

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



#### THE MISSING ATLANTIC STEAMERS.

The Inman Company's steamer City of Durham which had been sent out specially a few weeks ago to search for the City of Boston, returned to Crook-haven on the 21st inst. after a fruitless cruise. haven on the 21st inst. after a fruitless cruisc. When it became known on the Liverpool Exchange that the *City of Durham* had returned, and had brought no tidings of the missing steamer, many whose faith had been strong as to her safety admit-ted that matters looked very gloomy indeed, al-though they still thought that a week or ten days might bring some news of the vessel. The *City of Durham* cruised as far as lat 54, long. 24, and thence to lat. 45, long, 30. She sailed from Fayal on the 16th inst., bringing home the mails of the Channel squadron, then at the island. The missing steamer having now been 36 days out from Halifax, the underwriters have refused to take any fresh insurances upon her. Mr. Inman has written a letter to the Secretary of the Board of Trade, giving an emphatic denial to the statement that the vessel was overladen. Tug boats were at once despatched to the assistance of the disabled steamer, which was subsequently brought safely into har-bour. The passengers who were on board this vessel have since addressed a letter to the Guion Comparent is miled there exists that on the 19th vessel have since addressed a letter to the Guion Company, in which they state that on the 12th inst., with a smooth sea and very little wind, they sighted and hailed a Guion steamship, supposed to be the *Manhattan*. The *Samaaia* fired several guns, and hoisted those signals of the commercial code which denote "Engines disabled; I wish to com-municate." The ships were not more than six miles anert and the ansaing steamper was to leaward. mulacate. The snips were not more than six miles apart, and the passing steamer was to leeward; consequently she must have heard the guns, as two vessels bound east, which were farther off and to windward, noticed the reports, and immediately bore down to the Cunarder to offer help. The Manhattan—if the writers of the letter have accurately identified the ship—paid no manner of atten-tion to the signals of distress, beyond setting an ensign, but proceeded on her course to the west-ward.

#### MUNICIPAL COUNCIL COLOMBO.

An ordinary meeting of the Municipal Council was held at the Cutcherry yesterday. The following is the business brought forward : To consider Reports of Special and standing

Committees. To agree upon a Programme of proceedings in connection with the laying of the foundation of the Municipal Market by H. R. H. the Duke of Edinburgh.

The Epoca of Madrid has the following :--"The Duke de Montpensier is said to have taken no rest during the night which preceded the duel, but to have passed the time in adding a codicil to his will and in arranging his affairs. The duchess, on March 8, sent to her husband a telegraphic despatch in these words :- Do not fight; despise him.' To tranquillise her the duke replied in the same way : 'I have not fought; I am not fighting ;' but he did not add, 'I will not fight.' Dona Luissa Fernande no doubt guessed the sense of the message, as du-ring the whole of the day she continued sending telegrams to her husband and his intimate friends to prevent him from fighting, and to obtain news of him. Montpensier has offered to adopt the children of Don Henri, but they very naturally refused to accept the protection of the man who killed their father. Le Figaro publishes extracts from a letter address-

ed by the Duke d'Aumale to a friend in Pariss----Woodnorton, Evesham. March 17, 1870. My dear Friend.--At last I have received direct news of Montpensier. He was going on well, and was awat-ing at Madrid the termination of the judicial inquiry. Rubio is taking care of him. Rubio is a Republican Deputy for Seville, one of the Infanta's seconds, and was very hostile to my brother, but became his friend upon the ground. I have been shown a letter from a Spaniard who is not a friend of Montpensier, but he describes the conduct of my brother upon the ground in terms which have brought tears into my eyes. Who would have told me this,' cried Montpensier, 'I who would never learn fencing, nor the use of pistols, and who hold duelling and the punishment of death in horror: I have done my duty, and have only sought to avoid a misfortune. God's will be done.' In haste, yours, HENNED' OBLEANS."
