Part I.—Minutes, Proclamations, Appointments, &c.

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MINUTES BY THE GOVERNOR.

IS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR is pleased to issue the following amended Regulations on the subject of Travelling Allowances to Public Officers, which will take effect from Maych 1, 1897, from which date the Minutes dated October 20, 1888, May 15, 1889, January 14, 1892, April 9, 1892, November 10, 1892, and February 27, 1893, respecting Travelling Allowances, are hereby cancelled. The grant of Travelling Allowances to officers of the Railway, Public Works, Medical, and Survey Departments will continue to be regulated by the Minutes of August 23, 1886, and May 13, 12, and 11, 1887, respectively.

N.B.—All other Minutes, Circulars, and authorities regarding Travelling Allowances not hereby expressly cancelled will continue to have full force and effect.

1. Public officers travelling on duty will in future receive travelling allowances according to the scale laid down in the schedule annexed to this Minute, and will, in addition, be entitled to a refund of all tolls paid by them for themselves or their baggage.

2. In cases where the entire journey is made by public conveyance—coach or railway.

officers in Schedules A, B, C, and D will receive, in addition to their fares, the daily subsistence allowance of their respective classes for each day they sleep from home. Half of this allowance may be claimed for the day of return. In cases where the journey on the day of return is performed wholly or in part by private conveyance for which no charge is made, and should no mileage be claimed, full batta will be allowable for the day of return to station.

3. When public conveyance is available an officer is expected to travel by it. If, however, an officer uses his own or a hired private conveyance in travelling along a line of road on which a coach is available, he may be allowed a sum not exceeding the coach fare that he would have paid had he travelled by coach.

4. An officer in Schedules A, B, and C, Class I., travelling on duty by horse coach, is entitled

to the fare of one seat for himself and one seat for a peon or servant.

5. The cost of hire of private conveyance, in addition to subsistence allowance, is not grantable

except in cases of a particularly urgent nature, which should be fully explained.

6. Boats that regularly ply for hire at fixed rates are deemed to be public conveyances, and when used a charge for boat hire at the fixed rate will be allowed in addition to subsistence allowance. Officers who are entitled under the regulations to charge mileage will, instead of mileage, be allowed boat hire and subsistence allowance, although the boat used may not be of the nature of a public conveyance as defined by this section. In no other case will a charge for boat hire be admitted.

7. Officers when on a voyage by steamer are entitled to subsistence allowance only when their duty requires them to sleep ashore. When the steamer is delayed in port beyond three days, an extra charge of Rs. 5 per diem may be claimed as part of the officer's fare when no subsistence

allowance is drawn.

Mileage and batta are not allowable for the same day.

In calculating mileage the point of departure from headquarters is in all cases to be the

office on place of business of the applicant.

- 10. Subsistence allowance is not to be claimed when the journey does not involve the absence from home of the officer for at least one night.
 - (a) Nevertheless, subject to existing regulations as to distance to be travelled from an officer's residence, fares by public conveyance, resthouse charges, and the cost of such actual necessaries as may be consumed on the journey by the officer may be claimed on particulars being furnished with a certificate on honour of their accuracy.

(b) When such a journey is necessarily made wholly or in part by a hired private conveyance, the hire of the conveyance may also be claimed.

(c) Where a fixed allowance, or batta, or mneage is payable, none of the charges above mentioned can be claimed.

11. Officers in Schedules A, B, and C, Class I., sing the railway for the purposes of an extended iourney* will be reimbursed the fares paid by then for themselves and for such carriage, horses, and servants (not exceeding two in number) as they may take with them for the purposes of their journey. Officers in Schedule C, Classes II. to VIII., will be reimbursed their personal fares only.

12. Officers of the Executive and Legislative Councils, and officers in the receipt of an allowance for the keep of a horse or horses, using the railway for the purposes of a journey in connection with the duties for which they receive the allowance, will be reimbursed the fares paid for such carriage and horse as they may take with them.

13. Officers in Schedules A, B, and C, Class I., when proceeding by coach or steamer at the commencement or end of an extended journey,* necessitating the employment of the officers' own carriage and horses, will be allowed a fixed sum of thirty-five cents per mile in addition to the coach or steamer fare, to cover the expense of sending on their horses, servants, and carts to convey their

14. Public officers who receive a monthly allowance for the keep of a horse or horses are entitled to mileage and subsistence allowance only for distances travelled outside the radius of fifteen or thirty miles, according as allowance is drawn for one or two horses. When public conveyance is used for travelling outside the radius mentioned, these officers will be reimbursed the fares by such conveyance, whether made use of within or without the radius, and will be entitled to subsistence allowance for each day on which a journey, either wholly or in part, outside the radius is performed by public conveyance, but to half this allowance only for the day of return by public conveyance under similar circumstances.

15. In cases where any officer included in Schedules A, B, C, and D is detained from home for more than one day, when the distance travelled falls short of the radius fixed under the regulations, it may be made a matter of reference to Government whether travelling or subsistence allowance should be drawn; but it will be incumbent on the party to show that such absence was

required in the interests of the Public Service.

16. When an officer is detained at any station during a tour on duty beyond three days, it is incumbent on him to show the necessity for such detention; otherwise no subsistence allowance in excess of three days will be granted.

17. Officers will, in applying for the payment of their travelling allowances, furnish a

brief statement of the object of their journey.

- 18. Assistants and subordinate officers having occasion to travel on public duty will, when practicable, previously communicate with the Head of the Department; and the Governor trusts to the discretion of Heads of Departments in regard to charges of this nature which may be submitted for their approval.
- 19. Officers proceeding on a journey on duty will be allowed to draw a proportion not exceeding one-half of the probable expense of the trip in advance, recovering the balance in arrear in the usual manner.

^{*} An extended journey is to be defined as not a journey to a distance which may be regarded as extended from an officer's headquarters, but a journey extended from the place where public conveyance ceases to be available.

20. Officers in Class VIII. of Schedule C will be allowed train or steamer fare, but not coach fare, except when travelling in attendance on a superior officer or on urgent duty upon a certificate to that effect signed by the Head of the Department.

Regulations regarding Travelling Allowances to Public Officers when changing Stations.

1. When an officer of the Public Service is transferred from one station to another, he will receive allowances on account of expense of moving as below:-

Officers drawing Salaries of Rs. 3,000 a year and above.—Railway, steamer, and coach fare and resthouse charges for the officer and his family; railway and steamer fare on four tons of baggage, or the hire of six carts for the same; railway and steamer fare and batta at the rate of twenty-five cents per diem each for two servants. Railway and steamer fare for conveyance of carriage and horse (with horse box) will also be allowed, but no other charges on this account will be sanctioned.

Officers drawing under Rs. 3,000 a year.—Railway, steamer, and coach fare for the officer and his family; railway and steamer fare on two tons of baggage, or the hire of three carts for the same; and also railway and steamer fare and batta at the rate of twenty-five cents per diem for one servant.

No allowance will be granted when an officer is transferred at his own request or in conse-

quence of his misconduct.

2. An officer's family is to be understood to include only his wife and children, and for the purpose under consideration is to be limited to four persons, including the officer himself. Resthouse charges for actual necessaries supplied to the officer and his family only may be charged. When steamer fare is not charged for children under age, an allowance of Rs. 2 will be allowed for the maintenance of each child.

3. If an officer's family does not accompany him on his transfer, the expenses of removal

subsequently will only be allowed if his family follows him within six months.

4. When resthouses are not availed of, or when the journey performed is along a road where there are no resthouses, a reasonable sum for the cost of subsistence may be claimed upon a certificate on honour to the effect that the charges, of which a list should be furnished, were actually incurred.

5. Resthouse charges at the stations from and to which an officer is moved are not grantable. If however an officer incurs resthouse charges at the station from whence he moves in consequence of his baggage having been sent ahead, he will be entitled to a reimbursement of such reasonable resthouse charges for himself and his family as he may have incurred, on his certifying that they were actually incurred owing to his baggage having been sent ahead.

6. When travelling along a road where public ever is

Coach fare to servants is not grantable except in the case of a nurse or ayah proceeding in

charge of an infant.

8. No charge for baggage by coach, train, or steamer will be allowed in excess of the quantity provided for by section 1. Nor will any charge be allowed for the conveyance of baggage by cart or boat when such baggage can be conveyed by rail.

9. Officers on changing stations will not be allowed any fixed charges, such as batta or

mileage.

10. An officer assuming the duties of a new appointment on returning from leave will be allowed expenses on account of the journey from Colombo to his station as if he had been stationed in Colombo and had been ordered thence to such appointment; and he will also be reimbursed charges actually incurred by him for the removal of his baggage from the station whence he proceeded on leave to his new station, subject to the limitation as set forth in section 1.

Assistant Registrar-General.—Subsistence allowance Rs. 7:50 a day for days of detention on duty, and 75 cents a mile when public conveyance is not available. No allowance to be drawn unless the officer travels a distance exceeding ten miles from headquarters.

Class I.—Government Agents: Rs. 15 a day when travelling ten miles from their residences. These officers may receive an allowance of Rs. 15 a day notwithstanding that the distances travelled fall short of 10 miles, provided each officer certifies that the duty on which he was engaged necessarily began and continued so late as to reasonably preclude his returning to his station the same day.

Class II.—District Judges, Assistant Government Agents, the Superintendent of the Convict Establishment: Rs. 10 per diem when travelling seven miles from their places of residence.

Class III.—Police Magistrates, Assistant Collectors of Customs, the Superintendent of the Kandy Prisons, the Assistant Superintendent of the Convict Establishment, Sinhalese and Tamil Interpreters to the Governor: Rs. 750 per dell' a zhen travelling five miles from their residences.

Police Magk istrates, who also hold the office of Assistant Government Agent or District Judge, will be entitled to

No native headman will be entitled to this allowance when travelling within his own division.

it :: Class VII. (drawing salaries and allowances of less than Rs. 120 per annum).—Head Messengers, Money Counters, subordinate Headmen: 75 cents per diem when travelling five miles from their residences.

This allowance will not be paid to any subordinate headman when travelling within his own division.

Province of Uva, 50 cents; in the other Provinces, 37½ cents per diem. These officers should travel ten miles from headquarters to be entitled to batta, which will be allowed even when returning home the same day. When travelling less than ten miles, they are entitled to batta only for nights they sleep from home.

Forest Department.

Assistant Conservators.—Uva and Sabaragamuwa Provinces, subsistence allowance Rs. 8:50 a day: Western, Central, and Eastern Provinces, Rs. 7:50 a day; Northern, North-Western, and North-Central Provinces, Rs. 6.50 a day.

Foresters.—Throughout Ceylon, Rs. 5 a day subsistence allowance.

Assistant Conservators and Foresters who keep a horse and use it constantly when travelling will be entitled to draw a horse allowance of Rs. 30 a month.

Assistant Conservators of Forests may draw daily allowance for absolutely necessary detention from home employed on duty for a period not exceeding ten days at each place.

No allowance to be drawn unless these officers travel a distance exceeding ten miles from headquarters, or in the case of officers drawing horse allowance exceeding fifteen miles.

Forest Rangers.—A special monthly allowance fixed for each, not exceeding Rs. 30.

WEST RIDGEWAY. HEREAS by section 2 of "The Small Towns Sanitary Ordinance," No. 18 of 1892, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation to be for that purpose published in the Government Gazette, to bring any town or village mentioned in the schedule thereto under the operation of the said Ordinance, and to define the limits of such town or village for the purposes of the said Ordinance:

And whereas it is expedient to bring the villages of (1) Kattankudiyiruppu, (2) Erávur, (3) Cháyntamaruttu, (4) Kalmunai, and (5) Chammanturai, in the Eastern Province, mentioned in the said schedule, under the operation of the said Ordinance:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the powers in Us vested by the said section of the said Ordinance, do hereby, as from and after the First day of March, 1897, bring the villages of (1) Kattankudiyiruppu, (2) Eravur, (3) Chayntamaruttu, (4) Kalmunai, and (5) Chammanturai aforesaid under the operation of the said Ordinance, and define the limits of the said villages, for the purposes of the said Ordinance to be those set out in the schedule hereto.

Given at Nuwara Eliya, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Eighteenth day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-seven.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

HEREAS by section 22 of "The Butchers' Ordinance, 1893," it is enacted that whenever a building shall have been erected for the purposes of a public slaughter-house, and such building shall have been certified to the Governor by the proper authority as sufficient for the purposes of a public slaughter-house, the Governor may, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, declare and proclaim such building to be a public slaughter-house:

And whereas it has been certified by the Government Agent, Central Province, being such proper authority as aforesaid, that the building erected by the Board of Health, Central Province, at Dikoya estate, within the limits of the town of Dikoya, is sufficient for the purposes of a public

slaughter-house:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, declare and proclaim that the said building shall be a public slaughter-house for the towns of Hatton and Dikoya as and from the date hereof.

Regulations referred to.

The landing from vessels coming directly or indirectly from Karachi, Bombay, or Goa, of rags, used apparel, bedding, waste paper, and used gunny bags is prohibited. Such goods if landed shall be forthwith destroyed by fire under the direction of the

principal officer of Customs of the place at which such goods were landed.

The owner of the goods as well as the consignee thereof, and the master of the vessel from which the goods were landed, shall pay the expenses connected with the seizure, detention, and destruction of the same.

WITH reference to the notice dated January 20, 1897, which appeared in the Gazette of February 12, 1897, it is hereby notified that the sale of the Arrack Farm of the Province of Uva from July 1, 1897, to June 30, 1898, fixed for Saturday, February 27, 1897, is postponed for a fortnight.
