UPPER AND MIDDLE.

The London Correspondent of the Times of India, writing to that journal of the "Marathon Massacre," as the murders in Greece are termed in sensational England, says "the excitement will not surprise you, for two of "the murdered men were persons of condition. "There was a brother of Lord Carnarvon, and "a brother of Lady De Grev and Ripon among "them. If they had been Browns and Joneses "from the Minories, the case would doubtless "have been different. It is assuredly, a very "dreadful business—but to those who remem-" ber the wholesale massacres of the Indian "rebellion of 1857, it seems but a small mat-"ter. The excitement, which now exists "amongst us, is out of all proportion to that, "which I can remember in the Indian massacre days, when the relative extent of the butchery is considered. But the Indian victims were principally of the niddle classes." No noble houses were thrown into mourning. 'No cabinet-ministers or ex-cabinet ministers "had to deplore the loss of brethren, by affi-"nity or consanguinity. Our people were "massacred by hundreds, and their names were but little mentioned. The magnitude "of the crime prevented specification, and detracted from its individual horrors—and "yet the victims were much more innocent of

"having provoked their attacks upon them by
"any indiscretion of their own."
We can endorse every word of the above,
but more than that, it should be remembered
that when a cry for retribution arose throughout the length and breadth of India, we were taunted as cowards, craven-hearts, blood-thirsty alarmists and also reminded that the Sepoys were "men and brothers!" So much for the distinction drawn between the Upper and Middle

THE UNCIVIL MEDICAL DEPART-

Another instance of great remissness of duty, on the part of our Civil Medical Authorities, was lately brought to our notice by the Captain of the *Emma Ash*. It was the case of a Sailor who had fallen down the hold of his ship, and injured himself badly. He was taken to the government hospital for seamen, by the Chief Officer of the vessel, and for some unexplained reason refused admittance and taken back to the Fort. The Captain of the "Emma Ash" then conveyed the disabled man a second time to the hospital, when he was admitted. There must be some gross neglect or ignorance, and both are culpable, to account for this state of things, though penhaps it may to a great extent be explained by the perfect immunity accorded a former medical delinquent through the friendly intervention of the Chief of the Department. But there must be an end of this sort of thing; an inefficient Police force affects only our pro an inefficient Police force anects only our pro-perty, but negligent Medical officers touch us in life and limb, and earn for us an unenviable notoriety. We advise the Commander of the "Emma Ash" to make a direct represen-

Since writing the above, we have learnt that the regular Medical Officer of the Hospital was at the time absent on leave : it is urged on behalf of the subordinate officials in charge, that they are bound by the strictest depart-mental order to refuse admission to any patient who does not bring a guarantee for re-imbursement of expenses whilst in hespital. Surely this should not be enforced in cases of want of a formal document, which was never demanded, a poor man with a broken arm and an earhalf severed from the head, was sent away in agony from a Government Hospital which is supported at public cost. It is a most discreditable business: the only case which at all approaches it in absurdity, is that of the punctilious gentleman, who decimed to save a fellow creature from drowning on the plea that he had never been introduced to him!

heads, and declare there is no remedy for this state of things, and that small farming in Ceylon would not pay. This is usually the cry amongst people who know not how to remedy an evil. I don't mean to say that all the things to which I have alluded. say that all the things to which I have alluded, may be accomplished off-hand. I am quite aware of all the difficulties in the way. But I am certain such things will pay, not perhaps Europeans with enlarged notions of things but the natives of the country, Burghers and others who may be content with moderate competencies.

The Great, Galle Harbour question, and every other subject of ordinary local importance, faded into insignificance before the one all-absorbing fact—the Queen's second son was in Ceylon! The intense enthusiasm, that prevailed might almost lead one to believe that by this Royal visit the colonists felt themselves at length in some degree compensated and rewarded for the exemplary patience with which they ed for the exemplary patience with which they have so long borne an exorbitant military contribu-

ed for the exemplary patience with which they have so long borne an exorbitant military contribution, and put up with a sham Legislative Council. It is, satisfactory to find that the keen sense of wrong that is undoubtedly felt among nearly all classes in reference to the policy adopted towarde Ceylon by the Home Governmenr, has in no degree dulled the edge of their loyalty. Political differences sink out of sight before such loyalty as most British subjects feel towards their Sovereign and her family. It is pleasing to learn, and must be a source of much congratulation to the colonists, that no such petty jealousies and bickerings as arose out of the Duke's visit to Singapore happened to mar the success of his tour in Ceylon. The manner of his reception at the two places exhibits a very marked contrast. At Singapore, the extraordinary conduct of the Governor had the effect of keeping the residents quite in the background, so that the distinguished visitor on his landing found nothing to receive him but a beggarly array of empty benches.
