

It is seldom that any publication-other than the inevitable Newspaper, is issued from the Ceylon Press: but we believe the publication of an illustrated work, (always excepting a contemporary who, for obvious reasons, must be nameless) is a most extraordinary thing in the literary history of this far distant Isle of the Sea. The subscribers to the Ceylon Observer have however been presented, in the most liberal manner, with an illustrated broad sheet which reminds us forcibly of the *Graphic* and the *Illustrated London News*, although it may by some be admitted reluctantly that the *Illus*trated Police News has been consulted a little too much as a model in the mode of printing the Illustrations.—Be this as it may, the sheet now before us calls for a little art criticism, and we hasten to exercise a talent for which Ceylon usually affords no scope.

The first illustration represents Colombo as

seen from the Ramparts (which used to be) above the Sally-port; and with the exception that the Roman Catholic Church is represented

with one tower only (an omission which an in-vidious critic might attribute to bigotry) is an excellent representation of the scene, which is enlivened by the flight of a crow over the surface of the water. In the second view we have a most faithful representation of the railing round the Fort Ditch, and of the Telegraph posts on Galle Face; and were one disposed to be hypercritical we might point out that the wire is made rather too large; but possibly the drawing is accurate, as the said wire may have been employed at the time it was taken in conveying one of those interesting and original Telegrams which adorn only the sheet of our contemporary! Of the third illustration we cannot in candour say much. It is doubtless a stock piece, but it has a cosmopolitan advantage. It will do on an emergency to illustrate faithfully—the Stores of Labrador Horselydown, or Malabar, and the value this gives to the engraving will be easily imagined. The fourth engraving presents an animated scene. Part of the inner harbour of Colombo. We are not sure whether the gentleman in the native boat in the foreground (or rather water) is Mr. Halliley or Mr. Stephen, but we are glad to find one of those officials "paddling his own canoe." (On a further inspection we find that this figure has not a cocked hat, or a Court suitit cannot therefore represent Mr. S., for, as we all know, he has both.) Here is a striking likeness of a well-known buoy, which will at once be recognised by all Wharf Clerks. We regret to observe that the ships in the offing are very imperfectly rigged, and we trust that the various Insurance Offices here will protect themselves against shipments in either of the three nondescript vessels which appear anchor-ed off the Custom House Point. The roof of the Railway Terminus strikes the eye in the fifth picture, —otherwise it is a representation of still life, enlivened only by the posture of two gentlemen, one of whom appears in vain in-viting his friend to quicken his step. Un-happily they are going away from the station, instead of towards it; or, what a suggestive picture it would have been! The last engraving on the sheet represents the select portion of the Coffee pickers of a Ceylon Store, standing at as much ease as they can: they are doubtless lis tening to an address, either from a Catechist-or from an Ex. M. L. C. who is a partner in the firm, to whom the particular Stores belong. The wall and the smoke from the Chimney are excellently represented.

We presume that frames for the broad sheet

will be provided by the enterprising publisher, and though we cannot vouch for its truth, a report is current that an impression has been made most successfully on a large damask table napkin, (furnished at a very reduced price by the Turkish Consul), and is to be presented to His Royal Highness at the reception this evening. It is uncertain to what use H. R. H. will put he handsome present; some imagning that whe ill employ it as a pocket handkerchief; and others, that he will wrap the Municipality present in it, and pack both up as marvels of Ceylon art. In either case our cotemporary

should be delighted.

It will afford us real pleasure to resume these criticisms on the appearance of any further illustrated works.

### COLOMBO PREPARING. During the past four or five days the pro-

vinces may be said to have come to town. We should rather like to have seen how Galle, Matura, Negombo, Ratnapoora and a few other places have looked since Saturday last. Trade in those outstations must have come to a dead lock: gossip was nowhere, and for a time they must have borne a kindred resemblance to deserted villages. On Sunday, long belfore daydawn on Monday, and during a portion of Tuesday, the Galle, Kandy, and Ratnapoora roads appeared suffering from an eruption of

bullock hackeries. Toll-keepers were not pared for such a flight of Native Head m Toll-keepers were not prepared for such a flight of Native Headmen, and not knowing exactly where ot when the rush might end, felt uneasy in their mind, and at high noon began to wonder how much longer they could stand the rain af challies and copper pice which still kept pouring in upon them. It was all very well calling for powerful restoratives in the shape of cocoanuts and toddy: it was all very well to be relieved for an occasional ten minutes or so whilst soothing the over-wrought system by fresh plugs of tobacco and betel, but there is a limit to what human nature can endure, and we are credibly human nature can endure, and we are credibly numan nature can endure, and we are credibly informed that several toll-keepers' assistants on the Morotto road, were carried home on shutters long before sundown: one principal toll renter was removed from the scene of his trials wrapped in a double cumblie.

From whatever quarter they came, Modliar, Mohandiram, and Aratchy, all bent their steps towards one central point—the esplands.

towards one central point,—the esplanade. They passed by the pandahl at Bagatalle as a thing unworthy of notice: they pooh-pooh'd the long rows of bamboo pillars throughout Colpetty's length, they laughed to scorn the arch at the Galle Face terminus: all these were as nothing. At one end of the esplanade an outburst of Sinhalese genius was discernable, and thither they all went, doing their utmost to get in each others way, and bewilder the work-men who were really displaying no little taste under certain instruction. A maze of foliage, an ocean of cocoanuts, a wilderness of pine and leaflets; it was as though some tropical Covent Garden market were about to be established before the stalls were arranged. There were enough cocoanuts in and about that Pandhal of the Southern Province to keep that randal of the southern Province to keep the Hultsdorf Mills at work for a week with steam well up. Groups were looking on in dazed won der, open-mouthed, but silent. A select party of "Jacks" from the mercantile marine in our roadstead, were so charmed, so filled with bilarity with the entire proceeding that they could find no better mode of testifying their admiration than by commencing a game of bowls by the instrumentality of the convenient heaps of ripe cocoatality. nuts, the nine-pins being formed of the spindle-shanked lower limbs of Southern Mohandirams.

By degrees fruit ripe and luscious-looking found its place; flowers were garlanded and foliage of many hues, and tints, and shades assumed a shape of gracefulness. There was drapery, and there were streamers, and there were many quaint and strange devices, but none shore out more gracefully, more fittingly in this Palm isle of the ocean, than the pretty flowers, and tender leaflets and rich gold fruit of Lanka's own production, the Cocoa-palm.

It was hard toiling work for many to have these wide-spread arches full and complete.

But all was done, and as the Royal pageant passed slowly up that long green avenue all must have felt that Ceylon had done its part, not in gorgeous drapery or costly fittings, but in putting forth the treasures of the soil.

THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH IN

CEYLON. The punctuality which has marked the ducal progress throughout India, was observed on the arrival of the "Galatea" in our roadstead on Wednesday last. Shortly after nine o'clock in the morning, the smoke from the Royal vessel was descried some miles to the southward of Mount Lavinia, and by ten o'clock the vessel's masts were plainly visible off the Mount. She was coming on under steam alone, a considerable distance from

the land; shortly after ten o'clock the Master Attendant who had pulled off in his gig, was Attendant who all pulled of in his gig, was alongside, prepared to pilot her into the roads. By this time thousands of persons had congregated along the beach, on the ramparts, on the Custom House Point, on every building and projection which afforded a view of the roadstead, all anxious to catch a first glance of the noble vessel as she moved majest:cally along, seemingly propelled by some unseen power, for not a sail was set, no smoke issued

from her funnel. Arrived within a quarter of a mile of the "Forte" carrying the Commodore's Flag, the "Galatea" whilst still moving onwards to her berth, saluted the Flagship with the usual eleven guns, which were returned with seven Just at this juncture a whole fleet of fishing-canoes scudded up to the approaching vessel, three hundred in number, headed by Don Abram Fernando, Mudliar of the Fishers, They knew no other way of testifying their attachment to the Throne, their fidelity to the Sovereign, than by this simple act, and no doubt they formed a striking picture to the "one" in whose honor they had hoisted their fresh white sails, and crowded round the mamfresh white sails, and crowded round the mammoth ship. At about half-past eleven o'clock, the anchor was dropped, and the two ships lay floating quietly side by side, off the Royal Engineers' point, at a distance of two miles from the landing place. Immediately afterwards a boat pulled swiftly from the shore to the Galata, containing Mr. Cockburn Stewart, the Governor's Private Secretary, and Captain Chapman, the Governor's Aide-de-Camp, on whom devolved the duty of paying the official

And the flags too, as primitive as the barks, were of varied shape, and size, and color, from the comboy to the tiny neckerchief. Colpetty was loyally brilliant until the heavy rain began to descend, and then of course all was soon over. But in the Pettah and along Sea Street where ample verondahs afforded a good opportunity for display, there was one continuous blaze of light from every description of lamp or burner, Chandeliers, colored globes, Grecian lamps, wall-shades, everything, large and small that could be made to yield its quota of loyal light burnt brightly and the blaze was visible afar, reflected on the leafy arches in all directions. These were kept burning until a late hour, but other lights along Mutwal, blazing barrel of tar on various jutting points from Rock House down to the beach at the Whist Bungalow, kept up a cheerful ruddy blaze through all that stormy night, reckless of rain and wind that stormy night, reckless of rain and wind, disregardful of the watery torrent that did its best or worst against these bonfires, but in vain.

THE LEVEE.

houses had all been whitewashed, the gutters had been cleaned recently, though their proximity was painfully obvious, and before each house were planted three or four branches of occoa-nut tree, each leaflet of which waved in the light morning breeze. Half way down the street, an arch spanned the road bearing the device: "Welcome, His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh,"—a piece of advice to the community at large, rather, than an address to the Royal visitor. There were also here and there strings of cocoant leaves, flowers, and tinsel cloth, stretched across the road and the vista through these. looking down the road, was pretty ciota, stretched across the road and the vista through these, looking down the road, was pretty enough, though not very novel or striking. The Prince looked on wonderingly at the quiet, well-fed looking people who had come from all quarters of the great straggling town to see the tamash, and here and there Lord Napier directed his attention to a building less mean in appearance than the strucand there love represents the structure around it; but it would need even a more eloquent cicerone, and a more enthusiastic lower of native architecture than His Excellency, to invest the action with interest for a stranger who is such a street with interest for a stre

conscious that he is not proof against unsavoury odours.

The Ducal Cortege, emerged from Black Town, and came out by the side of the Evangelistic Hall upon the Light House Esplanade Road leading to the north gate of the Fort. This road was decorated in a very effective manner by means of casuaring poles planted on either side of the road, and at inter poles planted on either side of the road, and at intervals of about fifty feet, with large flags of almost every colour and of every nation waving from the tops. At the corner, where the road branches off towards Wallajah bridge, an imposing structure tin the shape of a triumphal arch had been erected.

The royal standard was floating over the top of the arch, and the royal arms were hung over the entrance, together with the inscription "Welcome Prince Alfred to Madras." As soon as the Duke's carriage was in sight two toddydrawers, in their own peculiar fashion,—climbed up the palmyra trees on either side of the arch with royal standards in their hands; a performance which appeared to amuse the Prince considerably. The native pandal on the esplanade was also conspicuous by an eruption of bunting and flags on the exterior. Indeed decoration was carried to such an extent that even the curb-stones along the road-ways had been white and blue reads. the curb-stones along the road-ways had been white-and-blue-washed for the occasion. The Wallajah bridge displayed a fair crop of streamers and evergreens, as did also the Government House bridge, but both were crowded with people who bridge, but both were crowded with people who even mounted the parapets in order to obtain a view of the Duke. An enormous crowd lined the esplanade road the whole of way between Thumboo Chetty Street and the island. On the Duke's arrival at the Wallajah bridge, the band of the Volunteers struck up God Save the Queen. The road across the island was lined with froops from one end to the other, with the exception of the space occupied by the galleries for the school children, the 45th Regiment and the Volunteers being posted on the Wallajah bridge side, and the Native Infantry, consisting of the 3rd, 17th and 35th Regiments, on the Government House bridge side of Munro's statue. dize ..... 3, 912 1 7

The Growing Vice.—The Indian Mirror in noticing the death of a popular and talented Baboo, alludes to the prevailing vice of intemperance. It will be remembered that the Reverend Mr. Long had something significant on the subject in one of his lectures at Bombay:—

We announce with regret the death of Babu Doorga Chura Banerjea, the eminent native physician, so well known nearly all over Bengal. He expired on last Sunday after a short illness, and has left a large family including his aged parents, who mourn his heavy loss. He was about fifty years of age, a man of sound general Education, which is so rare among our native medical men, his talents were remarkable, and his professional skill was believed to be unrivalled among the brethren of his class. The confidence which the native community placed in him in the most difficult cases of disease was something wonderful, and perhaps it will not be too much to say that he very well deserved such confidence. One thing however, which we cannot suppress in honesty, has been the cause of his untimely death and the serious loss which we have all sustained by it. That was the fatal vice of Intemperance. Those who knew the a vall self-indulgence to which he freely gave the reins in the latter days of his life, and the difficulty with which his services could be procured in consequence, were aware that his end could not be far off. The lamented Babu Doorga Churn Banerjea is only another victim to the terrible demon of Intemperance, which has up to this time robbed Bengal of some of her ablest sons, and threatens to do an incalculable amount of mischief in Bengalee Society.—Indian Mirror.

Fashions for Ferruary.—The question so often agitated, as to whether long or short toilettes should be adopted for full dress, has again been decided in favour of the trained skirt. Long trains are, doubtless, inconvenient for dancing, but they give so much grace and elegance to the figure, that we can scarcely wish to see them set aside for evening reunions. In the daytime a long dress is hardly to be seen, not even for ordinary visiting. Faye, taffetas and velvet are all in vogue for ball dresses; but thinner material is decidedly preferable for young ladies—tarlatane or tulle. There are so many elegant dresses of these materials, either plain or embroidered in colours, in gold, or in silver. that it is but the choice that perplexes. These necessitate a silk or foulard under-skirt. A contrasting colour may be worn under tarlatane, but the extreme transparency of tulle requires an under skirt of the same shade, and taffetas is more suitable than foulard. Low bodies are made both round and square, some plated à la Greeque; others with berthes, bouillonnes, or ruches. Bretelles are the favourite trimming for the bodies of young ladies' dresses. They are made of wide ribbon, or bouillonnes of gauze or ruches mingled with narrow ribbon. They sometimes terminate in long ends before and behind, finished off by a bow or rosette, which 'loops up the tunic. The pointed body is quite in vogue; but the long sash is by no means unfashionable. The skirt are trimmed in a variety of styles—five, seven, or nine row of narrow flounces, with a heading; bouillonnes, either lengthways, on the bias, or festooned; chicorees ruches of gauze, alternating with little plaitings of ribbon, &c. Bows, bouquets, or rosettes loop up the tunic, the border of which is always trimmed to match the lower skirt. For the "Pompadour" style gauze material with wide coloured satin stripes are preferred, as also t slightly pointed behind. For friendly calls, when a more simple toillette is suitable, nothing is in better taste than black faye, or faye of a dark shade—brown, green, or violet. By means of the separate train, merely attached to the skirt by fastenings underneath, these dresses may serve a double purpose—the custume and the long dress—the skirt being made round, either with or without flounces, the train trimmed with a double ruche, heading a flounce. Small veste-paletots for home wear are still much worn, especially by elderly or delicate ladies. The smaller fancy vests aire patronished by young ladies—the hittle "Zouave," without sleeves, trimmed with cashmere, embroidered, or guipure insertion over a colour; or the round veste, with coat-sleeves, of brown cloth or wadded cashmere, edged with fringe and braided. Also the round pelerine, with a little square collar, trimmed with a silk fringe or a velvet plaiting; or a fichu rounded at the back and over the arms, and held in front under a sash of the same, which is tied behind. These are all, of course, merely little extra vestments for the cold winter mornings. Bonnets the same colours as the dresses with which they are to be worn are more essential than ever. They vary little in form, the diadem, or rather bandeau bouillonne, being still the favourite. Small feathers of all kinds are also much used, and veils or scarves are necessary appendages. The Oriental scarf is very elegant when made—of gauze of a becoming colour or black tulle. Some modists are introducing a square veil, one point placed over the forehead, the opposite one falling over the chignon, whilst the two others are fastened by a brooch or flower under the chin. This forms a very graceful and becoming head-dress, particularly when worn with bright flowers. The narrow diadems can be worn only with the hair much frizzed in front and high at the back; when the banderux are flatter, then a wide and full ruche edged with lace should be put behind the diadem. Black velvet has been much worn, but i Loss of Vessels from THE TYNE.—The storm of

the last few days has been specially destructive to vessels which left the Tyne last week, and which seem to have sailed into the heart of it. The bark seem to have sailed into the heart of it. The bark Victoria, which was lost on Gorleston Sands on Sunday last, only sailed from the Tyne bound to the Mediterranean, on Friday. Eleven of her hands were drowned, and the master (Mr. Arcus) was killed by one of the master alling on him. The men who are lost all belonged to the Tyne. The master (Mr. Arcus) resided at North Shields, and he had bought a share of the ship before he sailed; William Geddes, the mate, belonged to South Shields; and the boatswain (James Arcus), the carpenter (Jamos Hay.) and the cook and steward (George Geddes, the mate, belonged to South Shields; and the boatswain (James Arcus), the carpenter (Jamos Hay.) and the cook and steward (George Tarbut) were North Shields men. William Davison, James Robson, John Murray, Robert Danskin, George Hutchinson, John Edwards, and Thompson Thompson, the seamen who were drowned with the officers, belonging to South Shields. A new steamer, the Jacona, which had been built on the Tyne for the Cork and London trade, was the only vessel which left Shields Harbour, in the gale of the early part of last week, and sailors predicted from the threatening condition of the weath that a bad report would be heard of her. And such has turned out to be the case, for, on account of the compasses having got wrong, she had run upon the Long Sands last week, and had to be abandoned by the crew, and she is a wreck. Last Friday morning the screw steamer Sea Queen sailed from the Tyne, bound for Malaga. Some very strong remarks were made by the people on the shore as she proceeded to sea on the impropriety of a vessel so deeply laden as she was venturing into such uncertain weather as then prevailed. On Sunday morning flash lights were seen to the eastward of the Cockle Light as from a vessel in distress, and on Monday last a quantity of wreck drifted on to Caistor Beach, and among it was the sternboard of a boat, bearing "Sea Queen, London," on it. If the steamer Sea Queen is lost it is probable that her crew of 19 hands have parished with EXTRAORDINARY ACCIDENT.—A LIGHTHOUSE CARRIED AWAY BY A SCHOONER.—An extraordinary accident took place last week near Fleetwood to the

THE VICTORIA DOCK offers special advantage

The Victoria Bock oners special advantages in trading between ports in the East and London, by means of the Suez Canal.

The Victoria Dock entrance is the first dock entrance arrived at on coming up the River Thames. It is situate half-a-mile below Blackwall, and by it steam vessels avoid all the bends in the more crowded parts of the river.

The depth of water on the cill of the gates is 28 feet and the capacity of the lock is adequate to the largest class of vessels.

Most of the Government iron-c'ads—the Minotaur and Northumberland, of 6:620 tons burthen, and 450 feet in length, were fitted out in the Victoria Dock. The large water space of ninety acres, and capacious jetties, each of which is 500 feet long and 80 feet wide, with convenient warehouses thereon, afford the utmost dock and wharf accommodation; and stached to the dock is a pontoon, for raising, examining, and repairing large vessels, whereby the risk and expense of removal to dry docks is avoided.

The quays are surrounded by railway communication, so that trucks come alongside vessels, and merchandize can be conveyed by railway to and from all the manufacturing places in the United Kingdom.

By means of hydraulic cranes vessels are unloaded and loaded with unexampled despatch. Goods to and from the Victoria Dock are received at and delivered from the Minories Station by frequent trains in the day.

Passengers are conveyed to and from the Dock by trains between the Fenchurch Street and Bishopsgate Stations every quarter of an hour.
