheel, eyes on the road, mind on driving, and driving alone!

Lack of understanding of the effects of Distracted Driving:

People feel it is harmless to use the phone and drive. But reports indicate that a driver on the phone has 4 times higher chance of causing a collision than a driver without a phone. We need to start the awareness campaign with the younger generation before they even get used to this habit. They are our future drivers. Education and awareness are the keys to fix this ignorance.

Social Stigma and Lesson to learn from MADD:

In the last twenty years, what MADD (Mothers Against Drinking and Driving) has done about drinking and driving, is quite remarkable. They brought the awareness of the dangers of drinking and driving. One could not escape from their campaign even if they wanted to. They were everywhere.

They worked hard. The amazing results—the development of social stigma against drinking and driving; people look down upon drivers who drink and drive; and no one boasts about driving drunk anymore to their colleagues near the water coolers. The campaign on distracted driving must reach the same level of intensity to produce similar results achieved by MADD.

Holding the phone while driving should be perceived and treated as socially unacceptable and shameful acts. We must change the mindset of those who talk on the phone while driving. The younger generation is quite capable of making changes and we must engage them in our campaign against distracted driving. They must be our target in addition to the general public. This will bring our desired effect.

Please Take Action:

- Please set an example by driving with your hands free.
- Educate others to drive with their hands free.
- Bring in the aspect of social stigma against cellphone usage while driving.
- Your Campaign against Distracted Driving will save another life, such as that of Ranjana.
- It will also save many families as hers from many years of agony and grief!

The final stages of the war in Sri Lanka were permeated with wide-spread breaches of international humanitarian law by government forces and included the specific targeting of Tamil civilians such as the shelling of hospitals and safety-zones. The UN Panel of Experts Report estimates the number of civilian deaths to range from 75,000 to 120,000. Tens of thousands of people who survived the final stages of the war now suffer from war-related disabilities. Humanitarian law was also violated by enforced disappearances of former combatants, their families and those who are suspected of sympathizing with former combatants. Enforced disappearances occurred throughout the war and continued in the camps for Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) after the war.

The effects of the final phases of the war have resulted in drastic changes to the demographics of Tamils in the Northern Province and are shaped by a history of state-based discrimination, protracted civil war and displacement. These effects are further compounded by post-war developments such as a sharp rise in militarization, land-grabbing, food insecurity, lack of permanent housing for resettled IDPs, continued enforced disappearances and arbitrary detention. Of the survivors of 2009, there is a high volume of Tamil wom-

cn-headed households who are now primarily responsible for the economic, social and cultural livelihoods of their families. There are at least 40, 000 widows in the Northern Province and tens of thousands more women-headed households, where the adult male has either been killed, disappeared or disabled due to the conflict. These women maintain families often in temporary or semi-permanent shelters, with irregular or no income and in areas with a high density of army and military settlements.

My doctoral research focuses on women survivors of 2009 and in particular women-heads of household. It is my contention that as survivors, witnesses and heads of their families, Tamil women of the Northern Province, particularly of the Vanni region have

important insights as to how the war was fought, the actions of the Sri Lankan armed forces, state oppression and the issues that their communities are grappling with post-May 2009. These insights are important and should shape any action taken towards peace building.





Through my interviews several issues were identified and below I will briefly discuss four of them.

The first issue that was raised was postwar militarization and how it effects the day-to-day life of Tamils in the Northern Province. For every three civilians in the North, there is at least one army personnel, with some areas having an even higher military-civilian density. Militarization is understood as occupa-

tion and has created insecurity. Women spoke of fear-fear to take their child to the hospital without an adult male accompanying them, fear for their children as they walk to school and fear of sexual violence. Women explained the source of their fears by giving countless examples of daily violence and harassment experienced by themselves, their communities and by their children. It is important to understand that almost four years after the war, the army now constitutes Northern Tamils' primary interaction with the state and this has only deepened resentment and suspicion of the Sri Lankan government.

Secondly, militarization has also created a crisis in income-security as the army has taken over civilian businesses and agricultural land. The women I spoke with pointed out that poverty, hunger and unemployment were issues that were new to them only after the war. The army was cited as their main barrier to employment and livelihood development. Tractors, vehicles and other instruments essential to their pre-2009 occupations had been destroyed or stolen by the army after they fled their homes during the war. Thousands of acres of agricultural land has been appropriated by the army and those who were displaced during the war have not had their land returned. Women-heads of household who had young children at home had no one to leave their children with while they sought whatever few employment opportunities available to them. Many women described the desperation of not being able to feed their children and how this impacted their sense of autonomy and self, as mothers and as those responsible for a future generation.

Another issue that was raised was the effects of arbitrary detention and enforced disappearances. Women continue to search for their loved ones and for information regarding what happened to them during the war. Many women




I spoke with would carry a photo of their family member and they narrated their struggles to find the disappeared or to visit a family member in detention. Prisoners are continuously moved between prisons and are often relocated outside of their communities making it difficult for their families to locate or visit them. Families are not informed when a prisoner is transferred or where they are transferred to and this often results in a form of enforced disappearance. Women described how for years they continued to seek out various authorities, prisons and army camps in search of the disappeared or demand that the detained are either charged or released.

Lastly, what I want to point out is that militarization, poverty, land-grabbing, enforced disappearances and arbitrary detention were all discussed using rights-based language. It is important to recognize that the post-war 'needs' women raised should not be divorced from questions of justice. Women spoke of their right to safety, the right to their land, the right to earn an income, their rights as mothers to provide for their children, their right to know what happened to their disappeared loved ones and the rights of prisoners. They spoke of how their rights are being violated and they named those responsible- the government and the

army. Furthermore, women made clear that what happened during the war lives with them. The war is not contained in a past that can be forgotten because what happened during the war continues to profoundly shape their lives. Any kind of peace must be built through justice and this cannot be done through a domestic mechanism because, as my research as well as the work of human rights groups have illustrated, the Sri Lankan government continues to carry out the violence of the war despite its 'official' end.





t the end of this year, we are expecting the next global forum to discuss the human rights situation in Sri Lanka in the March 2014 session of the UN Human Rights Council. Irrespective of how much hope one might want to draw from the result of this meeting, let us take one step back to think about the issue of human rights more generally. As we, the Sri Lankan Tamil diaspora, have learned, access to human rights is a matter of life and death. What we have learned as well is that this access is scarce; while for us living in Western countries, human rights are much more accessible, human rights to Tamils living in Sri Lanka are far away. How could we overcome this situation?

Gayatri Chakravorty Spivak[†] claims that human rights are a matter of education. She argues that education is key, not only when it comes to claiming human rights for oneself but also for abolishing the unequal accessibility of human rights for people living in the West and so called "third world countries". However, she does not speak about any kind of education. She even decries certain kinds of education, namely the system of rote learning, by means of which the poor in the global South are taught basic literacy and numeracy. Spivak argues that rote learning consolidates the "class-habit of obedience"2. It is a system which aims to bringing up citizens who obey, who do not question their lives in a political sense, and who do not see a connection between themselves and their government, except in terms of obedience. Of course, rote learning is officially justified as an efficient manner of teaching a large number of students from a wide range of age groups. Spivak has proved different by means of her own school projects3 in rural West Bengal, India, which 1 Gayatri Chakravorty Spivak (2004): Righting Wrongs. have abolished the system of rote learning. Instead, she aims to teach the children what she calls literary reading, aiming for "the move from rote to comprehension"4. She believes that education entails the ability to comprehend the world self-reliantly. That is why the humanities play an important role for her approach. What is characteristic for the humanities according to Spivak, is, that there is no right or wrong. There are many paths to finding the truth, and in most cases, there is no truth at all. A poem can be read in several ways. There is no right or wrong interpretation, only a well or poorly argued one. To get engaged with a text and to argue one's point of view. are the kind of skills the humanities teach us. As much as children are withheld from comprehension and from learning to argue one's own kind of comprehension, they are withheld from identifying and expressing their political interests as grownups,

What follows from Spivak's thoughts for us, the Tamil diaspora in the West, is the imperative to ask ourselves what kind of systems of rote learning we actually are exposed to. Are the jobs we do—whether we are working in offices or in factories—not some kind of rote learning as well? Doing the same thing over and over again, according to what one was told? Institutions like the Tamil Literary Garden remind us of the opportunity or even teach us the ability to comprehend the world self-reliantly. We get the chance to flee from our

The South Atlantic Quarterly 103 (2/3): 562. everyday systems of rote learning, get to practice to comprehend and to argue our own point of view on a poem or an essay we have read. In the end, this is what enables us to think politically, to express our political interest. One of these interests should be, to abolish the system of rote learning for Tamils in refugee camps and rural areas in Sri Lanka in order to enable them claiming access to human rights. The political

oppression through rote learning needs to be end. Another one should be encouraging our own children to comprehend their world self-reliantly by reading out poems to them.

In the veranda of the large courtyard house in Jaffina sat the 84-year-old Mrs Subramanium, who has worked as a secretary at Uthayan, Jaffina's most popular newspaper, for the past 17 years. I had arrived early for my appointment with Uthayan's editor, so Mrs Subramanium gave me a quick tour of the offices. Large archaic machines rattled as the newspaper went to press.

Mrs Subramanium was a one-woman hive of activity. Even at the end of the day, her starched sari was crisply in place, and there was a neatness and compressed energy in her movements. Our conversation was interspersed with her manning the phones and typing up letters. We spoke about the newspaper's painful history with violence. We have been going through a really terrible period,' she said. 'Because we had to undergo problems from the LTTE, EPDP [Eclam People's Democratic Party), then TELO (Tamil Eclam Liberation Organisation) ... Not only that, we also had to undergo problems from the army.'

The media has long been a target of intimidation and violence in Sri Lanka, and this has been especially so for the Jaffna press. On 2 May 2006,


unidentified armed men stormed the Uthayan offices and shot and killed Rajaratnam Ranjit, a 25-year-old employee, as well as the marketing manager, Bastian Sagayathas. For their safety, a policeman at the gate now provides round-the-clock security, but Mrs Subramanium is not impressed. 'Even if the police is here, if somebody wants to do something – somebody wants to throw a grenade, he will do it because he is determined to do it. Police will only shoot at him after he leaves the place!'

On my way to the office of Mr Kanamylnathan, the editor, I passed a wall with photographs and newspaper clippings of the two killed staff members. As a tribute, the bullet holes had not been plastered over – a reminder that the threat of violence still loomed large. For the last five years, Kanamylnathan had not left his office, even though the war ended in May 2009. He feels it is unsafe for him to venture out of the office compound and lives here with his wife. Kanamylnathan



fears that there might be another attempt on his life. He was badly injured after what he believed was a hit-and-run incident in 2001 and was evacuated to Switzerland for treatment, where he has permanent residency. Despite the pleas of diasporic family members to stay away, he returned to Jaffna to his role as Uthayan's editor.

It is not only Kanamylnathan's life that is at stake, but the newspaper's very existence. During the embargoes of the 1990s, the Colombo government restricted fuel, medicines and food items reaching the north and east of Sri Lanka, fearing that these would fall into the hands of the LTTE. Eventually, the ban extended to newsprint, and Kanamylnathan's team had to be innovative in seeking out a substitute. 'We went into the market to buy any paper and printed the newspaper on that. This included cardboard, brown

paper, even [lined] paper used to make exercise books for schoolchildren, he said, showing me the various coloured and textured papers that they had used during the ban.

The newspapers from that time were only about ten or so pages long, and mostly carried photographs of civilian casualties of war. Kanamylnathan Mrs Subramanium were not unique. Circumstances of the times brought out courage and innovation in surprising ways.

J Jegatheeswaran, or 'Esan', a 50-yearold taxi driver, drove me around Jaffina. 'No petrol, no batteries. There was nothing,' the usually quiet and composed Esan said as he described the situation in Jaffina he said. 'In the nights I had to drive the sick and take the women in labour to the hospital. It was difficult those days.'

These stories of everyday, utilitarian aspects of a survivor's life are in fact narratives that drive home the nature and experience of war. My films, supported by Groundviews, a 'citizen journalism' website, were all shot in Jaffna, where the current political climate and restrictions on the media made filming a challenge. So I decided to use a smaller camera and a 'guerrilla'-style approach to filmmaking, keeping a low profile. My visits to Jaffna, over a three-month period, were serendipitous - the mechanic who pioneered the conversion of engines to run on kerosene worked next door to the house where I stayed, so I was able to visit his garage often and film him at work.

When I first met Mrs Subramanium, she had told me that death comes only once, not twice. I have heard that sentiment repeatedly in Jaffna. At its core is an acceptance of the dangers that comes from living in a conflict zone, and a deep-rooted conviction to remain there. Despite the fear and insecurity that led others to emigrate to join the growing Tamil diaspora, they chose to remain. I was born in Jaffna but grew up in England, since the age of six. So for me, my journey in making these video portraits felt almost like a tribute to those who continue to dedicate their lives to Jaffna when so many others have left for safe havens abroad.

Kannan Arunasalam is an award winning documentary filmmaker and narrative journalist. He was born in Jaffna, grew up in England, and returned to Sri Lanka in 2005. His work has appeared in The New Yorker, The Guardian and broadcast on Aljazeera English. His latest documentary short The Story of One was awarded the Manuel Rivera-Ortiz Foundation grant prize for best documentary, 2013.

believes that the real reason for including newsprint in the bans was to curb the functioning of papers such as Uthayan, which was openly critical of the government. 'When they are not bothered about the essential items of a common man, do you think they are bothered about newsprint?' he said. 'They don't want a newspaper to come out from Jaffna!'

New environment

I left Uthayan thinking how remarkable these stories of resilience were. Both Kanamylnathan and Mrs Subramanium have neither resources nor family connections, but they are committed to stay. So, I returned to make Paper, a short film about the story of Uthayan overcoming scarcity and violence to deliver news to the people of Jaffna. But as I discovered on my return visits, people such as Kanamylnathan and

during the embargoes, echoing what Kanamylnathan had said. He became the inspiration for my second video portrait, Kerosene. Curfews were strictly enforced and without petrol, batteries or spare parts, driving taxis, or for that matter any car, was a real challenge. But then man adapted his machine to the new environment. Coconut oil, or illupennai, widely found in Jaffna, replaced engine oil, and kerosene was used instead of petrol.

Even so, not all cars could be converted. It was only the old British makes, such as the Morris Oxford and Austin Cambridge, that could be modified to run on kerosene. These older cars could even use spare parts fashioned out of scrap iron, and so could travel where the newer Japanese cars were not able to go. Esan and his trusty Morris Oxford had once taken 20 people to safety. 'My Morris Oxford was the only car running in the area,'


"I hope she will take over this place. I know she'll do an excellent job."

In the Tamil community, one often associates individuals suffering from mental health issues with the word "veesar" (crazy). However, mental illness is a complex issue that takes many different forms. This makes it especially difficult to pinpoint a specific definition. Mental health affects various different facets of one's life such as how we think, how we act, and how we integrate with our families and society. At times, individuals may not even know they are suffering from a mental illness, or may refuse to acknowledge this issue.

We all have bad days and it is easy for someone to be upset over something. However, for people who are experiencing a very common mental illness like depression, a 'bad day' could be

Mental Health and Canada's Tamil Community

Schizophrenia is a mental illness that has symptoms including auditory and visual hallucinations, paranoia about people on TV talking directly to them, ening to them. This particular mental health issue was brought to the Tamil community's attention through the movie Thenali staring Kamal Hassan. Kamal Hassan played the character Thenali, a man who suffers from irrational phobias thereby limiting his ability to lead a normal life.

Panic disorders and post traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) is also another common mental illness. Many individuals in the Tamil-Canadian community suffer from PTSD as a result of experiencing war in Sri Lanka, PTSD can last up to 10-15





very difficult to experience. Symptoms of depression can include but are not limited to isolation, sudden change in behavior, holding back or becoming less socially active, eating disorders and sleeping disorders. Another difference between being upset and serious depression is the longevity and severity of the changes. Unfortunately, these issues are often deemed taboo and are not openly talked about within the Tamil-Canadian community.



also problematic. The media often only talks about mental health and mental issues when things go wrong, such as suicides. However, the media fails to address the mental health issues of those living seemingly normal healthy lives. Movies and television have a tendency to exaggerate mental health issues into inaccurate perceptions of mental health issues, further confusing the public and fuelling more stereotypes.

Unfortunately, it is common for Tamils to shun an entire family when one member of the family has been identified with a mental health disorder or issue. This has a serious effect because it limits a family's ability to seek appropriate help and puts an emotional strain on the family due to isolation. If one member of a family has been diagnosed with a mental illness, the rest

of the family may also be affected. This false accusation is detrimental to the community and only festers negative stigma.

Although the Tamil-Canadian community has become more 'Westernized', certain traditions revolving around mental illness are still very much deep rooted. Many believe that mental health issues can be addressed through prayer or by going to the temple to do a "pooja". Although exploring holistic treatments and having a balance of medication and meditation is beneficial, it is important to seek proper medical attention as well.

It is important to realize that mental illness affects everyone regardless of age, gender, race or creed. Mental illness should not be ridiculed or taken light-heartedly. It deserves the utmost respect as it may even affect one's own

circle of family and friends.

*As part of its commitment to community outreach, Can TYD hosts monthly Community Forum to discuss various issues of importance to the Tamil Canadian Community. The above noted observations were made during an especially thought-provoking discussion on June 11th, 2013, concerning perceptions of mental health and Canada's Tamil community. Can TYD staff, youth and parents took part in this discussion to exchange perspectives on this issue.





n July 18th, 1918 in a small village in the Transkei countryside of South Africa, a baby boy was born in the Tembu royal house. The baby grew, year after year molding into a man, role model and a great leader of South Africa, Nelson Mandela.

After his education, Nelson Mandela moved to Johannesburg where he got a job in a law office. Traveling to and from the office was expensive for 'blacks', so Mandela along with 10,000 other blacks protested and boycotted the buses for six days resulting in the



nightsticks and shooting them. That day changed Mandela forever and from that point on he organized several protests, the most memorable one was the 'Defiance Campaign' in June 1952. This campaign was created to

> climinate the laws against blacks. On June 22nd, Nelson Mandela gave a speech in front of 10,000 people, his great speech ignited hope into listeners' hearts that one day South Africa would be united and free. During this campaign Mandela, other ANC leaders and protesters were put in jail for two days.

After being released from prison, Mandela plan was to combine Africans and any other political

party or race to fight back against the government. This plan was called the 'Freedom Charter.' Thousands attended the Freedom Charter read aloud.

On June 26th, 1955 the final document of the Freedom Charter was presented to the Congress of People. This day became 'Freedom Day' in South Africa. However, the issue kept on getting worse, as the government was tightening the laws against blacks at a rapid speed.

In September 1955, he went back home, after being away for 15 years. There he, was arrested for high treason and put into jail. This trial went on for five years and during the course, Mandela's first wife had left him and he married another lady, Winnie. During this period another group called Pan-Africanist Congress was starting to rise. The ANC and PAC were competitors, but believed in the same thing. Mandela finally got his verdict, that he was not guilty.

Released from the jail, Mandela traveled everywhere in South Africa under the radar and also out of the

country to gather supporters. He traveled to Tanzania, Ghana; Morocco; where he learned guerilla warfare tactics, London and also Ethiopia to have arms training. When he arrived back in South Africa, he met with the ANC, but on his way back to his house he was stopped





and taken to a police station. He had yet another trial and found guilty of leaving the country with no passport and encouraging workers to strike and as a consequence he was sentenced 5-year imprisonment.

fare to be lowered. Nelson Mandela that day joined the African National Congress (ANC) which was founded to fight against white leaders. This was the beginning of Mandela's journey. As time went on the ANC mission changed into the fight against racism, freedom and equality.

During the 'May Day' protest of 1950 (when more than half black workers went on strike) while Mandela was walking home at night be witnessed policemen beating people with



During Nelson Mandela's time in jail, another group just like ANC and PAC were emerging led by a man named Steve Biko. Biko lead many protests while Mandela was in jail. Mandela's wife, Winnie was part of a few of the protests. In 1979, Mandela won the Nehru Award for 'International Understanding.' The 1980's were a violent time in South Africa, many people died and many more were injured, but during this time support for Nelson Mandela was finally becoming worldwide. London was a huge support as well even though the past years were behind the government.

During 1989, the president Botha had a stroke and left office. F. W. de Klerk took this position and this was one of the turning points in the journey to freedom. President Klerk knew apartheid (a former social system in South Africa in which black people and people from other racial groups did not have the same political and economic rights as white people and were forced to live separately from white people-

Merriam Webster) could not continue. In October 1989, seven fellow prisoners were released for no certain reasons one being Sisulu. This was a sign, of the end of apartheid.

On February 2nd, 1990. President Klerk entered parliament knowing today he would set the new foundation of a democratic South Africa, Also that day all life sentences were lifted and all political leaders were freed including Mandela. On February 11th, 1990, Nelson Mandela was free and that day he said one of the most memorable speeches in front of 100,000 people. Mandela traveled across the world celebrating the new South Africa. Sadly, violence was still a problem in South Africa and Mandela along with members of the ANC continued to discuss solutions to the problem with the government, President Klerk and Nelson Mandela decided to have an election to vote in a whole new constitution. This decision won both Klerk and Nelson the 'Nobel Prize' in December of 1993.

April 27th, 1994, was the Election Day. The parties were led by Klerk of course and the opposition was the ANC, led by Mandela. It was very tough campaigning because many citizens didn't know how to read or write. The ANC trained 100,000 people to talk to these citizens and it all worked out in the end. Nelson Mandela was elected as the president of South Africa.

Five years had come and gone and Mandela decided to end his presidency but this was not enough for him.

Mandela continued to be part of the change not only in his country but across the world. Mandela worked hard and fought against HIV/Aids in his final stretch of his life. And that is what we salute him for, his hard work, inspiration and optimism. We will cherish him for all the work he has done to end apartheid in South Africa and he will be remembered for centuries to come.






