#### PROCLAMATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR.

In the Name of Her Majesty VICTORIA, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith.

#### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J. WEST RIDGEWAY, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

#### WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by section 6 of "The Master Attendants' Ordinance, 1865" it is enacted that the Governor may from time, to time with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, frame and establish such Port Rules not inconsistent with the said Ordinance as he may think necessary for any of the purposes in the several sub-section of the said section specified, provided that such port rules shall be promulgated by Proclamation in the Government Gazette at least one month before the same shall take effect:

And whereas the port of Galle was brought within the operation of the said Ordinance by a Proclamation dated the 6th day of January, 1866, and certain port rules have been duly framed, established and, promulgated for the said port of Galle:

And whereas it is expedient to frame and establish additional port rules for the port of Galle: Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, have framed and established the additional port rules set forth in the schedule hereto for the said Port of Galle.

#### RULES.

37. No boat, canoe, or steam launch snall go alongside or within 50 fathoms of any vessel arriving within the harbour until such vessel has been moored in her berth; nor, in the event of the quarantine flag being flying, until such flag has been hauled down.

56. No vessel, whether sailing or steam, except a native craft, shall come into or leave the harbour without a pilot in the service of Government being on board.

No vessel within the harbour shall display at night any electric arc light unless such light be so shaded as . 57.

to throw the light on the vessel's deck only.

58. No hawkers, touts, money changers, dhobies, or bom-boatmen shall be allowed on board of any vessel within the port without a permit signed by the Agent or Commander of the vessel.

Given at Trincomalee, in the said Island of Ceylon, this First day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-seven.

#### GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS.

It is hereby notified for general information that a trade description of count or number applied to a bundle of dyed cotton yarn shall be accepted as indicating length only, the hank being taken to measure 840 yards, and it shall be deemed to be false in a material respect if the average length of the hanks in a bundle is less than 819 yards.

It is hereby notified that His Excellency the Governor has been pleased, in virtue of the powers vested in him by Ordinance No. 17 of 1880, section 22, sub-section c, to make the following orders for settling the fees to be paid by estate proprietors, superintendents, or assistant superintendents, and all others who are not entitled to free medical attendance under the said Ordinance, viz.:—

(1) That in future the fee payable by the proprietors and superintendents in midwifery cases be Rs. 30.

(2) That the fee for a visit to the wife or children of a proprietor or superintendent be Rs. 3.50, with mileage at the rate of  $37\frac{1}{2}$  cents for every mile travelled each way (with a maximum of Rs. 15).

(3) That the fee for a visit to an assistant, superintendent, conductor, carpenter, mason, kanakapullai, storekeeper, writer, their wives and families, or to any person other than a proprietor or superintendent be Rs. 2.50, with mileage at the rate of  $37\frac{1}{2}$  cents a mile each way.

(4) The midwifery fee for all those included in (3) to be Rs. 15, and mileage  $37\frac{1}{2}$  cents a mile

each way.

(5) Advice at the dispensary or by letter for all included in (3) Re. 1, and Rs. 2 for proprietors and superintendents.

#### An Act for the better reporting of Floating Derelicts.

BE it enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

Short title.

Notice of derelict vessels to be given by masters to Lloyd's agents.

- 1. This Act may be cited as the Derelict Vessels (Report) Act, 1896.
- 2. Every master or other person for the time being in command of any British ship, after the passing of this Act, who shall become aware of the existence on the high seas of any floating derelict vessel, shall notify the same to the Lloyd's agent at his next place of call or arrival, and shall, together with such notification, furnish to the Lloyd's agent all such information as he may possess as to the supposed locality or identity of such derelict vessel, and the date when and place where the same may have been observed by or reported to him, and the Lloyd's agent shall forthwith, on receipt of such notification and information, transmit the same to the Secretary of Lloyd's in London.

And if any such master fails to make such a report he shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

Letters to be sent to Lloyd's in default of agents.

3. If there shall be no Lloyd's agent at the next place of call or arrival, then and in such case the notification shall be made and the information furnished by such master or other person as aforesaid, to the Secretary of the Lloyd's, London.

Information to be published by Lloyd's.

4. Any information received by the society of Lloyd's as aforesaid, in pursuance of this Act, shall be published by the society forthwith in the same manner and to the same extent as its reports of shipping casualties, and the society shall also forthwith communicate such information to the Board of Trade.

NDER instruction from the Secretary of State for the Colonies His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to direct the publication of the following copies of notes exchanged between the Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Costa Rica and the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs respecting the denunciation of Articles V., VI., and VII. of the Treaty of Friendship, Commerce, and Navigation between Great Britain and the Republic of Costa Rica of November 27, 1849, together with a copy of an announcement made in the London Gazette.

Foreign Office, San José, November 4, 1896.

My LORD,-The Government of Costa Rica wish to conclude with those nations, with whom they entertain close and cordial relations, new treaties which may be more in harmony with the

present interests and necessities of the country and of its commerce.

For this reason, and by instruction of the President of the Republic, I have the honour to inform your Lordship that I denounce, in the name of my Government, Articles V., VI., and VII. of the Treaty concluded between this Republic and Great Britan on the 27th day of November, 1849, and signed by the plenipotentiaries Don Joaquin Bernardo Calvo and Mr. Frederic Chatfield. This denunciation is made in accordance with the provisions of Article XV. of the same Treaty.

YOUR EXCELLENCY,—I HAVE the honour to acknowledge the receipt on the 26th ultimo of your note of the 4th of November denouncing Articles V., VI., and VII. of the Treaty of Friendship, Commerce, and Navigation concluded between Great Britain and the Republic of Costa Rica on

the 27th November, 1849.

Her Majesty's Government note that this denunciation is made in conformity with the provisions of Article XV. of that Treaty. They therefore accept it, and have announced in the London Gazette that Articles V., VI. and VII., of the Treaty will cease and determine on the 26th of

November 1897.

Her Majesty's Government are happy to think that all the other Articles referring to Friendship, Commerce, and Navigation will, under the terms of the above-mentioned Article, remain in force, and in order to strengthen the relations of amity, to which they attach much value, they will be prepared to negotiate alternative Articles in place of those now denounced.

They will therefore be glad to be informed of the nature of the alternative Articles which the

Government of Costa Rica may desire to suggest.

THE Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs received on the 26th ultimo from the Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Costa Rican Republic a note dated the 4th ultimo, denouncing Articles V., VI., and VII. of the Treaty of Friendship, Commerce, and Navigation between Great Britain and the Republic of Costa Rica concluded on the 27th November, 1849.

This notice of denunciation, which is in conformity with the provisions of Article XV. of that Treaty, has been accepted by Her Majasty's Commerced and Article XV. VI. and VII. of the Treaty.

Treaty, has been accepted by Her Majesty's Government, and Articles V., VI. and VII., of the Treaty

will cease and determine accordingly on the 26th November, 1897.

All the other Articles of the Treaty will remain in force.
