PROCLA MATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J. WEST RIDGEWAY, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RIDGÉWAY.

WHEREAS by section 8 of "The Road Ordinance, 1861," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation to declare that any road, canal, or river shall be deemed to be a principal thoroughfare for the purposes of the said Ordinance, and such road, canal, or river shall from the time specified in such Proclamation be deemed to be a principal thoroughfare accordingly:

And whereas it is expedient to declare that the roads mentioned in the schedule hereto in the District of Anuradhapura, North-Central Province, shall be deemed to be principal thoroughfares for the purposes of the said Ordinance:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare that the roads mentioned in the schedule hereto in the District of Anuradhapura aforesaid shall, for the purposes of the said Ordinance, be deemed to be public thoroughfares as from and after the 8th day of June, 1897.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J. WEST RIDGEWAY, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

HEREAS by the 11th section of "The Road Ordinance, 1861," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation to alter and vary any district or division into which this Colony has already been divided under the authority of the Ordinance No. 8 of 1848, or into which it may at any time be divided for the purposes of the said Road Ordinance of 1861 aforesaid, provided that any such alteration of a district shall take effect only from the 1st day of January thence next ensuing:

And whereas the present divisions of the District of Nuwara Eliya, in the Central Province, are as defined by Proclamation dated the 10th day of October in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-three, under the provisions of "The Road Ordinance, 1861," aforesaid, and it is expedient to alter and vary the divisions of the district:

.Know know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby alter and vary the divisions of the District of Nuwara Eliya aforesaid as at present existing, and declare that the divisions of the said district shall, from and after the 1st day of January, 1898, be for the purposes of "The Road Ordinance, 1861," aforesaid, as the same are in the schedule hereto set forth and defined.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Tenth day of June, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-seven.

REGULATIONS made by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under the provisions of "The Quarantine and Prevention of Diseases Ordinance, 1897."

- 1. The term "proper authority" in the following regulations shall mean—
 - (a) Wherever there shall be established a Municipality, the Chairman of the Municipal Council, or the Principal Civil Medical Officer, or the Colonial Surgeon of the Province, or the Health Officer of the Municipality, or any officer appointed by the Governor to perform the duties of the proper authority.
 - (b) Wherever there shall be established a Local Board, the Chairman of the Local Board, or the Assistant Government Agent of the District, or the District Judge, or the Police Magistrate, or the Chief Medical Officer resident within the Local Board limits, or any officer appointed by the Governor to perform the duties of the proper authority.
 - (c) Wherever there shall be no Municipality or Local Board established, the Government Agent of the Province, or the Assistant Government Agent of the District, or the Police Magistrate of the division, or the Colonial Surgeon of the Province, or the Chief Medical Officer of the district or place, or any officer appointed by the Governor to perform the duties of the proper authority.
- 2. It shall be lawful for the proper authority to cause persons infected with cholera, smallpox, chickenpox, or other infectious, contagious, or epidemic disease in any house or place hereunder described to be removed to some public hospital or other place provided by Government—
 - (1) In any house or place in which goods are exposed for sale.
 - (2) In any house or place of public resort.
 - (3) In any building in which there are no means of isolating the patients from the other inmates, or in any building where the retention of the patient is likely to prove a source of danger to others.

Provided that it shall be competent for the proper authority, in case the removal of any person so infected in any house or place in which goods are exposed for sale is objected to, and the house or place is not otherwise open to objection, to allow the patient to be retained, on condition, however, that the sale of goods shall not be carried on in such house or place during such time as any person shall remain so infected in such house or place.

Provided further, that it shall be lawful for the proper authority to allow any patient to be removed to any locality which such patient or his or her friends may choose, and to which the medical authorities of the town or place, if any, do not object, instead of to the public hospital or place provided by Government.

- 3. Except as provided by these regulations, and except as provided by the Ordinance No. 8 of 1866, it shall not be lawful for any person to remove or assist in removing any person suffering from cholera, smallpox, chickenpox, or other infectious, contagious, or epidemic disease from the house or place in which such person shall be to any other house or place, without the sanction in writing of the proper authority.
- 4. It shall be lawful for the proper authority to prohibit the removal from any house or place in which goods are exposed for sale, or from any house or place of public resort, or from any building in which cholera, smallpox, chickenpox, or other infectious, contagious, or epidemic disease may have occurred, of any articles of merchandise or trade, or goods of any kind, until such time as such building or place is declared to be free from infection by the Medical authorities of the town or place in which such building is situated.

Provided that it shall be lawful for the proper authority to permit any goods from an infected house or place in which goods are exposed for sale, or from any house or place of public resort, or from any building in which cholera, smallpox, chickenpox, or other infectious, contagious, or epidemic disease may have occurred, to be removed to any other locality which the owner or occupier of such building may choose, and to which removal the Medical authorities of the town or place do not object.

5. It shall be lawful for the proper authority to prohibit the removal for interment of corpses of persons who have died of cholera, smallpox, chickenpox, or other infectious, contagious, or epidemic disease along any particular thoroughfare, and to prescribe the thoroughfares leading to the place of interment along which such corpses shall be carried. Information of such prohibition shall be given by notice in writing under the hand of the proper authority, which shall be posted in two or more conspicuous places in the prohibited thoroughfare and by publication in such other way as may be deemed necessary by such proper authority.

HE following scheme prepared by the Director of the Royal Botanic Gardens, Peradeniya, relative to the means for securing communication and co-operation with Agriculturists in the Colony, is published for general information.

Communication and Co-operation between the Department of the Royal Botanic Gardens and the Agriculturists, &c., of the Colony.

It is very desirable that there should be greater and more ready communication and co-operation between the Department of the Royal Botanic Gardens and those whom it is chiefly designed to benefit, viz., the agriculturists, horticulturists, and botanists of the Colony. Many interesting cultivations, experiments, &c., are often going on in the Gardens, of which the public sees or hears nothing except in the brief annual report, which is not the place in which to give detailed accounts of such work. And, on the other hand, the staff of the Department, for want of better communication and means of getting information, often remain for long in ignorance of important occurrences, such as the appearance of new diseases, the starting of new cultivations or new methods of cultivation, and so on. A few suggestions as to ways of overcoming these difficulties are given below :-

I.—Publication of Information concerning the Gardens and what is going on therein.

(1) I would suggest the publication at intervals of a series of circulars or bulletins, each as a rule dealing with one subject only. The cost of a one-page circular would be about Rs. 3 per 1,000 copies. These circulars might be kept at the Gardens and distributed free or sent by post on receipt of a stamp for postage. Their publication should not be at fixed intervals, but whenever required. As examples of what is meant, the first few might deal with "the Chocho," "Rhea fibre," "the Cacao disease," "new ornamental plants," and so on. In some cases Sinhalese or Tamil translations might also be prepared for distribution among the villagers.

(2) I would suggest the publication in the Government Gazette and elsewhere, if thought

desirable, of advertisements of important seeds or plants on sale at the Gardens.

(3) I would also suggest the giving of occasional lectures on important subjects, such as diseases of plants, new cultivations, &c., by the staff of the Department in Colombo, Kandy, or elsewhere. Also the giving of occasional demonstrations at the Gardens upon such subjects, e. g., upon rubber-tapping at Henaratgoda, or upon fibre plants at Peradeniya. Notice of such meetings might be given in the newspapers, or invitations sent to the Planters' Association at its meetings in Kandy. Such lectures or demonstrations could hardly fail to be of mutual advantage both to cultivators and to this Department.

II.—The Collection of Information by and for the Department.

(4) I would suggest that occasional tours be made in different districts of the Colony to investigate the various cultivations carried on, the diseases of plants, &c.; and that the results of these investigations be from time to time submitted to Government as special reports, which might also, when deemed advisable, be published as separate bulletins or circulars (see above).

(5) I would suggest that the Superintendent of Hakgala Garden and the Curator of Peradeniya Garden should be authorized to travel with or in place of the Director on these expeditions whenever

the aid or advice of a highly skilled practical Gardener is needed.

(6) I would suggest that the Government Agents and other Administrative Officers, native headmen, Secretaries of Planters' Associations, &c., be requested to assist this Department by informing me from time to time of new cultivations started, old ones abandoned, outbreaks of diseases, and so on. Such a request might well form part of the first (introductory) circular issued by this Department.
