Japan Sea, Eastern Shore—Nipon—Reef reported Northward of Wakasa Bay.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 342 of 1894) that fishermen report the existence of a narrow reef, about 6 miles in length, with depths of 4 to 17 fathoms on it, 150 fathoms westward, 300 fathoms eastward, and a bank of soundings for some distance from either end, lying in approximately lat. 36° 30′ N., long. 135° 45′ E.

Korea, West Coast-Masanpho Harbour-Alteration in. Channel near Chanoine Island.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 343 of 1894) that a recent survey of the entrance to Masanpho harbour by the Japanese vessel-of-war Tsukuba shows that very great alterations have taken place in the changel near Chanoine island, and the indications given in Chart No. 1,270 are no longer of any service.

Approximate position, Cape Chanoine: lat. 37° 10′ 30′ N., long. 126° 37′ 10″ E.
Variation, 5° westerly in 1894.

E. I. Archipelago -- Borneo, North Coast.

I.—Dangerous Rocks near Lankayan.

Information has been received from Commander R. W. S. Rogers, H. M. S. Archer, that Mr. G. Mayne, commanding the British North Borneo Co.'s steamer Petrel, reports the following dangers discovered, and alterations in the buoys and beacons on the north coast of Borneo.

Two rocks having 6 to 7 ft. water over them lie near Lankayan on the track hitherto recommended: these rocks are 2 cables apart, on a N. 13° E. and S. 13° W. bearing from each other.

From the south-western rock Lankayan bears N. 34° E., distant $2\frac{\pi}{10}$ miles. This rock is marked on the south-west side by a small black cask buoy. At 5 cables S. 35° W. from the buoy is a coral patch of 5 fathoms.

Approximate position of the south-west rock: lat. 6° 28′ 35″ N., long. 117° 53′ 55″ E.

II.—Shallow Water between Langaan and Great Bakkungaan.

Also, that a large coral patch with 8 ft. water over it lies in the channel between Langaan and Great Bakkungaan, the exact position of which has not yet been determined.

Approximate position of Langaan: lat. 6° 12½' N., long. 118° 9' 30" E.

III .- Alterations in Buoys and Beacons in Mallawalle Channel.

1. A beacon with black spherical cage has been erected on the rock situated S. 35° E., distant 11° mile from

Kukuban, with Tibakkan bearing N. 66° E.

Approximate position: lat. 6° 54′ 55″ N., long. 117° 25′ 10″ E.

2. The beacon on Sandy island (previously notified as having disappeared) has been replaced, and is now screwed into the rock.

Approximate position: lat. 6° 49′ 20″ N., long. 117° 37′

0" E.

3. The beacon formerly marking Leonan reef has disappeared, and will not be replaced.

Approximate position: lat. 6° 44′ 30″ N., long. 117° 37′ 35″ E.

4. An iron perch surmounted by a black cage has been placed on the reef at $2\frac{1}{3}$ miles N. 61° E. from the position of Leonan reef beacon (removed)

Approximate position lat. 6° 45′ 40″ N., long. 117° 39′ 40″ E.

Note.—The red buoy marking this reef has been removed.

5. The black and red horizontally striped buoy marking the 2½ fathoms patch situated 1¾ mile N.E. ¾ N. from Billean, has been moved, and now marks a 3-fathom patch, situated 3\frac{3}{4} miles N.E. \frac{1}{4} N. from Billean island.

Approximate position: lat. \frac{6}{0} 39' 30'' N., long. 117' 48' 45'' E.

Bearings magnetic. Variation 13° easterly.

E. I. Archipelago-Kleine Soenda Islands-Reef N. of Meno and Lajar Islands-Lombok N.W. Coast.

The Commander of H. M. Borneo reports the existence of a coral reef, about one cable long in a S. by W. . W. and N. by E. 1 E. direction, and about 1 cable broad, with a least depth of 43 fathoms and with depths of 11 to 20 fathoms around.

The reef lies on the following bearings:

Peak of Lombok (Rindjani)......N. 101° 5 E. E. extreme of Lajar island.........N. 142° W. extreme of Lajar island......N. 169° E. extreme of Meno island......N. 196° 5 E. N. extreme of Terawangan island...N. 254° E.
Peak of Bali (Agoeng)............N. 268° 5. E.
Approximate position: lat. 8° 19′ 15″ S., long. 116° 3′ 30″ E
