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
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
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
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












'Visionary, Exciting and Unique'



Sri Lanka's bid to harness the power of sport, to build a better tomorrow, nears its decisive date, as the Commonwealth Games Federation (CGF) prepares to announce the venue to host the 21st Commonwealth Games. The CGF General Assembly meets in St Kitts & Nevis on November 11, 2011, to make a choice between Australia's Gold Coast and Sri Lanka's southern city of Hambantota. 'Visionary, Exciting and Unique' were the words of the CGF Evaluation Committee, describing Sri Lanka's plan to host the Games. The people of Sri Lanka now await the final vote to become the 10th country in the Commonwealth to host the Games in its 80-year history.

While the development of infrastructure and human resources continue at a rapid pace, Sri Lanka's economy has retained the 2011 growth forecast, indicating an eight percent increase in the first half of 2011, attributed to robust exports and a revival in tourism. July registers the highest tourist arrivals growth, in the first seven months of this year.

Renowned for beautiful golden beaches, the first ever South Asian Beach Games will be held on a 16-acre beach front in Hambantota from 8th-14th October, and is expected to host over 400 participants from neighbouring SAARC countries, who will be participating in 12 exciting beach sports. On the topic of beaches, an area covering 101 hectares on the beautiful, reef-fringed Hikkaduwa beach, has been declared a Marine National Park, which will

include specific zones for snorkelling, diving and a swimming area for adventure seekers.

SriLankan Airlines' expansion continues as the route network reaches 60 destinations covering 34 countries, with the newest code share partner - Air Canada, this winter, connecting eight cities in Canada. Flights to Moscow's Domodedovo Airport commenced in September, while the airline will add Zurich, Switzerland to its network in December, 2011.

A new phase in the airline's forward plan begins with the opening of the SIM Industries Airbus A320 Simulator Centre, in Katunayake in October. Its strategic location in South Asia offers a convenient, cost-effective training centre for pilots in the region.

This issue of Serendib, gives an account of some of the major development activity in the southern region, preparing to establish eight brand new sporting venues - seven of which will be complete to host the South Asian Games in 2016, Also enjoy reading some insights into Sri Lanka's culture, history, heritage and the people.

ast open plains flow endlessly into the horizon. Newly built roads take you deeper into the heart of the district we know as Hambantota. Amidst the greenery of the surroundings is the startling presence of massive scale development. Hambantota is taking on a new character as an upcoming city where the rich heritage of Sri Lanka is not forgotten in its pursuit for growth.

Situated in the Southern Province of Sri Lanka, Hambantota boasts of wildlife, culture, history, coastline and more recently accelerated development where a strategically located port, international airport, international cricket stadium, convention centre and administrative complex has added to the multi dimensional aspect of this exuberant district. Having been one of the 2011 ICC Cricket World Cup venues and currently in the run to host the 2018 Commonwealth Games, Hambantota is at the centre stage of development as a global hub.



MAHINDA RAJAPAKSA INTERNATIONAL CRICKET STADIUM, SOORIYAWEWA

With a capacity to accommodate 35,000 spectators, the Mahinda Rajapaksa International Cricket Stadium in Sooriyawewa is the country's third floodlit international cricket stadium. It was the proud host to two matches during the ICC 2011 Cricket World Cup. With facilities ranging from players' rooms, dining areas, separate building for media, pitches and practice facilities, plans are underway to increase the capacity to 60,000 prior to the ICC T20 World Cup in 2012. Furthermore this cricket stadium will be the anchor facility within the sports city and will be the venue for the opening and closing ceremonies of the Commonwealth Games as well as the venue for Archery during the Games.

Standing in the middle of the grounds it feels as if you are at the centre of the world. It does not take much to imagine the stadium filled with excited spectators, reverberating with their cheers.







INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT, MATTALA

The International Airport in Mattala is being constructed in two stages. On completion this will be the second international airport in the country. Stage one is taking place on 800 hectares and the runway is nearing completion. Large scale construction is underway with the control tower, apron and terminal buildings in progress.


The runway at Mattala will be able to facilitate A380 aircraft as the runway length is 3500 metres, and width is 75 metres. Passenger capacity during the initial stage will be one million, which will entail 40 percent of the function of the airport and cargo capacity will be approximately 45,000 metric tonnes, which is equivalent to 60 percent of the capacity. With work progressing at a rapid pace the airport is scheduled to be completed by end of 2012.


The International Airport in Mattala is expected to expand the local aviation industry whilst being a catalyst to the country's economic development, boosting international trade, tourism and employment.















ADMINISTRATIVE COMPLEX AND CONVENTION CENTRE

With the aim of providing the public with the required services under one roof, a massive Administrative Complex has been constructed in Hambantota. The complex consists of the Municipal Council, Main Building, Public Library, Depots and Residential Quarters for Government Officials.

The architecture of the building is a blend of the traditional and modern and exudes officialdom and regality. Overlooking the lake, there is a sense of serenity and calm where the Administrative Complex stands tall as a reminder of the development that is taking place in the district.

An auditorium with a seating capacity of 1500, three meeting rooms and restaurants are all encompassed in a state-of-the-art Convention Centre which is being built in close proximity to the Administrative Complex. This will provide the venue for international events and conferences. Amidst the rugged landscape of Hambantota, the Convention Centre under construction is visible from the road like a beacon in the distance.



MAGAM RUHUNUPURA PORT

Hambantota is situated along major international sea routes and is thus a strategically located port. Historically it is said that this area was a prominent commercial and shipping hub and as such with clear respect to the heritage of the country, the Magam Ruhunupura Port is initially being developed as a service and industrial port and subsequently as a transshipment port.

For the first time in the history of Sri Lanka, a harbour basin has been built inland and with the seawater being filled it has essentially changed the coast line of the country. The first phase of the Port consists of two 600m general purpose berths, 310m bunkering berth and 120m small craft berth. It will also contain a bunkering facility and a tank farm, which will include eight tanks for marine fuel, three tanks containing aviation fuel and three for liquid petroleum gas. A 15 floor administrative building is also currently under construction. With phase one nearing completion, the Magam Ruhunupura Port has been commissioned and ships can be seen plying its waters.

As Sri Lanka surges forward as the emerging Wonder of Asia, Hambantota will undoubtedly be a rising star that will pave the way for posterity.








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t was 6:30 in the morning and the sun had just come up. We'd been on the Ja Ela River for half an hour. I was with my Sri Lankan fishing buddy Loni in his boat, a typical 18 footer made of fiberglass with a removable cloth canopy, four rod holders and a 40 hp outboard. Four lines were out with Rapala hard baits attached and we were doing a slow troll, sipping our morning tea, waiting for the sound of the drag on the reels to announce the first strike of the day.

The Ja Ela is a typical and fairly shallow Sri Lankan river that winds its way down from the distant hills passing through several small towns and numerous villages before it empties into the Negombo Lagoon just north of Colombo and very near the international airport. I almost spilled my cup of tea as the Brrrrrr sound of the drag on my reel cut through the morning air! As I pulled the rod and reel from the holder, I knew I had a big one and he was well hooked. He was giving me a good fight and I figured it was either a Mangrove Jack (Red Snapper family) or a Barramundi.

15 minutes later, I had him about five metres (15 feet) from the boat when he broke water for the first time. He was a Barramundi and well over a metre (three feet) long and within five minutes we had him netted and on the digital scale, which showed him to be just over eight kilograms (close to 20 lbs).

It was a very good fishing day. We ended up with three large Barramundi and two Mangrove Jack in the ice chest and we must have gently handled and released well over a dozen of their younger siblings who will live to fight another day.

I have been in Sri Lanka for over five years now and have dipped my line in quite a few of the rivers, streams and lakes as well as gone trolling for the big game fish offshore in both the Bay of Bengal and the Indian Ocean.

This serendipitous tropical island has everything a sports fisherman could ever want, and all year round! You'll find everything from Rainbow Trout in the highlands, a non native species introduced by British tea planters more than a hundred years ago, to Barramundi and Mangrove Jack in the saline river estuaries and Tuna, Barracuda,

Swordfish and Marlin in the deep sea offshore. Sri Lanka is an island with two definite monsoon seasons. So when it's pouring down rain on one side of the island, you've usually got sunshine and clear weather on the other side. And incidentally, you don't need a license for sports fishing over here and the fishing is fine on either side of the island!

When we fish offshore, distance determines the type of fish we'll run into. Four to five kilometres off Colombo we approach the edge of a sloping offshore reef with around a hundred feet of water beneath the boat. Here we regularly catch Barracuda, Queen Fish, Barramundi, Grouper and the occasional Red Snapper. If we head out 15 kilometres from shore, we are in the deep blue waters of the Indian Ocean with no land between us and Antarctica. Here is where the Blue and Yellow Fin Tuna, mature Barracuda, Marlin, Swordfish and Shark are lurking. Out of the tackle boxes come the big hard bait lures, at least five inches or larger. These are usually deep diving Rapalas attached


to a minimum 40 test braided line. And if you hook one of these denizens of the deep, be prepared to spend considerable time playing with him before you can reel him in close enough to be netted or gaffed.


Most hotels or resorts will have fishing supplies available for hire or can recommend someone nearby who does. You'll usually end up with a sturdy but basic local boat with an outboard motor and a boat man cum fishing guide, rods, reels and lures. for a day's fishing either on a river, lake or offshore.

Sri Lankans love to fish and you'll find them fishing from river banks, bridges, breakwaters, docks or casting into breaking waves from knee deep surf but most of the organised sports fishing in Sri Lanka is done by slow trolling. You'll find a combination of trolling and spinning gear being used and most of it is heavy duty with 30 to 50 pound test, either braided or monofilament line. Depending on what you plan to catch, most of the time a Rapala or similar hard bait lure will be used. The lures range in

size from two to over eight inches and come in a rainbow of colors and different hook configurations. I've found that the sports fishing technique in most of the places I've fished in Asia is a combination of heavy duty gear, heavy duty line and heavy duty lures. The philosophy being, that once you've hooked 'em, you don't want to lose dinner due to a snapped line or a straightened hook!

But sports fishing attitudes in Asia are changing! Many of the younger sports fishermen and women in Sri Lanka are now using lighter gear and practicing the eco philosophy of "..hook, play, gently land and release". They are aware that overfishing and abuse of the fragile ecology of the many beautiful and productive waterways found throughout Sri Lanka will deprive the next generation of the main reason sports fishing is so popular. We put our bait in the water and patiently await the adrenalin rush that the English Patron Saint of all sports fishermen, Isaac Walton, referred to over 400 years ago as:





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
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


he train guard, smartly dressed in white trousers, black shoes and a black tunic jacket over his white shirt and black tie, blew his whistle and waved a green flag, heralding the departure of Podi Menike. Bound for Badulla, 290km from Colombo, the train (called "Little Maiden" in English) was expected to take ten hours snaking slowly up through tea-clad countryside to reach its destination.

With a shriek of warning, the diesel locomotive pulled away from the main platform (number three) of Colombo Fort station on time at 5.55am, as it has done for decades. Its sister train, Udarata Menike ("Upcountry Maiden") leaves later every day (at 9.45am), but that train doesn't arrive in Badulla until after nightfall.

The origins of this great little trip by train (acknowledged by rail travel fans as one of the world's finest) dates back to the beginning of the tea industry in Sri Lanka. The first train to the hill country steamed into Kandy in 1867, the same year that tea was planted commercially in the then Ceylon. The coming of the railway to the plantation hills meant that planters could easily send their crop to Colombo for shipment to England. Trains facilitated the tea boom, and the carriage of tea as freight provided the prosperity that financed the railways.

As tea production spread deeper into the hilly interior, the railway followed, extending to Bandarawela in 1894, eventually reaching Badulla 30 years later. In 1956, train number 15, the Udarata Menike, was introduced on the line, which it has plied ever since. In their heyday the Menike trains boasted a bar and a restaurant car. Now Podi Menike runs with a First Class Observation Saloon, one Second Class carriage, a Pantry Car and three Third Class carriages.

The 44 seats in the Observation Saloon are much in demand and can be reserved up to ten days in advance. Its four window-facing seats at the rear provide an inspiring panoramic view of the steady climb from lowland suburbs to the magnificent forests, plunging waterfalls and close-cropped tea bushes of the hill country. The Saloon is usually fully booked and in the other carriages there is often standing room only, but

a jolly camaraderie quickly develops, adding to the enjoyment of the ride.

After passing through Maradana, Colombo's second main station, the train weaves its way through a web of rails alongside the Dematagoda yard where retired steam engines and old wooden carriages are parked. Busy streets give way to plains devoted to paddy (rice fields) and orchards of plantains and bananas.

The train picks up speed for the sprint over concrete sleepers uphill to Kandy. The climb begins in earnest after Rambukkana, the station closest to the Elephant Orphanage. There the railway becomes single track and the train pauses while the driver receives a token from the stationmaster that confirms the track is clear. As the train climbs to Kadugannawa station at 517m above sea level, the scenery on one side of







the track dives down deeply through wooded gorges.

Then comes the triangular station of Peradeniya (the closest one to the Royal Botanical Gardens). At Nawalapitiya, the train's crew changes and vendors swarm along the platform offering snacks of fat fried lentil cakes, or fruit.

Tea bushes and pine trees share the hillsides as the train climbs to Hatton (the station for Adam's Peak) at 1,271m above





out of more than a dozen tunnels, the scenery changing with each gap from cloud-shrouded mountains to woodland copses. After the final tunnel comes the incredible station of Idalgashina (1,615m above sea level), amazing because of the deep, stunning views on both sides as it sits atop a ridge in the mountains. On to Haputale where the train seems to take the wrong turning as it wanders down the town's main street.





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


After passing through more tea gardens and the tidy station of Diyatalawa, serving a military encampment, the train rolls into the bustling town of Bandarawela where a restored vintage shunting engine stands in a siding. From there it descends - with occasional halts at small stations, including Hali Ela where the stationmaster's office resembles an English country cottage - to Badulla.

After crossing a bridge of nine arches, the train halts briefly at Demodara before following the contours to burrow under the station it has just left. Called the Demodara Loop this was constructed to avoid a gradient steeper than the ruling 1 in 44.

The final descent brings the train to Badulla which, at just 680m above sea level, marks the southeast end of the hill country and a return to a sluggish ambience after the vibrant air of the hills. Only a handful of passengers remain to alight at the quiet, highroofed station where nothing much seems to have changed since 1924.

During the journey the train has passed through 44 tunnels, over countless bridges, and through some of the most beautiful scenery of lush hills and valleys in the world.

n unprecedented famine hit Sri Lanka in the latter part of the 1st Century BC. That was the time Buddhist monks passed on the Dhamma - teaching of the Buddha through oral tradition. The monks memorised the teachings and preached to the laity. With the famine setting in, the monks realised the situation was grave. Even the oral tradition was being threatened. A solution had to be found to preserve the Buddha's teaching. As a last resort the far-seeing senior monks decided to commit the teachings to writing. Five hundred monks undertook the gigantic task at a cave temple in a rural location at Aluvihara near Matale in the central hills of Sri Lanka.

The monks inscribed the words of the entire Buddhist Canon (*Tri-pitaka*) in the Pali language on talipot palm leaves, popularly known as *ola*.

This is the first recorded event where ola leaves had been used for writing.
Earlier writing was done on rock as evidenced in inscriptions in the early period following the introduction of Buddhism in the 3rd Century BC.

This traditional art of writing is preserved to this day at least for one purpose. Astrologers use the *ola* leaf for casting of horoscopes. Numerous charts and astrological signs are drawn on it along with details of the person concerned. These are written in astrological jargon and can only be interpreted by the astrologers.

The talipot (Corypha Umbraculifera Linn) is an imposing palm growing to a height of around 80 feet and has a lifespan of between 40 to 100 years. The leaves for writing are taken from an opened leaf bud which is cut and brought down. The buds measure between 10 to 20 feet in length and contain about 80 to 100 leaflets.

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Great care is taken in cutting the bud in order to ensure that the leaves are not bruised. Similarly, they are brought down with utmost care.

The preparation of the ola leaves for writing is a delicate operation and quite a tedious process. First they have to be dried and seasoned.

After the leaves are cut and brought down, the leaf segments are then separated and the mid-rib is removed. Thus two strips are obtained from each. These are rolled up and dipped in water in a copper cauldron and boiled gradually using a mixture of raw papain the milky secretion of the papaya, unripe papaya pulp and pineapple leaves. This is to soften the talipot leaf fibre making it flexible. Papain helps this process. The leaves are left in the cauldron for about three to four hours when the leaf rolls are taken out, unrolled and hung up to dry.

The drying process takes six days. They are sun dried for three days after which they are left outside for three nights to catch the dew. At the end of this operation the colour of the dried leaves becomes golden.

These are stored in the kitchen attic in rolls. The wood smoke from the hearth adds to their durability.

The rolled leaves are taken out of the attic only when they are needed for writing. The leaf is unrolled from both sides and polished. The polishing is done by pulling the strips back and forth on a smooth cylinder of areca nut. This is done until a satin finish is obtained.

The instrument used for writing on the ola leaf is a stylus known as the panhinda. The material used to turn out the stylus varies from brass and copper to silver and gold. Their handles are elaborately carved using traditional motifs and designs. The writing is incised on the leaf with a steel point in the stylus.

In the early days the technique of writing on ola leaves was practised mainly in Buddhist temples. The monks used this method to document vital information which needed to be preserved for posterity. Once the writing was over, the written text was bound to form into a book. The pages in an ola book are narrow and the writing area is limited due to the leaf not being very broad. The length of a page rarely exceeds two feet and the width is around two to three inches. The books may contain many pages. They are put together and punched at two points and a cord sent through the holes thereby ensuring that the leaves will remain intact. These are loosened to read the script. Two polished wooden

covers are used on either side. The covers carry neatly drawn traditional motifs. These give added protection to the ola leaves with the text.

These are known as puskola poth (books made of ola leaves) and are stacked in cupboards and large heavy wooden boxes (pettagam).


The most popular of such books is the pirith potha - an anthology of selected discourses of the Buddha written in the form of stanzas. These are referred to as protective stanzas which, when recited, afford a protection against fear, misfortune and ill health that human beings are prone to. Every temple has a pirith potha and the monks chant the stanzas regularly to bless the devotees.

The native physicians who are well versed in Ayurveda - the oriental form of traditional medicine coming down the ages have studied from ola books containing ancient systems of medicine. The ancestral physicians had put down on *ola* leaves the numerous prescriptions and other curing procedures to preserve them and protect them from extinction. The old veda poth - medical books are treasured from generation to generation since that is the only way of studying the long-established practices, which in the earliest times was preserved through




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
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
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
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
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

Looming high above the grasslands of the Horton Plains Forest Reserve, Kirigalpoththa rises 2,395 metres above sea level and its summit is often immersed in mist. On a clear day though, an explorer who has laboured up the sevenkilometre trail leading to the top of Kirigalpoththa is rewarded with some of the most spectacular views of the mountains and valleys below. We headed out on a cold and misty morning, along a trail that would eventually bring us to the second

e began our journey through the flat, open expanse of the Horton Plains Reserve. Under the gloom of the mist, the moors took on an almost otherworldly strangeness. The wind enhanced the atmosphere by making roaring sounds far behind us, whispering in the grass beside us and blowing cold gusts in our faces every so often. There was no footpath among the grass and thorny bushes, but our guide strode confidently ahead, leading the way towards the jungle in the distance.


Soon enough however, a narrow little dirt path emerged, which was relatively easy to follow. Looking out on the vastness of the plains, rimmed along the horizon by forests and crowned by the turbulent skies above, induced in us an unfamiliar feeling. This kind of landscape – misty moors surrounded by jungle – is not a common sight in Sri Lanka and we felt we were observing some of the wildest settings in the country. We were awed by how insignificant we felt walking along that footpath sandwiched between jungle and vast grassland – five tiny travellers engulfed in the enormity of nature.

Then, to our relief, the sun struggled through the clouds and immediately the mist began to dissipate. Grateful for the unexpected warmth, we strode along the path that led us into the jungle. Our surroundings changed instantly. The path began to slope up

and down, making it much harder to keep up our pace. At this elevation, the jungles are called cloud forests because leaves are able to strip away the moisture of passing clouds. As a result, dew glistens on leaves, twigs and spider webs late into the afternoon. The high moisture content also ensures that there is something growing on every surface. Different types of furry moss and other types of small plants created a hundred minuscule jungles on the barks of trees. A baby horned lizard stared straight at us from one of the little jungles.

Above the branches of some trees, our guide pointed out the destination of our journey. Standing on tip-toe we gazed up at the peak of Kirigalpoththa.








WE WERE AWED BY HOW INSIGNIFICANT WE FELT WALKING ALONG THAT FOOTPATH SANDWICHED BETWEEN JUNGLE AND VAST GRASSLAND – FIVE TINY TRAVELLERS ENGULFED IN THE ENORMITY OF NATURE

Its steep sides were covered in deep green vegetation and it rose into a thick cloud of white mist. To actually be able to see the goal of one's travails is daunting and assuring at once. Doubts about the possibility of trekking that far began to creep into our minds, while at the same time we understood how senseless it would be to give up now. So on we went, clambering over rocks and negotiating waist-deep gorges.

We came out on the open plains again and headed down to an enchanting little stream called Kiriketi Oya. Along the way we tasted some sour-sweet wild berries. The brown rock bed of the stream glistened through the waters as the sun shone down on it. Marigolds and Nil Binara smiled up at us from the ground. Here was a place that nature had fashioned, it seemed, especially for a quiet afternoon chat as you listened to the bubbling water and surrounding birdsong. As we fell into this happy reverie, our guide pointed to the sky and warned us urgently that a thick mist was fast approaching. To appreciate the view from the top of Kirigalpoththa, it was essential we get there before the cloud of mist did. Now, in competition with nature herself, we hurried - as fast as the

difficult path allowed us - to the foot of Kirigalpoththa mountain.

The base of the mountain was covered with hundreds of flowering wild onion plants. Walking through the plants we admired the sea of powder-puff-like white blooms amidst the faint aroma of onions. On reaching the jungle covering the bottom of the mountain, we braced ourselves for the steep climb that lay ahead of us. At certain points the climb became excruciatingly difficult as we slipped in ditches and had our feet buried ankle-deep in boggy areas. As tired as we were however, we kept up our trudging unwilling to give up so close to the end.



Finally, after marching on seemingly forever through thick forest, we came to a clearing. It was a cliff that looked out over what appeared to be the whole world. Mountains and plains covered in green lay thousands of feet below us, arranged in breathtaking display. However, this was not the summit of the mountain, our guide informed us. There was still about ten minutes more of climbing to do.

The final phase of the climb was not as difficult as several areas we had passed along the path. It was however, the most thrilling. There was an extraordinary exhilaration in being able to see the mountain fall away thousands of feet on either side of us. We held onto trees and even each other as we climbed up rocky and forested spaces. The path leveled out and we came to a small glade to find our guide already there, smiling at our exhausted faces. We peeked over the edge of the precipice. This was, at long last, the summit of Kirigalpoththa - the second highest point in all of Sri Lanka. It was pure elation we felt, as we surveyed the cloud-capped mountains surrounding the grasslands below us. Every trace of weariness fell away as we stood there absorbing the magnificent scenes, perhaps made all the more beautiful for the effort we had put into catching a










glimpse of them. I wanted to somehow put the feeling into a bottle and take it back home with me. But I knew it was impossible. That is why millions of people all over the world have made a hobby of climbing mountains. That is why, despite the struggle it was to climb Kirigalpoththa, we would probably make the climb once again.

Plains Nature Reserve is



for its tea, natural richness in culture, heritage, flora and fauna, however, little is known of one of its most simple yet treasured indulgences – its cuisine. Blessed with fertile soils and limitless fresh catches from the ocean, the varied cuisines are just as bountiful.

Rice and curry is a staple in

Sri Lanka with rice being the main
serving alongside an assortment of
vegetable and meat curries and many
would agree that this plateful is as
colourful as they come – stained with
spices like lush yellow turmeric, chilli
powder, cinnamon, then reddened
with beetroot curry, warmed with
fried chilli potatoes, snake gourd curry,
sumptuous blackened sour fish and
its thick gravy and last but not least a

tangy coconut sambol, garnished with crispy pappadums. This would more likely represent a traditional Sri Lankan meal with several more choices of meat and vegetable sides, of course.


Regional recipes for traditional dishes have their own distinctive styles of preparation and methods of cooking and have been largely influenced by the islanders' diverse origins. Ambulthial (a sour fish curry) is a specialty dish hailing from the southern coastal regions of the country and is an island delicacy. The lagoon crab curry and cuttlefish braised and cooked in its own ink, are true belles of the northern coast, while polos mallum (young jackfruit sambol), polos curry, and curd and honey, all-timesought-after favourites, are celebrated dishes from the heart of the country the central dry zone regions.



Although these dishes and more are considered food anthems of their regions, they have now, gradually made their way to Sri Lanka's commercial capital - Colombo. And finding them anywhere, usually with an added twist to please the fusion of palettes, in Colombo's numerous restaurants, is a well earned treat for locals and tourists alike, in the midst of the bustling city.

In Colombo, Nuga Gama at the Cinnamon Grand hosts a most traditional setting. With the sky, whether noon or night, always suspended above large sheltering Nuga trees and sands crunching beneath the feet as one enters into its village like surrounding, this restaurant mimics aspects of a truly conventional rural township that cooks and eats together. While snacking on traditional appetizers like tempered prawns or gram, manioc chips or even kohila root cutlets, one can watch a cultural show, performed by traditional dancers and other local artisans on a rustic style stage. The buffet table beside a country kitchen teems with traditionally made dishes, amidst it all. Peppered cubes of pork immersed in thick blackened gravy, kohila leaf curry – fibrous and chewy, seer fish in a turmeric gravy, and chunky gourd curry, are one too many of the dishes on offer. Wood apple and amberella juices make for a quenching drink, village style and what's for dessert you say?

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


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
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
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
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
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




When all is still, a rhythmic clatter echoes in the distance, its source nowhere in sight. In the heart of this remote village wrapped in old world charm, is where one of the Island's oldest cottage industries still lives on. Cursory glances would go unawares of deft fingers at work, weaving together no less a work of art - one that has been learned and preserved through the ages.

he oldest chronicles of Sri Lanka record that when Prince Vijaya set sail from India and arrived upon the golden sands of an island, Thambapanni, his first encounter was of a woman in the forest, spinning cotton yarn. Thus the making of hand-woven material may have existed as far back as the 6th century BC in the country. However, actual evidence of the craft's existence in Sri Lankan history can be dated back to the Kandyan era, the hill capital. With the King's patronage the weaving industry flourished and endless items of clothing, and fabric were made.

Today, this traditional weaving on the loom still remains in the Kandy District, much the same as in the past, in a little village named Talagune of Ududumbara. Renowned as the Dumbara weavers, they are the remnants of their Kandyan ancestors. Reached by the Kandy-Mahiyangana Road (A26), Talagune is located away from Kandy towards Hunnasgiriya. The narrow roads that fall through Talagune show no hints of houses, instead, they sit below the road's elevation away from view. However any passerby could point out the individual houses as these weaver families are well known among the community and there are about eight remaining in Talagune.

The first of them that we discovered was Priyantha Premachandra. Once directed to the house we at once spotted the workshop set away from the house. Through the open windows we could see a woman busying herself at the loom. Within the workspace stood six of these contraptions. Premachandra sat at work behind one and on a closer look at the loom in action one is reminded of an exposed grand piano with its many strings and inner workings linked together to produce a beautiful work of art with the artiste's finger-work at the helm.

This was a family of weavers: Premachandra in the footsteps of his father continuing the tradition of their ancestors along with his sister, who runs

a separate facility farther away, and his sister-in-law, already a year into the trade was at a loom gradually weaving a wall hanging. His mother too sat at a wheel spinning thread onto spindles that could be used in the loom. Worked with a foot pedal this apparatus called "Huludeva" consists of a spinning wheel and is made out of bamboo strips. The spindles are then placed in narrow wooden 'cradles' that are passed horizontally through the loom's taut vertical strings adding string after string forming the design along with the entire cloth - from scratch. This is far more a complex process than can be described in words - or so I felt as I watched the nimble fingers at work.

As I watched Premachandra slide ekel sticks through the body of vertical threads marking the positions of the design to be woven, he spoke of his beginnings in the trade. Starting soon after his schooling, it was a comfortable transition, and he soon mastered the trade. It takes about a year for a weaver to become fully trained at the loom and



try out the more complex designs. Many of these designs are cast to the memory of the weaver who uses no other reference more often than not. Today with accolades to his name, Premachandra supervises the others in the workshop and caters to a broad clientele. from hotels and shops to customised orders. Wall hangers, cushion covers, bags, bedspreads and bed runners comprise of the many items frequently produced. Looking at the finished product - the intricate designs and the vibrant shades and colours - one could marvel at the fact that these have been entirely woven upon a loom with just loose threads and a single individual.

Farther up the road is Chandana Yapa's residence. With 25 years in the trade he too runs his own loom facility, taking the reins from his father Sirisena - a veteran in the trade. Chandana however takes a different approach to his designs. With more vibrant tapestries, he has also derived modern designs from the traditional motifs such as the 'lanu-getaya' (knot). In addition to the usual handloom products, sarees are also woven at this facility. An illustration of a lighthouse set in a vivid background, one of his more creative ventures, could very well have passed off as an oil painting. Fittingly it has won him an award, one among others in recognition of his skills. He rummages through a file of gathered sketches, designs and scribbles, to fish out a photograph of a 'diya kachchiya' or bathing attire which at present is displayed at the National Museum. This particular clothing is of historical value as it was worn by the King and is the very one woven by his great grandmother.

While his business at present thrives with the booming tourism and many orders and customers. Chandana reflects on a recent past when weaving took a standstill. During this time an age-old craft was laid temporarily to rest and farming fresh produce served as a more practical means for a living. He smiles as he adds the finishing touches to a wall hanging, today it is all he does and all he needs to do. In this little village, and only in this village the weaver's




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



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From inside the cave



orawaka Lena is an ancient cave with archeological findings dating back to 6300 BC that was initially discovered in the 1940's. Situated near Warakapola in the Kegalle District, finding the way to Dorawaka Lena is not an easy task. We reached Warakapola by the Colombo-Kandy (A1) highway, then turned right on to the Warakapola-Anguruwella (B457) Road.

After driving about five kilometres through paddy fields and rubber plantations, we came to a fork in the road, and took the path on the left. We continued until we reached the "Natha Devaleya", where workers at the rubber plantations would come to bless their knives at the start of each workday.


Proceeding farther we arrived at the "Bingala Thana Raja Maha Viharaya", a recently restored ancient temple. The number of unique artifacts inside the temple was astounding, with attention to detail, using natural dyes, to create a spectrum of colour that was simply beautiful. There are several stories surrounding this temple; one is that under the temple there is a place called "Bing Geya", where donations received are stored. Near the Bing Geya, it is rumoured, existed a secret tunnel system where one was able to travel underground to surrounding areas such as "Beligala", "Dhadi Gama", and "Sthri Puraya". One place of significance called "Soothigara Chaithya", is said to be King Parakramabahu's birth place. Another interesting story about the temple is that of the Sacred Tooth Relic. It is said that the Sacred tooth relic that is currently placed in Kandy at the Dalada Maligawa or Temple of the Tooth, was once hidden at this very temple. This was supposedly one of approximately 50 places where the Sacred Tooth Relic was hidden around the Island, before finding its permanent home in Kandy.

The friendly folk in the area helped us to find someone who could guide us through the rest of the way, as from this point on we would have to proceed about one kilometre on foot. Along the way as we trekked through rubber plantations where underground springs surfaced from time to time, our guide showed us how to use the uniquely shaped rubber-tapping knife to tap milky rubber sap from the rubber trees. It is this milky white sap that is processed to make various rubber items.

At first sight, the Dorawaka cave, or "Dorawaka Lena", is hard to make

out. It almost magically appears out of thin air, with the trees parting to bring to the fore two gigantic rectangular rocks leaning on each other. As you approach the cave, the first thing that you notice is the sound of bats shrieking, which is quite eerie. Standing at the foot of the rock I couldn't help but gaze in awe at the size of these two marvellous structures, coming together to form the entrance of the cave.

Walking into the cave you come across a signboard put up by the Department of Archaeology establishing the cave as one of the protected archaeological sites of

interest in Sri Lanka. The original carvings have been numbered, and with a flashlight, it was easy to make out several markings, ranging from "scribbles" called "Kurutu Gee", to carvings of animal-like shapes, said to be an elephant and its calf.

With so many archaeological sites in Sri Lanka, some reportedly dating back to 700,000 BC, what made this site special? According to Dr. W.H. Wijayapala, former Director General of Archaeology (and chief excavator of this particular site in the early 1990s), this excavation was one of the most important archaeological discoveries made in the country, as it was the first time that the existence of civilisation in Sri Lanka during the Neolithic period - the transitional period between the stone age and the copper, bronze and iron ages that arose with farming – was proven.

Furthermore, the carvings on the stone wall of the cave had to be made with metallic tools, and some domesticated grain (Kurrakkan) seeds, fireplaces and pottery of this period were also found. This area is thought to have been home to two to three families, and the combination of these findings were the definitive proof needed to confirm a Neolithic period in Sri Lanka, estimated to be around 6300 BC.

Dorawaka Lena is just another example of the abundance of interesting and unique sites and stories, which make this an island extraordinaire! It's amazing what a small trek off the beaten track will show you, in terms, of the wealth of historical and archaeological sites, and the mythical and magical stories intertwined with so much fact and spoken with such conviction, that it makes you almost believe.



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





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
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ow hovering high above the darting seagulls flitting by Toronto's waterfront, red suited adventurers clad in hardhats send high fives among themselves as they shuffle along the CN (Canadian National) Tower's Edge Walk.

With the introduction of the booming metropolis' latest extreme urban attraction this past autumn, tourists now anxiously cue to walk the roof's circumference. Surpassed only a few years ago, this freestanding structure once considered the world's tallest, remains the jewel in the city's skyline.

For the rest of us, there's the 58-second ride on one of the four glass floor elevators that blasts off from the CN tower's exterior. As you gaze down, the busy street life reveals an unusual orderliness where buses and taxis have separate laneways from other motorists.

Still Toronto's famous landmark remains ever popular as does the array of cultural offerings with its vast network of dining and shopping options that regularly shine onto the urban scene.

What this spells out to the more than 3.3 million residents of Torontonians (affectionate moniker describing the locals) is a success story of sorts.

Consider the long list of festivals that have garnered worldwide attention. There's the Scotiabank Caribbean Carnival, Toronto's celebration of its rich Caribbean culture; the Toronto International Film Festival (TIFF), regarded as the third top film festival in the world; and the two-week running CNE, Toronto's long anticipated summer farewell exhibition, a city staple around for 133 years. It's clear that Toronto, which in Huron means "meeting place," is living up to its name.

Visitors are quick to remark on how clean the streets are and how safe they feel as pedestrians. With its traditional city grid pattern, the downtown core resembles any street in, let's say, New York City. Sir Peter Ustinov once called Toronto, "New York City run by the Swiss."

By the waterfront rollerbladers, bicycle enthusiasts, joggers and pedestrians travel along the Harbourfront's boardwalk. Neatly sectioned off pathways along the Martin Goodman Trail stretch ten miles around Lake Ontario, connecting the east end known as The Beach with its cottage-like homes to the city's west end with its slick condominiums,

But, things weren't always so neatly mapped out. During the 1700s, the British purchased the land from the Mississauga Indians for \$3,400. Locals referred to this district as "Muddy York,"

reminding everyone of the squalid conditions of the town's muddy roads.

Later, when the city had the largest pork yards in North America, it became known as "Hog Town." These days, "T.O." (for Toronto, Ontario) is a hip spin-off from L.A. and reflects the movie-making productions raiding the streets and celebrities who arrive to walk the annual TIFF's red carpet.

Most attractions are downtown and midtown, making travelling by foot or commuting by local transit easy. Affectionately known as the "Red Rocket," the Toronto Transit Commission with its subway, buses and streetcars provides a service spanning the entire city for a cheap \$3 ticket (Canadian).

Swanky boutiques, avant-garde art galleries, and trendy cafes fill the treelined district of Yorkville smack in the hub of midtown. Ironically, hippy squatters saved the architectural integrity of the area in the 1960s. Today, Yorkville is the destination for celebrity spotting.


Over to the west of midtown stands the Royal Ontario Museum (ROM) with Canada's oldest and largest collection of artifacts. Visitors can marvel at the permanent collection of the bat cave, dinosaur gallery and other displays as they wander through the newest renovation designed by ace architect Daniel Libeskind.

Vibrant, cosmopolitan Toronto is a relatively new phenomenon. Prior to World War II, the city was largely an Anglo-Saxon domain, whose allegiance was to the Queen and England. With massive immigration after the war, things changed radically. The insurgence of such diverse cultures as the Chinese, Italians, Hungarians, Portuguese, Jewish, Caribbean and Greek have transformed the city's self-image from dowdy conservatism to a rich multicultural mosaic. Street signs mark out areas such as Little Italy, Portuguese Village, Greek Town and Chinatown.

Another example is the popular historic Kensington Market. Today, Italian butcher shops, Chinese fish markets, Jewish textile shops, Caribbean roti shops and Portuguese bakeries are crammed tightly together in the radius of two city blocks, making it one of the great examples of how different cultures not only co-exist but thrive. In 1989, the United Nations designated Toronto as the world's most ethnically diverse city.

Symbols exemplifying this everchanging city are Nathan Phillips Square, and City Hall, constructed in the mid-60's. The modern-day piazza has a skating rink, park benches, and





a radical bronze sculpture by Henry Moore. The installation of "The Archer" literally brought down a government, an event that most local historians agree marked the beginning of the city's transformation.

Many landmarks in Toronto incorporate design with educational and recreational attractions. The Art Gallery of Ontario recently had a facelift by the renowned architect Frank Gehry who grew up a couple of blocks away from the gallery he says helped inspire him as a child.

The Ontario Science Centre was built by Toronto architect Raymond Moriyama, who insisted on following the natural contours of a ravine for the Centre's shape. The location continues to dazzle children and adults with over 800 hands-on interactive exhibits.

Off University Avenue, the Ontario College of Art and Design building

dubbed "the table top building" has become a popular showpiece with photographers who capture the building's unique suspended shape.

At the cross section of Queen Street and University, the Four Seasons Performing Arts Centre, glistens nightly for the chic frou-frou patrons as the glass facade venue showcases productions by the Canadian Opera Company and the National Ballet of Canada.

For those with a shoe fetish, a visit to the Bata Shoe Museum is a must. Shoe baroness Sonja Bata spanning a 30 year period collected 10,000 different shoes of every description, dating back as far as 4,500 years. Now where to put them? How about a post-modern building (a Moriyama design) inspired by a giant shoebox five stories tall? And that's how the world's largest museum devoted exclusively to footware got started.

Whether you're busy browsing the many shops, touring the museums, or soaking in the view, there's always time for Toronto's nightlife. Rated No. 3 after London and New York, Toronto's entertainment district has a long list of shows for theatre lovers. At the restored Victorian theatre, the Canon Theatre, the longest running production, "Phantom of the Opera," was the spotlight showcase for years.


Once in T.O., it becomes evident that old Hog Town has a new sizzle. With attractions such as the Hockev Hall of Fame, the Air Canada Centre, the Casa Loma, more than 100 theatre companies, hundreds of live music venues nightly, the National Ballet Company, the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, the Canadian Opera Company and the Queen Street West district with its street artists, Toronto truly is "the meeting place." Who knows?



This information is displayed on an interface powered by Google Maps and Google Earth. The Logger has to be turned on before placing in the relevant place and it will constantly record up to 12 hours of data.



COBRA TAG

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AGlimpse of Sri Lanka

■ ADAM'S PEAK is the mountain with the sacred footprint at its summit. 2,243m high, the season to climb is from December to March. The wilderness protected area is a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

■ AUKANA is the site of the Island's elegant Buddha statue carved out of a single rock standing at a height of 12m. The statue was built around 459 - 477 AD.

■ ANURADHAPURA is one of the country's key religious and cultural heritage sites, dating as far back as the 3rd Century BC. This is where the Sri Maha Bodhiya is located.

■ SIGIRIYA built by King Kashyapa is the ancient rock citadel and a World Heritage Site. The garden city and the fortress were built in 477-495 AD with beautiful Sigiriya frescoes, baths and pools.

■ MANNAR is part mainland and part island. The famous Shrine of Our Lady of Madhu and the Thiruketheesvaram Kovil are situated in the mainland. August is the season for the Madhu pilgrimage.

■ JAFFNA is the splendour of the far north with colourful celebrations, customs and festivals. Jaffna consists of Valigamam, Thenmarachchi, Vadamarachchi and the Jaffna islands ■ KATARAGAMA is a revered pilgrimage site 283km from Colombo. Skanda or Lord Kataragama, the Hindu God of war is said to have made Kataragama his abode. The annual procession is held in July and August.

■ POTTUVIL lies along the Eastern coast. Muhudu Maha Viharaya, which means the temple near the sea and Magul Maha Viharaya are of archaeological importance.

■ KANDY is the capital city on the hills with panoramic mountain views. The sacred Tooth Relic of Lord Buddha lies in the Sri Dalada Maligawa. The Esala Perahera is held here every year.

■ DAMBULLA the cave temple with beautifully carved statues of Lord Buddha and Hindu Gods is believed to date back to the 12th Century. King Valagamba took refuge from invaders in these caves.

■ POLONNARUWA is one of Sri Lanka's most flourishing ancient capitals, boasting historic splendour with ruins of palaces, parks and water tanks that are still functional. King Parakramabahu's rule was the golden era.


■ BANDARAWELA in the hill country is known for its beautiful scenery, flowers and cool climate.

■ Ella with the picturesque Ravana Ella waterfall has a stunning landscape. There are magnificent mountain walks, waterfalls and wildlife.

■ Gal Oya National Park is home to the largest reservoir. Herds of elephants can be seen here throughout the year.

■ Horton Plains with its beautiful landscape and cool climate is home to many wild animals such as leopards, samburs and endemic birds. For the adventurous, it is also a place to go trekking, hiking or even camping.

■ Randenigala Wildlife Sanctuary is the place to go for wildlife enthusiasts. You can spot herds of elephants, deer, sambur, wild boar and rare birds.

■ Sinharaja Biosphere Reserve is a UNESCO World Heritage Site. One of the few surviving rain forests in the world, its biodiversity blends uniquely with endemic flora and fauna.


■ Kumana National Park hosts a multitude of birds and is regarded as an important bird nesting and breeding ground. Tens of thousands of birds migrate to the Kumana swamp area from April to July.

■ Wilpattu National Park is located north of Puttalam. Leopards, spotted deer, elephants, wild boar, sloth bears and crocodiles can be found in this fairly thick dry zone jungle area.

■ Yala National Park is the most popular park in the country that has a wide variety of wild animals. Yala also has one of the highest leopard densities in the world.

- Arugam Bay is one of the best surf spots in the world. International surfing competitions are held here annually

Precautionary steps:

Visit a doctor prior to your iourney

Make sure you have received the necessary vaccinations or medications depending on your destination. It is advisable to have prescribed medicines best suited for you.





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Route Map


