W HEREAS by section 289 of "The Criminal Procedure Code, 1898," it is enacted that if from the absence of a witness or any other reasonable cause it becomes necessary or advisable to postpone the commencement of or adjourn any inquiry or trial, the court may from time to time order a postponement or adjournment on such terms as it thinks fit, for such time as it considers reasonable, and may remand the accused, if in custody, or may commit him to custody or take bail in his own recognizance or with sureties for his appearance; and (2) that no Magistrate shall remand an accused person to custody under the said section for a term exceeding seven days at a time, save and except at such Police Courts as the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, shall from time to time proclaim to be Police Courts at which longer remands may be made, when it shall be lawful to remand accused persons at any such Police Courts for a term not exceeding fourteen days:

And whereas it is expedient to proclaim the Police Courts of Panwila and Urugala to be Police Courts at which longer remands than seven days may be made:

Now know Ye that We, the Lieutenant-Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim that from and after the 2nd day of October, 1899, the Police Courts of Panwila and Urugala shall be Police Courts at which longer remands than seven days may be made.

WHEREAS by section 2 of "The Cemeteries Ordinance Amendment Ordinance, 1885," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, from time to time to add to, or to reduce or otherwise alter the limits of any general cemetery established under the Cemeteries Ordinance No. 12 of 1862, provided that any such additions, reductions, or alterations, as the case may be, shall be proclaimed, specified, and defined, and in all respects dealt with in the same manner as is directed to be done by the said Cemeteries Ordinance No. 12 of 1862, as regards the original limits of any general cemetery established under it:

And whereas it is advisable to alter the limits of the general cemetery at Anuradhapur, in the North-Central Province, established by Proclamation dated August 6, 1885, by the addition of all that land comprising lots Nos 5,092, 5,093, and 5,094, described in preliminary plan No. 1,682 in extent three acres and thirty-nine and a quarter perches:

Now know Ye that We, the Lieutenant-Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council. do by this Our Proclamation add to the general cemetery at Anuradhapura, in the North-Central Province, which has been established by Proclamation dated August 6, 1885, all that land comprising lots Nos. 5,092, 5.093, and 5.094, described in preliminary plan No. 1,682, in extent 3 acres and 39.25 perches; bounded on the north by reservation along the Outer Circular road, on the west by trench, on the south by the general cemetery at Anuradhapura, in the North-Central Province, preclaimed on August 6, 1885, and on the west by Tissawewekele; for the burial of the dead within the following limits which are specified and defined as follows:—on the west the bund of Tissawewa, on the south the Wessagiri vihare, on the east the Malwatu-oya, on the north a line drawn from the Malwatu-oya due west to the Outer Circular road on the north of the Jetawanarama, and on the north-west the Outer Circular road to its junction with the Tissawewa bund.

This Proclamation shall take effect from the date thereof.

The 15th section of the Ordinance No. 15 of 1896 amongst other things provides:

15. (1) Where it appears from information on oath and in writing that any one has been murdered, maimed, or otherwise injured in his person, and an application is made for compensation, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, may, if he thinks fit, after giving public notice in the Government Gazette, and by beat of tom-tom in the village where such crime has been committed, by warrant nominate such person or persons as he thinks fit to investigate the application, and after hearing all parties whom he or they deem to be interested, including any inhabitants of the village, to report to the Governor thereon. The parties shall be heard personally or by pleaders, and the evidence taken an earth in open count. and the evidence taken on oath in open court.

3) Upon such report the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, may dismiss the application if

he thinks fit, or may award such sum for compensation as he thinks just.

(4) The said sum shall, if the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, thinks just, be a charge payable by such village and in such instalments as the Governor may by warrant order, and shall be paid to the personal representative of the person murdered or to the person maimed or injured, or, if he is dead, to his personal representatives.

WHEREAS on the 9th day of September, 1886, a Convention (hereinafter called the Berne Convention) with respect to the protection to be given by way of copyright to the authors of literary and artistic works was concluded between Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the foreign countries following that is to say: Belgium Hert: Smittenband France Italy Commany Spain and Trains. lowing, that is to say: Belgium, Hayti, Switzerland, France, Italy, Germany, Spain, and Tunis:

And whereas on the 5th day of September, 1887, the ratifications of the said Convention were duly exchanged between Her Majesty the Queen and the aforesaid countries:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the 28th day of November, 1887, and made under the authority committed to Her Majesty by the International Copyright Acts, 1844 to 1886, Her Majesty was pleased to make provision for giving rights of copyright throughout Her Majesty's dominions to the authors of literary and artistic works first produced in any of the said foreign countries therein referred to as the foreign countries of the Copyright Union), and otherwise giving effect througout Her Majesty's dominions to the terms of the said Berne Convention, and an English translation of the said Convention was set out in the First Schedule to the Order in Council now in recital:

And whereas since the date of the said Order in Council hereinbefore recited the foreign countries following, namely: Luxembourg, Monaco, Montenegro, and Norway, have acceded to the said Berne Convention, and by Orders in Council, dated respectively the 10th day of August, 1888 the 15th day of October, 1889, the 16th day of May, 1833, and the 1st day of August, 1896, and made under the authority aforesaid, the provisions of the hereinbefore recipied Order in Council of the 28th day of November, 1887, have been extended to the last-mentioned foreign countries respectively, and the last-mentioned foreign countries, together with the foreign countries comprised in the said Order in Council of the 28th day of November, 1887, now constitute the foreign countries of the Copyright Union within the meaning of the said Order in Council:

And whereas an Additional Act to the said Berne Convention was agreed upon between Her Majesty and the following foreign countries for the purpose of varying the provisions of the said Berne Convention, namely: Germany, Italy, Switzerland, Belgium, Luxembourg, and Spain, Monaco, Tunis, France, Montenegro, and the ratifications of the said Additional Act were, on the 9th day of September, 1897, exchanged between Her Majesty and the said foreign countries:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the 7th day of March, 1898, and made under the authority aforeside Her Majesty was pleased to make provision for varying the hereinbefore recited Order in Council of the 28th da of November, 1887, and otherwise giving effect to the said Additional Act throughout Her Majesty's dominions, softar as regards the foreign countries hereinbefore named as parties to the said Additional Act, and an English translation of the said Additional Act is set forth in the schedule to the Order in Council now in recital:

And whereas the Republic of Hayti having duly acceded to the said Additional Act, the said Order in Council of the 7th day of March, 1898, was, by Order in Council of the 19th day of May, 1898, extended to the said Republic:

And whereas it has been intimated to Her Majesty's Government that the Government of the Empire of Japan have notified the accession of that country to the said Berne Convention and Additional Act, to take effect from the 15th day of July, 1899:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the 28th day of November, 1887, and made under the authority committed to Her Majesty by the International Copyright Acts, 1844 to 1886, Her Majesty was pleased to make provision for giving rights of copyright throughout Her Majesty's dominions to the authors of literary and artistic works first produced in any of the said foreign countries, and otherwise giving effect throughout Her Majesty's dominions to the terms of the said Berne Convention, and an English translation of the said Convention was set out in the first schedule to the Order in Council now in recital:

And whereas since the date of the said Order in Council hereinbefore recited the Principality of Montenegro acceded to the said Berne Convention, and by an Order in Council dated the 16th day of May, 1893, the provisions of the said Order in Council of the 28th day of November, 1887, were extended to the said Principality:

And whereas an Additional Act to the said Berne Convention was agreed upon between Her Majesty and certain foreign countries (including Montenegro) for the purposes of varying the provisions of the said Berne Convention, and the ratifications of the said Additional Act were on the 9th day of September, 1897, exchanged between Her Majesty and the said foreign countries parties thereto:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the 7th day of March, 1898, and made under the authority aforesaid, Her Majesty was pleased to make provision for varying the hereinbefore recited Order in Council of the 28th day of November, 1887, and otherwise giving effect to the said Additional Act throughout Her Majesty's dominions so far as regards the foreign countries parties thereto (including Montenegro), and an English translation of the said Additional Act is set forth in the schedule to the Order in Council now in recital:

And whereas by the said Berne Convention and the said Additional Act it is provided that the said Convention shall remain in effect until the termination of a year from the day on which it may have been denounced, and that such denunciation shall be made to the Government of the Swiss Confederation, and shall only be effective as regards the country making it, the said Convention remaining in full force and effect for the other countries parties thereto:

And whereas Her Majesty's Government have been informed that the Government of Montenegro did, on the 1st day of April, 1899, denounce the said Berne Convention to the Government of the Swiss Confederation in accordance with the terms of the said Convention and Additional Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by the International Copyright Acts, 1844 to 1886, doth order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. The hereinbefore recited Order in Council of the 16th day of May, 1893, is hereby revoked as from the commencement of this Order, and the provisions of the hereinbefore recited Orders in Council of the 28th day of November, 1887, and the 7th day of March, 1898, shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to apply to the Principality of Montenegro.

2.
