PROCLAMATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR.

In the Name of Her Majesty VICTORIA, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J. WEST RIDGEWAY, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by section 3 of "The Local Board of Health and Improvement Ordinance, 1876," it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation to be for that purpose published in the Government Gazette, to bring any town or towns under the operation of the said Ordinance, and to define the limits of such town or towns respectively for the purposes of the said Ordinance, and such Proclamation to amend, alter, or revoke as and whenever the Governor shall, with like advice, determine:

And whereas by Proclamation dated the 13th August, 1884, the town of Batticaloa, in the Eastern Province, was brought under the operation of the said Ordinance, and the limits of the said town were defined therein for the purposes of the said Ordinance:

And whereas the said limits of the said town of Batticaloa were defined by Proclamation dated the 28th December, 1894:

And whereas it is expedient to amend the Proclamation of the said 28th December, 1894:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby amend the Proclamation of the said 28th December, 1894, by altering the limits of the said town as defined therein, and We do hereby define, for the purposes of the said Ordinance, the limits of the said town of Batticaloa to be those set out in the schedule hereto as from and after the 15th day of February, 1897.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Fourth day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-seven.
