MINUTES BY THE GOVERNOR.

TNDER instructions from the Secretary of State, His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to sanction the payment of compensation and the increase of 10 per cent. to officers who are paid their salaries from lump votes, either under Personal Emoluments or Other Charges, and who having served continuously for many years, may be regarded as permanently employed.

Heads of Departments are required, before payment of the compensation and the increase of 10 per cent., to submit for the sanction and approval of Government the names of officers entitled to such payments, with particulars of their salary and service.

All payments under this Minute are to be made in accordance with the instructions and subject to the restrictions set forth in the Minutes dated 7th December, 1894.

In future all surveys (a) of Crown lands applied for by the public, or (b) for the issue of certificates of quiet possession sanctioned by Government, will be undertaken by surveyors licensed under Ordinance No. 15 of 1889, who hold a special certificate from the Surveyor-General to make surveys on behalf of the Crown.

- 2. On an applicant being informed by the Government Agent that his application for the purchase of Crown land or for the issue of a certificate of quiet possession has been approved, he will inform the Surveyor-General of the name of the specially licensed surveyor whom he proposes to employ to survey the land. If the Surveyor-General approves of his employment, he will nominate him and authorize the survey to be made, and at the same time instruct the Chief Surveyor of the Province in which the land lies to issue the necessary detailed instructions for the proper performance of the work in accordance with Departmental Regulations. The private surveyor will inform the Chief Surveyor when the work is complete and send him his field book and plans. The Chief Surveyor will then test the survey, and when completed to his satisfaction he will make his report to the Surveyor-General, forwarding the field book and plan, which will be filed in the Surveyor-General's Office.
- 3. The plan, if approved by the Surveyor-General, will then be incorporated on the Survey Department record maps, and a copy forwarded to the Government Agent as at present. An intimation of acceptance should be given to an applicant in token of the Surveyor-General's acceptance of the plan.
- 4. Applicants for the purchase of Crown land or the issue of certificates of quiet possession should not consider the work of the surveyor complete until his plan has been accepted by the Surveyor-General. Should an applicant be outbid on the day of sale, the following survey fees will be recovered by the Government Agent from the purchaser and refunded to him:—

1 to 10 acres a minimum charge of Rs. 20. 10 to 50 acres Rs. 2 per acre. 50 to 100 acres Re. 1.80 per acre.

100 to 200 acres Rc. 1.50 per acre. 200 to 500 acres Re. 1.20 per acre. 500 to 1,000 acres Re. 1 per acre.

PROCLAMATION BY THE GOVERNOR.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J. West Ridgeway, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by "The Courts Ordinance, 1889," it is amongst other things provided that Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court shall be holden by one of the Judges thereof, or by a Commissioner of Assize duly appointed under the provisions of the said Ordinance, for each of the Circuits into which the Island is divided for the purposes of the administration of justice, for the hearing, trying, and determining all prosecutions which shall be commenced against any person for or in respect of any crime or offence or alleged crime or offence:

For the Southern Circuit twice at least at Galle and such other places in such Circuit as the Governor, after previous consultation with the Judges, shall appoint, such Sessions commencing at Galle on April 25 and September 15 in every year:

And whereas it appears to Us expedient that a Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court should be holden at Matara and Tangalla, two of the places included in the said Southern Circuit:

Now therefore know Ye that We, the said Governor, after previous consultation with the Judges of the Supreme Court, do hereby direct and appoint that a Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court shall be holden at Matara and Tangalla on Tuesday, the 25th day of May, and Monday, the 7th day of June, 1897, respectively.

Given at Nuwara Eliya, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Fifteenth day of April, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-seven.
