PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J. WEST RIDGEWAY, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by section 3 of Ordinance No. 12 of 1894, intituled "An Ordinance to authorize the destruction of valueless Documents preserved in Courts of Justice," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation in that behalf made, to bring any Court of Justice in the Island under the operation of the said Ordinance, and such Proclamation to amend, alter, or revoke as and whenever the Governor shall, with the like advice, determine:

And whereas it is expedient to bring the Police Court and the Court of Requests of Avisawella under the operation of the said Ordinance:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this our Proclamation bring the Police Court and the Court of Requests of Avisawella under the operation of the said Ordinance No. 12 of 1894, intituled "An Ordinance to authorize the destruction of valueless Documents preserved in Courts of Justice," as from and after the 1st day of September, 1897.

His Excellency has directed that the following paragraph 15 of the Regulations relating to the admission of Colonial Barristers to the English Bar be published for general information:—

Colonial Barristers.

15. While the two branches of the profession are kept distinct in New South Wales and Ceylon, as at present, and the regulations affecting the call to the Bars of those Colonies remain substantially as they are at present, any member of such Bars of three years' standing presenting a certificate of call to any of such Bars duly authenticated, and a certificate by a Judge of the Supreme Court of the Colony and by the Attorney-General or Senior Law Officer thereof, that the applicant is a fit and proper person to be called to the English Bar, may become a member of any Inn of Court, and be called to the English Bar on keeping three terms without submitting to any examination.

Hutchinson, of Carolina, Watawala, Ceylon, in recognition of his services on the occasion of the rescue by the steamship "Staffordshire" of Liverpool of the shipwrecked crew of the steamship "Aidar" of Liverpool, which foundered in the Mediterranean Sea on the 19th January, 1896.
