ORDER NISI.

In the District Court of Jaffna.

Testamentary No. 661.
Jurisdiction.

In the matter of the estate and effects of Elizabeth Kothanatham wife of Kathirgamer Saravananathan of Jaffna, late of Sangei-Barkah in Province Wellesley in the Straits Settlements.

This matter coming on for disposal before Hugh Nevill Esquire, District Judge of Jaffna on the 14th day of May 1895 in the presence of Mr. V. Tampoo, Proctor, on the part of the Petitioner Kathirgamer Saravananathan of Jaffna and the affidavit of the said Kathirgamer Saravananathan dated the 14th day of May 1895 having been read.

It is ordered that the said Kathirgamer Saravananathan be and he is hereby declared entitled to have Letters of Administration issued to him in relation to the testamentary affairs of the said Elizabeth Kothanatham of Jaffna. Local & General.

—CHANGES OF MAIL SERVICE. From the Island, the Pedro and Kangasanturai coaches with the mails left town in the evening, and the Pedro and Kangasanturai early in the morning. This gives those living at outstations their Colombo mail on the same day that it is received in Jaffna.

—MR. M. M. MIRZAN. M. L. O. has been made companion of the order of St. Michael and St. George. We congratulate him on his well deserved honour.

—THE LATE MRS. TAMBAY COOKE. Death has entered our ranks again and taken another in the very flower of her youth. Mrs. Tamby Cooke, daughter of Proctor T. M. Tampoo, was called to "Higher service" on the 29th ult. after a short illness of but a few days. She left behind a large circle of friends who mourn her loss. The bereaved husband and parents have our sympathy in their deep affliction.

—A LULL IN THE MONSOON. On Thursday last, the south west monsoon which had been blowing steadily for some days suddenly fell, and one or two days following the heat was almost unbearable. There seems to be great diversity of opinion as to whether the "big monsoon" has really set in. It certainly is unusual to have such a lull. Rain still holds off and the ground is dry and baked. The health of the peninsula continues good.

—GOVT. AGENT CENTRAL PRO. The Hon'ble Allanston Bailey Esq. has been made the Government Agent of the Central Province.

—It is reported that Mr. Call, Director of Public Instruction, is expected back in Colombo in August next.

—It is rumoured that Fureness has been designated a Republic, and independent sent to the foreign Powers.

—U. S. SECRETARY OF STATE. The death of Walter Q. Gresham Sec. of State U. S. A. is reported by telegram. Mr. Gresham was appointed to this position early in 1893 and entered upon his duties in March of the same year. His successor has not yet been announced.

—We would warn our readers against the purchase of tickets for the "Grand Fete and Drawing of Prizes in aid of St. Mary Magdalene's Asylum, Dublin." Buying tickets for a chance at a prize even for a good cause is wrong and demoralizing. We wonder that the Post Office authorities did not confiscate the whole lot.

—MISSISSIPPI NEWS. Some thieves broke into the house of an American Baptist Missionary living at Tibbaw, Burma, and killed him when he attempted to defend his property.

—By telegraph we learn that the Pacific Mail steamer "Colima" was wrecked on the coast of Mexico. As many as 170 lives, it is reported, were lost.

—RAI BAHADUR C. W. TAMOTHARAMPILLY. A. S. E. Among the native gentlemen who were recipients of honours from the government of India on the Queen's birthday was, we are glad to notice, Mr. C. W. Tamotharampilly, pilla, B. A. S. E. He has been created a Rai Bahadur, and is probably the first Jaffnese who has received this distinction.

—MISSIONARIES. The Rev. T. P. Smith and family who were expected back last night, are compelled to wait several days for a steamer to call at Negapattam and bring them over. They finally arrived in Jaffna yesterday morning.

It is too bad that the steamers plying between India and Ceylon are so uncertain. Very vexatious delays have occurred more than once this year. Dr. Grievs accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Smith and will take up her abode in Ooderville assisting Miss Myers in the Boarding School.

—MRS. ELLA SAMSON of the American Madura mission having found that the climate would not allow of her remaining in that field, is on a visit to Jaffna, hoping that she may be able to live in our less trying climate. Miss Young of Colombo is visiting her sister Mrs. Pickford at Nellore.

CONVENTION AT NELLORE.

On Friday and Saturday, May 24th and 25th, a series of quiet meetings took place at Nellore.

On Friday morning, at 7 o'clock, a Bible Reading and Prayer meeting took place conducted by Mr. Pickford, the subject being the 1st chapter of the 1st Epistle of St. John.

At 9.30 a large gathering took place in the church. The building was quite full. The subject of the large meetings both morning and evening of that day, was the covenant with man. The Revs. G. J. Trimmet and G. Chapman spoke in the morning, and the Revs. D. P. Silva and S. Enay in the evening.

From 2 to 2.30 in the afternoon a meeting specially for pastors took place in the mission house conducted by the Rev. Dr. Scott. Fourteen were present. At the same time a meeting for women and girls was held at the Boarding school, several of the ladies of the mission taking part in it. A large meeting also for Christian workers took place in the church addressed by Mr. Pickford.

On Saturday morning at 7 o'clock a Bible reading was held, the subject being the 2nd chapter of the 1st Epistle of St. John. At 9.30 a large meeting was held and addresses given by the Revs. L. Pickford and J. Backus, the subject for the day being "The second coming of the Lord Jesus Christ."

At 2.30 a meeting for Bible Women, School Mistresses &c. was held in the Girls Boarding school where addresses were given by Mrs. Hastings and Miss Lamb. A children's service also took place in the church conducted by Mr. J. Thevathasa of Pallai. In the evening at 6 the church was again filled with the attentive audience and addresses were given by the Revs. S. Ellyatamby and R. C. Hastings. Those who had the privilege of organizing these meetings were greatly pleased to see the large numbers present. Between 500 and 600 were probably present at the larger gatherings. We have every reason to believe that God's blessing rested upon the whole series of meetings, and we sincerely trust that the result will be for the glory of His great name.

JAFFNA CHRISTIAN PROVIDENT ASSOCIATION.

The third Annual meeting of the J. C. P. Association was held at Manippal on Tuesday of last week. There was a good attendance. The Rev. G. Lees presided and read the meeting. Mr. J. J. Abraham, the Secretary, read an encouraging Report. There are at present 96 members, and we understand that several are intending to have their names enrolled as members. The treasurer Mr. Lees read out the balance sheet which was audited by our Police Magistrate, Mr. Woodhouse and Dr. Grenier. There is a balance in hand of about Rs. 1400, which shows that the Association is on a firm footing.

Mr. A. S. Appilly, S. M. P. called upon the J. C. P. Association to make some introductory remarks. The Chairman then addressed the meeting on the subjects given. The speakers dealt at length on the object of benefits of the Association. Mr. Appilly related some of the objections urged against the Association. It appears that there are some who think that there is no necessity of having European Missionaries as President and Treasurer. Mr. Appilly said that these are no competent men. Result Christians to hold these offices but it is to be understood that it is the wish of the majority of the members that European Missionaries should hold these two important offices. As our churches will be benefited by this Association, we trust our Pastors will endeavour to stir up their members to join it as soon as possible.

THE HAWAIIAN REPUBLIC.

About two years ago the Queen of the Sandwich Islands, by her alliance with opium and lottery tickets, and by her contempt of the constitution which she had solemnly sworn to uphold, was forced to abdicate her throne. After her downfall the people asked the United States to annex the islands as a territory, and to assume control. This was refused, and after long consultation and debate, a republic was proclaimed and a constitution adopted. July 4th 1894.

The president of this republic is chosen for a term of six years and is not eligible for immediate re-election when his term of office has expired. He is chosen by the two houses of the Legislature in joint session and must have a majority of the votes in each house. The Legislature consists of two houses of fifteen members each chosen by the people. Any doubt as to the election of any member is settled by the Supreme Court.

In addition to these two bodies, there is what is called a Council of State consisting of 10 members. Five are chosen by each house of the Legislature and five by the President. They hold office from the close of one session of the Legislature to the close of another, so that the President is never without a body of men with whom he may consult in times of emergency.

As to suffrage, all male citizens, twenty years of age, who can fluently speak, read, and write the English or Hawaiian language, are entitled to vote for Representatives. To vote for a Senator, one must possess in addition to the above qualification a certain amount of property. Foreigners can obtain if they wish, all the rights of citizenship without renouncing their allegiance to their home governments.

The constitution seems to be well adapted to Hawaii's peculiar situation, and it is claimed shows statesmanship of the highest order.

The first president chosen was Sanford B. Dole, a prominent lawyer and an associate justice of the Supreme Court. He is a son of missionaries and was born in the Islands. Two of his cabinet are also missionaries—some one, the Minister of finance, and the other the Attorney-General. Another missionary's son is Chief Justice Judd who is at the head of the Judiciary Department. All these men are spoken of as men of sterling worth, and who have the real interests of the republic at heart.

It is a curious fact that out of the 100,000 inhabitants of this republic, only a little over two fifths are Hawaiians and many of these are of mixed blood. A little less than two fifths are Chinese and Japanese, while the remaining fifth laid originally from America and Europe.

A few months ago the deposed Queen instigated a rebellion, which was promptly suppressed. She has now signed a document by which she renounces all claim to the throne on her behalf as well as on the behalf of her heirs. We shall watch with interest the progress of this little republic, wishing for its prosperity and peace.
