The following amended Rule, relating to the investment of Loan Board Funds, is published for general information. The funds of the Loan Board are henceforth to be invested in Indian or Ceylon Government Securities, or on mortgage of Immovable property, situated within the Gravels of Colombo, Kandy or Galle.

Comparative Statement of the Revenue of the Colony for the first and second quarters and also for the first Six Months of the year, are published.

It is announced that in future the Collector of Customs at Colombo, Galle Jaffna, and Trincomalee are to be added to the Board for enforcing Quarantine.

CATTLE DISEASE IN NEWERA ELIYA DISTRICT.—The Assistant Agent in his Report for last quarter says:—  
In the town of Newera Eliya and in the district of Uda-Hawete this disease has continued to prove fatal throughout the quarter. Its introduction into Uda-Hawete is attributed to the Tavalams which resort to all the grazing grounds and thus spread the disease. I have received no satisfactory and reliable information yet from the R. M. of the District but I am led to believe the disease has been very great, and both buffaloes and black cattle—Uda-Hawete has not had so severe a visitation of this scourge for some years past—Walapana and Kotmale are reported entirely free from it.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—Carelessness in loading and firing rocks is proverbial with Tamils, one of these lamentable cases took place a few days ago at Heliobdie, when a poor fellow lost his life and three more are said to be in Hospital seriously injured. Loaders in this country require careful supervision, and we believe these accidents are owing entirely to the carelessness of the workmen and greed for gain which prompts them to represent themselves as experienced hands, when such is far from being the case.

INDIAN OFFICERS AT THE SEAT OF WAR.—It is stated by an Indian Cotemporary that Lord Mayo having asked permission of the Secretary of State to depute a few Indian officers as attaches to the belligerent armies, he has been informed by telegraph that such an arrangement cannot be made.

QUARTERLY REPORT FOR THE THREE AND FOUR KORALS FOR THE QUARTER ENDING 31ST MARCH, 1870.  
The ending of the people throughout the past three months has been satisfactory, and the heavy rains which fell in January appear only to have affected the cattle which suffered from the exposure to which carelessness of their owners subjected them. The crops both on high and low lands were above the average, and the heavy rain of March has induced the people to commence operations again with a view to a Yala Harvest. The Service Tenures Commission commenced its work in the Four Korals in February, and its proceedings have, I think, in most cases been considered satisfactory, by the Proprietors and Tenants of Nindagamas.

The quarter is rendered remarkable by three crimes of more than ordinary magnitude. In two of these cases the accused were apprehended, but in a recent case of murder the efforts of the Police have as yet proved unsuccessful. In one of these cases, wife-murder, the accused has already been convicted. A little stealing prevails to a considerable extent owing to the difficulty of detecting the thieves.

Rain had fallen during the afternoon for some days previous, and it was feared would prevent the whole of the programme being carried out, but fortunately and to the delight of all, about 3 o'clock on Thursday it cleared up, and at 4 o'clock both Happutelle and Badulla men were on the ground prepared to test their respective abilities in the Cricket Match. Badulla won the toss and sent in their opponents, whose last wickets fell for 45 runs. In a short space of time the Happutelle men were in the field, and Badulla had to bat at the wickets, there was just time to complete the innings, when darkness put an end to the day's proceedings, Badulla having one more than their opponents.

Friday.—Play commenced at 6.30. a. m. and Happutelle again "wielding the willow" and scored 63 before the last man was out. Messrs. Peake and Hawkes then went to the wickets and put 21 runs together, when the sun being now very powerful it was decided to draw the stumps, the match being given in favor of Badulla by one run.

The dinner might have been anticipated, proved a success, and was not one of the least pleasing features of the meeting: 55 sat down to table, Mr. Sharpe taking the Chair.

The dinner was served in the Court house, which had been placed at the disposal of the Committee by the much respected District Judge, Mr. Dawson. Every delicacy that could be obtained was there, the wines were excellent, and everyone left thoroughly delighted. Between the toasts several songs were given, which tended to increase the hilarity of the evening, those given by Messrs. Mackenzie and Dawson being much appreciated. Much disappointment was felt at the non-arrival of the prizes. They were shipped in the S. S. "Gambia" which unfortunately "came to grief" on the other side "Alexandria"—Mr. R. P. Master holds the "Champion's belt" for the year, he having scored the greatest number of points—Mr. Templer being one point behind him. The success of the meeting is in a great measure due to the Stewards who worked assiduously to make every thing pass off satisfactorily. Mr. Byrde as Starter, and Mr. Ranken as Judge, gave universal satisfaction, and Mr. R. P. Master was ever ready with book and pencil to enter competitors for the several events.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR.  
DEAR SIR.—A writer in your issue of yesterday, accuses me of making an accusation against the Racing men of Colombo, inasmuch that I have offered a reward for the apprehension of the miscreant who has been guilty of poisoning two of the Centaur's horses.

Now, I have simply to aver that no such accusation was ever made or intended by me, nor did I ever suppose that Racing men were the guilty parties, or that they could possibly injure me. I suspected any of them. During my turf career in Ceylon I have always regarded my racing associates as men of the highest principles of honor, and each and every one of them must allow I think, that all of us are interested in the success of the most amiable character. Therefore let me repeat, I do not believe any one of those gentlemen have ever thought that I looked upon them with suspicion, or that my advertisement referred to them in any way, and I can only add that if they have so thought they have done themselves and me great injustice.

I regret exceedingly the omission of the writer's name from the letter alluded to, for I cannot believe him to be one of those sporting acquaintances who have always honored me with their perfect confidence, and if he be a stranger it is much to my regret that he should have been so much deceived by my character. Much has been written in and no very kind spirit appears over the subject of horse-poisoning, fictitious Biffins, &c., since my notice of a reward appeared, and if the writers of those articles are true sporting men, gentlemen who have ever done anything for the good of the turf in Ceylon, then I am prepared to hide my diminished head and be reviled by such superiors. If on the contrary they are people whose appearance in Racing circles is of a purely ornamental character, then their effusions degenerate into contemptible impertinence to raise as they can, the injured who have fought his turf battles honestly and fairly, and whose acts or judgment never yet led a confiding public astray, but to the contrary, have ever brought success to all those who put their confidence in them.

CHINA.  
Shanghai, 4th August.

Mr. Wade, the British Minister, has visited Tientsin. The Foreign Officials are waiting instructions from Europe with reference to further action; meantime much evidence is being collected. No decisive steps have yet been taken to bring the perpetrators of the recent massacre to justice. It is reported that Tsankwofan has written a letter to Chungchow expressing in the strongest possible manner, his belief in the innocence of the Missionaries, and that the Magistrates were guilty in not at first restraining the outbreak.—*Reuter's China Express.*

MAIL OF AUGUST 5TH.  
THE FIRST WEST DESPATCH.  
General Froissard has sent to the Emperor the following report of the military proceedings at Saarbrück:—

"SIR,—I have the honour to render an account to your Majesty of the movements executed to-day by the 2nd Corps d'Armée, in conformity with your Majesty's command, in order to seize the positions situated in front of the Saar overlooking the heights of Saarbrück.

"The Division of General Bataille, its right resting on the Division Laveaucoupet, and one of the batteries, 12 of the reserve, and its left supported by the first brigade of the Division Verge and by the second battery, 12, formed the first line, and it was evident that the movement of the line was intended to direct the movement of the right, had received orders to send two battalions to capture the village of Saint-Anna, and afterwards the heights commanding it, while the rest of his brigade descending into the ravine, situated in front of Speichersheim, was to attack in front the positions which were to the right of the front of Forbach to Saarbrück.

"The other brigade of the Division Bataille had for object the position called the battle-ground; and three squadrons of the 5th Chasseurs were thrown forward as skirmishers.

"Lastly, Colonel du Feron, of the 4th Chasseurs, with a squadron of his regiment, and two squadrons of the 1st brigade of the Division Verge, was to push a strong force as far as Gersweiler in order to connect the movements of the 2nd Corps with those of Marshal Bazaine.

"The troops left their bivouacs between nine and ten o'clock. Lieut.-Col. Thibaudin, of the 6th, entrusted with two battalions of his regiment to assume an offensive movement on Saint Anna, found that village strongly occupied and defended by batteries placed in position on the right bank of the Saar. To oppose this artillery General Micheler, whose brigade had come to support the movement of General Bastoul, ordered forward a battery of the 15th Regiment, which most effectively opened its fire upon the Prussian artillery.

"Supported by a battalion of the 40th of the line, and by a company of engineers of the 3rd Division, aided by the flank movement of Colonel Mangin, who, with the rest of the 67th and 66th, was descending on his left, Lieut. Colonel Thibaudin was enabled to carry the village of Saint Anna, and had it occupied by the battalion of the 40th and by a company of engineers; afterwards, the battalions of the 67th scaled the slopes of the high ground of St. Anna with great dash, and began to establish themselves on its summit, right in front of Saarbrück. The 66th, with not less resolution, took possession of the heights as far as the parade ground, driving the enemy successively from all his positions.

"At the same moment General Bataille brought his first brigade rapidly on the slopes to the left of the road to Saarbrück, uniting the movement of his 2nd brigade by a battalion of the 23rd.

"Marching in battalions deployed, and covered by numerous sharpshooters, the battalions of the 23rd and 8th of the line resolutely carried the different ravines, intersecting this very difficult and woody part of the country. A battalion of the 8th of the line, making its way through the woods, followed the railway as far as the village of Trébes, where it joined the battalions of the regiment, and they attacked together the parade ground on the right side.

"General Bataille, on arriving on the heights, caused one of his batteries to be placed in front of the 66th, and another on the parade ground, in order to batter the railway-station, and silence the fire of the enemy's artillery, which had taken up its position on the left of Saarbrück. The latter could not sustain our fire, and had to move further off.

"The battery 12 of the reserve came by my order to support the fire of that on the parade ground, and, finally, the battery of mitrailleuses of the 2nd division threw the most complete disorder into the midst of the columns of infantry which were evacuating the town.

"During this combat of artillery the troops were able to loudly cheer the Emperor and the Prince Imperial on the very ground from which they had just dislodged the enemy.

"The movements of the infantry were perfectly well seconded by the 5th Regiment of Chasseurs, under the orders of Colonel de Sererville. The 5th, supported by the sharpshooters, secured every part of the ground, and rapidly arrived at the town, whence they could perceive the enemy. The 12th battalion of Chasseurs and the company of engineers of the 2nd division formed the reserve of General Bataille, and joined the troops of the 1st brigade on the parade ground. The 1st brigade of the Division Verge, forming the second line, constantly maintained itself at 4 or 500 metres from the first line, making use of the inequalities of the ground to protect itself.

"The reports which up to this time have reached me mention the following losses:—The 66th has one officer killed, Lieut. de Bar; Captain Private very seriously wounded by a musket shot, Lieut. Laramey, shoulder also pierced; 15 or 16 wounded or killed. The 67th has no officer killed, but two non-commissioned officers were carried off by cannon-shot, and 100 men killed or
