
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
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
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The Way Forward!

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





Bandarawela

As the train chugged along slowly, hugging the countryside I was struck by the greenery that surrounded me. As we pulled into the train station of this charming little town, I began to realise that there was something besides the beauty, something subtle, yet significantly different. It was the air.

Bandarawela has one of the most invigorating climates in the island, sought after by health enthusiasts the world over. This coupled with its cool temperatures and lush green surroundings has now made it a base for eco-tourism in Sri Lanka.

Several tea estates surround Bandarawela. Walking is the best option and you could walk through the beautiful trails, which pass through the tea estates.

The town itself, slightly elevated from the rest of the area is surrounded with hotels and guesthouses, municipal buildings and a sports ground. From the central train station, a colonial remnant, the town slowly begins to unfold bringing Buddhist temples, Christian churches, Hindu kovils and a newly renovated Muslim mosque into sight.

Located a mere 45 kilometres southeast of its more famous older brother "Nuwara Eliya", Bandarawela has set itself apart as a town, and has become yet another "must-see" attraction for tourists both local and foreign.

ELLA

On the way to Ella from Bandarawela (about six kilometres northeast of Bandarawela) we stopped at the enchanting Dowa Temple where a four metre high standing Buddha is carved onto a rock and the walls of the adjoining cave are adorned with traditional Buddhist murals.

Ella is similarly charming but considerably quieter in comparison. Located at a height of 1,041 metres above sea level, Ella is famous for its stunning views, some of Sri Lanka's striking waterfalls, and ancient caves with noteworthy religious and historical significance.


The "Ella Gap", is an actual "gap" between two mountains from which you could witness several stunning views, from multiple angles. It is said that on a clear day you can see across Wellawaya plains all the way to the Hambantota coastline.

In addition to the view, there is quite a bit more to see in the area – from visits to the nearby jungles to the tea plantations and even a hike up the mountains.

On top of my list was to find the famous Ravana Cave. It is pretty hard to get to and as we trekked through the wilderness and climbed the 700 steps to reach the top, I wished we had planned better and taken more water! The Cave of Ravana known in Sri Lanka as *Rattaran Guhava* (Gold Cave) is very close to the Ravana temple. This cave as the name indicates is linked to the legend of Rama and Sita from the Indian epic poem, the Ramayana. According to legend, King Ravana of Sri Lanka abducted Princess







Sita after defeating her husband Prince Rama of India. It is believed that this cave is one of the hideouts where she was held prisoner.

The Ravana Rock Temple situated on a side road about one kilometre away, off the main Ella-Wellawaya Road is also worth a visit.

Ravana Falls, six kilometres down the Wellawaya Road from Ella, is a must "dunk" and it certainly left an impression on me as I cautiously plodded into the chilly waters. It comes down the mountain in stages and forms into a little pool by the side of the main road. Nothing comes close to the feeling of a ton of water crushing down on you.


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Lush paddy fields in Wellawaya

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WELLAWAYA

We headed on towards Wellawaya on the A 23 highway better known as the Ella-Wellawaya road, which is certainly one of the most scenic roads in Sri Lanka, for in a relatively short distance the road makes a rapid drop from Ella (over 1,000 metres above sea level) to Wellawaya (a few metres above sea level).

Wellawaya is famous for its paddy fields, where buffalos work alongside men to harvest the paddy.

Wellawaya is a fertile land and is home to the cultivation of corn, pumpkins, cucumber and watermelon. Wood-apple and papaya are also grown in abundance here. We quenched our thirst with a lovely ice-cold wood-apple drink.

However the highlight of the area is the Buduruwagala Rock, to the south of Wellawaya. As you pass the beautiful lake from which large trees jut out of the water where there is reason to believe that this may have been earlier dry land, you will see Buduruwagala, which literally means "Rock with the statue of Lord Buddha". Seven figures are carved in this rock with a huge 51 foot image of Lord Buddha. The rock itself is famous for its unusual shape of a kneeling elephant with its head bent in prayer.

Back in the hustle and bustle of city life, I look through the pictures and wish I could live in this quiet village where the beauty of rural Sri Lanka could be enjoyed at its best.

One thing is apparent in each picture; whether it is the charm of the colonial hill country or a simple traditional village life; there is natural beauty on every part of this island.

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
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Surfing Heaven

Kalpitiya has unwittingly stirred the interest of a growing number of

enthusiasts all over the world, not for its scenic beauty or its marine sanctuary but for its perfect conditions for kite surfing.

he small strip of land sea-bound from the vast Puttalam lagoon is home to a diminutive yet unique landscape. Kalpitiya forms its own little niche; a lagoon richly endowed with a surrounding reef, islands, dolphin populated waters and a scenic desert-like landscape bordering on surreal. With eco-lodges springing up in the vicinity the sandy lagoon access

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has seen the arrival of many visitors drawn for its unusual attributes.

The 'Sethawadiya spot' as it is increasingly becoming known had welcomed a group of kite surfing thrill seekers all the way from the Czech Republic – the news certainly had travelled far and wide. Petr Smid and his crew who were no newcomers to extreme sports had 'discovered' the ideal conditions that the location

offered. 'Following the wind' in the guest for perfect conditions, which are none too common, found them on the sandy banks of this lagoon as their gear lay strewn about waiting to set off and catch some wind. The season for kite surfing at Kalpitiya prevails most of the year beginning in May and lasts through to October.


"The conditions here are perfect for kite surfing," declares Petr who specialises in extreme sports equipment and arrived here to test the winds as a beginner. "The vast open lagoon, shallow waters and of course the strong winds make up the ideal conditions here," pitches in Martin Florek the crew's most enthusiastic member who has reached the high ranks in the world championship in kite surfing. With ten years of experience under his belt, the desire to be airborne first struck him during an excursion to the Alps. At high altitudes he only wished he could take off and fly. A licensed instructor for kite surfing he

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mentors the rest of the members of the crew. "The conditions here are also very good for beginners," he states. And shallow, calm waters, and open space are the most appealing, and of course the continuous stream of smooth winds. The wind at this location is said to read 15-20 knots, from 12 noon till evening – ideal for kite surfing.

In mid-afternoon the crew wasted no time, loading equipment to a boat to set off across the lagoon to a gravel-bar a few hundred metres away.

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


PARAGLIDING ALL ROLLED INTO ON

A temporary linear landform surfaced by low tide, it served as a suitable spot for take off. Surfers also have the option of travelling downwind by boat, stopping at the many islands for suitable spots for kite surfing. At the gravel bar the crew prepped for adventure. The bow shaped kites with their expansive wingspan are used to harness the wind and it is this weight that propels the rider across the water to pick up speed and then be airborne. The kite itself seemed a handful to manouevre. The inflated edge is air pumped and a kite of suitable size or wingspan varies upon the weight of the rider. The kites are hooked into a

harness worn by the surfer and the feet are placed on the kite-board with foot strappings for firmer leverage.

As a veteran would, Martin hoisted the kite straight into the sky seemingly effortlessly, while some kites of others rebelled askew in the wind. Once the kite is hoisted and soaring steadily in the sky the surfer takes off into the water. From this point on it seems like wakeboarding, snowboarding, windsurfing and paragliding all rolled into one. It was easy to see why the lagoon served as a fitting spot – with ample unobstructed open space the rider could easily careen across to pick up speed.

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Skidding ashore breathless Martin states the obvious - "You must be well trained by a professional to do this, especially breaking speed and making sharp turns is tricky." Exhilaration radiates from his demeanour and even after hours out in the water he promptly sets off again. Watching him executing high leaps and somersaulting jumps mid air, a display of speed, agility, strength and control, the kite, board and surfer seemed to have become one entity. Even watching from a distance gives a taste of the adrenaline rush that can be experienced – it was as close as you could get to flying! ®



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
Somawathie 1 Common Property of the Wilderness

t is the 3rd Century BC, the Island is governed in three provinces, Ruhuna, Maya and Pihiti. In the Ruhunu Province, Princess Somawathie, sister of King Kavantissa is betrothed to Prince Abhaya and the newly weds take leave to Giri Nuwara (hill country). Meanwhile, Prince Dutugemunu son of King Kavantissa is sent to the protection of his aunt Somawathie during the prevalent

South Indian invasion, In time Prince Abhaya and Somawathie entrust Giri Nuwara to Prince Dutugemunu and take up abode at Seru Nuwara where King Shiva, uncle of Prince Abhaya, reigns. Here, King Shiva gifts them an abode at the banks of the Mahaweli River, which they rule as the Kingdom of Somapura.

It is while they reside here that Somawathie desires a place of worship. Abhaya, now the King of the region, embarks on a search for a site befitting worship and stumbles upon a beautiful forest of Sal trees. Here the King discovers the ascetic Arahat Mahinda Thero (Mihindu Thero) and 60 other Arahats residing in the forest. Thus, the King, instilled with great reverence proceeds to build a temple at the forest. Obliging the King's



request for relics to pay obeisance to, the Mahinda Thero, bequeaths from his possession a right tooth relic of the Buddha to the King who enshrines it in the temple's stupa. This stupa is built in a characteristic shape of a droplet and religious observances and offering of alms are carried out regularly by the royal pair for many years to come.

The right tooth relic, it is recorded, originates from India, more specifically from ancient Nagpur of India (originating from the Naga tribe), which is said to be Maharashtra of the present day.

The tribal King Jayasena of the Naga tribe who had in his protection the right tooth relic, offered the relic to Arahat Mihindu Thero, who was also of the Naga tribe. Incidentally, Mihindu Thero was a disciple from a lineage of Arahats leading back to Maha Mahinda Thero, who introduced Buddhism to Sri Lanka.

Today Somawathie Stupa is located in the ancient capital Polonnaruwa to the west of the Mahaweli River.

Geographically, its position is intriguingly different from that which is mentioned in the ancient texts of Mahawamsa, as the east embankment of the river.


Archaeological investigations attribute this to the geographical changes over time including the river changing its path. Even today the untarred stretch of road that directly leads to the stupa is said to be the river bed of the Mahaweli,

centuries ago. As you reach Sungavila in Polonnaruwa, the surroundings are distinctly remote and peaceful in its isolation. The turn off to Somawathie Raja Mahavihara leads to a seemingly endless stretch of road that reaches deeper into scrub jungle, providing ample refuge for animals. Wild elephants are often sighted here. The temple is situated within the Somawathie Wild Life Reserve and the road reaches a clearing where the temple and its precincts can be found. At a glance a clear white bubble of stupa sits strikingly with

no other elements to detract from its presence. The surroundings impress a natural beauty that is both inviting and soothing. Its stem of quietude is only punctuated either by the chanting of prayers or a family of deer resting idly, accustomed to human company.

Strolling around this age-old stupa a deep cleft is left visible to expose the ancient brick at its core as over time the stupa had required renovation over its original structure to possess a unique assembly – a stupa within a stupa. Towards the end of the Polonnaruwa











Kingdom and along with South Indian invasions the temple was abandoned, ran into neglect and remained shrouded in mystery and legend undiscovered in the deep jungle. On the trail of the Somawathie legend and historical accounts, in 1947, Ven Sri Piyarathana Thero of Malwathu Maha Viharaya of Kandy along with a group of disciples braved the dangers of the jungle. The accounts of the discovery relate that a beam of light caught their attention and guided by this illumination they finally happened upon the stupa from which it radiated. The stupa however had run into intense neglect and disrepair and in time the stupa and its premises were restored and reinstated with resident monks. Many and varied accounts of similar nature echo in its past, since its discovery. Thus the revered stupa soon became known as the "Budhu-res-vihidena Somawathiya" - "the stupa that radiates" and even today its present Chief Incumbent Sri Sumangala Thero speaks of past incidents with wonderment.

Walking around its surroundings, ruins only hint vaguely at its rich past. Rock columns stand askew and are remnants of the temple complex.

Among these its most important are the stone inscriptions – a total of 11 – around the premises. One of these inscriptions refers to the Stupa as "mani agiya" or a rare gem. The most important of these is a stone slab inscription consisting of ten lines made during the time of King Kanittatissa (164-192 AD) that details a complete ceremonial method that should be conducted and failure to meet its requirements would result in a forfeit of 500 gold coins. Unusually, a duplication of this inscription can also be found upon a high rock located away from the temple precincts and can be accessed even today, its faint lettering still visible.

Today there is no doubt among the faithful of the Somawathie Stupa's history or legend. During the dry season when the water of the Mahaweli River recedes and the path to the stupa has cleared, pilgrims travel far and wide to reach Somawathie Raja Maha Viharaya. They pay homage at times hoping to bear witness with their own eyes, a faith and belief that they carry within. Tucked away from civilisation, in its remoteness it is as a symbol that has emerged unscathed having withstood centuries of change - today its story is told to all who see and listen in wonder. S

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





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
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OPROV SRI LANKA'S FIERY DANSEUSE

Fiery eyes blazing with unspoken passion, a regal turn of the head, supple moves of the body that only hint at the underlying strength until the drums begin to beat faster and the dancer picks up her pace, moving across the stage with nimble steps, thrusting jumps and dizzying twirls. To watch Sri Lanka's finest female dancer, Upeka, dance is to be drawn into a mesmerising world, which she creates for you.

t's difficult to begin a story about
Upeka without mention of her
parents and the unique heritage into
which she was born. The oldest child of
Chitrasena and Vajira, Upeka grew up
in an atmosphere where she lived and
breathed dance.


Her father, Chitrasena, transformed Sri Lankan dance by bringing the hitherto hidden and little known traditional dances onto the stage, creating an entirely new culture and appreciation of traditional dance and dramatising traditional folklore and legends into fascinating ballets.

Chitrasena, although no more, is still considered Sri Lanka's finest male dance artiste while Vajira, the queen of Kandyan dance, is one of the most brilliant choreographers of our time.

To be the first born of such illustrious parents, was not an easy mantle for Upeka. But in a career spanning over 50 years, she has more than proved herself as a unique and enchanting danseuse in her own right. In dozens of performances across the globe as the lead artiste in the Chitrasena Dance Company, Upeka has taken Sri Lankan dance into new heights.

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
The tiny seven year old who made her stage debut in Vanaja, a children's ballet created by her mother, probably never realised what lay ahead in her future. But her innate artistic brilliance, moulded by the discipline and hard work espoused by her mother, won her the first lead role in Rankikili soon after she turned 13.

A few years later, in 1975, she performed the lead female role in Karadiya, a role which her mother had performed many times before. This was also her first performance on stage with her father. "I was very nervous performing with my father, but all the

reviews said I had been at my best when I was on stage with him. I had performed in Karadiya previously as one of the group, but my mother had to coach me in playing the lead female role. I already knew the movements, the steps. I knew the music and every day when I came back from school I was part of daily rehearsals. We rehearsed and rehearsed and rehearsed and rehearsed."

Critics agree that Upeka came into her own as a solo artiste in Kinkini Kolama, a ballet choreographed for her by her parents and performed in 1978. Although originally created by Chitrasena with Vajira in mind as the lead female dancer, it was never produced. Years later, as they saw their daughter blossom into a true dancer and realising she was ready for a starring role, they re-choreographed the ballet to suit her style of dancing.

It was the ideal ballet for Upeka who describes it as a "showcase of the entire Sri Lankan dance spectrum. It features Kandyan dance, low country dance as well as the kolam tradition from Southern Sri Lanka." And in that unforgettable performance, she danced it with a passion and artistry which stunned the entire artistic community. Just when the country had come to



terms with the brilliance of Chitrasena and the regal perfection of Vajira, here was Upeka introducing an emotional element and "soul" to dance theatre.

Although unmatched in her creativity and imaginative interpretation of dance movements, Upeka's true brilliance has been in bringing a depth of emotion never before seen in traditional dance performances in Sri Lanka. Even when she's performing an excerpt from Kohomba Kankariya, a centuriesold, ritual-laden Kandyan dance performance, Upeka is never detached - she draws the crowd into the story, each step, each movement almost like a whispered word.

Her dance style is unique, difficult to pin down with a few adjectives. At times her dancing seems very fragile, exquisitely feminine and graceful while at other times she storms across the stage in leaps reminiscent of her father, with the energy and vigour of an athlete. Upeka explains how these seemingly-disparate styles evolved to become her signature style: "I grew up, as a child and as a dancer, watching my parents dance. I first learned to dance by dancing behind them. When I watched them dance, I always took things from both of them because there were lots of things my father did, which I loved. And there were lots of movements in my mother's dances, of which I was in awe. My father was a very masculine and very strong dancer and my mother was very regal. So I took from them both, I always thought about them when I did certain steps."

Watching Upeka dance, it's clear that there is a special relationship between the beat of the drums and this fiery danseuse. "I always feel that when I hear the drum, I don't even feel my body",

she says. "That's why, even at 60, I can dance! I don't have pain, I just dance. I feel the pain when I wake up the next morning and can't walk! But when I hear the drums, I can go on and on."

Her relationship with the drums is unique in Sri Lankan dance theatre. The drummers are always on stage with her, in a prominent place, often where she can see them as she dances. A careful observer will catch the quick glimpses, the silent communication between Upeka and her drummers. "Dance and the drums go together. It's like a marriage. One can't do without the other," she says.


Chitrasena famously said "the new is an extension of the old". And his dance company has proved this time and again, as each performance, each ballet takes the essence and core of traditional dance, interpreting it through modern choreography. For over three decades, Upeka was the lead dancer in the Chitrasena Dance Company but has now passed on the mantle to her niece, Thaji. "The most wonderful thing is that I don't feel sad or depressed that I can't dance," she says. "I never feel like that. I've danced everywhere. I have danced in the most beautiful theatres, to the most wonderful audiences. I have collaborated with the most wonderful artistes. All those experiences have given me so much pleasure that I don't have any rearets now."

While she continues to head the dance company, Upeka no longer performs solos, preferring now to be a guru, investing her energy and creativity in others. And after a lifetime of dance, her passion for dance remains undimmed

"My life is my dance", she says. "For me, there's no other life but dance." ®

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
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The soft, white flesh of the Mangosteen wedges

It is that season again, when one eagerly anticipates the time when the streets are lined with hues of red, deep purple and yellow on makeshift tables. In fact they appear not just in the streets but everywhere.

y imagination races as I picture this wonderful sight competing with the brightness of the sun. Excitement builds up and suddenly I find myself craving for the extraordinary, exquisite taste of the red 'hairy' fruit and the majestic 'queen of fruits': the taste of luscious Rambutan and Mangosteen.

The Rambutan and Mangosteen season enthralls almost the entire Sri Lankan community. One bite into either of them is all it takes to go back to the pavements or supermarkets and

buy bags and bags overflowing with these fruits. Sri Lankans cannot seem to get enough of them and this sentiment is exactly what makes this season a sort of festival: a festival of Rambutan and Mangosteen.

Rambutan, known botanically as Nephelium lappaceum, is a tropical tree that did not originate from native soil. It is believed that the Portuguese brought the first Rambutan seeds to Sri Lanka from Malaysia. According to ancient folklore they had a fortress in Malwana and found that the soil in the Kelani Valley was ideal for the plant to

thrive. Although this fruit is not native to our little island, it is very popular and much sought after by the locals. Street sales of Rambutan were first introduced along the Kandy-Colombo road, close to Nittambuwa, as both sides were crowded with temporary Rambutan stalls. Today, these street sales have expanded to nearly all of the main streets in Colombo, in particular, Havelock Road and Alexandra Place. popular attractions among passers-by.

The Rambutan season commences in May when its trees flower and the fruits begin to appear from June till

the middle of August. This process can change however if there are unfavourable weather conditions such as continuous rainfall. Malwana. the heart of Rambutan cultivation, is decorated with orchards that stretch for acres and are heavy laden with fruit. Rambutan is mainly cultivated in home gardens, chiefly in Malwana as almost everyone in this area grows a Rambutan tree. There are several varieties of Rambutan in Malwana: 'Malwana Special' and the 'Malaysian Yellow'. 'Malwana Special' is a fusion of a foreign variety and the traditional Sri Lankan variety. The 'Malaysian Yellow' is very sweet, sometimes more delightful than the 'Malwana Special'; but the demand is low for the vellow because the red outer covering of the 'Malwana Special' has more appeal and people are naturally drawn towards it.


Rambutan isn't the only seasonal delight to titillate our taste buds. Commonly referred to as the 'queen

of fruits', Mangosteen was introduced to our soil from Southeast Asia. Its botanical name being Garcinia mangostana, this fruit has an equally exceptional flavour. The rind, also known as the exocarp of the fruit, is deep purple in colour turning into a shade of wine when ripe. The soft, white flesh within is divided into wedges similar to that of an Orange with a seed in each of the larger wedges. The smaller wedges are more often seedless and easily digested. The pleasant juice released is a perfect balance of acids and sugars. It is almost the same size as a Tangerine and its hard rind can be likened to that of a Pomegranate. The Mangosteen fruit is as delicious as the Rambutan and is primarily cultivated in dry areas of the country. The Mangosteen season lasts till September and therefore shares a few traits with its seasonal counterpart. Kalutara is the hub of Mangosteen

cultivation and it is also grown in areas such as Kegalle, Kandy, Matale, Galle, and Gampaha. Mangosteen trees are typically large in nature and produce an abundant harvest during its season. Temporary stalls are prominent mostly in the vicinity of the famous Kalutara Temple while it is also sold in and around Colombo during the season.

These tropical delights do not merely satisfy our taste buds: they are of significant nutritional value and provide considerable health benefits. Mangosteen is sometimes used to treat skin infections while both fruits help the digestion process.

A wave of emotions overwhelms me as I recollect those neatly stacked piles of Rambutan and Mangosteen adding colour to the environment. This recollection is only a glimpse of what is to come. Sometimes referred to as the 'food of the gods', these mouthwatering fruits are truly heavenly treats on this little Island of paradise. S



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
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
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


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
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Monkey Business!

They are everywhere, swaying and leaping from tree to tree, hopping on to roofs, carrying their young in troops. They may silently approach, grin and plaintively coo at you, seeking a hand-out, and when you're not looking will even steal from you. They are none other than the Sri Lankan monkeys.


ri Lanka is home to five different species of primates. In fact it is rather surprising to learn that Sri Lanka has the highest diversity of mammals in South Asia. Even though the country takes up only about 1.5 percent of the land area of South Asian countries with primates, Sri Lanka is home to 30 percent of all primate forms found in South Asia.

Dr. Wolfgang Dittus has spent over 40 years studying monkeys, mainly in the Polonnaruwa area of Sri Lanka, unravelled some of the intriguing details unique to the wonderful world of these remarkable creatures.


Reddish brown in colour, the toque macaques are the most socially active and intelligent of all Sri Lankan monkeys and are widely seen in forests as well as populated human habitats around

the island. The males are relatively larger, almost twice the size of females who are red faced and subordinate. Gray or Hanuman langurs have light gray fur with black faces and the purple-faced langurs are distinguished from the grey langurs by their darker fur and white beards.

Two of the species are leaf-eating monkeys, namely the langurs. These monkeys have a specialised gut with protective bacteria that enables them to digest mature leaves. Thus, in forests food is widely available for these monkeys. The toque macaques on the other hand, cannot eat mature leaves because like humans they cannot digest it. They prefer to eat fruit and leaf-shoots, and of late they have increasingly adapted to human food; and people in turn have gotten used to

feeding them. This is one main reason why there are more macaques than there should be in areas such as Kandy and Dambulla explained

Dr. Dittus adding how people should help protect these monkeys from becoming pests and reduce their numbers, by not feeding them.

The macaques live in social groups of about 25 members constituting about one to three mother-families. These families consist of related females with their young, and one or more adult males that have come from other social groups. Together they protect the family's young. When the young males of a family reach adolescence they leave the family and wander off in bachelor groups in search of mates. The reason they do this according to Dr. Dittus is to prevent inbreeding. They attach themselves to unrelated females outside their own group. Each group has its own territory, which is a large area of forest identified as a home range. According to Dr. Dittus, the macaques (like all life-forms) are genetically designed to reproduce as many offspring as possible and therefore, there is fierce competition

Like the macaques the grey langurs also live in social groups, ranging from ten to sometimes over 50 members. comprising of females and normally several adult males. They too have their home ranges and often engage in

among the males for mating rights with

females. As a result, many adult males

get wounded and die, the reason why


territorial battles with others of their kind. They are often seen feeding in trees and on the ground. The purple-faced langurs are similar to the Hanuman langurs, but live in small groups or harems dominated by a single adult male. They are not so easily seen because they confine their activities usually to the top-most forest laver.


Interestingly enough, all these monkeys communicate with one another. Language is the dominant characteristic that distinguishes the humans from animals, but according to Dr. Dittus, these primates have a basic structure of language. The toque macaques are most socially active and clever, even form social coalitions and alliances and tend to have a very good memory to remember their history with over 300 other monkeys. One example of monkey communication would be the way they warn their group of predators. They have different types of calls for different predators. For instance, when one makes the snake-call the whole group would run up trees to protect themselves; and if it were a hawk, the call would be different and the troop would descend from the trees.

Troops of monkeys are a common sight in Sri Lanka and from the days of the Monkey King Hanuman who is believed to have come from India to Sri Lanka in search of Sita in the popular epic Ramayana, these animals have been a part of its people for generations blending in with

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
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
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

The trademark laidback Australian approach to life is here, but this isn't the outback. Melbourne is a centre for international commerce, and Melburnians pride themselves on being the most culturally sophisticated people in Australia.


The Arts Centre at Southbank, Her Majesty's Theatre and the Princess Theatre, stage the world's biggest shows, and the Melbourne Recital Centre is the newest addition to this enviable arts precinct. Combining stunning architecture with world leading acoustics, the Melbourne Recital Centre is an unmissable treat for lovers of fine music.

Melbourne was recently named a UNESCO City of Literature, one of only four in the world. Hardly surprising then, that Melbourne hosts as many poetry readings per week as cities triple her size and boasts the Wheeler Centre for Books, Writing and Ideas, where authors discuss their work daily.

And the modernised State Library, with its hushed Domed Reading Room, offers an oasis for thinkers in the heart of the city.

the Museum houses the fascinating Bunjilaka Aboriginal Cultural Centre, which empowers Aboriginal people to interpret and display their cultural heritage.

Outside of Rome, no city in the world loves its coffee more than Melbourne. 


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
(Central Business District) and suddenly open a door and find yourself in one of the city's coolest new establishments.



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


A Glimpse of SriLanka

- ADAM'S PEAK is the mountain with the sacred footprint at its summit, 2,243m high, the season to climb is from December to March, The wilderness protected area is a UNESCO World Heritage Site.
- AUKANA is the site of the Island's elegant Buddha statue carved out of a single rock standing at a height of 12m. The statue was built around 459 - 477 AD
- ANURADHAPURA is one of the country's key religious and cultural heritage sites, dating as far back as the 3rd Century BC. It is where the first sapling of the Bo tree was brought to.
- SIGIRIYA built by King Kashyapa is the ancient rock citadel and a World Heritage Site. The garden city and the fortress were built in 477-495 AD with beautiful Sigiriya frescoes, baths and pools.
- MANNAR is part mainland and part island. The famous Shrine of Our Lady of Madhu and the Thiruketheesvaram Kovil are situated in the mainland. August is the season for the Madhu pilgrimage.
- JAFFNA is the splendour of the far north with colourful celebrations, customs and festivals. Jaffna consists of Valigamam, Thenmarachchi. Vadamarachchi and the Jaffna

- KATARAGAMA is a revered pilarimage site 283km from Colombo. Skanda or Lord Kataragama, the Hindu God of war is said to have made Kataragama his abode. The annual procession is held in July and August.
- POTTUVIL lies along the Eastern coast. Muhudu Maha Viharaya, which means the temple near the sea and Magul Maha Viharaya are of archaeological importance.
- KANDY is the capital city on the hills with panoramic mountain views. The sacred Tooth Relic of Lord Buddha lies in the Sri Dalada Maligawa, The Esala Perahera is held here every year.
- DAMBULLA the cave temple with beautifully carved statues of Lord Buddha and Hindu Gods is believed to date back to the 12th Century, King Valagamba took refuge from invaders in these caves.
- POLONNARUWA is one of Sri Lanka's most flourishing ancient capitals, boasting historic splendour with ruins of palaces, parks and water tanks that are still functional. King Parakramabahu's rule was the golden era.

Stretches of sandy beaches, misty mountains, tea gardens in the rolling hills, herds of elephants and historical sites... Experience the wonders of this tropical gem.



Away from the sun and the sand you must explore the hill country with its blue green mountains, sprawling tea gardens and waterfalls.

- BANDARAWELA in the hill country is known for its beautiful scenery, flowers and cool climate
- NUWARA ELIYA is known as 'Little England' and is home to some of the finest tea plantations in the world. Hakgala Botanical Garden is filled with a rich variety of orchids and roses. Adjacently located is the Hakgala Nature Reserve. The Nuwara Eliya season starts in April.

The many national parks all over the Island are home to elephants, leopards, deer and bears as well as many species of birds, reptiles, flora and fauna that are endemic to the Island.

- Bundala is a must-see destination between Kirinda and Hambantota. It features lagoons, wetlands, jungle and numerous species of wildlife, all wrapped in the natural setting of the nature
- Ella with the picturesque Ravana Ella waterfall has a stunning landscape. There are magnificent mountain walks, waterfalls and wildlife.
- Gal Oya National Park is home to the largest reservoir. Herds of elephants can be seen here throughout the year.
- Horton Plains with its beautiful landscape and cool climate is home to many wild animals such as spot leopards, samburs and endemic birds. For the adventurous, it is also a place to go trekking, hiking or even camping.
- Kaudulla National Park features leopards, sloth bears and diverse bird populations. Herds of up to 250 wild elephants are drawn to the tank in the park.
- Lahugala Kitulana National Park is located near the coastal town of Pottuvil. Wild elephants and endemic birds can be spotted here. The national park also contains the reservoirs of Lahugala, Kitulana and Sengamuwa.

- Pinnawala Elephant Orphanage is a short drive from Kandy and home to almost 100 elephants. It offers many photo opportunities, with the babies quaffing huge volumes of milk and the biggest elephant bathing sessions you're likely to see.
- Randenigala Wildlife Sanctuary is the place to go for wildlife enthusiasts. You can spot herds of elephants, deer, sambur, wild boar and rare birds.
- Sinharaja Biosphere Reserve is a UNESCO World Heritage Site. One of the few surviving rain forests in the world, its biodiversity blends uniquely with endemic flora and fauna.
- Kumana National Park hosts a multitude of birds and is regarded as an important bird nesting and breeding ground. Tens of thousands of birds migrate to the Kumana swamp area from April
- Wilpattu National Park is located north of Puttalam, Leopards, spotted deer, elephants, wild boar, sloth bears and crocodiles can be found in this fairly thick dry zone jungle area.
- Yala National Park is the most popular park in the country that has a wide variety of wild animals. Yala also has one of the highest leopard densities in the world.

- Weligama Bay leads to Taprobane Island. During low tide, one could just wade up to this small lush island.





The Airport Expressway between Colombo and the BIA is also nearing completion.

Make sure you have received the necessary vaccinations or medications depending on your destination. It is advisable to have prescribed medicines best suited for you.

Eat lightly

Your body becomes considerably inactive during the flight, which slows down your digestive processes. Eat lightly before and during the flight.

Arrive early

Rushing can cause stress and fatigue. Arriving ahead of time gives you time to reach the gate without hassle.

Travel lightly

Minimise your luggage to avoid unnecessary stress and take only the essentials with you onboard.

Travel tips:

Ear pressure

During take-off and landing, mild discomfort in your ears can be remedied by sucking on a sweet and swallowing. Provide babies and children with a pacifier to alleviate distress.

Moisturise

Use a moisturiser as the reduced humidity of the cabin air can dry out your skin.

Feel at home

Loosen tight clothing and adjust your seat to a reclining position. Use lumbar support available on most seats to make yourself comfortable.

Wear glasses instead of contact

Wear glasses to avoid irritation of the eyes due to the dry air within the cabin.

Rehydrate

Drink water or juices every hour during the flight. Avoid an excess of coffee and tea as they aggravate dehydration.

Blood circulation

Do some light exercises on your lower legs and calf muscles and turn often to encourage blood circulation.

Baggage tracing

If your baggage does not arrive at your destination, complete a Passenger Irregularity Report at the Baggage Services Counter on arrival. You can check the status of your baggage through the WorldTracer system online.

Accommodation

The Serenediva Transit Hotel, located in the Departure area inside the airport. offers rooms, equipped with essential amenities for transit passengers.

Safety first

We recommend that you leave your seat belt fastened at all times. Familiarise yourself with emergency procedures and safety features illustrated in the safety card placed in the seat pocket in front of you.

Medicine

A number of over the counter medicines can be obtained from our cabin crew.

Entertainment

All seats are fitted with individual video monitors in our Airbuses A330 and A340. The television, movies and games listings can be found in Onboard. Business Class passengers will also have a personal video player and 35 titles to choose from in Ondemand. Magazines can be found in the seat pocket in front of you.

Drop a line

SriLankan offers postcards for passengers, which can be handed to the cabin crew who will post them for you.

Spruce up

Washrooms are situated in all aircraft. You can obtain the many toiletries from the cabin crew, however due to security requirements of certain countries shaving equipment will not be available on some flights.

Baby Food

Baby food is available on request and games are on hand to keep children occupied.

Bassinettes

Bassinettes are available for infants weighing less than 16 kgs and are too young to sit up on their own. For safety reasons, the bassinettes will be fixed after takeoff and removed before landing. Infants should not be left in the bassinettes when the seat belt sign is on and instead be with an adult, secured with a kangaroo belt.

Baby Car Seats

Passengers are allowed to carry Baby Car Seats on board to be secured to the aircraft seat assigned to the infant and provided a responsible adult (over 18 years) is occupying the adjacent seat. Please refer to Check-In staff, for permitted specifications of Baby Car Seats and to Cabin staff, for usage.

Dos and Don'ts

Smoking policy

Smoking is prohibited on all SriLankan Airlines flights.

Hand-luggage

Hand-luggage must be stowed in the overhead racks or under the seat in front of you (Economy Class only).

Electronic equipment

Use of mobile telephones, portable televisions, radios, cordless laptop mouse and other transmitting devices, is prohibited.

Use the call button near your seat to seek assistance from our cabin crew.

EXERCISES: recommended for three to four minutes every hour whilst seated to encourage blood circulation.

TOE CIRCLES:

Raising your feet from the floor, make circles with your toes. Turn each foot in a different direction and reverse the direction after about 20 turns. Repeat as desired.



KNEE, THIGH AND TOE

Lift your knees slightly whilst at the same time clenching your thigh muscles and pointing your toes up and down. Repeat this between 10 and 20 times with one leg and then with the other.



FOOT ROCKING

Place your feet on the floor. Then, keeping your toes on the floor, lift your heels up, hold the position and then lower back to the floor. Then lift your toes whilst keeping your heels on the floor. Repeat for 30 seconds.



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


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
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
