WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by section 2 of "The Vehicles Ordinance, 1901," it is enacted that the said Ordinance shall come into operation on such day as the Governor shall, by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, appoint:

WHEREAS by a Proclamation dated the Thirty-first day of July, One thousand Eight hundred and Ninety-five, the revenue divisions of the said revenue district of Kalutara were re-distributed and re-defined, and it was appointed that the said divisions should consist of certain sub-divisions and villages as set out in the said Proclamation :

And whereas it is expedient further to alter and re-define, for revenue and administrative purposes, the sub-divisions called Walallawiti pattu and Iddagoda pattu in Pasdun korale west, being two of the sub-divisions set out in the said Proclamation :

Now know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, do hereby proclaim and appoint that from and after the 1st day of October, 1901, the village Kuruddippita, situated in the sub-division Walallawiti pattu aforesaid, shall, for revenue and administrative purposes, be transferred from the said sub-division Walallawiti pattu to the sub-division Iddagoda pattu in Pasdun korale west.

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WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by section 41 of "The Branch Roads Ordinance, 1896," it is enacted that in any case in which a road or portion of a road has been constructed or partially constructed, or shall, after the coming into operation of the said Ordinance, be constructed by the proprietors of any estates, it shall be lawful for the proprietors for the time being of such estates to apply to the Governor that such road may be treated as a branch road constructed under the said Ordinance, and that on receipt of such application, the Governor may, if he thinks fit, with the advice of the Executive Council, issue a Proclamation declaring that such road shall be treated as a road made under the said Ordinance; and that on the publication of such Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* the provisions of the said Ordinance relating to improvement, upkeep, and repair of roads shall apply to such road as if it had been originally constructed under the provisions of the said Ordinance :

And whereas a road from Ratnapura to Malawale ferry, in the District of Ratnapura, Province of Sabaragamuwa, has been constructed by the proprietors of the following estates, namely, Mahawale, Hapugastenna, Hopewell, Balakotenne, Wewelwatte, and Alupolla :

And whereas such proprietors have applied to the Governor that such road be treated as a Branch road constructed under the said Ordinance :

And whereas the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, thinks fit to declare that the said road shall be treated as a road made under "The Branch Roads Ordinance, 1896" :

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare that the said road from Ratnapura to Malawale ferry, in the District of Ratnapura, Province of Sabaragamuwa, constructed by the proprietors of the following estates, namely, Mahawale, Hapugastenne, Hopewell, Balakotenne, Wewelwatte, and Alupolla, shall, as from or after the First day of January, 1902, be treated as a road made under "The Branch Roads Ordinance, 1896."

WHEREAS by section 1 of the Ordinance No. 3 of 1887, intituled "An Ordinance empowering the Governor in Executive Council to extend the provisions of 'The Small Tenements' Ordinance, 1882, to places other than towns," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* from time to time to extend all or any of the provisions of the Ordinance No. 11 of 1882—anything in the said Ordinance to the contrary notwithstanding—to any place in this Island other than a town, and to define in such Proclamation the limits of such place :

REGULATIONS as to issue, surrender, forfeiture, and restoration of the "Colonial Auxiliary Forces Officers' Decoration," and the Colonial Auxiliary Forces Long Service Medal," under Royal Warrant of the 18th May, 1899.

#### COLONIAL AUXILIARY FORCES OFFICERS' DECORATION.

##### *Persons Eligible.*

1. (a) Officers having 20 years commissioned service, which need not be continuous.  
(b) Honorary Colonels and Acting Chaplains who have the qualifying service of 20 years.  
(c) Officers who have retired and have the qualifying service.

##### *Qualifying Service.*

2. (a) Service rendered partly in the Local Forces of one Colony or Protectorate, and partly in the Local Forces of another Colony or Protectorate, or partly in the local forces of one or more Colonies or Protectorates, and partly in the Volunteer Force of Great Britain; provided that no officer shall be eligible unless at least half his qualifying service has been rendered in the Militia or Volunteer Forces of one or more Colonies or Protectorates, service on the West Coast of Africa counting double.

(b) Half the time served in the ranks of the Auxiliary Forces of any Colony or Protectorate, Indian Volunteers, or the Volunteer Force of Great Britain.

3. Service on the Permanent Staff shall not reckon as qualifying Service for the Decoration.

##### *Applications.*

4. Application for the Decoration will be made in writing by the Commanding Officer of each Corps and will in each case be supported by a statement of the applicant's service on Form A. Commanding Officers will forward their recommendation through the usual channels of correspondence to the Governor, together with the certificate marked B or the certificate marked C.

5. The Decoration being granted as a reward for good and long service, Commanding Officers should in each case state in general terms the reason which in their opinion gives the applicant a claim to receive the Decoration.

THE following rules of the Provincial Committee, Buddhist Temporalities Ordinance, Kegalla, made under section 36 of Ordinance No. 3 of 1889, as amended by Ordinance No. 3 of 1901, are published for general information.

Rules referred to.

A.

1. Three members of the Provincial Committee shall form a *quorum*.
2. In the absence of the President one of the members present shall be selected to preside who shall have, for the time being, all the rights and privileges vested in the President.
3. A member absenting himself from three consecutive general meetings shall *ipso facto* cease to be a member.
4. In the event of a vacancy occurring in the Committee a meeting of the remaining members; the members of the District Committees, and the trustees shall elect a duly qualified person to fill the vacancy.

B.

1. The meetings shall be held at the office of the Committee in Kegalla, or at any other place in the Province, after due notice of time and place being given to members.
2. All correspondence under the Ordinance between the incumbents, trustees, and the Committee members shall pass through the District Committees.
3. The Committee shall appoint one of their members as Honorary Secretary, and shall employ as many clerks and messengers as may be found necessary.
4. The business coming before the Committee shall be decided by a majority of votes. In the event of the votes being equal the vote of the President shall be counted for two votes.
5. The Honorary Secretary shall enter in a book the business to be placed before each meeting, and shall record in another book the minutes of the proceedings of each meeting, and the minutes shall be confirmed from time to time, the President signing such confirmation.

C.

1. Each Sangasabhawa shall nominate an incumbent for each vihare belonging to their sect, and shall send his name to the Provincial Committee through the District Committee. If approved a certificate shall be given to such incumbent.
2. The characteristic qualifications required in a priest of the Buddhist faith (adherence to and observation of the rules laid down in the "Vinaya" for their guidance, knowledge of the Buddhist doctrines and education) shall be considered essential qualifications in candidates for incumbencies, and the Provincial Committee shall give due weight and consideration to such qualifications.
3. A representation of an offence committed by an incumbent of a temple or any other priest or priests in violation of the "Vinaya", made in writing by any respectable person or persons of the district wherein the offender lives, shall be considered a sufficient cause for the Provincial Committee to institute an inquiry.
4. The Provincial Committee and a Chapter of not less than ten Buddhist priests selected by the Committee shall constitute a competent body to inquire into offences committed by priests in violation of the "Vinaya."
5. The Chapter of Buddhist priests shall belong to the same sect as that of the offender against whom a complaint is preferred, and its opinion is to be taken by the Committee only on "Vinaya" matters.

6. The Provincial Committee alone shall have the power of finally deciding on the removal or otherwise of the accused from the incumbency, and in the event of the nature of the offence established at the inquiry requiring that the offender or offenders should be disrobed, it shall be competent for the said Committee, provided the action be acquiesced in by the said advisory council or a majority of its members, to entrust a committee of priests especially appointed with the execution of this part of the finding.

7. All charges preferred against priests shall be fully inquired into and the proceedings duly recorded. Every such inquiry shall be in the presence of the accused who shall have full liberty to make their defence, unless in case of their absence it is proved to the satisfaction of the Provincial Committee that they have had ample and distinct notice of the inquiry, and the Committee is satisfied that they have no valid excuse for being absent therefrom, and further satisfied that they purposely evade the inquiry.

8. If any person who is not duly ordained a priest, or who has been disrobed under the above rules, is found wearing the robes of a Buddhist priest, the Provincial Committee shall have the power to prosecute him at the nearest Police Court.

9. In the event of the incumbency of a Basnayaka of a dewale falling vacant, the President of the District Committee of the district wherein the dewale is situate shall hold a meeting to elect an incumbent, giving fourteen days' notice of the purpose of the meeting to all persons who are empowered under section 6 of Ordinance No. 17 of 1895 to give their consent for such election. The President of the District Committee shall preside unless he himself is a candidate for the incumbency, or absent from the meeting when one of the members present shall be elected to preside.

D.

1. From the income of each vihare and dewale five per cent. shall be paid annually to the Provincial Committee for necessary expenses in carrying out the provisions of the Ordinance.

2. The Provincial Committee shall have the power to raise or lower the percentage of assessment from time to time, if it shall be found necessary.

3. All moneys paid into the Provincial Committee shall be deposited in a bank in the name of the Committee, and cheques shall be drawn by the President and one of the members.

4. The President of the Provincial Committee shall have power to grant certificates of recognition to all persons elected to hold offices under the Ordinance in a form to be hereafter framed and adopted by the Committee for general use.

5. The Provincial Committee shall keep their accounts systematically, and the same shall be audited annually.

6. The Provincial Committee shall have power to alter, amend, or frame additional rules, or cancel existing ones, when it is found necessary to do so.

SIR,—WITH reference to my Circular despatch of the 30th October last, stating that the Government of New Zealand had decided to adopt from the 1st January, 1901, the Imperial Penny Postage scheme for letters, I have the honour to inform you that by a Proclamation issued by the Governor of New Zealand on the 11th June last, under the authority of His Majesty's Order in Council of the 13th May, 1901, the boundaries of the Colony were from the date of Proclamation extended so as to include all the islands and territories which now, or may hereafter, form part of His Majesty's dominions, situate within the following boundary line:—

A line commencing at a point at the intersection of the 23rd degree of South Latitude, and the 156th degree of Longitude West of Greenwich, and proceeding due North to the point of intersection of the 8th degree of South Latitude and the 156th degree of Longitude West of Greenwich, thence due West to the point of intersection of the 8th degree of South Latitude and the 167th degree of Longitude West of Greenwich, thence due south to the point of intersection of the 17th degree of South Latitude and the 167th degree of Longitude West of Greenwich, thence due West to the point of intersection of the 17th degree of South Latitude and the 170th degree of Longitude West of Greenwich, thence due South to the point of intersection of the 23rd degree of South Latitude and the 170th degree of Longitude West of Greenwich, and thence due East to the starting point at the intersection of the 23rd degree of South Latitude and 156th degree of Longitude West of Greenwich.

The penny rate of postage will therefore in future be applicable to letters passing between persons in the Cook Islands, the Islands of Aitutaki, Niue, Mangaia, and other British Islands in the area included within the new boundary lines and persons in any other parts of the Empire which are parties to the penny postage scheme.

CEYLON TECHNICAL COLLEGE.

DEPARTMENT OF DRAWING AND ART.

(A)—Classes for Training Teachers of Drawing.

Applications are invited from persons who wish to become teachers of drawing for admission to a special course of training at the Ceylon Technical College. The course will be for one year at least. Certificates of qualification to teach drawing will be granted to those who satisfy the examiners. Persons of both sexes will be admitted.

N.B.—It must be understood that in this course the student will be trained, not only in the individual performance of practical drawing, but also in the faculty and method of teaching others, in the organization and conduct of classes, and in the preparation and selection of appropriate models and diagrams.

[His Excellency the Governor has directed that after the year 1901 the Code for Aided Schools shall provide for drawing being a separate subject in an additional schedule (marked schedule U in the Code for 1902) of six stages, and grants will not be paid for drawing as a "specific subject." Grants will be paid for passes in drawing at the rates specified in the Schedule of the Code for 1902, viz., ordinary grants will be paid for passes in drawing if none of the masters or mistresses teaching that subject in the school holds a qualifying certificate, and enhanced grants will be paid for passes in drawing in each stage if one of the masters or mistresses holds the drawing certificate of the Ceylon Technical College, or other qualifying certificate or diploma to teach drawing. Drawing will be a special subject for the Teachers' Certificate Examination, and a special certificate for passing in that subject will be issued, which will entitle the holder to earn enhanced grants for the school where he or she is teaching drawing.]

The course of training at the Ceylon Technical College will consist of both the theory and practice of drawing and also the methods of teaching, and will include the following:—

*First Year's Course.*

1. Practice and teaching of freehand drawing from flat examples, and the design and preparation of such patterns (including elementary brushwork).
2. Practice and teaching of drawing from models and objects in outline and in light and shade.
3. Practice and teaching of geometrical drawing and instruction in the use of instruments and scales.
4. Practice and the proper use in teaching of drawing in chalk on the blackboard.

*Second Year's Course.*

1. Practice and teaching of freehand drawing from casts of ornament.
2. Practice and teaching of drawing from models and objects in outline and in light and shade, the proper arrangements of such groups, and of classes for drawing the same.
3. Practice and the preparation of designs and patterns for the use of teaching freehand drawing (including the elementary principles of ornament).
4. The theory and practice of perspective.

The first class certificate to teach drawing will be granted to those who are successful at the examinations in at least six of the above subjects. Second class certificates will also be granted, which will qualify the holder to earn enhanced grants, and may be obtained by the work of the first year's course.

No fees will be charged to teachers, pupil teachers, and students of training schools. A deposit fee of Rs. 10 will be charged to cover cost of materials. The balance will be refunded at the end of the course.

The classes will be held on Tuesdays from 10.30 A.M. to 4 P.M. and on Saturdays from 10 A.M. to 4 P.M.

Application forms may be obtained from the Superintendent of the College.

The next term begins on September 9, and application forms properly filled in must be sent to the Superintendent before that date.

**(B)—Drawing Class for Students of the Normal School.**

Instruction will be given to the students of the Colombo Normal School in the following subjects:—

1. Practice and teaching of freehand drawing from flat examples and from casts of ornament.
2. Practice and teaching of drawing from models and objects in outline and in light and shade.
3. Practice and teaching of geometrical drawing and the use of instruments and scales.
4. Drawing in chalk on the blackboard.
5. The elementary principles of ornament.
6. The theory and practice of perspective.

No fees will be charged to students of the above school. A deposit fee of Rs. 2.50 each term is to be paid in advance to cover cost of materials; any balance will be refunded at the end of the term.

Application forms may be obtained from the Superintendent of the College.

**(C)—Drawing and Painting Class for Ladies.**

Applications are invited for admission to the drawing and painting class for ladies at the Ceylon Technical College.

The classes will be held on Wednesdays and Fridays from 11 A.M. to 1 P.M.

Instruction will be given in drawing and painting from flat copies, casts, models, groups of still life, &c.

Fees: Rs. 15 a term to be paid in advance, with a deposit of Rs. 5 to meet the cost of materials; the balance will be refunded at the end of each term.

The next term begins September 9.

Forms of application may be obtained from the Superintendent of the College.

**(D)—Drawing Class for Apprentices and Others.**

Applications are invited for admission to the drawing classes for apprentices and others at the Ceylon Technical College.

The classes will be held on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 4 P.M. to 6 P.M.

Instruction will be given in drawing from casts, models, and objects, in outline, and in light and shade, architectural drawing, the principles of orthographic, oblique, isometric, perspective, and orthogonal projection, &c.

Fees: Rs. 5 a term to be paid in advance, with a deposit of Rs. 5 to meet the cost of materials; the balance will be refunded at the end of each term. The fees will be reduced by one-half in the case of *bona fide* apprentices and former students of the College.

The next term begins September 9.

Application forms may be obtained from the Superintendent of the College.

**(E)—Drawing Classes for Boys and Girls.**

Applications are invited for admission to the classes in drawing at the Ceylon Technical College.

A class for boys will be held on Saturdays from 11.30 A.M. to 1.30 P.M. and for girls from 2 P.M. to 4 P.M.

Instruction will be given in freehand drawing from the flat drawing models, objects, and casts, in outline, and in light and shade, geometrical drawing, and perspective.

Fees: Rs. 5 a term to be paid in advance, with a deposit of Rs. 5 to meet the cost of materials; the balance will be refunded at the end of each term.

The next term begins September 9.
