China Sea—Cochin-China—Saigon or Don-Nai River— Intended exhibition of Lights.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 319 of 1897) that the under-mentioned lights will shortly be

exhibited at the entrance to Saigon or Don-Nai river:

1. On the nothern side of the entrance to Kua-tieu, a fixed light showing white and red sectors, white between the bearings S. 35° W. through west, and N. 50° W., red between N. 50° W. through north, and S. 70° E.

Approximate position: lat. 10° 16′ 20″ N., long. 106° 45′ 25″ E.

2. At 3 miles S. 68° E. from the above light (No. 1), a fixed light also showing red and white sectors, red between S. 37° W. and S. 58° W. and N. 89° W. and N. 53° W., and white in all other directions.

Approximate position: lat. 10° 15′ 5″ N., long. 106° 48′ 20" E.

3. Upon the eastern point of entrance to Kua Dong tranh a white light showing fixed and flashing sectors as follows: quick flashes between the bearings N. 54° Wand N. 10° W., fixed between N. 10° W. and N. 9° E., quick flashes between N. 9° E. and N. 36° E., and fixed between N. 36° E, and S. 54° E.

Bay of Bengal-Orissa Coast-Two loaded Cargo Boats Sunk.

A telegraphic communication has been received from the Port Officer, False Point, stating that two loaded cargo boats have sunk at the anchorage: the one lying with the flagstaff bearing south 4° east; Old Telegraph Office, Jumbu, south 59° west. The second wreck is about 150 ft. S.S.W. of position given, with 18 ft. and 19 ft. of water reduced over them respectively. These wrecks will be buoyed as soon as possible.

Africa, North-East-Red Sea, Western Shore-Approaches to Sawakin-Five-fathoms Patch on South Jumna Shoal.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 331 of 1897) that information has been received from Lieut. R. Greey, R.N.R., of the Eastern Telegraph Company's ship Amber, that a five-fathoms patch has been found on South Jumna shoul in approximately lat. 19° 11′ 15′ N., long 37° 31′ 25″ E., or about one-third of a mile eastward of the known dangers.

China Sea—Formosa Island—Light exhibited on Foki Kaku (Tapien Point).

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 334 of 1897) that the under-mentioned light was established on Foki Kaku (Tapien or Faki point), the north extreme of Formosa Island:-

Foki Kaku light is a fixed white light of the second order, elevated 161 ft. above high water, and visible in clear weather from a distance of 19 miles, between the

bearings N. 70° E. through east and south, and N. 87° W. The lighthouse, 100 ft. high, is iron, octagonal in shape, and painted in black and white horizontal bands.

Approximate position, lat. 25° 18′ 30″ N., long. 121° 31′ 30″ E.

Variation, 1° westerly in 1897.)

Australia-Spencer Gulf .- A newly discovered Reef.

The President, Marine Board, Port Adelaide, has given notice (No. 3 of 1897) that a reef, on which the sea breaks only occasionally, and which is not marked on the Admiralty Charts, exists in lat. 34° 51′ S., long. 136° 14', 30" E., the highest part of dangerous reef bearing

N.W., cor. mag., distance 21 miles therefrom.

The reef in question extends east and west three-quarters of a mile, and north and south a quarter of a mile, with less than five fathoms of water, shoaling in the centre where the sea occasionally breaks heavily to not more than 7 ft. L.W.S.
