At nine o'clock on the following morning a portion of the Prince's party steamed across the Bay in the launch, with the view of landing at Mudur, but although the little craft drew only 3½ feet, it was found impossible to take her across the bar: and accordingly the steam-whistle was sounded, and in a short time a fleet of boats came out of the river on which Mudur is situated, and into these the passengers and luggage were transhipped and taken on shore, the launch returning to the "Galatea." A halt having been made during the heat of the day, the encampment was reached easily by five o'clock, the royal party coming in soon after dusk.

This encampment, which is the principal of several, is situated at the west end of the Allai Tank—afine piece of water, the bund and sluices of which have recently been renewed, with a view to the extension of paddy cultivation in the neighbourhood. Mr. MacBride has had the work in his charge, with Mr. Varian under him. The only portion of the work remaining in hand is a canal or water-course, to be open-ed from the Pootoor end of the tank in the direction of Mudur, where there is a great deal

of waste land suitable for paddy.

The encampment is prettily situated on the edge of the tank, but the face of the lake is so completely covered and hid by long grass that, seen from a short distance, it has all the appearance of an immense tract of grazing ground. The water is in many places twenty feet deep, and teems with alligators of a very hungry kind, and musquitoes equally voracious and rather more aggravating in their tendencies. The ride out here from Mudur was pleasant enough, barring the heat, which was very trying. There was a breeze it is true but it came upon you over many a hot league of sandy scrub, and without it. A hastily improvised breakfast having been partaken of, the sporting portion of the party disposed of them-selves in various directions for different game, of which abundance was reported in the shape of elephants, buffaloes, pigs, deer, and alligators, pea-fowl, &c., the only question regarding which there appeared to be any doubt was as to the locality in which the largest game was likely to be found. The day's sport did not prove very first-class, in fact it was regarded more as a trial for "spoor" with a view to determine future proceedings. One party came across a number of deer, but owing to the color of their clothes being too light, they did not succeed in getting within reach of them. Another party went out on the tank in quest of duck, but did nothing beyond making themselves uncomfortably warm and exceedingly thirsty. A third party got Pea-fowl and pigs; whilst a fourth, making a long detour quite round the tank, a distance of fully twenty miles, managed to pick up pigs, deer and pea-fowl. The latter did not come into camp until nearly two o'clock, having had a hot and weary tramp since five o'clock, and being quite ready for "Soda-and-C—" and a bath.

Corbet and Tyndall.

At the date of our last summary for Europe At the date of our last summary for Europe the Prince was on the Plains of Bopatalawa enjoying Elk hunting, in which he met with much success; five "kills" having been had during one day and a half, of which two fell to the Duke's knife. The weather was exceedingly fine, and every one enjoyed the sports and the amusements provided, the Planters of Dick Oya and Dimboola each entertaining His Royal Highness at Dinner.

On his return to Kandy the Prince held a reception of the Ladies of Kandian Chiefs, which was well attended; the families of the Native Headmen appearing to be well pleased at the opportunity thus afforded them of being introduced fo and conversing with His Royal Highness. Such a gathering has not taken place within the memory of present residents in Ceylon, and we can only hope that this means of bringing forward the female members of high native families from their time-honored seclusion may be repeated on future occasions.

Of not less significance was the Entertain-All were agreeably surprised at the coolness of the weather, which they had expected to find hotter than in Colombo. There was a steady, and, at times, a strong breeze blowing ment given in nonor of this Royal Tagana by the De Soyza family, at their mansion at Bagatelle, on the 22nd ultimo, at which the Prince, the Governor, Lady Robinson, and the best Colombo Society were present, together with a large gathering from the Central At one o'clock His Royal Highness went on Board the "Forte" to pay the usual complimentary visit to the Commodore, the re-

This same family of De Soyza have quite ecently distinguished themselves for a munificent appropriation of ten thousand pounds for the establishment of a Model experimenta imental Farm, for the purpose of effecting improvements in Native Agriculture,—a patriotism which has been acknowledged by the bestowal of rank and honors on the uncle and nephew. A few words as to the family and their history. The original founder of the House was the late Jeronis Soysa, who inherited no fortune. At an early age he showed signs of enterprise and industry. He was the first man who left Morotto for the Kandian

country. He began by a contract to supply firewood to the Government, and, afterwards fresh contracts to supply rice and paddy. Having profited by these means he turned his attention to Arrack farms, which were by degrees extended to the entire Kandyan District. His upright conduct brought him to the notice of the Honorable George Turnour, Agent of the Central Province.

Subsequently he became the purchaser of the Hangurankettia Coffee Estate, which pro-

ving a very profitable investment, paved the way to his after success in life. He afterwards became the owner of other Coffee properties. and gradually invested largely in house and landed property in Kandy, Colombo, and elsewhere. He was made a Modliar of the Governor's gate by Sir George Anderson, which he retained to his death in 1862, having in the meantime largely increased his fortune by the cultivation of his estates, and having erected in the meantime the Morotto Church-at a cost of £8,000.

Some of the high-caste Singalese have expressed themselves angrily, that a person of so little aristocratic origin as Mr De Soysa should presume to invite a Prince of the Royal Famiy to an entertainment at his house, and in conformity with this "Caste" feeling abstained from attending. One of their number—the Rev. S. Dias—going so far as to return the invitation.
The Prince has however shewn, by attending the party, that with the British Government all such distinctions as those springing from Caste are ignored, the only claims to distinction being based on honorable conduct and in dustrious enterprise. In this regard the De Soysas are certainly entitled to consideration, and they have received it.

In another column will be found very full particulars of a serious breach of the peace, and an attack in open day upon the Police barracks by a mob of Moormen, whose religious fanaticism had been excited by a Mahomedan woman having renounced her religion in order to marry a Singhalese man-a Roman Catholic. Application was made to the Supreme Court to compel the girl's return to her mother's house, but the Court saw that she would not have been safe amongst Mussulmans any more, and in the exercise of its discretion refused to coerce her. She and her lover were kept in the barracks for protection, and hence the attack of the mob, led on by three Europeans who, with five others, have recently professed the faith of the Prophet. The attack was easily repulsed, but not untill the Inspector-General and some of his men had been severely injured, and windows and doors smashed. The ringleaders were taken, and have since been committed for trial. The leading moormer of course repudiate any knowledge of their countrymen's intention, and all sympathy with their violence. The two lovers have since retired to Morotto where the young man's friends live, and where they are comparatively

To those who may hear the real story, the proceeding may probably suggest an act of sacrifice to the well-known "god of the grass lands"—the deity of hunting-fields and edible ruminants; for, after all, the native mind may not see much distinction between hu ting the deer and cutting the hair. The planters may, indeed, connect the ducking with some previous act of discourtesy towards one or other of their body, and trace in the circumstances the semblance of poetical justice. But, on the whole, it is a pleasure to know that, in all their dealings, the Planters are guided by so strict a sense of regard for the Law, that they lose no time in punishing even an infringement of the the target of regard to the Law, that the property of the Laws of Sport, and that with them a contempt of Laws of Sport, and that with them a contempt of Court is dealt with as summarily in the open Fields, as it would have been in the Hall of Justice. LAW INTELLIGENCE.

IN THE MATTER OF THE HABEAS CORPUS DI-RECTED FOR THE PRODUCTION OF THE BODY OF ONE MEENATCHY.

Colombo, April 22nd, 1870. The Supreme Court must decline to make order for the delivery of Meenatchy to her mother, and the said Meenatchy is therefore at liberty to depart,

thither she pleases.

The writ of Habeas Corpus was obtained by The writ of Habeas Corpus was obtained by the mother of Meenatchy on an application that she was detained against her will by the man with whom she is living. On questioning the girl herself, it appears that this is not the case, but that on the contrary she is determined to remain with the man, and not return to her mother.

The question therefore is, whether the girl should be delivered over to her mother against her will, and in considering this point we had first to determine her age. Evidence was then called to prove that she was under twelve, but we attached little weight to it, and were inclined to believe from her appearance that she was at least

believe from her appearance that she was at least fourteen years old. But a Cadootam has been produced which proves that the marriage of her father and mother took place on the the 31st Jany. 1856; she must therefore want some months of having completed her fourteenth year.

Such being the case, we should have thought it incumbent on us, in compliance with the authority of the Court of Queen's Bench in the case or Alicia Race, which has been before acted on by this Court, to have ordered the restoration of Meenatchy to her mother, if no special circumstances had existed to take the case out of the general rule there laid down.

But it appears to us that Meenatchy, if sent

But it appears to us that Meenatchy, if sent back to reside with her mother, would incur such serious danger from the excited state of the Mohametan population of the neighbourhood, that we feel bound to exercise the discretion which understands the leaves the miscretion which understands and the serious seri doubtedly belongs to us in this matter, by refusing to place the girl in a position of such peril and constant terror, were we should be unable to

protect her.

To this conclusion we are brought, not by evidence heard or affidavits laid before us, but by our own observations of the conduct and demeanour of the Mahometan population, who thronged the Court and its approaches during the hearing

of the case.

A body of Police had to be in attendance to a number of about 50, and the girl had to b A body of Police had to be in attendance to the number of about 50, and the girl had to be brought to and from Court under a strong escort. Order was with difficulty maintained in Court, and we were frequently interrupted by the tumult outside. When the Court was adjourned, an attempt was made, as we were leaving the bench, to gain forcible poissession of the persen of the girl, in which her mother joined, and which the Police had to repel. Some of the respectable Moorish inhabitants were observed endeavouring to preserve order, and the Court has pleasure in recording the fact, but these endeavours were only partially successful. The girl cannot always have this body guard of Police about her, and the Court would not be justified in sending her to live unprotected, in the midst of a population so hostile and so excited. In the case of Alicia Race cited above, the Court stated that it would not have made the order to restore the infant to her mother, if in so doing any risk of endangering her morals had been incurred. This shews, that in granting or refusing the order, the Court has a discretion to exercise, and the personal danger which the girl would incur, seems to us a sufficient reason for refusing to make the order. It is with regret that we feel ourselves oblige to speak thus of a large body of persons, and we charge no one with a deliberate design to injure the girl while

for refusing to make the order. It is with regret that we feel ourselves oblige to speak thus of a large body of persons, and we charge no one with a deliberate design to injure the girl, but whilst this excitement continues it is impossible to foresee in what acts of violence it may result.

This Court has always protected the Mahometan inhabitants of this town in the peaceable exercise of their religion, and not long ago severely punished persons of other denominations, for an insult offered to their religious worship; but we are equally bound to protect from them those of their communion who may deliberately choose to adopt another creed.

SIR,—Much has been done towards the amalgamation of Caste in Ceylon, since the capture of the Island by the British, but there is yet much to be done for the consummation of this desirable object. It is a mistake, however, to suppose that the Wellalas are the only upholders of Caste. This being the acknowledged highest caste in the Island, it may lead many to believe that a Wellala in Ceylon is what the Brahmin is in India: but it must be admitted by every one who has taken any notice on the working of the Caste system, that the Wellalas are very tolerant and more courteous, to those of an inferior Caste than the other sections of the Sinhalese nation, into which it is unfortunately divided. Caste is perpetuated in this country, by the jealousy of the inferior Castes, who have particular caste customs and observances to preserve their own dignity, and that of those whom they serve. They are more strict observers of caste, than the Wellalas. Sir Emerson Tennent in his history of Ceylon asserts that a Rhediya of Redwilled district of the caste of SIR,-Much has been done towards the amal-Emerson Tennent in his history of Coylon asserts that a Rhodiya of Badulla district (an outcaste of Emerson Tennent in his 'history of Ceylon asserts that a Rhodiya of Badulla district (an outcaste of Ceylon) would tie up his dog, when a wedding takes place at a neighbouring Embettay's house, that his dog may not be degraded by going there. Dr. Cardwell in a paper appended to his Dravidian Comparative Grammar on the Pariars of Southern India, observes "It is not generally known by those Europeans, who sympathize in the wrongs of the Pariars that whenever they have an opportunity, the Pariars deal out the very same treatment to the members of Castes which are inferior to their own, e. g. the caste of shoe-makers and the low caste washerman, that they are equally with the higher castes filled with that compound of pride of birth, exclusiveness and iealousy which, is called Caste feeling, and that there is no contest, for precedence amongst the higher castes, of longer standing, or of a more eager character, than that which is carried on between the Pariars and Pullars. In the insane dispute about pre-eminence, which is always being carried on in Southern India "between the right hand and left hand Castes, the Pariars' range themselves on the right hand and the Pullars on the left, and it is chiefly, by these two Castes, that the fighting part of the controversy is transacted. Such of my countrymen who truly believe, that God has made of one blood, all nations of men for to dwell on the face of the earth deplore this state of things. There area very few Sinhalese men

for to dwell on the face of the earth deplore this state of things. There are a very few Sinhalese men, scattered here and there, who believe that Caste is an evil, but this number being very few, they are not able to withstand the mighty force set against them, nor can they make any sensible impression on national customs which have prevailed for ages in the land. ages in the land.

The different Castes in India and Ceylon have lived for upwards of two thousand years without being co-mingled like oil and water in the same vessel. "For ages there has been no intermarriages

vessel. "For ages there has been no intermarriages no common bond of sympathy, rank has become hereditary as well as Caste, and no not only rank but even intellect, temperament, character and physical characteristics. In consequence of the separation of caste from caste for so many ages, through the prohibition of intermarriages, unmistakable points of difference both in features and in mental temperament have been developed." Any attentive reader of the Revd Mr. Hardy's Jubilee Memorial of the Wesleyan Mission in Ceylon, may see that he admits the above facts to some extent of such castes which came under his some extent of such castes which came under his notice. A native Sinhalese will in most cases be notice. A native Sinhalese will in most cases be able to say, to what caste a man belongs to by looking attentively at his features. The long continued operation of Caste in Ceylon has given to men of different castes, features which can be discovered by an experienced eye with much precision; in the face of such astounding facts, one cannot wonder at the slow progress which is made in the downfall of caste. Its days are however numbered, fall it must, but this will be the work of time. Much of the baneful influences of caste. bered, tall it must, but this will be the work of time. Much of the baneful influences of caste have been effased by the Missionary efforts and the spread of good education, but it is to be pitied the spread of good education, but it is to be pitied that some educated people confounding the grade of society which prevail more or less among all civilized nations, with the caste customs of the Hindus, have made the Sinhalese caste system more anomalous and ridiculous. These customs or laws being less understood by the low country Sinhalese, they generally have a greater pride of caste than the Kandians. From several facts which have fallen within the reach of my observation, I can vouch for the truth of what I assert. The grandson of an Adigar a Ratemahatmaya The grandson of an Adigar a Ratemahatmaya The grandson of an Adigar a Ratemahatmaya, has not thought it derogatory, to marry a low-country Sinhalese lady, members of whose family are regarded as belonging to the so-called second class, by the high caste men of Colombo. The men of superior castes in the Western Province, are greater upholders of caste than those in the Southern. This is perhaps owing to their more affluent circumstances than the Southerns, and their confounding of what is called pride of ancestry and foreign customs with caste laws or customs.

The Thames Conservancy Board, influenced by the high encomiums specially passed upon them by both the Oxford and Harvard crews on the occasion of that great race, determined to adopt the same course on this occasion by permitting only two steamers to accompany—one conveying the umpire, the other the representative of the press. The small steamer of the Thames Conservancy did good service in clearing the course; but the police were chiefly aided by a steam launch lent them by Messrs. Yarrow & Hedley, of the Isle of Dogs, to wh in therefore the public are largely, if indirectly, indebted for the supression of a good deal of the rowdyism that has frequently been too conspicuous on such occasions. For the third time since the establishment of this contest His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales honoured the race with his presence. He was accompanied by His S-rene Highness Prince Leiningen, the Prince of Teck, Prince Hassan, and Lord Alfred Paget. The Royal party occupied a space in the bow of the umpire's boat, and in the geneeal excitement that prevailed remained incog for some time.

LIFE AFTER DEATH.—The Cosmos gives an account of certain experiments made by two French doctors on the head of the particide Belière, who was recently executed at Beauvais. You can take the first sheet of paper that comes to hand, and, after stating the relationship existing between you and the person to be incarcerated, make a demand for his admission.
