# Bengal-No. 9.

Pacific Ocean—Solomon Islands—Shoals on East Coast of Mala (Malaita) Island.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 685 of 1895) of the existence of the under-mentioned shoals on the east coast of Mala (Malaita) island:—

(1) A shoal, apparently coral, on which a sounding of \$\frac{4\frac{1}}{2}\$ fathoms was obtained (possibly there may be less water), lies in the northern entrance to Maramisike passage, with Pyramid island bearing east, distant \$1\frac{1}{4}\$ mile, and Annuta island, about \$8.25\circ W\$. Approximate position: lat. \$9\circ 16\circ S., long \$16\circ 14\circ E\$.

(2) A shoal, on which a sounding of 5 fathoms was obtained, but probably there is less water lies with South

obtained, but probably there is less water, lies with South Sister island, bearing about W.S.W., distant 2 miles, or approximately in lat. 9° 8′ S., long. 161° 12′ E.

The extent of this shoal is doubtful, and a wide berth should be given to the Sister islands until the locality has been thoroughly examined.

# BENGAL-No. 10.

Pacific Ocean-Philippine Islands-Shoals in St. Bernardino Strait.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 686 of 1895) of the existence of the under-mentioned shoals northward and southward of Dulampiri (Puercos), St. Bernardino strait:

(1) A shoal of sand and coral, with depths of less than 5 fathoms on it, extends for a distance of 2 miles northward of the north point of Dulampiri, and has depths of 11 fathoms for a distance of half a mile further north-

ward. Approximate position, north extreme of 5 fathoms: lat. 12° 30′ N., long. 124° 13½′ E.

(2) A similar shoal extends southward from the southern point of Dulampiri, the 5 fathoms limit peing at a distance of 11 mile and the 11 fathoms limit with at a distance of 11 mile, and the 11 fathoms limit 2 miles

from the south point.

Also, dated November 23, 1895, of the undermentioned shoal, south-westward of Dulampiri :-

(3) This shoal, now named Rubi shoal, is about 14 cable in extent east and west, with a depth of about 6 fathoms on it (possibly there may be less water) and deep water close around. It lies N. 79° W., distant 14 mile, from El Diamante, or approximately in lat. 12° 204 N., long. 124° 10¼ E. Variation, nil in 1895.

# Bengal.-No. 11.

Pacific Ocean—Isabella, Waterwitch, and Combe Banks-Banks North-west of Uea or Wallis Islands.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 688 of 1895) that the following information respecting the Isabella and other banks in its vicinity, north-west of Uea or Wallis islands, has been received from Lieutenant and Commander J. W. Combe, H. M. Surveying Vessel  ${f Waterwitch}:$ 

Isabella bank, on which a depth of 12 fathoms coral was found, in circular in shape, and about 2 miles in diameter. Its centre is approximately in lat. 12° 24′ S., long. 177° 26′ W.

Waterwitch bank, situated between the parallels of 12° 29′ and 12° 34′ south latitude, and the meridians of 176° 41′ and 176° 50′ west longitude, is of atoll-like formation, having a parallel with soundings of having a narrow rim of growing coral, with soundings of from 12 to 16 fathoms all round its outer edge, and depths of 23 to 28 fathoms inside.

Combe bank, situated between the parallels of 12° 24' and 12° 28' south latitude, and the meridians of 177° 30' and 177° 41' west longitude, is a coral bank with from 14 to 22 fathoms over it. The soundings on this bank were not sufficient to decide whether it is of a similar formation to the Waterwitch bank, but the shoaler soundings are near the outer edge.

All these banks are "steep-to," with soundings of over

100 fathoms near their outer edges.

Current.—Whilst the Waterwitch was employed sounding these banks (September, 1895), a slight current setting to the west-north-west was experienced. fresh trade wind this set was much increased, and there was a troublesome sea in the neighbourhood.

## BENGAL.-No. 12.

China, South-east Coast-Hongkong Approach-Intended Alteration in Fog Signal at Gap Rock.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 694 of 1895) that on January 1, 1896, the fog signal on Gap rock will be altered from an explosive signal to a gun, which, during thick or foggy weather, will be fired every ten minutes.

Approximate position: lat. 21° 48′ 50″ N., long 1113° 56′ 15″ E.

### Bengal.—No 13.

New Zealand, North Island-Napier-Lights in connection with Breakwater Works.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 696 of 1895) that on November 1, 1895, the red light previously shown at the extremity of the breakwater wharf, Ahuriri bluff, would be discontinued, and the under-mentioned lights would be exhibited from the breakwater works near Ahuriri bluff, Napier :-

(1) A red light is shown from a red beacon, at an elevation of 25 ft. above high water, in a position 146 ft. from the eastern extremity of the breakwater wharf, or about N.E. ¼ E. (N. 48° E.), nearly 2 cables distant from the north- east extremity of Ahuriri bluff.

Approximate position : lat. 39° 28' 15" S., long. 176° 57'

(2) A green light, visible from S.E. by S., through east, to E. ½ N., is shown at an elevation of 25 ft. above high water from a green beacon at the extreme of the steamer wharf of the breakwater, or approximately in a position bearing N.W. <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> W., distant about six-tenths of a cable from the red light (1).

The above lights or beacons in line, bearing S.E. 3 E., lead into the breakwater harbour.

The breakwater now extends about 2 cables beyond the red light or beacon (1), and the extremity of the rubble foundation about 3 cables beyond that light.

Vessels entering Napier harbour by day should keep well outside the breakwater works buoys and those marking Auckland rocks. By night vessels should be in the white section of eastern pier light, bearing S.W., before losing sight of Ahuriri bluff light, bearing S. by W.

The southern limit of the green light (2), E. \( \frac{1}{2} \) N.,

passes over the 3 fathoms limit of soundings between the

breakwater and the entrance to port Napier.

Note.—A chart is in course of preparation, and will shortly be published, showing the breakwater works, &c., in the vicinity of Ahuriri bluff. Variation, 14° easterly in 1895.

### BENGAL.-No. 14.

Korean Archipelago-Crichton Group-Sunken Rock Northward of So au tau.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 702 of 1896) that the Commander of the Japanese vessel-of-war Tatsuta reports that on October 18, 1895, he observed a rock (now named Tatsuta) awash at low water, lying with the summit of Stanley island, bearing E. by S. & S. (S. 76° E.), distant 53 miles; and Selby island summit (2,013), N. by E. § E. (N. 18° E.).

Approximate position: lat. 34° 14′ 45″ N., long. 126° 39′

Variation, 4° westerly in 1895.

Pacific Ocean, South-west-New Britain-Reef Northward of Gazelle Peninsula.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 703 of 1895) that the Master of the steamvessel Ysabel reports that on August 28, 1895, his vessel struck on a reef lying north-westward of Urara, and extending in the form of a crescent from its southern point in approximately lat. 4° 8½' S., long. 151° 53' E., to its north-east point in approximately lat. 4° 3' S., long. 151° 53½" E.

## Bengal.-No. 16.

Japan Sea-Eastern Shore-Sunken Rocks Westward of Bittern Rocks.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 704 of 1895) that during a recent survey of the vicinity two rocks, one with a depth of 3 fathoms at low water and the other with  $2\frac{1}{4}$  fathoms on it, were found, lying respectively W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N. (N. 84° W.), distant  $1\frac{1}{10}$  mile, and W. by N.  $\frac{3}{8}$  N. (N. 75° W.), distant nearly 7 cables from Bittern rocks.

Approximate position, Bittern rocks : lat. 40° 31' N., long. 139° 31′ E. Variation, 5° westerly in 1895.

### BENGAL.-No. 18.

Bay of Bengal—Hooghly River Approaches—Positions of the Pilot's Ridge and Mutlah Lightships.

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 124, dated July 9, 1895, issued by this Office, the Commissioners for the Port of Calcutta have given further notice that the Mutlah lightship was moved into position on January 5, 1896, and now lays in lat. 20° 57′ N., long. 88° 34′ E., with the station buoy bearing one mile due north of the lightship in 17 fathoms mud bottom.

The Pilot's ridge buoy has been brought in N. 62° E., distance 13 miles, and laid in lat. 20° 52′ 30″ N., long. 87° 52′ E., in 24 fathoms of water, coarse sand, and mud, with broken shells.

The ridge lightship will be placed in position one mile due south of its station buoy on March 15 next.

All bearings are magnetic.

### GOVERNMENT OF JAPAN.

Japan—Tai Wan South Coast—Disappearance of Nanko (South Cape) Lighthouse.

Information has been received from Rear-Admiral Tsunoda, I.N., dated November 19, 1895, that the lighthouse on Nanko has entirely disappeared.

Tsu Shima—East Coast—Asu Harbour—Landslip formed.

According to the report of Commander Otsuka, of H.I.M.S. Banjo, dated November 17, 1895, a landslip showing white clay has been produced on the south-east side of a hill forming Magari Zaki, the north entrance point to Asu harbour, and is very conspicuous from a considerable distance.

### Entrance to Amoy.

Information has been received by His Excellency the Governor from Admiral Hoffmann (Imperial German Navy) of the existence of a rock lying in the tract of steamers entering Amoy.

Its position has been ascertained as half way between Coker and Brown rocks, a little to the eastward of a line drawn between the east buoys (black and white chequered) marking these rocks, its depth from 4 to 5 fathoms at low water springs, one pinnacle found to be reaching up to 21 ft. under low water.
