



# LOCAL ORIENTAL LITERATURE.

I take this occasion to congratulate you on the increased facilities for communicaof the second part of the Asiatic Society's Journal for 1867-1870, and we now take the opportunity of offering to our readers a short eview of the contents of that journal, while we tender to those who have the management of the Society our cordial congritulations on the new life which appears to have been introduc-ed into the half-dead remains of what was once worthy of general support. We trust that this vitality may be enduring, and that we may not have to bemoan the death of this, as of many other Societies, in the Island. think it well, however, to warn the Society against allowing its journal to be the receptacle of polemics. The object of the Society is to nvestigate, but not to declaim, and we may be permitted to express some regret at the appearance of the paper on the Parajika, of which the Rev. Mr. Coles is the author. We have Max Müller's authority for stating that translations of portions of the Jampatakas are much to be desired, and we are happy to learn that such translations are in preparation. At the same time we take exception to Mr. Cole's introductory essay, as well as to the loose English in which that essay and the translations are written. It is to be regretted that the phraseology, and diction of the church of England should be sneeringly applied to Buddhu. The reverend author, of whose production we are speaking, applies the term "Chief Shepherd" to Gautama, though in no part of any Buddhistical writings, so far as we can learn, is he so termed. The extraordinary melange of tenses in the following sentence almost worthy of the consideration of pedagogues seeking phrases "to be corrected" by their pupils: "He claims here the power not only to legislate but also to execute, and was the judge to give sentence when any one of his laws had been violated." Again, to translate "Methuna Dhanema Parajika," "the cohabiting Parajika" is simple nonsense, unless indeed, Mr. Coles intends that the Parájika cohabited. We have some faint idea that this is not his meaning. We will not quarrel with Mr. Coles' statement that penances "can possibly have no deterring effect on crime" though we might, had he written "cannot possibly

have any deterring effect on crime." We have carefully read the translations of the Parajika by Mr. Coles, and we cannot meet with a single line which bears out his statement that the most abominable crimes were judged to be less heinous than others for which some excuse might be found in natural desires and the force of temptation. We have not space, nor have we time to remark on the extraordinary ideas of crime presented here for consideration, though we might casually remark that we have not yet met with a graduated scale of sin and its punishment. Mr. Coles makes statements to Madras and back without calling here for out by the translations, and we would call upon him to give to the world the writings on which those statements are founded. It is not easy to discover any real hardship in this proceeding, yet we learn that it has excited an unpleasant feeling amongst native dealers whilst some of our Mercantile Firms consider that a longer period should have been allowed by the Banks before the operation of their new regulation, a position which does not appear very strong when we know that fourteen days would be ample time to allow for a reply from India. This divergence of opinion might perhaps have been obviated had the Bank Managers and the Mercantile Firms discussed the matter between them before adopting this new rule, as it is generally inconvenient to act first and discuss afterwards. In the meantime our import trade in Cotton goods languishes, and stocks accumulate.

THE PROGRESS OF THE "ENTERPRIZE."-A very excitable correspondent writes to its from Happutalla, the following remarkable account of the passage of the Traction Engine through that elevated district. He says:—"You will doubtless be glad to receive from an im-partial correspondent a reliable account of the dealers have found themselves placed in a situation of some embarassment. Merchants at the same time, have shewn less disposition to the day before last week was a fortnight; any passage of the Traction Engine through our

casual traveller might have seen the Road Steamer slowly approaching the bottom of the Haputala pass road. On reaching the first Estate on the Pass—The macfiddle of that ilk was seen on the look out, attended by numerous duinewassels who were all clad—as indeed was the chiefhimself, in philibegs and paper collars, their legs being neatly painted with the tartan of the clan. The chief wildly waving his pibroch, hailed the steamer, and wanted to know, why the deuce they had nt brought up that cask of whisky of his, from Toombatenne. The ngineer in charge was understood to reply— Sure and he used it to light the fires" and consequently he didnt need wood. A planter who was apparently looking at the engine through the bottom of a tumbler, here remarked why not try chaff, while some one on the lower side of the road, was heard to mutter "Walker." A few hundred yards beyond this, the whole concern was on the point of tunning over a Bank, when a cry of, "The Campbells are coming" was suddenly heard, and the accident was prevented by the timely appearance of the worthy manager, who was seen rushing out with a cheque in each hand, which he ap-plied to the fore wheels of the engine, thereby nstantly checking its progress.

Here some disturbance was caused by Mr.

C—n of the Roads department, who wanted to mount the engine, which he proposed riding barebacked up the Pass. The Engineer however objected to such a disgraceful exhibition, whereupon Mr. C—n suggested that they should all go and liquor at B——l's. This being done, a triumphal arch was formed of the empty bottles---under which the Steamer---its boile having been filled with cooly gin on account of the steepness of the road—safely passed. On arriving near B—t—e Estate a deputation consisting of the Brothers Cheeryble met the procession. They wanted to bet anybody anything with sixpenny points and ties paying the dealer, that they would walk up the Pass on crutches the citizen wine and light crutches, shooting snipe all the way, and lick the engine all to smithercens. The stakes were to be deposited at the butchers shop which they were just passing. Some of the contents of the boiler being drawn off and impartially distributed, order was again restored, and progress was made as far as Kalupahani Estate; on nearing which however Mr. P-o rushee out with anguish depicted on his countenance and insisted that the fire of the Engine should be extinguished while passing through that Estate, at the same time coolies were observed dragging out a portable fire-engine, with which they at once commenced to play on the road steamer. The Engineer however with great presence of mind, turned on the waste pipe, which hitting Mr. P. in the stomach, doubled

him up, and forced him to retreat.

Half a mile further up a visiting Agent was seen in the distance, some Estate Reports were immediately put in the fire, and extra steam having been thereby got up a chase was com-menced—on coming up with him it was ascertained that he was a member of a respectable K—y firm, he was therefore merely mercifully run over, at the same time being told that it was uncommonly lucky for him that he didn't belong to the C. C. or he would'nt have got off so easily. This occurrence took place in Blackwood Estate, the Superintendent of which was requested to come down and bury the body, but he replied that he couldn't possibly leave the Estate without a berry on it which was "bery natural"—no further interruptions taking place till near the top of the Pass when a gentleman was seen in the middle of the road apparently struggling with some-thing on three legs. He was next observed to put his head in a bag, and from within its ecesses was heard to shout, now then, stand out of the way, he was ultimately persuaded to be quiet. After a few seconds, he was informed that "it was all over," and he was allowed to proceed, at length the Haputala Rest House was safely reached—where some sugar and lime-juice having been put in through the safety valve, the boiler was emptied of its contents. Mr. C-—n being at last gratified by permission to sit astride the boiler, and lead the cheers with a Hip-Hip-Hurrah for the Road Engine, which was allowed by all to be a Succés De-Steam."

MY DEAR BYRDE, -There are two questions (both MY DEAR BYRDE,—There are two questions (both connected with manuring) which are interesting me much, and on which I should be glad to profit by the experience of others; and I have no doubt many planters would be glad to get information on these points. They are, to what extent and in what proportions, can Bone dust and Poonac be applied without stimulating the trees injuriously? Bone dust alone has on the Borders, put on one of the finest crops I ever saw.

Secondly.—What proved good effects in increased bearing, having result from the application of wood-ash? I am applying this considerably, but should like to hear definite reports of the benefit wrought by it, elsewhere. It is a cheap manure easily prepared and easily applied.

The Borders, 24rd May, 1870. To THE SECRETARY OF THE PLANTERS' ASSOCIATION DEAR SIR,—I doubt if I shall be able to attend the meeting of Committee to-morrow, so I send in herewith a few notes of what I have observed of

the trees appear, as yet, to be suffering from it. I consider the crop is nearly double what it is on the unmanured portions of the same field. How Bonedust would answer, alone, for a succession of years on small trees, I am not in a position to state, but its good effect in bringing out crop on large, but sluggish, trees in undeniable. Woodash alone, 2 measures to a tree, and on one field 3 lbs. to a tree has produced a very fine crop, giving perhaps 4 cwts. an acre additional. In company with two other old planters, I examined some days ago, a field so manured; we estimated the crop at least double that on an adjoining field, unmanured. Say double that on an adjoining field, unmanured. Say in the one case, I to 9 cwts an agre, in the other 4, manured abut a year ago. As Bonedust alone, and wood-ash alone, produce such good effects, I do not think I can go wrong in mixing them; I intend to apply this season (especially on all my high fields, where the crop is not in proportion to the fine large trees) over 30 tons of Bonedust, in the following reconstitutes 1 lb Reconstructed. fine large trees) over 30 tons of Bonedust, in the following proportions \$\frac{1}{2}\$ lb Bonedust and one measure (heaped) of Wood-ash to a tree. I believe this mixture has also the approval of our late Chairman, Mr. Wall, who has studied the subject of manures (especially of the two specified) most carefully. But I shall be very glad to learn any information on the subject that may be elicited at the meeting to-morrow.

The Weather continues mild, but we have had more days on which rain has fallen since the departure of last English main than since the departure of last English main than since the year commenced. It is soaking the ground nicely. Even thirsty Doombera has had its drink; and the denizens of that dry region are now filled with gratifude and gladness at the prospect of an enormous crop. The blossom that they feared was lost, chiefly that of April having been not dead, but sleeping with the late rains has swelled into fine healthy berries. It will make the crop late: but better late than never.

The Old Crop must be now about all gone as we see very little on the roads: and that little is from those late districts which send their crop forward in driblets all over the year.

The new crop most people are now convinced, is to be a short one: and it also will be late. There is no work of any moment going on, on the Plantations, so that those Superintendents whose employers allow them to leave their Estates without permission or with it, rnight fairly and reasonably enough be now enjoying their holiday.

The Season altogether has more of a growing look about it than anything we have had for years, and except the six weeks of dry weather, we had during April and May, we have not been a week without rain, for a year past or since the S. W. Monsoon of last year commenced—say about the 20th of May, 1869.

Coffee continues very depressed and many Proprietors participate in the feeling.

The Ownah Crop seems to be giving Kandy the go-by this season, as very little is coming in and that little considerably mixed. Prices too, though low at home are considerably higher than would correspond at this end, 36/ at 38/ and 39/ are now being paid in Kandy for Native which is selling in England at 48/ !!!

The shippers must know a way of living upon their losses.

Parkment is hardly on offer and when obtainable fetches io/ at 10/15 per Bushel in Kandy.

Rice sells at 67 to 6/6 according to quality. It has not been so cheap for many ye

SUPERINTENDENT'S HOLIDAYS. DEAR SIR .- I have seen the discussion in the

Times on the above subject and as it is a deeply interesting one to all concerned with coffee and who in Ceylon is not? I hope to be allowed a word on the subject. It is amusing to read the different opinions expressed, but to me it seems that there can be no argument on the matter. A man is paid, purchased if you like, to devote his whole time and energy to the supervision of a Coffee, or any other, property, and if he neglects to do so, and spends his time, his employer's time in running about frisking and consequently neglecting the interests entrusted to his charge he is guilty of as much dishonesty, as if he appro-priated his employer's funds to himself. I know that far more money has been squandered in Ceylon, by neglect than was ever lost through those, "Due the Estate."

Let Superintendent's have their Holidays, no one ever grudged that, but what I do object to, the action of the manures specified.

Bone dust and Poonac, combined, I have tried largely on one Estate. The mixture does not seem to stimulate injuriously, but yields a fair amount of both wood and crop. About I lb a tree was applied. Bones alone (1 lb a tree) seems to put on a still bigger crop. On a field of fine large trees manured with Bones alone last year, a crop of 11 to 12 cwts. an acre has been brought out, nor do the trees appear, as yet, to be suffering from it. I those who are so indignant at being placed under the supervision of men who are not their equals in birth, or education. I would suggest a simple

remedy, a month's notice."

SIR,—The present Manager of the well known as "Farm Company" ran a Coach to Navelepittia in competition with a native, who is also plying on the same line with all the disadvantages and difficulties before him—when the Native applied to the Postal Authorities to allow him to convey the Mails in his coach between Gampolla and Navelepittia at the expense incurred by Government for conveying Mails by Runners, before ever a coach was established on the line, the European competitor would apply to the Postal Authorities that he would convey Mails on the line free of any expense to Government only Tolls free, merely with the object of carrying in the Coach "The Farm Bread," for sale at Navelepittia—Government. of course very properly approved of the lowest Tender.

"Tender for nothing"—and gave the European competitor the contract. But however the European contractor failed on the line in question and withdrew his coaches, "I dare say for a time," and the Mails are now carried again by Runners as in olden days, and the native man's coach still runs as clock work Paying Tolls.

Further facts:—The native coach proprietor on several occasions found out that the European

takes over an Estate at a small gathering of people the farce is called a public sale; the Auctioneer puts up the property at some small figure, and after a time the mortgagee gives his bid which is invariably a little over what it was put up for by the Auctioneer, when, it is duly knocked down to him, lie being the highest (and only) bidder. The mortgagee then congratulates himself on his acquisition, but publicly calls himself a victim, and makes known his intention of taking all other property his debtor may possess to make up the deficiency caused by the bad sale: of course he has only to get the property sold up at a bad time after a small erop, when money is scarce, he is sure of having it all his own way, there will be no competition, especially, just now that so many estates are in the market, thus may a man work his life through and at last die in poverty; while the fat mortgagee that has made money (God only knows how) can take an unfair though legal advantage of the times to enrich himself, by bringing utter ruin on an individual, or family, and this, the present state of the law allows: this beats Shylock hollow, for he was only to have his pound of flesh and blood, but here the mortgagee takes his pound of flesh (the original mortgagee) then blood in shape of any other property the debot may possess. This is the law of mortgage in Ceylon, which has enabled some few uniprincipled people to get immensely rich, by merely ruining a few of their weaker country-men. May they people to get immensely rich, by merely ruining a few of their weaker country-men. May they never enjoy their ill-gotten wealth.
