BENGAL.—No. 105.

*New Zealand, South Island—Daggs Sound—Sunken Rock
off Schooner Point.*

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 159 of 1898) of the existence of a sunken rock, on which the Government steamvessel Tutanakai touched, with a depth of 12 ft. on it at low-water springs, situated at one cable offshore, in a position with north-east extreme of Schooner point bearing E. by S., distant a quarter of a mile; and western extreme seventy fathoms point N. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

Approximate position: lat. $45^{\circ} 25' 10''$ S., long. $166^{\circ} 52' 50''$ E.

Variation, 16° easterly in 1898.

BENGAL.—No. 106.

*Bay of Bengal—Sandheads and River Hooghly—Anchorage
Lights in River Hooghly.*

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 178 of 1898, paragraph 3) that on April 1, 1898, the under-mentioned anchorage lights would be shown in the river Hooghly:—

(a) Kalpi anchorage (Jigerkolli) light is a fixed white light, elevated about 12 ft. above the water, and visible from about north, through west, to S.S.W., at distance of 5 miles in clear weather.

It is situated near the surveying beacon about half a mile eastward of Jigerkolli obelisk.

Approximate position: lat. $22^{\circ} 6' 0''$ N., long. $88^{\circ} 11' 15''$ E.

(b) Kantabaria point light is a fixed red light, elevated 16 ft. above the water, visible 5 miles in clear weather, and shown either from Kantabaria obelisk or from a mast close to it.

Approximate position: lat. $22^{\circ} 8' 0''$ N., long. $88^{\circ} 12' 40''$ E.

(c) Diamond harbour lights are two fixed red lights, visible 2 to 3 miles in clear weather, one shown from the yard arm of the Telegraph Office, the other from abreast the Custom-house trees, at an elevation of about 14 ft. above the water.

Approximate position, Telegraph office: lat. $22^{\circ} 11' 30''$ N., long. $88^{\circ} 11' 5''$ E.

(d) Fisherman's point light is a fixed red light, elevated 14 ft. above the water, visible 2 to 3 miles in clear weather, and shown from the western bank of the river abreast Fisherman's anchorage.

Approximate position: lat. $22^{\circ} 19' 40''$ N., long. $88^{\circ} 5' 30''$ E.

Variation, 3' easterly in 1898.

China Sea—Pescadores Islands.

(1) *Sunken Rock North-eastward of Ragged Island.*

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 179 of 1898) that a sunken rock, on which the sea breaks, is reported to exist in a position with Ragged island bearing S.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., distant $4\frac{1}{2}$ cables; and south extreme of Organ island W. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.

Approximate position: lat. $23^{\circ} 36' 30''$ N., long. $119^{\circ} 41' 45''$ E.

The symbol for a rock with less than 6 ft. water on it, with the word "breaks" written against it, has been placed on the Admiralty Chart in the above position.

Also that the sunken rock shown on the chart nearly a mile north-eastward from Organ island extends about a quarter of a mile north and south.

(2) *Rocks Northward of North Rocks.*

Also that the under-mentioned rocks exist northward of North rocks:—

(a) Niyake sho, a sunken rock, on which the steam-vessel Naramaru was wrecked in 1897, is situated about a mile northward of North rocks, in approximately lat. $23^{\circ} 48'$ N., long. $119^{\circ} 34' 50''$ E.

(b) Higashiyake sho, a rock above water, in approximately lat. $23^{\circ} 48' 20''$ N., long. $119^{\circ} 34' 55''$ E.

(c) Oyake sho, a rock above water, in approximately lat. $23^{\circ} 48' 10''$ N., long. $119^{\circ} 34' 20''$ E.

NOTE.—The two masts of the Nara maru are reported to be still standing, and the upper part of the wreck shows at low water.
