Eastern Archipelago-Java. (1) Batavia—Amended particulars of Tanjong Priok
Time Signal.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 199 of 1897) that the Time Signals at Tanjong Priok are now

made as follows :-

Tanjong Priok Time Signal consists of 4 boards, Tanjong Priok Time Signal consists of 4 boards, placed above the signal station, which are inclined at an angle of 45° 5' before signal; placed vertically at two minutes before signal; and dropped into a horizontal position at noon, and at 1h. 7m. 32°6s. P.M. Tanjong Priok mean time, equivalent respectively to 16h. 52m. 27°4s. and 18h. 0m. 0s. Greenwich mean time. Position: lat. 6° 5′ 48″ S., long. 106° 53′ 9″ E. Should the signal fail, a red flag with white centre is hoisted and kept flying until 0h. 55m. P.M.; and the

signal is repeated at 1 1h. 0m. 0s., Tanjong Priok mean time; equivalent to 17h. 52m. 27.4s., Greenwhich mean

(2) Surabaya—Amended particulars of Time Signal.

Also, with reference to Notice to Mariners No. 755 of

That the Time Signal at Surabaya is now made from a mast on the western mole head at a height of 65 ft. above the sea, with 4 boards, in exactly the same manner as described above at Tanjong Priok, at noon, Surabaya mean time, equivalent to 16h. 29m. 2.6s. Greenwhich mean time.

Should the signal fail, it is repeated, as at Tanjong Prick, at 1h. 0m. 0s. Surabaya mean time, equivalent to 17h. 29m. 2 cs. Greenwich mean time.

Position: lat. 7° 11′ 55″ S., long. 112° 44′ 21″ E.

Note.—If at either Tanjong Priok or Surabaya Time
Signal stations a blue flag is hoisted at 11h. 30m. A.M., or after the signal at noon has failed, it signifies that the time signal apparatus is out of order, and that no further time signal can be made on that day.

The above time signals are not made on Sundays or

holidays.

India, South-Indian Ocean-Caution-Reported Icebergs.

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 7, dated January 15, 1897, issued by this office, the British Admiralty has given further notice (No. 201 of 1897) that icebergs are still being reported in unusual numbers in comparatively low latitudes in the Southern Indian ocean between the meridians of 40° E. and 84° E., thus:

(1) On January 10, 1897, the Dutch barque Concordia passed icebergs between lats, 42° S. and 43° S., and long. 46° E. and 48° E.

(2) The steamvessel Kaikoura, from January 10 to

The steamvessel Kalkoura, from January 10 to 16, 1897, between lats. 45° S. to 48° S., longs. 42° to 80° E., passed many icebergs, especially in about lat. 48° S., longs. 59° E. to 65° E.
 The steamvessel Port Chalmers, from January 13 to about 18, 1897, between lats. 44° S. and 46° S., and longs. 45° E. and 75° E., passed many bergs, much broken up in appearance.
 The steamvessel Hubbuck from January 17 to

(4) The steamvessel Hubbuck, from January 17 to 22, 1897, between lats. 45° S. to 47° S., longs. 40° E. to 74° E., passed icebergs, one in the last-mentioned longitude about 5 miles long.

(5) The steamvessel Gulf of Lions, from January 12 to 18, 1897, between lats. 44° S. to 47° S., longs. 41° E. to 80° E., passed many icebergs, some said to be 400 ft. in height.

(6) The steamvessel Cornwall, on January 28, 1897, passed icebergs in lat. 41° S., longs. 52° E. to 53° E.

(7) The steamvessel Nairnshire, from February 8 to about 18, 1897, between lats. 43° S. and 47° S., longs. 45° E. to 84° E., passed many icebergs; and during a fog on February 8 was in collision with a low berg.

As it is not likely that ice in such unusual quantities will quickly disappear, the seaman is cautioned that the route recommended in the Admiralty book of Ocean Passages, 1896, pages 138, 139, should be followed; and particular attention is directed to the reason on page 139 for not recommending a higher parallel than 40° S.

South Pacific Ocean-Tubuai or Austral Islands .-Bank eastward of Vavitao.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 205 of 1897) that the master of the French barque President Thiers reports that on January 8, 1897, he obtained foundings of 19 to 21 fathoms on a bank composed of broken coral and shells, extending about 6 miles in a N.N.W. and S.S.E. direction, with discoloured water

N.W. and S.S.E. direction, with discoloured water some distance from it, and 16 fathoms on its edge.

This bank, now named President Thiers, has been placed on the Admiralty Chart in lat. 24° 39' S., long. 145° 51' W. (the position given), with a depth of 16 fathoms marked on it.

Japan—Liu Kiu Islands.—Oki Nava Jima—Light on Iye Shima.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 206 of 1897) that a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on the west end of Iye Shima, westward of Bise Saki (cape Niofa).

Iye Shima light is a first order flashing white light every thirty seconds, elevated 167 ft. above the sea, and visible from N. 45° W., through north and east, to S. 64° W. (an arc of 289°), a distance of 19 miles in clear weather.

The lighthouse, 100 ft. high, constructed of iron, and octagonal in section, is painted black and white in horizontal bands.

Appreximate position: lat. 26° 43′ 30′ N., long. 127° 45′ 50″ E.

Variation, 2° westerly in 1897.

China Sea-Formosa Island.-Light on Petu Point (Bito Kaku).

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 213 of 1897) that on February 1, 1897, a light was exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Petu point (Bito Kaku), eastward of Kelung harbour, north-east coast of Formosa.

Petu point (Bito Kaku) light is a fourth order flashing white light every thirty seconds, elevated 211 ft. above the sea, and visible from about east, through south and west, to N. 12° W. (an arc of about 258°), a distance of 19 miles in clear weather.

The lighthouse, 41 ft. high, constructed of iron, and

hexagonal in section, is painted white.

Approximate position: lat. 25° 7¾ N., long. 121° 55° E. Variation, 1° Westerly in 1897.

Eastern Archepleago - Makassar Strait. - Pulo Laut Strait .- Shoal in Fairway Northward of Suangi Island.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 214 of 1897) of the existence of a shoal of hard clay, with a depth of 3 fathoms on it at low water springs, and of small extent, situated in the fairway northward of Suangi island, in a position with the south extreme of Burung island bearing S. 84° W., distant $1\frac{1}{10}$ mile; and west extreme of Tampakan island N. 3° E.

Approximate position: lat. 3° 24' 30" S., long., 116° 2'

Note.—Vessels proceeding through Laut strait must now pass over a depth of 3 fathoms at low water springs owing to the existence of the above shoal.

Variation, 2° easterly in 1897.
