MUNICIPAL COUNCIL NOTICES.

MUNICIPALITY OF KANDY.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall on Saturday, September 17, 1898, at 8.30 o'clock a.m., in accordance with notice dated September 12, 1898.

Present:—Hon. Mr. Allanson Bailey, Chairman; J. H. Sproule, Esq.; Dr. F. Keyt; W. D. Gibbon, Esq.; E. Beven, Esq.; C. Vanderwall, Esq.; R. W. Jonklaas, Esq.; A. Philip, Esq.

- 1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on August 20, 1898, were read and confirmed.
- 2. The following documents were laid on the table:—Statement of Receipts and Disbursements from close of 1897 to August 31, 1898, on account of the General Revenue, Police Assessment, and Water-rate 'Accounts; Progress Report of Work done brought up to the same date; Return of Cases instituted by the several Inspectors during the Month of August; and Health Officer's Report.

Resolved,—That the several statements, together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, be forwarded as required by section 90 of "The Muncipal Councils' Ordinance," No. 7 of 1887, to the Colonial Secretary for publication in the Government Gazette.

- 3. The following correspondence was submitted and read:-
 - (a) Letter No. 38, dated August 17, from the Colonial Secretary, intimating that the Treasurer had been instructed to advance the Council Rs. 60,000 as a loan for purchase of land in connection with the water supply.
 - (b) Letter No. 39, dated August 24, from the Colonial Secretary, stating that Ordinance No. 12 of 1898 to further amend "The Municipal Councils' Ordinance, 1887," is now in force.

 (c) Letter No. 40, dated August 24, from the Colonial Secretary, acknowledging receipt of Chairman's letter
 - (c) Letter No. 40, dated August 24, from the Colonial Secretary, acknowledging receipt of Chairman's letter forwarding a resolution of Council in respect of alleys, and suggesting that instead of attempting to deal with all the alleys at one and the same time, the Council should select some of the worst and ascertain cost of acquisition and of erecting model buildings; also Health Officer's reports as to the six worst alleys.

It was proposed by Mr. E. Beven, seconded by Mr. C. Vanderwall, "that the following members be appointed a Special Committee to deal with the matter of alleys and to report to the Council:—The Chairman, Messrs. Gibbon, Creasy, and Philip."

Proposed by Mr. C. Vanderwall, seconded by Mr. A. Philip, "that the thanks of the Municipal Council be conveyed to Government for their letter of August 24, and for the promise of considering favourably an application for a loan.'

(d) Letter No. 41, dated August 31, from the Colonial Secretary, forwarding copy of report by Captain Hallaran, R.A.M. Corps, on sanitary condition of Malabar street drains

(e) Letter No. 42, dated September 2, from the Colonial Secretary, acknowledging receipt of Chairman's letter forwarding copy of resolution having reference to Special Committee's report recommending alteration of section 26, chapter II., of schedule to Ordinance No. 19 of 1896.

(f) Letter No. 43, dated September 5, from the Colonial Secretary, relating to the recommendation of the Committee appointed to report on the sanitary condition of Kandy in respect of the alleged necessity for legislation for authority to enter private sheds and galas, and forwarding copy of letter from the Attorney-General.

It was proposed by Mr. E. Beven, seconded by Dr. F. Keyt, that the letter be referred to the following Special Committee for report :- Messrs. Sproule, Beven, Vanderwall, and Philip.

(g) Letter No. 44, dated September 6, from the Colonial Secretary, intimating that the Governor regrets he must decline to comply with the request of the Council that the proceeds of sales of lands within the catchment area of the reservoir be handed over to the Council.

(h) Letter No. 53, dated September 3, from the Government Agent, forwarding copy of letter from the Colonial Secretary respecting the land at Mahaiyawa handed over by the Military and occupied by the Municipal Council, and inquiring whether the Council desire to buy the land at a valuation.

On motion proposed by Dr. F. Keyt, seconded by Mr. J. H. Sproule, it was resolved that the land at Mahaiyawa be purchased at the valuation made, viz., Rs. 1,512·50.

(g) Letter No. 2,182 of August 20, from the Director of Public Works, and connected correspondence respecting a retaining wall on the Katugastota road.

4. Mr. Philip, pursuant to notice, inquired—What had been done in regard to extending the limits of the Municipality to Ampitiya, including the dhoby's quarters.

*Reply.—The Special Committee appointed on July 16, 1898, has not yet reported. A meeting had been called

for Saturday next.

- 5. In pursuance of notice, Mr. Philip proposed, seconded by Mr. Vanderwall, "that the attention of Government be drawn to the manner in which the assurances given by the Public Works Department in reference to the disgraceful condition of the sides of the Katugastota road from the 1st milepost to the railway viaduct have remained unfulfilled since the damage by floods at the end of 1896, was officially brought under immediate notice by the late Provincial Engineer, Central Province (Mr. A. Murray), and by the Municipal Council through special reports and otherwise, the orders at the time being that the work was to be done from Maintenance Estimates, and that if this could not be done, that the cost be included on the following year's estimates; notwithstanding which and renewed assurances to the contrary nothing has yet been done to put the sides of this principal thoroughfare within Municipal limits into a proper state so as to prevent still further damage and encroachment by a recurrence of floods which may take place at any time.
- 6. Proposed by Mr. C. Vanderwall, seconded by Mr R. W. Jonklaas, "that with reference to letter No. 41, dated August 31, from the Colonial Secretary, the Government be informed that in the opinion of the Council the drains referred to should be kept up and maintained in proper repair by the Public Works Department, who have undertaken the upkeep of the streets, inasmuch as the drains are necessary for their preservation.

On the motion being put to the Meeting, the following votes were recorded:-

Ayes, 6; Noes, 2; Majority, 4.

The Chairman declared the motion carried.

7. Mr. Philip, in accordance with notice, inquired—When the Annual Administration Report of the Municipal Council for 1897, with the observations appended thereto, under section 80, sub-section (e), "The Municipal Councils' Ordinance, 1887," was transmitted for submission to the Governor in Executive Council, and moved that the letters to Government be read, and any papers be laid on the table. The motion was seconded by Mr. Beven.

Reply.—Annual Report sent to the Colonial Secretary on July 20, letter No. 76, dated July 20, to the Colonial

Secretary, forwarding observations of the Special Committee was read.

8. Mr. Philip, pursuant to notice, asked—What delays the erection of the new public latrine at the site decided on by the Municipal Council near the junction of Lady Gordon's road with Katugastota road and the improvement and conservancy of the locality, desired and determined in terms of resolution passed at the General Meeting held on July 16.

Reply.—The delay was owing to a dispute in respect of one of the boundaries. The work of erecting the latrine way commenced on September 13.

Mr. Philip, with leave of Council, withdrew the motion calling for papers.

9. Mr. Philip, in accordance with notice, asked—How the various cemeteries within Municipal limits are regulated, and moved that the Health Officer's reports recently received on the subject be laid on the table.

The motion as altered to "laid on the table" instead of "read" was seconded by Mr. Beven.

Reply.—The General Cemetery at Mahaiyawa is governed by "The Cemeteries Ordinance, 1862," Ordinance No. 1 of 1894, and regulations made by the Government before the Council took charge, and other burial grounds by Ordinance No. 2 of 1894 and by-laws in chapter XVIII. of the schedule to Ordinance No. 19 of 1896.

Application has been made for registration of one of the burial grounds, viz., the Mohammedan burial ground at Katukele. The owner of the Mulgampola burial ground has been warned to register. The Chairman has ordered

a prosecution in respect of a recent burial on a ground at Getambe, near the railway line. This ground is apparently not in charge of any one.

It was ordered that the Health Officer's report dated September 8 be circulated.

10. Mr. Philip, with leave of Council, amended the motion of which he had given notice by substituting "laid on the table" for "read," and moved "that the most recent report on dairies from the Health Officer be laid on the table."

Report dated September 12 was laid on the table and ordered to be circulated.

11. Resolved that a copy of the report on the sanitary condition of Kandy by the Committee appointed by His Excellency the Governor be sent for publication in the Government Gazette in connection with the Minutes of the Special Meeting held on August 6 last.

Health Officer's Report for August, 1898.

Water Supply.—The water supply of Kandy still remains open to many sources of pollution. I consider the matter so urgent that I am of opinion that Fairieland bungalow and all lands from which the supply to the reservoir comes should be bought up at once, and that the purchases should be completed as expeditiously as possible. I wrote some days ago to Mr. Gordon Pyper asking him to let me know the number of coolies daily employed on Hantane and Fairieland estates from which the water supply is derived, also asking him if weeding, &c., is still carried on. I wrote asking for this information in order that I might forward it to the Members of the Municipal

I know from personal observation that large numbers of Council, but up to date I received no reply to my letter. coolies are employed on the estates I refer to, and I think it a most disgraceful state of affairs that the residents in Kandy have to drink water which is contaminated by these coolies. I beg again to be permitted to bring most urgently to the notice of the Municipal Council the way in which their water supply is liable to sources of contamination.

Alleys.—The alleys of Kandy remain as a rule in a most insanitary state.

Drains.—The drainage of Kandy could not well be worse than it is; many of the drains are simply past descrip-

tion they are so bad.

Laundries. - All the laundries in Kandy have been limewashed. I consider many houses used as laundries

consider many houses used as laundries in Kandy have been innewashed. I consider many houses used as laundries quite unsuited for such a purpose, and many times have I thus reported to the Chairman, stating my reasons for doing so. I beg again to be permitted to bring the insanitary condition of the laundries generally to the notice of the Municipal Council.

Cometeries.—On the 7th of this month I pointed out personally to the Chairman how several cemeteries along Peradeniya road are conducted. I showed the Chairman how the dead were buried, and Mr. Bailey saw for himself that in many cases the deaths could not have been registered. I asked the care-taker of the large Mohammedan cemeters and the council and the conditions of deaths had a rectard to the conditions of the large Mohammedan cemeters. tery at Katukele to show me all the certificates of deaths he had ever got from medical men, as I presumed he kept them all; he showed me thirteen certificates, these were all dated from last July; in this cemetery we noticed many fresh graves. I noticed that one of the Members of the Municipal Council lately asked what the death-rate of Kandy was. It would be simply impossible to answer this question until the cemeteries I refer to are registered. As far as I could find out, not one of the by-laws in chapter XVIII. relating to burials and burial grounds of Ordinance No. 19 of 1896 are kept in any of the cemeteries the Chairman saw. I have sent a special report about these cemeteries to the Chairman.

Public Latrines have been kept in a sanitary state.

Scavenging.—The scavenging of the town has been well done during August. The scavenging carts are many of them in bad repair. The Chairman inspected land at Peradeniya with a view to purchasing it for depositing refuse, &c., thereon. A depôt at Paradeniya is urgently required, also one at the end of Malabar street, the one at Katugastota

being too far away.

Night Soil.—As far as I can find out the carts have removed the night-soil in a sanitary manner from all the public latrines and many private ones during the month.

Depôt at Katugastota.—This place has been kept in a sanitary state. A well to supply water for washing the carts is urgently required there.

Cooly Lines. The Municipal cooly lines have not been kept in a sanitary state during the month.

Bakeries are all in a fairly sanitary state.

Dairies .- All dairies are kept in a sanitary state; frequent inspections are made.

Cuttle Stalls are kept in as sanitary a condition as possible. Owners have often to be prosecuted for not

complying with the by-laws.

Public Market.—This building has been kept well scavenged during the month. All the stalls required to be either painted or limewashed. The tats in the market are in a worse condition than even they were.

Slaughter Houses.—These buildings have been kept in a sanitary state. Cuttle Inspection Shed has been kept in a sanitary state.

Cattle.—I carefully inspected cattle and sheep exposed for being slaughtered; only good animals were passed

Fish Boutiques .- Several inspections were made of these places during the month, and several owners were

prosecuted and punished for selling rotten fish.

Native Eating Houses.—All these places have been limewashed. As a rule their drainage and other sanitary arrangements are most defective.

Infectious Diseases.—Several cases of chickenpox occurred during the month.
