THE CUSTOMS.

A Commercial Correspondent writing from Galle wishes us to remove the Customs Officer of our Southern Port from the category in which we had placed that Department generally, stating that nothing could be more satisfactory than the manner in which the Customs business there is conducted. We were fully aware of this, and had no intention of including Galle in our remarks. The dissatisfaction so long caused amongst the mercantile community of Colombo by the harshness, delays and vexations of the Chief Customs department is notorious, and our Executive

would do well to consider whether all the complaints made can by any possibility be groundless. Surely a Colombo Firm has a right to complain of such impropriety as that noticed by a Correspondent in our last issue, in which a package consigned to their address was advertised in such an imperfect manner as to render it impossible for them to be aware of its existence, and claim it for their constituent.

To avoid all such irregularities in future and to ensure a sale fair to all parties, the Govern-

ment should entrust all such Auctions to one of the several Firms in the Fort, who would take care that sufficient notices should be issued, and as their remuneration would be by Commission on the amount realised it would be for their interest to effect as good a sale as possible.

THE MESSENGERIES MARITIMES.—The next

French Steamer for Europe will leave Galle on Wednesday next, taking Mails for the Brindisi and Southampton packets. The last outward steamer brought no English-mails owing to the transfer of the mail route from Marseilles to Brindisi not having at that time been completed. In future however we may expect to receive our Brindisi packets by the *Messagerie* steamer as well as by the English mail boats.

will therefore be glad to hear that one at least is working satisfactorily. On arriving at Kani on the other morning, I found the Traction Company's Engine with steam up ready to start with four or five trucks. We proceeded along the flat at the rate of 6 miles an hour, and up the steep hill into Kadoogamao at a speed of 4 miles; it is marvellous to see the trucks following round the numerous curves on this road in the track of the Engine; Robertson, the driver, steers along in and out of carts and round the turns as easily as an experienced performer on a Velocipede, and only looks to the Engine, the trucks must follow and no attention is paid to them,

The Journey up a distance of 18 miles, was made most satisfactorily, and the return trip equally so; conveying 400 bushels of Coffee, all that could be procured at one store, damages to a bridge by the late floods preventing the Engine or even carts proceeding further. I had the pleasure before leaving Dolosobage of seeing the Engine again in the District and 700 bushels were then being loaded; this was all accomplished in 5 days, and no detention had been met with in procuring Coffee, the 4 journeys having been made in 4 days, and as soon as the driver knows the road I am assured 3 days will be sufficient, and the Engine is capable of drawing 800 to 1000 bushels. Of course, on our journey one, or two delays occurred.

one small pin and a coupling screw snapped by a severe jerk, but these weak points can easily be strengthened, and there is no doubt of the success of the Traction Engine, and that it is well adapted for many roads in this Island. Let Government therefore render every assistance, and the Planters raise no objections, for there can be none. danger; but talk of driving an Engine on a railway it is child's play to steering a Traction where every moment a steady hand, good eye, and fixed attention are required: the difficulty may be to fix such drivers, but the excitement and pleasure may induce some of the nobles of our Island to follow the example of the noble Earl who toils the London and Brighton Coach, and of others driving those between Town and Windsor. All success to the Traction Engine and Messrs. Chippindall, the Company's Agent, and Robertson the driver.

SUEZ CANAL.

THE VICTORIA DOCK offers special advantage for the long steam vessels likely to be engaged in trading between ports in the East and London, by means of the Suez Canal.

The Victoria Dock entrance is the first dock entrance and canal on coming to the River Thames. It is situated half-a-mile below Blackwall, and by its steam vessels avoid all the bends in the more crowded parts of the river.

The depth of water on the sill of the gates is 28 feet and the capacity of the dock is adequate to the largest class of vessels.

Most of the iron-clads—the *Minotaur* and *Northumberland*, of 6,620 tons burthen, and 450 feet in length, were fitted out in the Victoria Dock.

The large water-space of ninety acres, and capacious jetties, each of which is 500 feet long and 80 feet wide, with convenient warehouses thereon, afford the utmost dock and Wharf accommodation; and attached to the dock is a pontoon, for raising, examining, and repairing large vessels, whereby the risk and expense of removal to dry docks is avoided.

The quays are surrounded by railway communication, so that trucks come alongside vessels, and merchandise can be conveyed by railway to and from all the manufacturing places in the United Kingdom.

By means of hydraulic cranes vessels are unloaded and loaded with unimpeded despatch. Goods to and from the Victoria Dock are received at and delivered from the Minories Station by frequent trains in the day.

Passengers are conveyed to and from the Dock by trains between the Fenchurch Street and Bishopsgate Stations every quarter of an hour.
