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PROCLAMATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR.

In the Name of Her Majesty VICTORIA, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith. PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J. WEST RIDGEWAY, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RÍDGEWAY.

THEREAS by the 19th section of "The Forest Ordinance, 1885," as amended by section 6 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1892, it is enacted that whenever the following events have occurred, viz. :-

(a) The period fixed under section 7 of the said Forest Ordinance, 1885, for preferring claims has elapsed, and all claims (if any) made within such period have been disposed of by the Forest Settlement Officer; and

(b) If such claims have been made, the periods fixed for appealing from the orders passed on such claims have elapsed, and all appeals (if any) presented within such periods have been disposed of by the Supreme Court; and

(c) All lands (if any) to be included in the proposed forest which may be acquired under

section 13 of the said last-mentioned Ordinance have become vested in the Crown;-

the Governor shall, by Proclamation to be published in the Government Gazette, specify the limits of the forest which it is intended to reserve, and declare the same to be reserved from a date fixed by such Proclamation:

And whereas all things necessary for declaring the forest hereunder mentioned to be a reserved forest have been fulfilled, and all times hereinbefore recited have elapsed, and it is expedient to specify the limits of such forest:

Now know all Men that We, the said Governor, do by this Our Presidentian proclaim the forest, the limits of which are set forth in the schedule hereto subjoined, to be a reserved forest

as from and after the 1st day of December, 1897.

And We do hereby further specify the limits of the said reserved forest to be those set forth in the said schedule.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Sixteenth day of November, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-seven.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, CEYLON.

ADDRESS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL TO THE GOVERNOR IN REPLY TO HIS EXCELLENCY'S SPEECH OF NOVEMBER 5, 1897.

To His Excellency the President of the Legislative Council, the Right Honourable Sir J. WEST RIDGEWAY, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

THE Council is gratified to learn that the finances give proof of continued prosperity, and agrees with Your Excellency that in the development of the resources of the Colony by the wise and prudent extension of its means of communication lies the best insurance against possible misfortune in the future.

The Council will carefully consider the proposals for railway extension to the Kelani Valley and for the construction of a tramway to Uda Pussellawa, and gives expression to the hope that the making of the railway from Kankesanturai to Elephant Pass will not be much longer deferred, and that the claims of the districts to the North of Colombo will receive early consideration.

The Council cordially endorses the action of Your Excellency's Government in the adoption of timely measures to guard the Island against the introduction of the Plague. The proximity of Ceylon to the Continent of India and the facilities for communication with infected places render it impossible to consent to the adoption of such limited safeguards as in places more distant may be thought to be sufficient. The Council relies upon Your Excellency for the continuance of every possible precaution against the occurrence, in the introduction here of the disease, of a calamity pregnant with ruin and disaster to the Island.

The Council regrets that crimes of violence involving the use of the knife continue to be prevalent, and, while it entertains the opinion that the surest remedy will be found in the improvement of administrative and police machinery making the severe punishment of crime certain and immediate, will readily support such legislation as Your Excellency's Government considers to be

necessary.

The Council expresses the hope that the changes in the various Departments of the Administration will tend to its greater efficiency and be conducive to the public interests. The Council attaches importance to the extended employment in the Service of the Crown of natives of the Island qualified by position, character, and ability.

The Council is pleased that representatives from the Island were enabled to witness the rejoicings in London on the occasion of the Sixty Years' Jubilee of the reign of Her Most Gracious Majesty, and takes occasion to record its gratification at the attention shown to these gentlemen by Mr. Chamberlain and the gentlemen who assist him at the Colonial Office, as well as by others connected with the Island.

The Council assures Your Excellency of its cordial co-operation in the furtherance of all measures for the benefit of the Island, and prays that its deliberations may be directed by the Divine Providence to the welfare and prosperity of the people.

THE following rules of the Provincial Committee, Buddhist Temporalities Ordinance, Colombo, made under section 10 of the Ordinance No. 17 of 1895, are published in accordance with section 10 (3) of that Ordinance.

Rules referred to.

(a.)

1. Three members of the Provincial Committee shall from a quorum.

2. In the absence of the President, one of the members present shall be selected to preside, who shall have, for the time being, all the rights and privileges vested in the President.

3. A member absenting himself from three consecutive general meetings shall ipso facto

cease to be a member.

- 4. In the event of a vacancy occurring in the Committee, a meeting of the remaining members the members of the District Committees, and the trustees shall elect a duly qualified person to fill the vacancy.
- (b.)1. The meetings shall be held at the office of the Committee in Colombo or at any other place in the Province after due notice of time and place being given to members.

2. All correspondence under the Ordinance between the incumbents, trustees, and the Committee members shall pass through the District Committees.

3. The Committee shall appoint one of their number as honorary secretary, and shall employ

- as many clerks and messengers as may be found necessary.

 4. The honorary secretary shall enter in a book the business to be placed before each meeting, and shall record in another book the minutes of the proceedings of each meeting, and the minutes shall be confirmed from time to time, the President signing such confirmation.
- 1. A representation of an offence committed by an incumbent of a temple or any other priest or priests in violation of the "Vinaya" made in writing by five or more laymen or by two Buddhist priests, or by a Committee member, or by the President of the District Committee of the district wherein the offender lives, shall be considered a sufficient cause for the Provincial Committee to institute an inquiry.

2. The Provincial Committee and a chapter of five, ten, or twenty Buddhist priests selected by the Committee shall constitute a competent body to inquire into offences committed by priests in

violation of the "Vinaya."

3. The chapter of Buddhist priests shall belong to the same sect as that of the offender against whom a complaint is preferred, and its opinion is to be taken by the Committee only on

"Vinaya" matters.

4. The Provincial Committee alone shall have the power of finally deciding on the removal or otherwise of the accused from the incumbency, and in the event of the nature of the offence established at the inquiry requiring that the offender or offenders should be disrobed, it shall be competent for the said Committee, provided the action be acquiesced in by the said advisory council or a majority of its members, to entrust a Committee of priests especially appointed with the execu-

tion of this part of the finding.

5. All charges preferred against priests shall be fully inquired into and the proceedings duly recorded. Every such inquiry shall be in the presence of the accused, who shall have full liberty to make their defence, unless in case of their absence it is proved to the satisfaction of the Provincial Committee that they have had ample and distinct notice of the inquiry, and the Committee is satisfied that they have no valid excuse for being absent therefrom, and further satisfied that they purposely

evade the inquiry.

6. If any person who is not duly ordained a priest or who has been disrobed under the above rules, is found wearing the robes of a Buddhist priest, the Provincial Committee shall have the power

to prosecute him at the nearest Police Court.

7. The characteristic qualifications required in a priest of the Buddhist faith (adherence to an observation of the rules laid down in the "Vinaya" for their guidance, knowledge of the Buddhist doctrines, and education) shall be considered essential qualifications in candidates for incumbencies, and the Provincial Committee shall give due weight and consideration to such qualifications.

8. In selecting a candidate to fill up an incumbency Nati-sisya and Sisyanu-sisya Parampara succession shall be observed, provided the Provincial Committee is satisfied that the election is not liable to operate against the interest of the temple, and the candidate possesses the qualifications prescribed in rule No. 7 (c). •

1. From the income of each vihare and dewale 5 per cent. shall be paid annually to the Provincial Committee for necessary expenses in carrying out the provisions of the Ordinance.

2. The Provincial Committee shall have the power to raise or lower the percentage of

assessment from time to time if it shall be found necessary.

3. All moneys paid into the Provincial Committee shall be deposited in a bank in the name

of the Committee, and cheques shall be drawn by the President and one of the members.

4. The President of the Provincial Committee shall have power to grant certificates of recognition to all persons elected to hold offices under the Ordinance in a form to be hereafter framed and adopted by the Committee for general use.

5. The Provincial Committee shall keep their accounts systematically, and the same shall be

audited annually.

6. The Provincial Committee shall have power to alter, amend, or frame additional rules, or

cancel existing ones, when it is found necessary to do so.

- 7. Every incumbent of a temple shall send to the Provincial Committee on or before the 31st December each year a list of priests residing in the said temple, or over whom he is considered to be chief, with particulars under the following heads :-
 - (a) Full name and residence before ordination.

(b) Name of the ordaining priest.(c) Date of ordination.

(d) Date of Upasampada.

- 8. Every priest who acts as tutor in the ordination of a novice shall in future furnish to the Provincial Committee within one month of the ordination a certificate, with the following particulars :-
 - (a) Name of person ordained.
 - (b) Residence before ordination. (c) Name of parents or guardians.
 - (d) Date of ordination.

(e) Age.

- (f) Name assumed on ordination.
- 9. No person shall in future be considered a priest unless the particulars required in the above rule have been furnished to the Provincial Committee as required.
- 10. Every priest who ordains a novice to Upasampada shall within a month of such ordination furnish to the Provincial Committee the following particulars:-
 - (a) Name before ordination.

(b) Residence.

- (c) Date of ordination as a novice.
- (d) Date of Upasampada ordination.

(e) Name of tutor.
