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## LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, CEYLON.

ADDRESS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL TO THE LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR IN REPLY TO HIS EXCELLENCY'S SPEECH OF OCTOBER 4, 1899.

To His Excellency the President of the Legislative Council, Sir EDWARD NOEL WALKER, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Lieutenant-Governor in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

THE Council is gratified to receive Your Excellency's assurance of the continued prosperity of the Colony.

The Council agrees with Your Excellency as to the sound position in which the energy and care of those interested has placed the Tea Industry, and counts on the support of the Government in securing the best scientific aid to assist in meeting such enemies as may threaten it and the agricultural interests of the Island.

The Council hears with pleasure of the advance made in the construction of the Harbour Works. The progress of the Topographical and Cadastral Surveys is satisfactory. The Council attaches great importance to the rapid disposal of applications for the sale of small lots of Crown lands and to the early settlement of questions as to the title to waste and unoccupied lands. The Council assures Your Excellency of its cordial co-operation in providing the funds required for the machinery necessary to effect these objects.

Your Excellency's Government is to be congratulated on the success which has attended the measures adopted to prevent the entry of the plague and on the immunity from cholera which has characterized the just year. The Council joins with Your Excellency in gratefully acknowledging the services of the Plague Committee.

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The Council recognizes the continued activity of the officers of Government in dealing with crime, and expresses the hope that the measures adopted will have the effect of checking the hasty use of the knife to which so many homicides may be attributed.

The Council is glad to learn that the Kelani Valley and Uda Pussellawa Railway works will

be at once begun, and notes that tenders have been invited for the Northern Extension.

The Council will give its careful attention to the Legislative proposals laid before it, and assures Your Excellency of its cheerful assistance in the furtherance of measures designed for the public good.

The person whose tender has been accepted by Government will be required to bear the expense of having security bonds prepared for the due performance of his contract, which had will be subject to the conversal. of his contract, which bonds will be subject to the approval of the Attorney-General, but may be drawn by the tenderers' own lawyers, in which case the name or stamp of the Proctor who drafted the bond should be affixed to the document. But if a contract or submits a security bond which does not bear the name or stamp of the lawyer who drafted it, he will be required to pay a fee of Rs. 10.50 to the Attorney-General for approving such
