Pacific Ocean—Sandwich Island—Kauai—Light on Ninini Point—Nawiliwili Harbour.

The British Admirality has given notice (No. 116 of 1897) that a fixed white light, elevated 75 ft. above the sea, and visible 12 miles in clear weather, is exhibited from Ninini point, northern side of entrance to Nawiliwili harbour, east side of Kauai.

Approximate position: lat. 21° 57′ 35″ N., long. 159° 20′ W. 15"

China, East Coast—Amoy Inner Harbour—Sunken Rock North-westward o/ Coker Rock.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 120 of 1897) of the existence of a sunken rock (on which the steamvessel Chaeng Hock Kiang struck), with a depth of about 10 ft. on it at low water, situated north-westward of Coker rock, in a position with Thumb rock bearing N. W. 4 N., distant 3 cables, and summit (207) north-eastward of old fort E. by N. 4 N.

Africa, North-east Coast-Red Sea-Suez Bay-Intended alteration in Newport Rock Light.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 120 of 1897) that information has been received from the

Government of Egypt that a lighthouse is in course of erection on Newport rock, on the exhibition of the light from which Newport rock lightvessel (occulting with light) will be withdrawn, and the high light (fixed white) on the north shore of the bay discontinued.

Newport rock new light will be a second order dioptric alternating red and white light with a period of sixty seconds, thus: white light, thirty seconds; red light, thirty seconds; elevated 46 ft. above the sea, and visible from a distance of 12 miles in clear weather.

The light will be shown from a screw pile structure, with the cylindrical lighthouse rising from the centre of the keeper's dwelling.

Approximate position: lat. 29° 53′ 5″ N., long. 32° 32′ 50″ E.

China Sea-Singapore Road - Alteration in position of Manof-war anchorage Buoy.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 124 of 1897) that information has been received from the Master Attendant at Singapore, dated January 22, 1897, that the man-of-war anchorage buoy (conical red, &c.) has been moved about N. W. by W., nearly 3 cables, from the position in which it was previously moored, and now lies at the edge of the 5-fathom line, with fort Canning flagstaff bearing N. 52° W., distant 13 mile; and Tanjong Katong obelisk N. 42° E.

Approximate position: lat. 1° 16′ 25″ N., long, 103° 52′
