SMALL BEGINNINGS.

It is instructive to note with what small beginnings, on what apparently insignificant foundation some of the most important work of the world is accomplished. A liberal and enlightened Sinhalese family, unconnected with the traditionary aristocracy of the country, have set apart a lakh of rupees for the establishment of a Model Farm, destined at no distant date to revolutionise not merely the agricultural processes of the people, but their condition.

Let us see whence this movement arose The scarcity of rice in certain parts of the island induced Mr. Smith, a late unofficial member of Council to move for an en-quiry into Irrigation and Rice Cultivation. The report of that Committee led eventually, after much writing in the newspapers, to the institution of an enquiry into the kindred question of Cattle Disease: the report of that second Committee, only a few months before the public, strongly urged the adoption of various improvements in Agriculture, pointing to the institution of a Model Farm. Before the government could act on these suggestions, as we have reason for knowing was their intention, the De Soyzas came forward and took up the matter in a spirit which leaves no room for doubt as to its ultimate success. There is so much to be accomplished in Ceylon in the matter of agricultural improvements that almost anything that can be done in that direction must be pro-ductive of good results. Never until now have the people of this country appeared likely to be able to escape from their old-world habits and practices. Without a teacher, without example, a race of cultivators who had been accustomed to follow the practices and usages of antiquity could scarcely be expected to emerge from the systems of the past. If we add to the strong influences of prejudice and caste, the disheartning incubus of oppression and the overwhelming weight of disasters from unfavourable seasons, we can form some opinion as to the deterrent influences at work against any chance of agricultural improvement. To effect reforms in farming we need not only the requisite knowledge, but a certain amount of means. Cultivators struggling for dear life are not likely to turn their attention to such matters as experimental farming, or

new processes or implements. We have stated on more than one occasion that the readiness of the Sinhalese to adopt improvements in certain directions where they ee the practical results, will undoubtedly be followed in other matters whenever the successful issue is placed before them. Let them once see how easy it is to carry on agricultura operations on right principles, and with better results, and there need be no fear of lack of imitators. We have no manner of doubt that a properly conducted Farm established for the purpose indicated, will before very long become to a great extent self-supporting. know nothing of the plan of operations proposed to be adopted, possibly none has yet been decided upon. The farm may be worked by a Committee, or by a single Director, but this is quite certain, that it should be readily accessible and that it should embrace the three distinct objects of improvements in grain, grasses, and cattle, which necessarily include improved implements. But above all it should be remembered what is needed in such a country as Ceylon is not so much great achieve ments, startling experiments, as small beginnings in improvements, such changes as can be easily appreciated and readily adopted by native cultivators. In India it has too frequently happened that progress has been bar-red by attempting too much. Enthusiastic philanthropists have introduced the English Plough and Harrow, and marvelled that the people did not adopt them, whereas what was really required and what would have been acceptable was a slight modification of the country plough suitable to the use of country In the same way numerous experiments have been made with Carolina Paddy in the expectation of important results: in some instances the yield has been great, but as a rule it has failed because it needed special man-agement, whereas all that should have been ttempted was a change of seed, a few fresh and better varieties changed year by year, from district to district. These improvements are practicable, and they will surely be successful hundred and twenty-five years of age, though we believe they will do as much for Ceylon

culture as irrigation, and go far to change the

But however it passes Peradenia free of tolls, present renter there perhaps is afraid to stop a public vehicle and enquire whether it carries mails or not. As I intend to purchase the Toll Rent for next year, and apprehend that the same trick may be played upon me by the Coach Proprietor, and as I do not wish to lose money on any account, having very little left (after purchase of Coffee properties and horse flesh) I wish you will make it public through the medium of your journal the above fact, so that the Government Agent whom I intend to petition on the subject, should I succeed in getting the rent next year, although I lost it this year, take notice of it, and issue orders to recover tolls from all vehicles not conveying mails, and thus prevent people from imposing upon poor renters, (with the mean object of saving a couple of rupees a day) renters who come from a great distance to get a living who can ill-afford to lose a couple of rupees every day, if they can honestly make it instead. Spain.—There was an exciting scene in the Spanish Cortes on April 2nd, caused by the Deputy Senor Capdevielle coolly entering and assuming his former seat. It had been supposed that he was in France or Naples, whither he had field on the failure of the late Republican insurrection in which he was a leader, and in his absence had been condemned to death by a Council of War. Senors Figueras, Castelar, and several others tried to persuade him to retire, but he farmly refused. The agitation was increased by Rivero and many other deputies conferring with the President, the latter taking no official notice of Capdeviella's presence in the Cortes. Eventually, after great pressure, he retired to the President's room. The Cortes subsequently held a secret session, and he left in a coach about seven o'clock, according to some statements for Gerona, to be delivered over to the military tribunal which sentenced him; but other reports are to the effect that he left for the frontier, to be allowed to escape. The general impression is that he is insane. General Prim was absent through indisposition. It is generally reported that the Deputy Capdeviella escaped from custody with the connivance of the authorities.

Sun'lay, April 5th, being the day appointed for drawing of lots for the conscription, the results were vermad peacefully in most parts of the country, but there were serious from some places. In Malaga some ponce-officers were wounded. In Salmanaca, Torders, Huen's, and Castellon crowds of people broke into the places where the drawing in the two letter towns they destroyed the bailot sma. The province has been declared in a state of siege. The troops remain loyal. It is rumoured that outbreaks have occurred at Cadiz and Valencia, but these reports want confirmation, the telegraphic communication being interrupted. The Ministerial crisis has now terminated. Senor Echegarry remains in office.

The insurgents at Barcelona having cut the telegraph wire, no news has been received from that place; barricades had been arected at Jarcia, asshurb of Barcelona.

ITALY.—Two of the Fathers attending the Roman Council have been the cause of a serious commotion at one of the late sittings in consequence of their sillogy of Protestants. Cardinal Schwarzenberg and Monsigner Streamayer denounced from the tribune and characterised as simply sideous those panous of the revised echeme De Fide which anattematise Protestants. Both prelates are said to have spoken very eloquently, and to have agreed in the view that all addresses to the Protestant Church must henceforth be made in a spirit of conciliation. A scene of tumult ensued, and ultimately the legates were obliged to dissolve the assembly.

Great excitement has been occasioned owing to three English ladies being expelled from Rome. They are single women, not relatives, but travelling together, and for the second time spending the the winter at the Eternal City. A few days ago, between eleven and trealve at right, they were disturbed by a visit from three gendames and one police agent, who proceeded to a rigorous search of their lodgings, entering every room and inspecting every place where it was possible that any thing or person could be concealed. AMERICA.—The public feeling in America with regard to the loss of the Oneida, is one of strong indignation and censure. In response to a resolution of the House of Representatives, the secretary of the Navy transmitted the information in his possession relative to the loss of the Odeida. The Secretary says, from an examination of the testimony before the court of inquiry, and evidence in the possession of the department, and also of the testimony of the master, Yates, the officer on board the Oueida, at the collision, it is the opinion of the department that the Oneida, when she was struck, was steaming her proper course out to sea from the harbour; that the ship was well commanded; that the discipline on board was good; and that all necessary precautions had been taken by her commander to insure the safe navigation of the vessel and prevent a collision. The rules of the read were conformed to agreeably to regulations of the United States Navy, and no blame attached to the officers or crew of the Oneida for the collision. The Secretary says it is secreted by the captain and some officers of the Rombay that the Rombay, on rounding Kanonsaki Point, approached the Oneida ahead, or a little on the port bow, and then took a course which would have carried her well clear of the Oneida. This assertion is, in the opinion of the department, inconsistent with the real result of their evidence when closely examined, and it is forced to the conclusion, on evidence now before it, that this disaster occurred through the bad navigation of the Bombay. No means appear to have been taken by the captain of the Bombay to render any assistance to the Oneida, although it seems inevitable that he should have had reason to suppose that damage had been done which was serious and dangerous.
